Bodah ran the "100" in 10.1, clipping a second off the track record. Bob Sturman also set a new record in the pole vault, with a 11-foot 9-inch leap.

This final setback brings Grosse Pointe's seasonal record to one win, one tie and three losses.

pared to \$16.36 last year, or an increase of 39c over the preceding year. The reason for the increased tax rate is due to the fact that the Village has temporarily lost from its rolls a certain amount of property which was previously subject to taxation. As pointed out before, during the election campaign, there were two sizable subdivisions in the Village upon which the taxes had become delinquent and these subdivisions are now owned by the State of Michigan under the Act providing for the scavenger sale. Last year these subdivisions were assessed at \$716,870.00, but now, being owned by the State, they cannot be assessed by the Village. In addition, certain intangible personal property, formerly subject to assessment by the Village, is now absorbed by the State of Michigan under the intangible tax law. Largely because of this law the as-

sed valuation of personal property this year is \$623,543.00 less than last year. Hence, the Village is deprived of assessing property, real and personal, 1939, the sum of \$1,340,413.00, whereas the value of new construction work during the past year is approximately \$800,000.00.

"The above mentioned losses to the Village of part of its revenue due to State laws is beyond our control. The cost of operating our Village govern-

ment is the most important matter to absorb the added burdens with which we are confronted this year, but has approved a budget, the total of which creating expenses sufficiently, not only is less in amount than in the year 1939."

The Lehan farm is still on the turf map as a nursery and this year seven mares were bred to some of the better sires standing in the vicinity of the Jefferson County homestead.

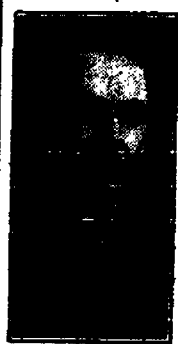

Drinking and Driving

"Come on, Joe," his friends coaxed, "just one more drink!" Joe took "just one more drink." And last week he stood before me in Traffic Court charged with operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.



The nineteenth hole or after the ninth inning has created another major traffic problem. Such arrests reach their peak between midnight and 2 a. m., bearing evidence that heavy drinking at beer gardens and night clubs produces drivers mentally and physically incapable of operating a motor vehicle.

Common sense is merely seeing things as they ought to be seen and doing things as they ought to be done. It is common sense that driving and drinking should be completely separated, despite one's personal attitude toward drinking.

The operation of a motor vehicle requires quick and accurate reaction to ever-present danger and the slightest mental or physical inadequacy makes an accident more possible. The intelligent and law-abiding motorist will avoid the erratic thinking and physical lack of alertness which are brought about by the use of intoxicants.

It is not my intention to reform anybody who wishes to indulge in alcoholic beverages. But if a motorist must drink, he must not drive!
