

| Nazi 'Blitzkriegs' Send Red Cross Into Action

The 3.700 Red Cross Chapters throughout the nation this week set into motion machinery locally to raise a \$10,000,000 European war relief fund to lessen distress among Europe's war sufferers.

William M. Baxter Jr., of St. Louis, Red Cross midwestern area manager, said today that early indications point to a gratifying response on all sides.

"The Red Cross already has cabled \$200,000 to Belgium and the Netherlands for emergency relief work, and this week placed new orders for 150 ambulances, 100 auxiliary hospital trucks and other equipment, such as field hospitals and surgical supplies," Baxter said.

"Invasion of the low countries has multiplied the requirements for additional American Red Cross assistance in the war zones," Baxter added. "Before the latest invasion into Western Europe, the Red Cross had spent \$1,-500,000 for aid in Europe since the outbreak of hostilities last September. Most of this was to provide for innocent refugees. American Red Cross chapters have turned out approximately 300,000 garments for European war civilians since last September.



Federal Insurance Marriage Proof

Marriage certificates have taken on added importance in connection with insurance checks from the federal government quickly.

Mr. Pollock explained that the new system which went into effect this past Ready For Presentation January provides survivors' insurance for widows and children of workers who die, as well as old-age insurance for qualified wage-earners and their wives after age 65. Claims for insurance are now being received, he said, from the windows of men who have died since the first of this year when the new plan went into operation. Experience with these claims has already shown that delay in producing proof of marriage may hold up payment.

"It is the Social Security Board's policy," Mr. Pollock stated, "to give assistance to the applicant in furnishing such proof. But the board's representatives naturally must have proper evidence that the woman is entitled to these benefits as the wife or widow of the worker in question. An Ordinance

ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE VILLAGE OF CROSSE POINTE WOODS, WAYNE COUNTY, MICHIGAN.

AN ORDINANCE to regulate and 'estrict the location of trades and infustries and the location of buildings sesigned for specified uses, to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildags hereafter erected, to regulate and letermine the area of yards, courts, and sther open spaces, to limit and restrict the maximum number of iamilies which nay be housed in dwellings hereafter rected or altered, and for said pursoses divide the Village into districts, o provide a method of administration, end to prescribe the penalties for the riolation of its provisions:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE VIL-LAGE OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS: Section 1. PURPOSE OF REGU-

Such regulations shall be made in accordance with a comprehensive plan and designed to lessen congestion in the streets; to secure safety from fire, panic, and other dangers; to promote health and the general welfare; to prowide adequate light and air; to prevent the overcrowding of land; to avoid undue concentration of population; to facilitate the adequate provision of transportation, water, sewage, schools, parks and other public requirements. Such regulations shall be made with reasonable consideration, among other things, to the character of the district and its peculiar suitability for particular suitability for particular suitability for particular uses, and with a view to conserving the value of buildings and encouraging the most appropriate use of the land throughout this munici-

Section Z. DISTRICTS.

There shall be three use districts as indicated on the plotted map of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods which is attached hereto and is made a part of this ordinance.

DISTRICT A.

A district confined to detached residences accommodating but a single family and containing one housekeeping unit and having no party wall or walls in common with an adjacent house or houses; and certain public buildings and uses necessary for the public convenience and welfare.

DISTRICT B. A district confined to business and/or commercial establishments erected for the sale of goods at retail or a commercial or professional service conducted for the residents of the locality which is not observious or offensive to of odor, fumes, dust, smoke, waste, vibration or noise, provided there is not in connection therewith any manufacturing, repairing, converting, altering, finishing or assemblying except that which is incidental to such retail business or service and on which not mor than five mechanics or workers are customarily engaged, provided that the limitation on the number of mechanics or workers employed shall not apply to automotive sales rooms and/or service stations.

DISTRICT C.

Section 3. HEIGHT OF BUILD-INGS-DISTRICT A.

All buildings in District A shall be restricted to not more than two and one-half stories in height. A story is construed as being no more than ten feet in height using a vertical line extending from floor to ceiling. A half story shall be construed as an area for finished or unfinished rooms under sloping roof which does not exceed onehalf of the floor area of the story immediately below. That portion of any structure below the ground in whole or in part, in which living or sleeping quarters are provided, shall be considered to be a story in determining the height of the structure.

Section 4. BULK AND AREA-DISTRICT A.

(a) Front Yards. In a residence A District there shall be on every lot a front yard, the minimum depth of which shall be 25 feet to the main front wall of the building. Where an enclosed vestibule, attached garage, or similar projection extends beyond the front wall, the minimum depth shall be applied to such projection. Where at the time of passage of this ordinance. more than fifty per cent of the lots on one side of a street between two intersecting streets within a Residence District are occupied by dwellings having a front yard of greater depth than 25 feet, any building thereafter erected on any one of such lots shall have a front yard at least equal in depth to the average front yard of such existing dwellings, but this shall not require a greater depth than sixty feet or more than one-third the depth of the lot in any case.

Districts B and C. DISTRICT B.

Shall embrace all land fronting on Mack Avenue for its entire length within the Village and to a depth of 300 feet from the center line of Mack Avenue as established by the Wayne County Road Commission: PROVID-ED, HOWEVER, that in no event shall the death of said district exceed the platted depth of lots as determined by the recorded plats thereof.

All land fronting on Vernier Road from a point 300 feet East of the center line of Mack Avenue to the Westerly line of the Village and to a depth of 300 feet from the center line of Vernier Road as established by the Wayne County Road Commission; PROVID-ED, HOWEVER, that in no event shall the depth of said district exceed the platted depth of lots as determined by the recorded plats thereof.

All land fronting on Harper Avenue within the Village limit's and to a depth of 180 feet from the center line of Harper Avenue as established by the Wayne County Road Commission; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that in no event shall the depth of said district exceed the platted depth of lots as determined by the recorded plats thereof. DISTRICT C.

Shall embrace all land fronting on Vernier Road from a point 300 feet East of the center line of Mack Avenue to the Easterly line of the Village and to a depth of 300 feet from the center line of Vernier Road as established by the Wayne County Road Commission; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that in no event shall the depth of said district exceed the platted depth of lots as determined by the recorded plats thereof.

Section 26. VIOLATION AND PENALTIES.

Any person, firm or corporation who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense, or shall be punished by imprisonment in the Village or County jail for a period of not to exceed ninety days for each offense, or may be both fined and imprisoned as provided herein. Any building which is erected, altered or converted or any use of premises which is begun or changed subsequent to the time of passage of this ordinance and in violation of any of the provisions thereof is hereby declared a nuisance per se.
