**Dr. Hillary at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church**

So much interest was aroused in the series of lectures by Dr. Mark Hillary before the Young Married People's class at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church that the officers have requested the lecturer to continue the series with four more lectures on the same subject, "Practical Psychology of Everyday Life." This will give many who were unable to be present or secure seats an opportunity to hear this timely subject.

The Young Married People's Class will sponsor the course which will begin Monday evening, April 17, at 8 p. m. sharp, in the church house. A nominal charge will be made.

For several years Dr. Hillary was connected with various universities throughout Europe, including Vienna, Budapest, Prague, Moscow, Kiev, Athens, and Munich. He was closely associated with the late Dr. Alfred Adler in Poliklinik Hospital in Vienna, and worked with several commissions in Germany, Russia, and Greece. He is an author as well, having written numerous articles and books, the latest being "The Heritage of the Human Mind," which will be off the press in the near future.

In these lectures Dr. Hillary has promised to avoid the complicated nomenclature and technical language of Psychology, thereby making it possible for those who have never taken Psychology to understand its rudiments. The following lists the lectures and dates:

April 17—"Simple Theories in Psychology," which will deal with the comparative psychologies of Europe and America, and explain the points of difference and such terminology as Pansexualism, Inferiority, Behaviorism, Introversion, Bi-sexualism, etc.

April 24—"Sources of Habit Patterns." This deals with the habit patterns of thought and action which have their rise as a result of fear, adolescence, childhood, discipline, and the crises and shocks of maturity.

Wednesday, May 3—"Psychology of Home and Business." Explains the fundamental obligations of fathers, mothers, husbands, wives, children; and will deal with the general relationship of employer and employee.

Monday, May 8—"Simple Application of Psychology." This will guide all persons in applying psychology to their social, religious, and economic needs; teaching them to evaluate emotions and exercise the mental mechanisms in their proper spheres.

The class is open to the public and all are cordially invited. Come and bring your friends. Discussion period will follow each lecture at which you are cordially invited to present your questions in psychology.

**"The Merry Wives of Windsor" to Be Presented Today**

Grosse Pointe will have the opportunity of seeing the Detroit Federal Theatre Players at their best, and for the second time at Grosse Pointe, when they appear at the High School auditorium in Shakespeare's "The Merry Wives of Windsor," on Thursday, April 13 for a special matinee at 3:45 p. m. One performance only will be given.

"The Merry Wives of Windsor" has been called the Bard of Avon's brightest comedy. The familiar tale of the jolly, fat knight, Sir John Falstaff, and his flirtatious pursuits of two of Windsor's merry wives, Mistress Margaret Page and Mistress Alice Ford, have furnished the theme for several translations of the play and also an opera version. His many escapes from the two irate husbands, Master Ford and Master Page—once by concealing himself in a hamper filled with soiled linen and being dumped into the Thames, again by masquerading as an old woman—furnish many uproarious situations.

The cast of 35 is entirely professional and includes many actors and actresses with Broadway reputations. Features of the production will be a special prologue written for the presentation by James Doll, Art director for the Detroit project. It depicts Queen Elizabeth and her court arriving at an early Elizabethan Theatre and commanding the players to perform the play of her choice so that she may see her favorite character, Sir John Falstaff; a special musical score written for the production by Verner Haldene, the play's director; and an old English folk-dance which marks the finale.

Included in the cast will be Mrs. William Faversham as Queen Elizabeth, Peggy Fenn and Marie Curtis as the two wives, Alfred Fernelius as Falstaff, A. Courtney White as Ford, Ruth Whitworth as Mistress Ann Page, Mary L'Herminier as Mistress Quickly, Chester Adams as Fenton and many others. Sets and costumes have been designed by James Doll and are authentic reproductions of early Shakespearean styles and required careful research. The unit set depicts an old English tavern, and, together with the lighting equipment and 70 costumes, swords and wigs, doublets and hose, boots and properties; require two large, special scenery trucks to transport the production. A special orchestra is also carried which plays the musical score, composed especially by Mr. Haldene for this production. The orchestra is under the direction of Harry Reynolds and Gordon Fairclough is business manager for the tour which to the present has covered 20 educational institutions and is booked well into May.
