Actual work in the annual Clean Up, Fix Up, Paint Up campaign will start May 1 and continue throughout the week in Grosse Pointe. Co-operating agencies are the Civic Pride association, health, fire, public works, school and police departments and the American Legion.

The event is held each year for the purpose of clearing away the debris of winter and making the community more attractive. Garbage collection will be accelerated in an effort to cut down the rat menace.

The fire department will co-operate by making tours of inspection of fire hazards and the Civic Pride association will also visit various neighborhoods. School children will aid in inspection work and in seeing to it that backyards are cleaned. They will also join in an educational campaign.

The rat plague in the backyards and alleys can be beaten only if the general public will keep garbage and refuse where it belongs in containers and not strewn around in the open, says the head of the committee, who also suggests that citizens who have not the time to do the work on their own premises might hire someone who is not employed, thereby aiding in counteracting the depression, and relieving the welfare department of some of its heavy load.




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Aerograph showing main highways which lead from New Jersey, New England, Westchester and Long Island to the grounds of the New York

World's Fair 1939 in the heart of greater New York City. Tunnels, bridges ferries, airports, water gates-all are indicated.



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
