WPA Sponsors To Hold 'Open House' May 20-25

Joining with city, county and state governments, Work Projects Administration supervisors throughout Michigan will hold "Open House Week" May 2 to 25, Abner E. Larned, State WPA administrator, announced today.

Residents of every community in Michigan where WPA projects of the professional and service division are operated will be invited to visit these projects personally and see for themselves how they are operated, Mr. Larned said.

"I want to make it plain that WPA doesn't claim all the credit for what's been done during the past four and one-half years," Mr. Larned explained. "We share the responsibility with the local governments which plan and sponsor our projects and put up most of the cash for materials and equipment. The WPA pays the wages and manages the program."

Tribute to the work of the WPA project workers who carry out the plans of WPA and the sponsors also was voiced by Mr. Larned.

"Too often they are overlooked and the community forgets that without their labor, the benefits resulting from WPA could not be gained," he said.

The Michigan WPA sponsors "Open House Week" is part of a nation-wide program in which the people of America will be urged to participate.

Outstanding among the types of prospects which will be thrown open to visitors all over Michigan during this week are:

Adult education classes, recreational activities arts and crafts classes and production units; nursery schools and hot school lunches; concerts by WPA musicians; writers, museum, archaeological, historical records, tax survey, and assessment record projects; also building and furniture renovation and clothing and shoe renovation projects; tourist guide demonstrations; house-keeping side projects, and medical and dental clinics.

Sponsors of these projects and the WPA supervisors in charge will welcome visitors to their projects during the week of May 20 to 25 and will provide demonstrations of the work being accomplished.

Luncheon clubs, civic groups, chambers of commerce and church organizations will be among the special groups invited to take part in the program, Mr. Larned said.

Social Security Service Free

All services of the field offices of the Social Security Board are free, it was explained today by Elmore B. Pollock, manager of the East Side field office of that federal agency.

His announcement was made to bring about a broader understanding of the type of service which the field office of the federal agency gives, it was said. Commenting on the availability of service Mr. Pollock declared:

"The service of a Social Security Board field office begins when a person applies for a social security account number, whether an original or duplicate.

"Then if a worker desires to know how much money is credited to his wage record in the social security headquarters in Baltimore, he may get the postcard which is used to obtain this information, from any field of the board. The only expense to the worker

for this service is for a one cent stamp to attach to the post card.

"If the worker find any error in his account the board will endeavor to find the cause of the mistake and thus bring about a correction.

"Finally if a worker or his survivors file claim for monthly payments under the amended Social Security Act, the board will handle all necessary details of filing the claim, with no charge for this or any other service within its scope," Mr. Pollock added.

He said that those having any social security matters to discuss may use the Harper field office at any time, either through personal or telephone call or by correspondence. This office, located at 8037 Harper at Van Dyke, has been established to serve your community.

Mason P. T. A. Explains Functions Of Association

In the belief that a number of people have never been made fully aware of the functions and objectives of the Parent-Teachers Association, the executive committee of Mason P. T. A., through Mr. Brooks, president, in an interview with the staff of Grosse Pointe Review, issued the following statement. Quoting from the manual of the national P. T. A.:

Objects, Etc.
Article 2.—The objects of this association will be: To promote the welfare of children and youth in home, school, church and community; to raise the standards of home life; to secure adequate laws for the care and protection of children and youth.

To bring into closer relation the home and the school that parents and teachers may co-operate intelligently in the training of the child and to develop between educators and the general public such united efforts as will secure for every child the highest advantages in physical, mental, social and spiritual education.

Article 3.—This association shall be noncommercial, nonsectarian and nonpartisan. No commercial enterprise nor any candidate or its officers in their official capacities shall not be used in connection with a commercial concern or with any partisan interest, or for other than the regular work of the association.

Article 4.—All persons who are interested in the objects for which the association is organized may become active members upon payment of the dues. Dues for membership in Mason P. T. A. are only 25 cents for the year.

Article 5.—Officers and Their Election. The officers of this association shall be a president, a vice-president (one or more), a secretary, and a treasurer, who shall hold office for one year and be eligible for re-election. Nominations shall be made by a nominating committee of three members elected by the members of the association at least one month previous to the election. Following the report of the nominating committee nominations may be made from the floor.

Election shall be held at the meeting (usually in the school building). Duties of office shall be assumed at the close of the last meeting of the school year. Election shall be by ballot when there is more than one nominee for an office.

Vacancies in office shall be filled by the executive committee. You may note from the above the fair democratic manner in which elections are held and offices filled. Every parent has the right and the responsibility of holding office in their own local association.

Many people believe that the meetings are for parents of pupils only. Such is not the case. The regular meetings are planned to interest, enlighten and entertain every resident of the community and it is a matter of extreme importance to the program committee that the attendance be built up to a point where competent speakers

Clean-Up Campaign Started In Detroit

For several years the Board of Commerce and the Civic Pride Association have annually sponsored a clean-up, six-up, paint-up campaign to make Detroit more attractive, healthful and prosperous. The period for the intensive work this spring is April 27 to May 10.

Joining in the program are the American Legion, Junior Board of Commerce, Board of Education, Fire Prevention Bureau, Department of Public Works, Health Department, Police Department and thousands of private citizens.

Starting April 27, 260,000 school children will swing into action to do their bit toward making their city a better place in which to live. Programs in their class rooms will give them a better understanding of civic responsibilities. Yards will be cleaned and the message of safety taken to parents in the homes. One hundred and fifty thousand Fire Prevention Bureau posters will be distributed by the pupils.

Citizens will remove the winter's accumulation of rubbish from their basements and attics, test electrical wiring and otherwise see to it that no fire hazards are in existence to endanger lives and property.

The Department of Public Works will make a special effort to speedily remove all debris placed in the alleys. It is urged that garbage be put in separate packages to facilitate this work.

Lawns will be cleaned, houses painted, fences repaired and a general plan of rejuvenation of property will be carried out. Rats, which cause millions of dollars loss annually, will be killed off and flying papers corralled and burned.

All citizens are urged to join in this work. Tourists advertise an attractive city. Detroit should be second to none.
