Hon. Hugh Gibson to Lecture at Town Hall
 The Hon. Hugh Gibson, former Minister to Poland and Switzerland and ex-Ambassador to Belgium and Brazil, will arrive in this country from London October 15. He will come directly to Detroit where he will give his first United States lecture before the Detroit Town Hall audience in the Fisher Theatre Wednesday, October 18, at 11 a. m.
 For the past six months, this distinguished diplomat has visited the countries of Europe, interviewing the personalities who control present-day history. He brings to his subject, "What's Happening in Europe," an eye-witness knowledge based on years of experience in the diplomatic service.
 Since the beginning of the current war, Mr. Gibson has broadcast from Europe frequently, and from mid-August to mid-September he gave a regular series of broadcasts over the Blue Network, speaking on such subjects as "British Attitude Today," "Germany's Attitude Today," "The Place of Spain in Europe," and "What Europe Thinks of Us."

Few men have served on so many of the delegations and committees to world conferences which have wrestled with the great problems of disarmament, mediation and trade relations. Mr. Gibson's activities along these lines included the chairmanship of the Conference for Limitation of Naval Armament in 1927, the acting chairmanship of the U. S. delegation at the Disarmament Conference in Geneva in 1932. He is author of three important books: "A Journal from Our Legation in Belgium," "Rio, 1937" and "Belgium, 1939." 

Miss Bernice Moore and Paul Jung, Deans, and by the teachers in the building. Teachers were stationed in rooms throughout the structure. Twelve Boy Scouts of the junior high troop, and 46 members of Miss Moore's Service Club assisted as guides and in other ways.

Mrs. Bert Wicking, representing the Council of Parent-Teacher Associations of Grosse Pointe, announced the series of five presentations to be given at the Pierce auditorium. Each program will be presented twice, once on Saturday morning and once on Saturday afternoon. The first of the series will be "Pinocchio." At five points throughout the building P. T. A. representatives disposed of tickets for the series. A few tickets still remain

and can be obtained from any school or from P. T. A. representatives. William Iverson, teacher of English and journalism at the Pierce School, who is sponsor of the school's newspaper, the "Pierce Arrow," had charge of the radio broadcasting. Mr. Iverson, who formerly taught at the Grosse Ile High School, has also served as announcer and radio newscaster over Buffalo radio stations. Literature descriptive of the school was distributed to the first 1500 guests,

but supplies were quickly exhausted. Seven hundred visitors arrived in the first seven minutes after 7:30 o'clock. Besides parent and other taxpayers, there were pupils present from the Pierce School and the high school, officials of the Grosse Pointe municipalities, principals and teachers from other schools, Parent Teacher Association representatives, and numerous Detroit school teachers and principals. Scores of the visitors entered the building through the side entrances, the public

library and the auditorium and most of these were not counted. Many signed the school's guest book. In the student publications office visitors were presented with copies of Volume 1, No. 1, of the "Pierce Arrow."

The inspection had been scheduled to end at 9 o'clock but it was after 11 before the last guests left the building. Early arrivals were given a note of welcome signed by Dr. Van Kleek. It read as follows:

"The Board of Education, the administrative staff of the school system and the faculty of the Pierce School bid you welcome. We hope you will return again to visit this new building. As you inspect its facilities, you will bear in mind that the object in constructing it has been to achieve genuine, ultimate economy, in terms of long life of building, equipment and furniture, plus ease and cheapness of maintenance. More important even than these, has been our goal to produce a school which will exemplify the best tested modern thought in school house construction and which will be suitable to a community like ours.

"The date for the formal dedication program, at which we hope Professor William Lyon Phelps will speak, has not yet been set. It will be possible at that occasion to accommodate in the auditorium only a portion of those who will doubtless desire to be present. An almost unlimited number of persons can, however, be accommodated throughout the building, in the public and pupil libraries, the gymnasiums, classrooms, etc. By means of the buildings public-address radio system, all should be able to hear perfectly. Perhaps when our second junior high

school is built, we shall have television! At any rate, the Board of Education desires you to know that you are most welcome, not merely tonight but also at the dedication program."

On Friday evening, November 3, the Pierce School will conduct its first 7-B Open House, and on Friday evening, December 1, its first 8-A Open House. On Sunday afternoon, December 17, the junior high school vocal music department will present its first annual Candlelight Vesper Service in the Pierce auditorium.
