

NOTICE OF THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CHARTER OF THE VILLAGE OF GROSSE POINTE PARK, WAYNE COUNTY, MICHIGAN

Petition to amend the Charter of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park, so as to provide benefits for incapacitated members of the Grosse Pointe Fire and Police Departments, whose incapacity occurred in the line of duty and to provide a retirement fund for the members of the Grosse Pointe Park Fire and Police Departments, and to provide for contribution by all members of both departments of two (2%) per cent of their yearly salaries to be used toward the payment of pension and retirement benefits payable to such members of either department as may be retired, due to incapacitation occurred by discharge of their duties.

CHAPTER XXVI. PENSION AND RETIREMENT

Section 1. A system of pensions and retirements for the benefit of the personnel of the Fire and Police Departments of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan is hereby established to take effect April 15, 1939.

Section 2. A Pension and Retirement Board is hereby created, hereinafter referred to as the "Board" which shall consist of seven members as

The Treasurer of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park.

Two members shall be appointed by the Council of the Village, one shall be a member of the Council, the other so appointed shall be a resident freeholder of the Village. C. Two members shall be appointed by the Fire Department, one

shall be a member of the Fire Department, the other so apopinted shall be a resident freeholder of the Village. D. Two members shall be appointed by the Police Department; one shall be a member of the Police Department, the other so appointed shall be

a resident freeholder of the Village. E. This Board shall not constitute a quorum unless six members are present.

F. In the event of illness or the inability of any Board member to serve, a Proxy shall represent the body for which he shall be Proxy by a showing of proper credentials from that body, and said Proxy shall have the full power to act in all respects as if said Board member were present.

G. Each member shall serve for a term of two years, except the Treasurer who shall serve for the duration of his official term of office.

H. In the event any member shall prior to the expiration of his term, cease to have the qualifications required as referred to in this section, then the appointive body shall appoint his successor. DUTIES OF THE BOARD.

Section 3. Duties of the Board shall be:

A. Make all rules and regulations necessary for the proper conduct of its official business.

B. The Treasurer of the Village shall be the custodian of all funds and shall be required to give a good and sufficient bond to said Board for the faithful performance of his duties and the safe keeping of all moneys collected hereunder, and to issue warrants for the disbursement of such money upon certification of the Board.

PENSIONS.

A. In case any person, a confirmed member of the Fire or Police Department, shall be killed while in the discharge of his duties, or shall receive injuries which result in his death, the widow shall be paid a pension. B. If there be no widow, then the mother or father of such person, if dependent upon him for support, shall, by vote of the Fire and Police Department Pension Board, be paid a pension. But if at any time the Board shall find that a parent or parents are no longer dependent upon such

pension for support, then the Board may discontinue such pension.

C. The widow shall receive the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per month during the term of her natural life or until she remarries, in which case all payment of monies under this chapter to such

The dependent parent or parents shall receive forty dollars (\$40.00) per month for one or seventy dollars (\$70.00) per month for

C. In all cases where pensions are payable because of injuries received by any Fireman or Policeman resulting in the death of such person, such pension shall be allowed from the date when salary was discontinued.

A. There shall be deducted by the Village, semi-monthly, two (2) per cent from the salary paid to each Fireman and Policeman, which money so deducted shall be paid into the Fire and Police Department's Retirement

B. On or before the first meeting of the Village Council of each fiscal year, the Board shall submit to the Council its estimate of additional monies necessary to pay such pensions for the current fiscal year, and the Council shall appropriate and cause to be collected and levied by taxation such a sum of money as shall be required to make the payments herein provided for.

C. The amount of money necessary for the Village Council to appropriate, shall be determined by an actuarial survey for each one-year period, D. All such money appropriated and not having been used for payment of pension claims, shall remain in the General Pension Fund, and may be invested in Bonds referred to in Section 11 of this Chapter. ACCUMULATION OF A RESERVE.

Section 11. A. Beginning April 15th, 1939 the Village Council shall provide the sum of twenty thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) each year for a period of five years. The fund from time to time thus provided shall be invested in the bonds of the Village, or Grosse Pointe Township Bonds or U. S. Government Bonds, which bonds shall be deposited with such bank as may be selected by the Board.

The Fund accumulated during this period shall be used as occasion may require, to supplement the sum provided annually in case such sum falls short of actual requirements because of an inadequate estimate of the necessary sum, as referred to in Section 10 of this Chapter.

C. Beginning April 15th, 1944 this reserve fund shall become part of the General Pension Fund.

REFUNDS OF DEDUCTIONS. Section 12. A. Should a Fireman or Policeman die in active service, leaving no dependents, three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350.00), shall be paid toward

the expenses of his burial.

B. Should a Fireman or Policeman become separated from the service for any reason before being eligible for pension, seventy-five (75%) per cent of his salary deductions, without interest, shall be returned to him. C. In the event a member shall die while in the service from causes not entitling his dependents to a pension, then the money so deducted from

his salary, without interest, shall be paid to his dependents. FIREMEN AND POLICEMEN.

Section 13.

A. The terms "Firemen" and "Policemen" shall be deemed to mean all employees of these Departments at the effective date of this amendment, and any or all future employees the Village Council shall designate as being members of these respective departments.

B. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply to Firemen or Policemen appointed at the request and expense of private parties nor to probationary Firemen or Policemen. SECURITY OF PENSION.

A. No money owed to any disabled or retired Fireman or Policeman. or his widow, or to his children or dependents, shall be held, seized, taken or detained, or levied on by virtue of any attachment, execution, injunction, writ, interlocutory or other order or decree of any process or proceeding whatever issued out of any Court of this state, for the payment or satisfaction, in whole or in part, of any debt, damages, claim, demand or judgment, against any such Fireman or Policeman or widow, or guardian of any minor child or children, or dependent parents of any deceased Fireman or Policeman. No pensioner shall have the right to assign his or her pension or any part therof, but said money shall be sacredly held, kept, secured and distributed for the purpose of pensioning the persons named, and for no other EFFECTIVE DATE.

Section 15.
A. This Chapter shall take effect two (2) years from date of adop tion in cases of service retirement. B. This Chapter shall take immediate effect in all cases of duty dis- .

ability or death. Section 16. All provisions of the Village Charter of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park inconsistent with the provisions hereof, are hereby expressly repealed, and in the event any section, or part of any section, of this Chapter, shall be determined to be invalid for any reason, such determination of invalidity shall in no way affect the remainder of this Chapter.
