City of Grosse Pointe Proposes Charter Changes

A nucleus of the charter commission which in 1935 drafted the present charter of the City of Grosse Pointe and the members of the council have unanimously approved certain changes in the charter of the City of Grosse Pointe which will be submitted to a vote of the electors at a special election to be held April 3rd in conjunction with the state and county election.

The committees of citizens, all former charter commissioners, is composed of Simon D. Den Uyl, Ben R. Marsh, Julius Nagel, Charles A. Poupard and Yates G. Smith.

The changes are also approved by the Michigan Municipal League and Albert E. Champney, Director of the Bureau of Taxation of Wayne County.

The details of the proposed amendment, according to Albert E. Meder, attorney for the city, are as follows:

Boundaries
There is an error in the boundaries of the city as stated in Section 1 of the present charter and the object of this portion of the amendment is to correct it. (Section 1)

Elections
Two members of the council and the city clerk are to be in charge of elections, rather than the city clerk alone. (Section 4)

The number of members of the election board is made indefinite rather than six. (Section 5)

Government Organization
At present a mayor and six members of the council are elected every two years. Under the proposed change the terms of the six councilmen are staggered. In order to accomplish this, elections being once every two years, their terms are made four years, while the mayor's term remains two years.

and three councilmen will be elected every two years as well as the mayor, assuring that regardless of the result of any election there will always be on the council at least three men of at least two years' experience as councilmen. (Section 11)

In the place of the clerk, treasurer and assessor being elected, they will be appointed by the council for indefinite terms. (Section 14).

Finance
For greater convenience in the handling of the budget and the drafting of the tax roll the time within which the various steps must be taken is extended: the submission of the assessment roll to the council by the third Monday in February rather than the first Monday in January; the opening of the assessment roll to the public beginning on the third Tuesday in February for the remainder of that week instead of during the week of the second Monday in January (Section 34); the Board of Review to meet on the fourth Monday in February in place of the third Monday in January; the Board of Review to complete its work by the second Monday in March rather than the first Monday in February (Section 35); the adoption of the budget by the council not later than the third instead of the first Monday in March; and the preparation of the tax roll by the assessor before the 28th instead of the 20th of March. (Section 41).

The requirement that anyone complaining regarding his assessment must do so in writing is dropped. (Section 34)

To aid in the preparation of the budget each department head, rather than each city officer, as the charter now reads, must submit an itemized statement of his proposed expenditures for the ensuing year to such person as the council may designate rather than to an official designated in the charter. (Section 36)

The council is given permission to borrow and issue bonds without an election in an amount in any one year up to one per cent of the assessed value provided that the amount so borrowed in any year together with the taxes levied for that year does not exceed the limit of taxation authorized by the charter and provided the net bonded indebtedness for all public purposes does not at any time exceed ten per cent of the assessed value of all real and personal property in the city. (Section 47)

Instead of the charter stating what officer or officers of the city shall issue and sign vouchers, the proposed amendment leaves the selection to the council. (Section 51)

**Dr. S. M. Brownell
Honored at Convention
Held in Cleveland**

High honor was paid Dr. S. M. Brownell, formerly superintendent of schools in Grosse Pointe, at the convention of the American Association of School Administrators at Cleveland last week. An engraved resolution adopted by the Grosse Pointe Board of Education commending Dr. Brownell's services to the school district was presented to him at the luncheon meeting of alumni of Yale University engaged in educational work. The presentation was made by Dr. E. R. Van Kleeck, the present superintendent. The resolution was bound in a leather covered booklet and was signed not only by members of the Board of Education but also by teachers, principals, and other employees of the school system.

Dr. Brownell left Grosse Pointe to become Professor of Educational Administration in the Graduate School at Yale University.

Dr. Finis Englemann, President of the New Haven State Teachers College, presided at the luncheon. Speakers were Dr. John H. Furbay, Director of Teacher Education in Liberia, and Dr. Mark May, Director of the Institute of Human Relations at Yale University.

The Board of Education resolution, which was moved by Ralph M. Clark, secretary, and seconded by Attorney Albert E. Meder, was as follows:

"Whereas, our Superintendent of Schools, Dr. S. M. Brownell, who has served the Rural Agricultural School District, Grosse Pointe Township, Wayne County, Michigan, since August, 1927, has tendered his resignation in order to take an offered professorship in the Graduate School of Yale University, and

Whereas, it is with deep appreciation that we remember those eleven years of devoted service to this board of education and to the parents and children and taxpayers of this district, and

Whereas, it has ever been the policy of this Board of Education to en-

deavor to promote the welfare and progress of its staff and to encourage study and promotion, to inspire ambition to public service, and

Whereas, in the offer that has come to Dr. Brownell we recognize that he is again a living example of this philosophy, and

Whereas, we believe that in going from us to this exceptional opportunity for service and influence in a broader field, he will carry many valuable experiences that have come in these eleven years of effort that have resulted in bringing our school system to the position of fine achievement recognized nationally.

Be it Herely Resolved that we accept the resignation of Dr. S. M. Brownell to take effect August 1, 1938 and that we do so with regret for the district and ourselves personally and that we extend to him our grateful appreciation for his faithful, conscientious, and skillful service and that we cause this resolution to be inscribed and presented to him as a memento of the honor and affection which we have ever had and will continue to have for him." The resolution was adopted unanimously.

**High Students Choose
Catherine Hanke for
D. A. R. Competition**

Catherine Hanke, 883 St. Clair avenue, has been chosen by the students and faculty of Grosse Pointe High School as their candidate in the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage to Washington, D. C. in April. This competition is sponsored annually by the Daughters of the American Revolution in high schools throughout the country. Girls are selected on a five-point count of dependability, leadership, service, ability and patriotism. Patriotism is defined as co-operative service and good citizenship within the school group.

Four other high schools have a candidate to present. The five girls, Miss Hanke of Grosse Pointe, Julia Starcevic of Pershing High, Marieanne Porter of Northwestern, Betty Vincent of Edwin Denby and Elizabeth Campbell of Cooley were guests of the Louisa St. Clair Chapter, D. A. R. re-

cently at Newberry House, where they were presented with merit pins by Mrs. J. Harvey Maxwell, chairman of the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage.

There was an informal reception for the girls who were then invited to go to the state conference of the D. A. R. in Saginaw in March.
