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The New Russian Policy of Aggression

(The opinions expressed in this column are expressly those of Mr. Deane, and have no bearing on the editorial policy of this paper.)

Evidently, Lenin's realpolitik as once revealed to this writer by ill-fated Christian Rakowsky, erstwhile Soviet Ambassador to Paris and victim, since, of one of Comrade Stalin's blood purges, has again become the pivot on which revolves Soviet Russia's foreign policy: "When two bandits are fighting one another over an honest traveler they both want to rob, the traveler should avail himself of the providential breathing spell to organize his defense."

Needless to say that inasmuch as Russia considers herself the "honest traveler," she is "organizing" her defense, even if in order to do so she must in turn rob another traveler. For, this is exactly what Russia is doing right now.

It is the imperative need of the military machine for stronger positions, more security for the Regime and not

Stalin's alleged ambition to have the U. S. S. R. expand along the lines formerly set up by Czarist Russia's imperial wizards that has sent the Red Army across the Finnish borders. It is the above precepts alone which has persuaded

Paul M. Deane Stalin to drop the dream of a world revolution and inspire the Izvestia (official organ, Moscow) to rule that "like or dislike of Fascism (an Nazism) is henceforth a matter of taste."

For, it must be remembered that in the minds of all Soviet leaders, from Kalmine and Stalin down to the humblest call chief, an ultimate drive of a coalition of capitalistic powers against communistic Russia has always been considered as inevitable. In fact, British conservatives have long dreamed of such an enterprise, but few bigwigs have considered it feasible or even desirable.

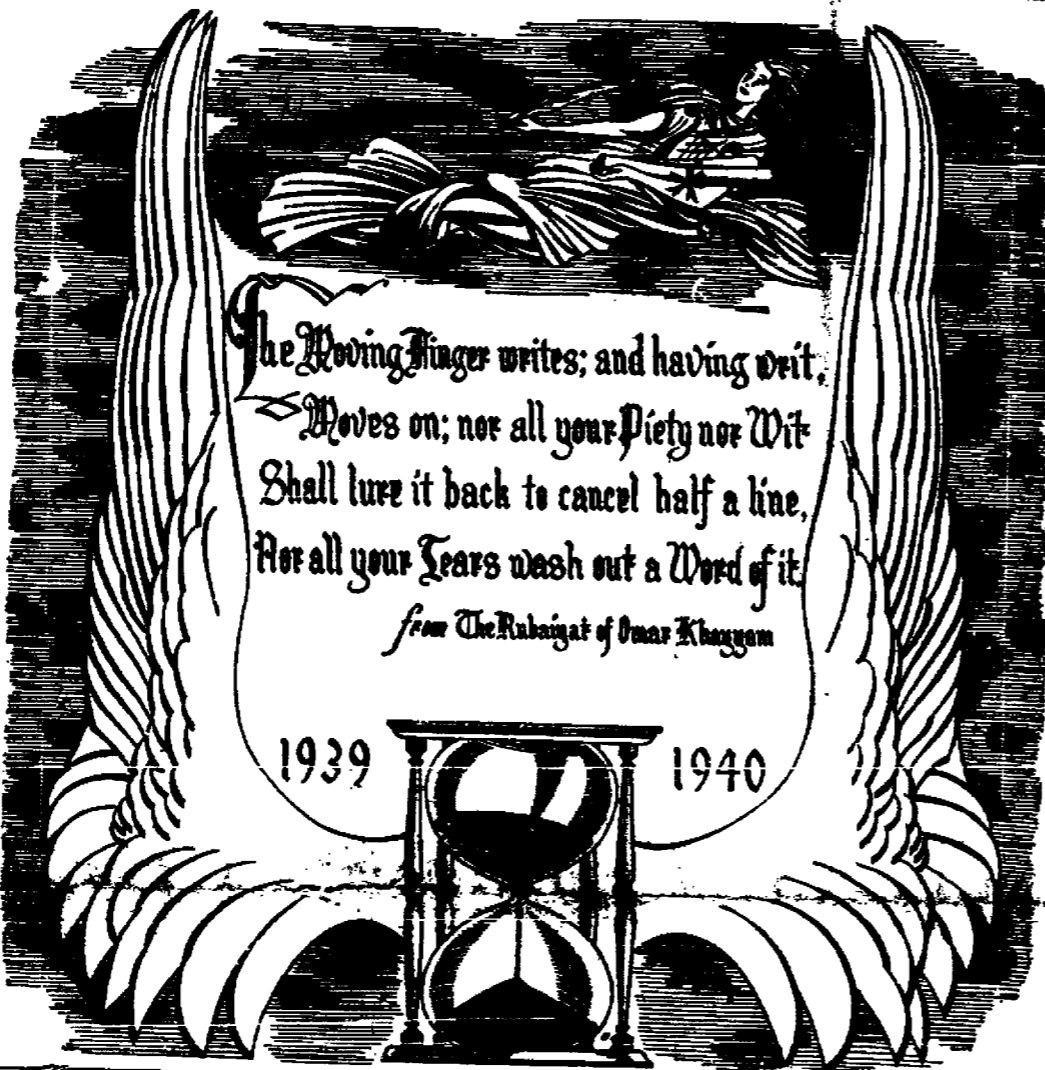
Soviet Russia is playing safe. She is availing herself of the Allies' struggle with Nazi Germany to expand and strengthen her position in the Baltic, heretofore considered by the German High Command as the German Sea. She also intends to wipe out all smaller neighbors hostile toward the Soviet Union and liable to serve as a springboard for eventual Allied or German military operations against the communistic regime.

Those in power at Moscow are paid to know that Britain and France want a weak and dismembered Russia just as badly as they want a feeble and pliant Germany.

To better understand the source of Russia's distrust of the outside world, one must go back to the stormy years immediately following the World War when the new Russia was being attacked from all sides, when isolation was the only antidote for her woes.

People in this country have long heard of Germany's ambitions with regards to the Russian Ukraine, but few have even the faintest idea of France's aims concerning this same Ukraine. It is not they ever suspected Britain of planning to seize Caucasia with its vast oil fields. Yet, proof to this can be found in a secret treaty signed between France's Clemenceau Cabinet and one notorious Hetman Petliura (assassinated some years ago) right after the World War, while conditions were still unsettled in Russia. This agreement virtually turned the beautiful Ukraine over to France to be exploited for a period of 50 years as a French colony. At the same time, the British government had pressed its

Schools Announce Visitation Plans for Kindergarten

For a number of years the public schools have invited children who will be enrolling in beginning kindergarten the following semester to visit one day per week for a few weeks prior to the opening of the new semester.

Letters have been sent out to the parents of such children, by the various elementary schools in the district in all cases where the children's names appeared on the school census taken last May. As many families have moved into the district since that time, the Grosse Pointe elementary schools are taking this opportunity of inviting the parents who have children who will be five years old or before March 1, 1940 to call the elementary school in their district and avail themselves of this privilege.

The principals and kindergarten teachers feel that a few visits to school prior to formal enrollment aids greatly in the adjustment which these young children make upon entering school for the first time. Because of this, parents of children who will be old enough to enroll in beginning kindergarten next semester are urged to contact the principal of the elementary school in their district at this time to make arrangements for this pre-enrollment visitation.

Quebec Eliminates Ragweed The Quebec provincial government's long-term program to eliminate ragweed in the lower St. Lawrence and Gaspe peninsula regions has been successful according to a recent survey. The offensive weed, which causes hay fever sufferers so much discomfort, has virtually disappeared. The plant protection service started this campaign three years ago. In addition to its own workers, this government agency has paid premiums to school children to aid in destroying the weed.

Ben Thornton and Marguerite Danz, two outstanding dancers with the Arthur Murray Dance Studios at the Statler Hotel, have been chosen to open a branch studio in the Statler Hotel in Buffalo, according to Curtis B. Andrews and Doris Eaton, co-directors of the Detroit school. They will leave for Buffalo after Christmas to appear at the Statler Hotel in a series of exhibitions during the holiday week, after which they will remain to establish a branch studio similar to the Detroit school.

Mr. Thornton's original home is in West Virginia. He attended Concord College in that state, and Rollins College in Winter Park, Florida. During his college days he first began to teach dancing, but dropped it after graduation to go into sales-promotion work. He came to Detroit three years ago to work for the Ford Motor Co., but left his job to join the Arthur Murray Studios when they opened two years ago.

Miss Danz is a Detroit girl, a graduate of Marygrove College where she studied art and music. At present she is still pursuing her studies during her spare time.

Both dancers have appeared in various exhibitions in the Terrace Room at the Statler Hotel and at many private clubs and are well known to the dancing public.

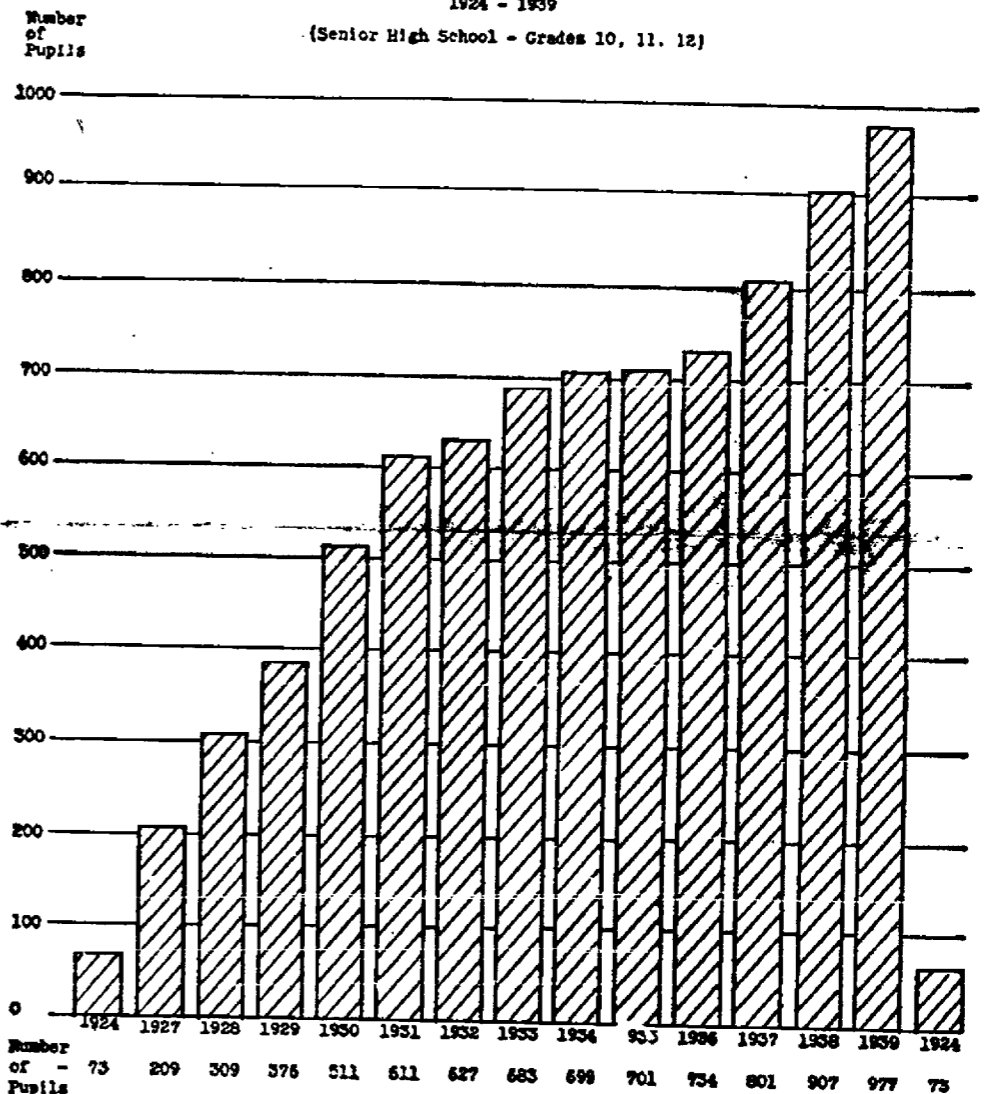

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT SHATTERS ALL PREVIOUS RECORDS

Enrollment in Grosse Pointe High School 1924 - 1939 (Senior High School - Grades 10, 11, 12)



"Where but in America" or, better yet, "where but in Grosse Pointe?" could anything like the above picture be found! The graph, prepared by the Grosse Pointe Board of Education staff, shows an increase of well over 1200 per cent in the enrollment in the senior high school (grades 10, 11 and 12) in a fifteen-year period. According to school officials, the rapidity of the growth in secondary school enrollment in America exceeds anything recorded anywhere else in the world at any period of time. The Grosse Pointe secondary school growth, in the senior high school grades at least, has been far more rapid than even that for the nation as a whole.

The graph shows that the upper three grades of the school system, which school authorities say are always the most expensive to maintain have increased in enrollment from 73 pupils in 1924 to 977 at the present time! Dr. E. R. Van Kleeck, Superintendent of Schools, stated that since the graph was prepared the senior high school enrollment has increased another 20 pupils and is now 997 an increase of 8% per cent over the same period a year ago. Besides these pupils, there are 493 junior high school children (grades 7, 8 and 9) in the senior high school building at Grosse Pointe Boulevard and Fisher Road and 737 junior high school children in the new Pierce School, making a total secondary school enrollment of 2217 pupils, or more than the entire school system, grades and high school had only a few years back. There has been no year without an increase, the graph shows.

AN ORDINANCE

REGARDING Fumigating and Disinfecting.

THE CITY OF GROSE POINTE ORDAINS:

Section 1. No person, firm or corporation shall, as an independent contractor, engage in the City of Grosse Pointe, in the business of exterminating household insects or pests by the process of fumigating, in which process of fumigation, hydrocyanic acid gas or other poisonous or dangerous gases or fumes are used, liable to affect human beings by causing severe sickness or death, without first obtaining a license therefor as herein provided. Any person, firm or corporation desiring to obtain such a license shall first file with the Clerk of the City of Grosse Pointe an application stating:

(a) The name, age and address of the person, firm or corporation applying for such license and what, if any, previous experience, he, she or it has had in such business.

(b) The name, age and address of the person or persons who are to actually engage in the work of exterminating and fumigating as above set forth, as employees of said independent contractor. The City Clerk shall furnish the proper forms of application, and when said application shall have been filed out by said independent contractor, the City Clerk shall cause an investigation and examination to be made of such application as to said applicant's qualifications to engage as an independent contractor in the business of exterminating with the use of such gases above referred to. Applicants failing to satisfy the City Clerk as to their ability, as independent contractors, to employ such dangerous gases or fumes in exterminating processes, shall be rejected and not entitled to apply for re-examination within a period of six months from the date of such rejection. Applicants duly certified by the City Clerk as qualified to receive a license as independent contractors to engage in such fumigation business, as heretofore referred to, may obtain a license to engage in such business upon the payment of the license fee and filing the bond as herein provided. Such license shall be issued by the license bureau of the City of Grosse Pointe.

Section 2. The sum of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) shall be charged each applicant for a license to engage in the business as an independent contractor, exterminating or fumigating by the use of such gases or fumes as hereinbefore mentioned. No license shall be issued such applicant unless the applicant files, as hereinafter provided, an indemnity bond as surety, in the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00), which bond shall inure to the benefit of any person or persons who shall receive bodily illness, injuries, or suffer death by reason of the negli-

gence or the misconduct by said independent contractor or any agent, servant or employee of the independent contractor engaged in the business of exterminating or fumigating as herein set forth. The sureties upon the bond shall be approved by the City Attorney before the filing of the same with the City Clerk.

Section 3. All licenses granted hereunder shall expire on the 31st day of March next following.

Section 4. When hydrocyanic acid gas or other danger gases or fumes are used for exterminating purposes, the following method of procedure shall be followed:

(a) In addition to securing a license to engage in the business as provided in the preceding section, an application for each job must be filed with the City Clerk before fumigation is begun and a written permit for such job secured. Such application shall be signed by the one proposing to do the fumigating and shall set forth the address of the building to be fumigated, the names of all occupants of the building, the type of building, the specific space to be fumigated if the building is a multiple dwelling, the date of the proposed fumigation, and such other similar information as the City Clerk may require. The application, before presentation to the City Clerk for issuance of a permit, must bear the written approval of the Chief of the Fire Department and of the Chief of the Police Department of the City of Grosse Pointe.

(b) The permit must be signed by the City Clerk, as well as the Chief of the Fire Department and the Chief of the Police Department, and must describe the premises to be fumigated. The permit must be posted on the premises while the fumigating is being carried on and in addition to the warning card provided for herein.

(c) Notification of Occupants and Adjoining Occupants and Vacating of Premises: Before fumigation, the operator shall personally inspect the premises, and shall serve notice, over his signature, upon all responsible occupants of each room or apartment within the danger area stating the dangers of the process and the precautions to be observed, designating the rooms or apartments which must be vacated, and indicating the time when the gas is to be generated. In every case all rooms to be gassed shall be vacated, and in addition the adjoining or adjacent rooms on the same floor and on the floors immediately above, and immediately below, and in the case of a building with apartments, the entire apartment adjoining or adjacent and immediately below and immediately above. In the case of a building, in which there are inner courts or light wells upon which any room being gassed opens, all rooms with windows open to such courts or light wells shall be vacated and securely locked. In the case where the walls of any adjoining buildings are located within 10,

feet of the rooms or apartments being gassed, the operator shall notify over his signature, all responsible occupants of rooms or apartments, with window openings in such walls, that such windows as are directly opposite, or above the area of the adjoining building which is under gas, must remain closed, or the rooms vacated during the time the building gassed is being flushed or aired. All rooms or apartments ordered vacated but not under gas shall be well ventilated during the process by keeping the windows of such rooms or apartments open. Special notices with the operators' signature thereon shall be served upon all responsible occupants of every room or apartment within the danger area. Such notices shall state in a clear and concise manner the precautions to be exercised during the entire process.

(d) The Danger Area: The danger area shall be construed as those portions of any structure or dwelling under gas which lie within the boundary of the outside walls of the building, the roof, and the basement or cellar floor, and such cut-off or fire walls as may exist in the structure in question. Such cut-off or fire walls shall be of solid masonry, gas tight, at least 8 inches in thickness extending from the basement through the attic, with all openings locked and guarded against entry and effectively sealed against gas leakage.

(e) Persons Qualified to Perform Dangerous Work: No person other than a duly licensed operator shall release cyanide gas in any room or enclosure, or enter into any rooms under gas for any purpose whatsoever. This section shall not apply to Inspectors of the Department of Health, duly authorized to investigate into the use of cyanide gas.

(f) Sealing Rooms Before Releasing Cyanide Gas: Before fumigation, it is required that the operator shall seal all cracks, crevices, and apertures in porous walls and floors in such a way as will connote the gas to the premises intended to be treated.

(g) Locking Rooms and Adjoining Rooms or Apartments: Before fumigation, it is required that the operator shall personally inspect all rooms and apartments ordered vacated under Section 4, subdivision (c), and be assured that they are unoccupied by persons or domestic animals, afterwards all doors to all rooms or apartments excepting an exit door to the rooms or apartments to be gassed, shall be securely locked; in addition, such windows or other wall openings as might possibly be used to gain entrance shall be securely fastened. Immediately upon generating the gas, the door through which the operator leaves shall be securely locked and sealed, and keys to all rooms or apartments ordered vacated retained by the operator until all danger is passed. As an additional precaution, all rooms and apartments vacated shall be placarded.

(h) Warning Card: Before releasing the gas the operator shall place on all entrances a plainly legible card at least 8 by 12 inches in size with the following warning:

DANGER—DO NOT ENTER

This place is being fumigated with a poisonous gas and must not be entered except by fumigator until this card is removed.

By order of the
CITY OF GROSE POINTE

(i) Guard: It is required that whenever cyanide gas is generated in any room or portion of a structure in the City of Grosse Pointe, a capable alert watchman or watchmen shall remain on duty at the entrance or entrances to the room, building or enclosed space vacated for gassing, to keep people from entering while gas is present and for two hours after the room or area gassed is opened for airing. All guards or watchmen shall be able bodied persons and must be acceptable as a proper guard to the City Clerk. The licensed operator shall be held strictly responsible and accountable for the conduct of guards or watchmen. In every case where the entire building is not vacated, the licensed operator shall remain on the job during the progress of fumigation, and shall constantly supervise the occupancy of the structure to insure that no person will be endangered by gas leakage. Licensed operators shall give all guards definite and proper instruction, and shall visit the premises being fumigated at regular intervals during the process to insure that the property is properly guarded.

(j) Removal of Food: Before fumigation, the operator shall see that all ice, food and drink, are removed from the rooms ordered vacated; except that, such food as is in sealed air tight containers and those food products which must be boiled or cooked before serving need not be removed.

(k) Fire: All fires within the premises under gas, shall be put out.

(l) Container for Ingredients: For containing the ingredients, a deep stoneware or crockery jar is recommended.

(m) Spilling of Cyanide: Great care must be taken that no cyanide crystals be dropped on the floor or left exposed where people may come in contact with them.

(n) Ingredients: The ingredients for generating hydrocyanic acid gas shall be of such quality and shall be mixed in such proportions as will liberate sufficient gas to completely fill the rooms or apartments treated.

(o) Opening of Rooms After Gassing: At the conclusion of the gassing process, which shall consume not less than six (6) hours, it shall be the duty of the operator to throw open doors and windows of the premises, starting at the basement or first floor and continuing through the upper floors of the house, until all rooms have been opened for free access of air. No person other than the operator or operators shall be permitted to enter the premises until all traces of the gas have disappeared, and in no case shall the occupants of the rooms or areas gassed be permitted to enter until twenty-four (24) hours after airing begins. The licensed operator shall be responsible for informing all occupants, having children, of this provision.

(p) The residue left in the jars or containers shall be poured down the toilet bowl, which shall then be flushed thoroughly with water to remove all traces of the chemicals.

(q) Report of Premises Fumigated: It shall be the duty of every person intending to generate or release cyanide gas for fumigation purposes, to notify, in writing, the City Clerk, or his authorized assistants, of the location of the building or enclosed space to be fumigated as well as its character, and the day and hour when the work will be performed. This notification must be received at the office of the City Clerk prior to the release of the gas and not later than 8:30 a. m. of the day upon which the job is to be undertaken. For the purpose of this Section, 8:30 a. m. is to be construed as the time of the beginning of the working day.

Section 5. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not to exceed One Hundred Dollars and costs of prosecution, or imprisonment in the County Jail for a period of not more than ninety (90) days for each such violation.

Section 6. The license of any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, may be revoked by the Mayor of the City of Grosse Pointe after due hearing before said Mayor, upon notice of said hearing issued to the holder of said license.

Section 7. Should the Courts of this City or State declare any section or provision of this ordinance unconstitutional or unauthorized or in conflict with any other section or provision of this ordinance, then such decision shall affect only the section or provision as declared to be unconstitutional or unauthorized and shall not affect any other section or part of this ordinance.

This ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after its publication.

The New Russian Policy of Aggression
(Continued from Page One)
demand for recognition of certain British rights (?) in Caucasus.
When it became evident that the Central Soviet Government would not recognize these "treaties," France and England declared Bolshevism a menace to civilization. When they found out they could gain no control whatever of the vast Russian market and the inexhaustible supply of Russia's mineral wealth and raw materials, they incited Russia's neighbors to provoke and fight her. And, when this too failed, they tried to overthrow the Communistic regime through subversive movements within the boundaries of the U. S. S. R. Nor has Germany been more friendly, especially since Hitler came to power.

Meanwhile, the Russian Revolution is dead. Stalin and the exigencies of the modern state have killed it. Little does it matter whether in the future Stalin is to turn Nazi or whether he will convert Hitler over to his form of totalitarian statesmanship, his dictatorship or that of the (Communist) Party is henceforth openly directed against the proletariat, not only in Russia, but the world over.

AN ORDINANCE
RELATING TO THE MOVING OF Houses, Boilers and other Heavy Objects.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE ORDAINS:

Section 1. It shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation removing or causing to be removed, any building of a larger size than 14 feet by 20 feet, and 13 feet in height from the surface of the street, and for moving any boiler weighing over 15 tons or any machinery or bulky article of such weight, to be hauled upon or over the streets of said City, to secure written permission therefor from the Building Commissioner who shall not issue the same without the written approval first appearing thereon of the chief of the police department and the chief of the fire department. The Building Commissioner shall thereupon and upon receiving satisfactory evidence that the bond or cash that is required hereinafter has been filed or paid in, issue a permit designating the route to be taken and the time to be occupied in the removal of such building, boiler or other heavy and bulky article, the route to be taken and the time for moving to be stated upon the permit and to be agreed to by the chief of the police department and chief of the fire department before the issuance of the permit. While in transit any such building or heavy and bulky article shall be so moved as to least obstruct the street and by the route and in the time prescribed in the permit; nor shall any person leave any building, steam boiler or other heavy and bulky article on any street crossing. Any person, firm or corporation moving any building, steam boiler or other heavy and bulky article as aforesaid, shall erect a safe and sufficient barrier around the part of the street so occupied, and maintain sufficient colored lights thereon during the hours of night for the protection of the public. Before any person shall obtain such permission to move or remove such articles as heretofore prescribed, he shall file a bond or deposit cash to the satisfaction of the City Clerk but in no case less than the penal sum of \$200.00 conditioned that he will pay all damages to public or private property, including trees, that shall be caused by removing any such building, steam boiler or other heavy and bulky article; Provided that any person, firm or corporation whose business is that of moving buildings or other bulky articles, if so desiring, may file a bond or deposit cash in an amount satisfactory to the City Clerk, sufficient to secure the payment of all damages to public or private property that shall be caused by him or them in removing buildings or other bulky articles, during any period not exceeding one year. No steam boiler or other heavy or bulky article shall be moved into, along or across any paved street unless the wheels under the same are so guarded as to prevent the flanges of such wheels from cutting, breaking or injuring the pavement; and that boilers, machinery, or other bulky articles of such weight or more, to-wit: fifteen tons, shall only be hauled on trucks, the wheels of which shall be equipped with tires not less than 8 inches in width. It shall be the duty of the Police Department to ascertain from the person in charge of the moving of any such article if they have the proper written permit therefor. And every person, firm or corporation moving or causing to be moved any steam boiler or other heavy and bulky article into, along or across any street, alley or public space, shall furnish the driver or person in immediate charge of such operation, a certificate showing the exact weight of the article being so moved, which shall be shown by such driver to any police officer on demand. And when the question arises as to the correctness of the weights between the driver or other operator and the police officer, such driver or operator shall immediately proceed to have the weight named in such certificate verified, on such a scale as shall be designated by the police officer. And if it shall be ascertained that such person, firm or corporation as aforesaid is moving or causing to be moved such heavy or bulky article as heretofore described in violation of the conditions heretofore set forth, it shall be the duty of the Police Department to at once make the proper complaint; Provided, however, that in case the Building Commissioner shall refuse to grant the desired permit, a petition may be made to the Common Council, who may direct such Commissioner to issue a permit therefor.

Sec. 2. It is hereby made the duty of the Police Department and Building Commissioner to see that the provisions of this ordinance are faithfully observed, and to make complaint for all violations of the same.

Sec. 3. Any person performing work, as provided in this ordinance, who shall neglect or refuse to comply with its provisions, and any other violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding One Hundred (\$100) Dollars and costs; and in the imposition of any such fine and costs, the Court may make a further sentence that the offender may be imprisoned in the County Jail until the payment thereof, for any period of time not exceeding six months.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after publication.

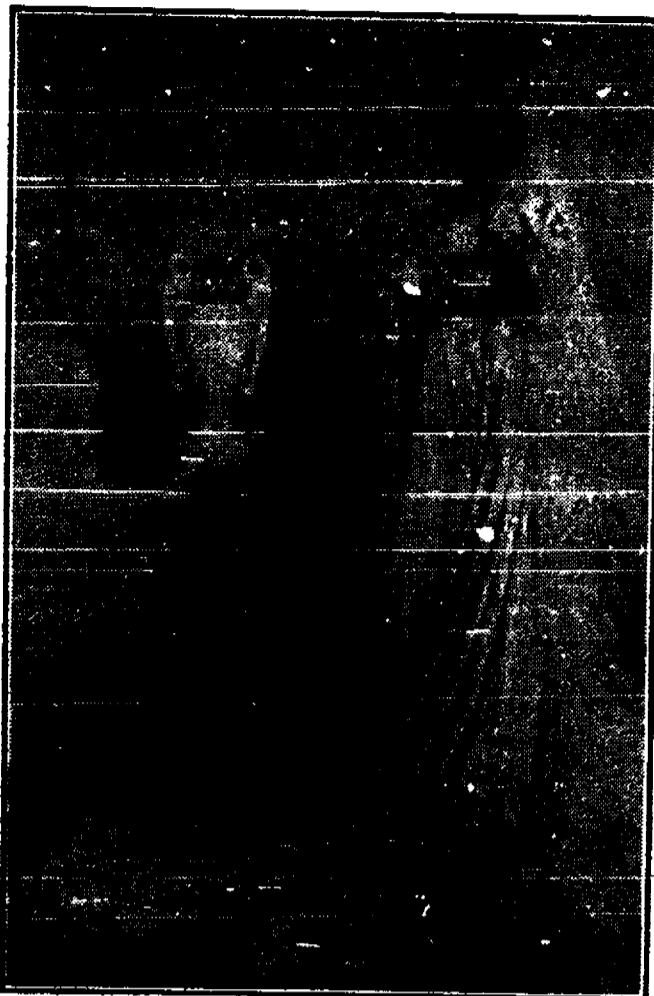
