Health Dept. Notes

The sale of Christmas seals in helping in the fight against tuberculosis should receive support from us all and bad that the enthusiasm where between twenty and thirty of the fight against this disease is not

sustained throughout the year. Passing his opinion upon the records of our Health Department, Dr. Warren believes that the number of cases of this disease, that cost over 2,000 lives and millions of dollars in Michigan izst year, could be cut 40 per cent

These records show that there were same spirit of good fellowship and the 26 cases of tuberculosis in our district in 1919 with a school census of less than 1,000. Some were hospitalized and the incipient cases cared for at home. In five years 25 of them had recovered entirely or the disease in the arrested state. In spite of our great increase in population, the incidence of this disease has decreased so that there were but 14 cases in 1928, While if it had increased in proportion to population, we would be having over one hundred cases instead of 14, Dr. Warren suggests that parents do not send children to school if they have colds, as they are infectious.



Ghost Towns of West

Show Signs of Revival Out in the West a few years ago you could drive off the beaten path and go exploring into the last cen-Behind the shoulder of some hill or in a desert valley you would discover a full-sized tov one lived, says Popular Mechanics. Along the sagebrush-covered main street would be weather-beaten stores, post office, banks and saloons of a small city, flanked by blocks of monomiad houses. blocks of unoccupied houses. In the eerie silence the flapping of old wallpaper behind a broken window or the creaking of a door would be the only sounds.

These ghost towns of the mining country were left intact when the gold fever died or when bonanza strikes in other districts caused the inhabitants to move away overnight. Towns like Rhyolite with a preten-tious railway station and office buildings, or Bodie, built with tre-mendous hardahip high in the mountains, were left complete right down to stacks of dishes still in the kitchens and files of records still in the

Today the ghost towns are coming back to life. Towns that have been asleep for 75 years are stirring again under the excitement of high priced gold. Modern air-conditioned stores are springing up next to the tottering ruins of old buildings. Lively stables where harness still rots on the walls are being torn down for gasoline stations. From Cripple Creek in Colorado to the Mother Lode in California longabandoned mines are being worked again. A survey by the Automobile Club of Southern California shows that practically every old gold camp in the West is active.

Timber Is Classified

According to Usage

Yard lumber is largely general purpose lumber. It is manufactured and classified into those shapes, sizes and grades required for ordinary construction and general pur-pose uses. Heavy timbers for structural purposes, soft-wood factory lumber and other special use materials are not considered as yard

lumber.
A bulletin from the Southern Pine association divides yard lumber into two main divisions (a) select and (b) common. These again are divided into two classes. Select lumber (1) that suitable for natural finishes and (2) that suitable for paint finishes. Common lumber (1) that which can be used without waste and (2) that which permits some waste.

The various types are graded A, B or C. A has a minimum of defects or blemishes, B is permitted a greater number of defects and blemishes, and C an even greater

An important factor is the mois-ture content permitted in the various grades and classifications.

Lineals Biotorical Park Abraham Lincoln National History ical park, birthplace of Abraham Lincoln, comprises 110 acres, and lies three miles south of Hodgenville, Ky. The Lincoln Farm association bought the site in 1906 and began the erection of a granite building in which to place a log cabin said to be that in which Lincoln was born. 

Pillars of Hercules'

Located in Morocco One of the smallest and northern-most of African subdivisions, Span-ish Morocco, is a narrow strip sliced off the top of the continent at the western entrance to the Mediterra-nean. It lies directly across the strait from Gibraltar and contains the southern end of the two rocky eminences called the Pillers of Hereminences cause the range of sec-oules, which the legendary hero is supposed to have created by slitting a mountain in two.

The Spanish zone of influence in

the Sultanate of Morocco is only about one-sixteenth of the whole country. Starting at the southwestern corner of the country, one comes upon the port of Larache, on the Atlantic coast, and its neighbor, the fishing village of Arxila; then Ceuta, at the country's northern tip, and the Med-iterranean mineral port of Melilla

hear the eastern end Tetuan, the capital and largest city, is comparable in size to Lorain, Chio, a baby metropolis of 44,000 people. It lies just inland from the undeveloped part of Rio Martin, and has developed small industries in morocco leather, tiles

and pottery.

The second and third largest cities do not belong to the Protectorate at all, but are Spain's own territory.

Ceuta, governed as part of Cadiz, was taken by Spain in 1580, and Melilla has been Spanish since the days of Columbus.

Centa lares many visitors, and its crowded oriental bazaars attract them with rare brassware prized in Europe since the Middle ages. This secient city, once a slave market, was the first in Africa to have trans-Atlantic telephone service.

Natural Gas Less Toxic Than Artificial Product

Natural gas in general is not considered as toxic as the manufac-tured gas, which has a higher percentage of carbon monoxide. "The American Cyclopedia" tabulates the tituents of verious natural gases ad compares them with coal gas.

Coul gas is given an average of 60 per cent marsh gas, 4 per cent hydrocarbons, 2 per cent nitrogen, 6.4 per cent carbon dioxide, 8 per cent carbon monoxide, 46 per cent

hydrogen. The first gas company in this untry was the Gas Light company of Baltimore, incorporated February 8, 1817; it made and distributed coal gas and the first street in Baltimore was lighted with the gas on February 17. The first natural gas company was the Fredonia Gas Light and Water Works company, organized in Fredonia, N. Y., in 1865. Natural gas had, however, been used as an illuminant in Fredonia as early as 1824, a pipe line having been led from a well to the hall where General Lafayette was given a reception. A few years later nat-ural gas was being used for fuel and light in Findley, Ohio.



The custom of breaking a bottle of wine on the prow of a ship when it is launched is a relic of the ancient libation which was practiced when ships were launched. The ancients consecrated the ship to the god whose image she bore. The action of blessing ships is alluded to by monks of St. Denys. In July, 1418, the bishop of Bangor was sent to Southampton to bless the king's ship to insure successful voyages. In this country, water, or some other liquid usually took the place of wine during prohibition.

Humerist to Minister Robert Jones Burdetter was a fa mous humorist who became a minis-ter. He was on the staff of the Peoria Transcript and later became associate editor of the Burlington (Iowa) Hawkeye and of the Brooklyn Eagle, in which his humorous sketches won him considerable fame. He began to lecture in 1876. In 1887 he was licensed as a minister of the Baptist church and held a pastorate at Los Angeles until 1909, He was the author of a number of humorous books.

Man-Made Duststorm

Grades Soil Particles When duststorms of 1934 and 1936 darkened the sky from the South-west to the Atlantic ocean the grit that settled at Cincinnati was finer than the particles dropped at Kansas City, and dust denneits at Washington, New York, and Boston were progressively finer. A modification of what happens in a "duster" is the basis of a new device for grading soil particles developed in the Soil Conservation service laboratory at the California Institute of Tech

When the laboratory staff needed soil particles sorted accurately according to size, they develop d a simple machine that creates a gentis "duster." The machine drops assorted sizes of sand or silt particles in suitable drawers, the coarser bits nearest the feeding hopper, the finer particles at a distance. For the most accurate sorting they run the dried sand or silt through twice, first in a rough sifting by a slow breeze, and second a re-sorting of fairly uniform material

in a brisker but still mild draft. The sorting machine is a bell-mouthed wind tunnel about 15 feet long with a grating as a floor to let the socied material drop into the collecting drawers below. A small electric fan draws air through the tunnel at not more than 2½ feet a second—less than 2 miles an hour. Dry sand and silt is fed in a thin

Dry sand and silt is fed in a thin sheet from a hopper on top of the tunnel. Larger particles drop almost vertically. The finer the sand or silt particles, the farther they are carried by the breeze. Particles of equal size drop at equal distances from the feeding apparatus. Walls of the tunnel are made as smooth as possible to purpose ed. smooth as possible to prevent ed-dies, but there is some difference in the air action near the walls, so the drawers have partitions at so the trawers have partitions at each end, and this material is re-jected. What drops in the central compartment is graded more accu-rately than is possible with fine sieves. The machine will handle from 60 to 100 pounds an hour.

Rockefeller Carillon

The Rockefeller Memorial carillon at the University of Chicago is one of the two largest in the world. It has 72 belis and was cast by Gillett and Johnston, Croydon, Eng. These bells, given by John D. Rockefeller in memory of his mother, Laura Spelman Rockefeller, were installed in the belfry of the chapel tower in the autumn of 1932 The bells range in size from 10% pounds to the great bourdon, which weighs 36,926 pounds and has a diameter of 117 inches, or almost 10 feet. The total weight of the bells is 220 tons. Their total cost was approximately \$200,000.

Spanish Main's Location

Was Puzzle to Travelers The exact location of the Spanish Main long puzzled travelers and writers. Some applied the name to the entire Caribbean, others thought t designated the mainland border-

ing that sea.
In the heyday of the conquistadores and pirates, the old Spanish Main comprised not only the Caribbean sea, but that part of the Atlan-tic ocean plied by Spanish treasure

The name later came to embrace the shores of the Caribbean islands and the adjacent coasts of South and Central America. Now the name has narrowed down

to denote the northern coast of South America between the Isthmus of Panama and the delta of the Orinoof Panama, Colombia and Venezuela.

Unromantic freighters replace the old gilded galleons, but precious cargoes are still shipped from the Spanish Main.

Venezuela is the third largest oilproducing country in the world.
Colombia contains the world's

most important emerald mine. Exports from the main include platinum, gold, silver, Panama hats, coffee, chicle, tonka beans, ivory nuts, which are made in many articles from umbrella handles to buttons, and kapol, a so-called "vege-table down" used as stuffing for upholstery.

An interesting relic of the old days is the Bluebeard Castle at St. Thomas, now called Charlotte Amalie. It is a three-story fortress and is now the centerpiece of a new hotel. It is a gaunt structure and popular with visitors during the daytime. At

night people prefer to stand outside and gaze at it.

The rugged old fort is made awe-some by the tradition that the origi-nal owner, a pirate who was nicknamed Bluebeard because of the bluish sheen on his black whiskers, had a full set of 13 wives.

Shark Fishing Is Now

Million-Dollar Industry Since the comparatively recent discovery that the livers of soup-fin sharks constitute the best source of Vitamin A, shark fishing on the Pacific coast has become a million

dollar industry.
With six companies operating with specialized equipment now, and with the industry in its infancy, fisher-men, reduction companies and pack-ers alike predict that it is destined to become one of the greatest in-dustries on the coast.

Fishing is being carried on from Mexico to Alaska. Last year 2,500,-000 sharks were caught in California waters while vast quantities of livers were sent here for reduction

from other states. Packers point out that extensive research work still will be neces-sary to develop all the possibilities of the industry, not only from the standpoint of the extraction of Vitamin A, but for use of all the by-

products.

While the liver remains the most the flesh is already being used ex-tensively as food, some for fertilizer and also for food for chickens

The industry is confident that eventually a good quality of leather can be produced from the skin. Exploration work has yet to be undertaken, they say, to discover the habits of the shark, what it eats, if and where it migrates and what equipment is best adapted to

handle the fish. Up to now most of the shark fishing has taken place from boats constructed especially for sardine and halibut fishing. When shark fishing is fully developed as a major indus try, its backers here declare that it will all take place from specialized boats and with specialized equip-

At present packers are paying fishermen \$55 a ton for sharks and 27 cents a pound for the livers alone.

Ohio Man Earns Living

Entering Prize Contests A \$3 prize in a newspaper con-test won as an 11-year-old boy is the basis of a modern success story by Frank G. Davis, of Springfield.

In the 35 years since that first prize, he has won \$50,000 in 1,500 contests. In the last eight years, Davis said, he earned between \$2,-500 and \$5,000, including eight automobiles—for doing nothing more strenuous than thinking up slogans, working out crossword puzzles, pre-dicting football scores or drawing

Davis now spends five hours a day at his work, the rest of the time doing free-lance writing and cartooning. So far this year he has come through with 71 prizes, which is con-siderably better than his 35-year-av-

erage of one every 10 days.

He desent been account of his expenses, but estimates that expenditures for stamps, stationery and ink amount to \$12 and \$15 a month. The cost of soap wrappers, box tops and the like don't amount to much because he doesn't enter many of this type of contest. "They're too big; judges can't give entries prop-er consideration," he says.

'Dead' Lives Again

Dr. D. H. Werden, of San Diego, reports the saving of a 14-year-old girl's life after breathing had ceased for 40 minutes, by removing a brain tumor. Writing in the Journal of the American Medical Association, the physician stated that 18 months after the operation, the patient's speech and mentality were normal. only apparent afterenects blindness and some difficulty in walking. The respiratory paralysis Dr. Werden wrote, was compensated for by immediate artificial respiration. There was a prolonged period of unconsciousness that he ascribed to insufficient oxygen in the brain tissues. He said the condition was sufficient to cause blindness, but not mental impairment.






The film is one of five which have been presented to T. K. Peters, director of archives at Oglethorpe university. The others include the life story of Thomas A. Edison, the description of the description velopment of land transportation from the most primitive methods to the electrified railroad, the history of Panama canal operation and the development of American naviga-tion from the first crude Indian craft to the massive electrically propelled battleships of today.

It probably will take about four

or five years to fill the crypt with the thousands of records that are to be placed in it. Micro-book records are being made of the world's greatare being made of the world's great-est literature, and the films are be-ing sealed in stainless steel recep-tacles after first being placed in glass containers encasing an inert

An inscription plaque on the door of the Crypt of Civilization briefly describes the contents of the sealed chamber and requests that they remain inviolate until the year \$113. The date was decided by Dr. Thornwell Jacobs, president of Oglethorpe university, because when he started the project in 1936 the year \$113 was just as far in the future as the total number of years man has recorded events in the past.

Scientists Seek to Chart

South Seas With Bottles Professor Wilbur A. Nelson of the University of Virginia plans a "bottle message" bombardment of the

South Seas.
Outlining the itinerary of a scientific expedition he will head for National Geographic society and his university, he said he would throw 2,000 citrate of magnesia bottles into the South Pacific.

Printed messages will be inclosed telling the finder that he may "keep telling the finder that he may "keep the bottle as a souvenir of the occasion," but asking him to report where he found it. The purpose is to help determine the movement of currents in the South Pacific.

Professor Nelson said the bottle would be tossed from the coas guard cutter Hamilton, which the government has assigned for the expedition, at regular intervals during

pedition, at regular intervals durin the year that fellow scientists wi tour the South Seas over an area larger than the United States.

Unless the egg-laying parasites can find a certain stage of the insect on which it preys, it does not even place its eggs. The progeny will develop only in a particular hard and in the particular hard and in the particular hard strictly place of lar host and in a certain stage of the host. Other parasites prey on a goodly number of species and sometimes the presence of more than one kind of host in a locality has an important bearing on the success of the parasite in the control of the species which is destructive

to cultivated crops.

Entomologists working to control the Japanese beetle are seeking ear-nestly to determine if some parasites of the beetle can also reproduce by preying on native white grubs that are very similar to grubs of the Japanese beetle. If they could find one among those introduced from abroad that could live under conditions here—it would be most valuable.

Appendicitis Fatalities

Show Increased Rate The depression is responsible for an increasing death rate among vic-tims of acute appendicitis, accord-ing to two Cleveland doctors. Drs. F. R. Kelly and R. M. Wat-

ains, observing the mounting death rate in a study of 2,000 consecutive cases at Women's hospital here, report that appendicitis victims without funds hesitate to summon med-ical aid when an attack occurs and try to treat themselves. Half of the victims studied were

hospitalized in the more prosperous years of 1999 to 1935; the rest beiwoon 1931 and 1938. The death rate emong the first 1,000 was 5 per cent; among the second 1,000, 22

per cent. The doctors reported their study in the Joseph of the American Medical Association.

"During the depression years," they wrote, "patients delayed operation 20 per cent longer than in better times." This surely invested the times. This surely increased the mortality rate.

"If economic conditions improve, this delay on the patient's part will be lessened, but in the meantime persons should be told to pocket their pride and seek medical aid regardless of their circumstances, if they have pain in their abdomen."
