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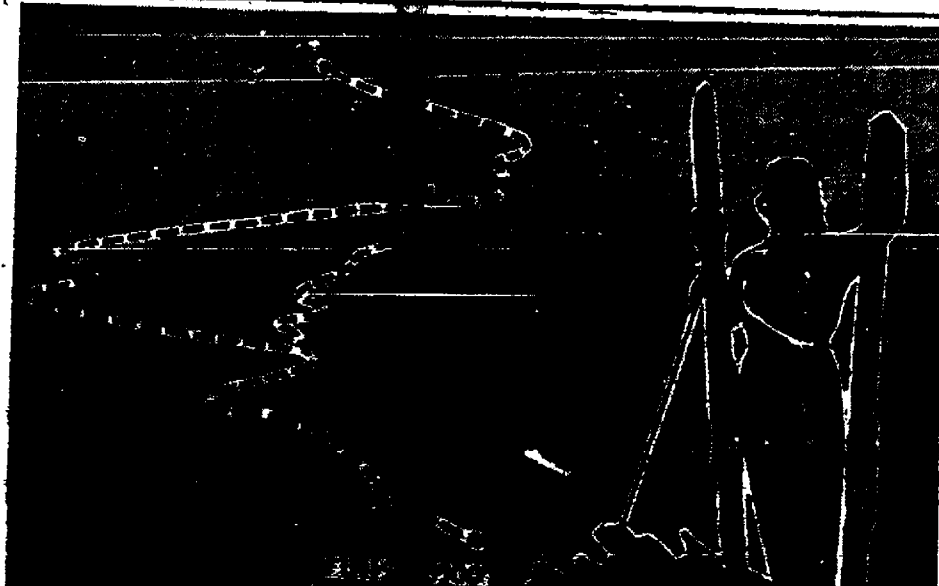

Small Pox is one of the easiest diseases to contract and anyone not vaccinated against it is very sure to get it if exposed to it. People of any age may get it and it is apt to be fatal to children.

"New Ideas for a New World" Topic at Baha'is Meeting

Mrs. Margery McCormick of Chicago, spoke last Thursday night to a group of Baha'is and their friends, gathered at 104 Moran road on "New Ideas for a New World."

"We think that we get our own ideas," said Mrs. McCormick, "but that is not so; for even the greatest of poets, artists, and philosophers say that their ideas come from somewhere outside of themselves. As the minds of men have matured greater ideas have poured into them, until it seems today as if we could live happily for years without another idea. But also it seems today as if we would perish if we do not do something."

"Therefore we must select those ideas, none begin to approach those given by the Prophets who have come to man from time to time. Their words and ideas have influenced countless millions. And as each Prophet speaks, he says that he does not speak through himself, but through the Divine Creator. And so, in its beginning, each new revelation has had a powerful influence on moulding the lives of its followers. But it seems to be like a battery which needs constant recharging from the Divine world. And it is the belief of the Baha'is that the Divine message has again been renewed to man through Baha'ullah, who announced the mission in Persia almost a hundred years ago.

"Baha'ullah does not come into the world with a new religion. He brings the same religion of old, just as Christ came to fulfill the law of Moses. Baha'ullah comes to renew, to embrace, to restore the teachings of the Divine Messengers to their pristine purity, to praise religion from its depths, to clear away all of the misunderstanding and prejudices that have grown out of interpretation of the original teachings.

"Among the causes of war is the one of religious prejudice. This is due not to true religion but to the misrepresentation of it. If we investigate independently as Baha'ullah has urged us to do, we will find that essentially all religions are the same, since there is but one Source.

"The second great cause of war is racial prejudice. Some races have assumed themselves to be superior, with the right to annihilate others. But Baha'ullah says that every race has tremendous capacity which needs only education to develop it, and that one needs the contrast of characteristics to make the world interesting just as a garden needs flowers of many colors to make it beautiful.

kind is like a bird, and if the wing of science is overdeveloped, and the wing of religion underdeveloped, mankind cannot progress so rapidly.

"And then we have the teachings for the basis of an international tribunal. Many will say that this is impossible because the League of Nations failed. But although this was a failure, it was a step in the right direction. Its failure was due to a poor foundation.

"When Abdul-Baha was here in America, he said, 'In 1863 you did a wonderful thing when you abolished chattel slavery. Now what you must do is abolish industrial slavery. This cannot be done by strikes and arguments. There is a Divine law for this of that voluntary sharing, a profit-sharing basis, one of ownership in the company for which one works.' And today we find that those companies who have followed this idea have prospered through depression and been working while others stood still.

Today relatively few people look to religion as a solution for the ills of the world. Capital and labor leaders have all tried their problems as have socialists and economists. But the world seems to become worse instead of better.

century is too much for anybody, and to prevent a return of such a calamity, the Allies plan to Balkanize Germany, at the end of this war. This plan is nothing new. In fact, it would have been applied in 1919, at the end of the World War had not Wilson vetoed it. This time we alone shall dictate the terms on which the future peace will have to be based. By carving Germany up into pieces, they plan to revive the old Germanic states of the pre-Bismarck era. The 25 German provinces would be divided into so many independent states with a president or a reigning prince at its head.

This is not impossible when one considers the difference between the proud brutal and often ignorant Prussian and the mild, refined and life-enjoying Bavarian. The contrasts are practically the same when one compares natives of other German provinces. For, we must not forget that it is Bismarck in 1861-70 who brought the various Germanic states together in federated 'y William I. king of Prussia. And, to do this, Bismarck had to use coercion. Bismarck himself, was a Prussian. Perhaps that is why he always preferred the whip as an effective means of persuasion. Hitler is not a Prussian, but he has read Bismarck too much.

Of course the fate the Allies hold in store for Germany after the war is being kept secret by the Allied governments. To reveal it at this time might well defeat its purpose. It would most certainly solidify the German people behind Adolf Hitler. And that is one thing the Allies want to avoid. They want to win the war comfortably.

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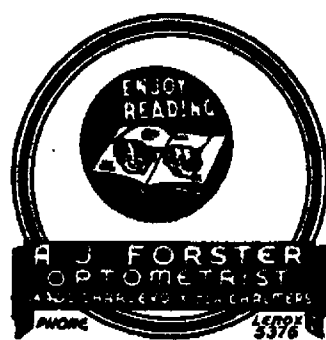
