



THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE ORDAINS:

Section I. That Sections II and VIII be amended as fel-

SECTION II

For the purpose of this ordinance the City of Greece Pointe is hereby divided into the following districts:

RESIDENCE A DISTRICTS RESIDENCE B DISTRICTS RESIDENCE C DISTRICTS LOCAL BUSINESS DISTRICTS COMMERCIAL DISTRICTS OPEN PUBLIC PARKING DISTRICTS

The boundaries of the first five named districts as a upon the map attached hereto and made a part of this ordinance are hereby established, the map being designated as "BUILDING ZONE MAP," and the map and all notations, references and other information as shown thereon shall be as if the matters and information set forth by said map were all fully described herein.

SECTION VIII

OPEN PUBLIC PARKING DISTRICTS:

(1) In case there is now or hereafter dedicated to the public an alley of a width of not less than twenty feet (28') directly in the rear of and adjacent to property in a Local Business District or a Commercial District there may be used in back of such property across from the alley an open public parking space.

(2) The alley shall be paved and kept in a good state of repair at the expense of the abutting property owners, and the paving and repairs shall be under the supervision and control of the Building Commissioner of the City of Grosse Pointe.

(3) The alley in length may or may not extend from side street to side street, but the width of the parking space

shall not be less than twenty feet (26'). (4) No structure of any kind, including any gas pump, etc., shall be erected upon such parking space.

(5) No business of any kind shall be conducted upon such parking space, nor shall any charge be made for parking

(6) No such space shall be used for an open public, parkspace without the approval of the Council of the City of Grosse Pointe contained in a resolution duly adopted

(7) Upon its ceasing to be used for such parking space its use shall revert to the use provided for in this ordinance prior to its use as an open public parking space."
