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graduated from the Grosse Pointe High School is unprepared to fill that place successfully, it is through no fault of the school.

The high school maintains a home economics department where girls are trained in all the duties of caring for the home. They are able to practice what they learn from their text books in a completely equipped apartment.

The girls in the home economics classes, as part of their regular work, it is sometimes said that a woman's keep up the apartment as if they were living there. Cooking, polishing the furniture, washing, ironing, planning and serving meals, and making slip covers, napkins, and draperies are part of their duties.

In addition to the apartment where the home economics classes meet, there is a cooking laboratory where the various foods classes are held. The first semester of the foods course includes a study of the planning and serving of dinners. Several times during the course the girls receive practical experience when they prepare dinners for guests.

In the second semester of the foods course, the preparation of fancier meals such as teas, buffet dinners, picnics and luncheons is taught.

Besides learning how to cook and to care for a home, a girl may also learn the essentials of sewing. In addition to obtaining practical experience through making clothes, the girls study personality, posture, color, design, textiles, the care of clothing, alterations, remodeling, accessories, wardrobe planning and clothing budgets.

If a girl is especially interested in children, she may take a course in child care where she will read stories to kindergarten classes, give parties for small children, and learn how to make simple toys for children.

Out of these various courses have grown some extremely interesting outside activities such as the open house which the home economics department gave last spring. The cooking classes prepared the food for the tea which the girls in the home making classes served, while the sewing classes prepared a fashion show consisting of articles made by the girls.

At the beginning of last semester, 18 girls under the leadership of Mrs. Helen Horton, foods instructor, formed the Home Economics Club. Their activities included trips to the builders show, The Free Press fashion show, and the flower show. Another club recently started is the Boys' Cooking Club, headed by Miss Dorothy Hostettler, clothing instructor.

If a girl would rather learn about the construction and decoration of a home instead of its care, she may take the interior decoration course. There she learns how to plan a house and the steps it goes through from the time the steam shovel digs the hole to the hanging of the final pictures on the walls. She plans her own ideal home, making floor plans for it, selecting color schemes and choosing furniture.

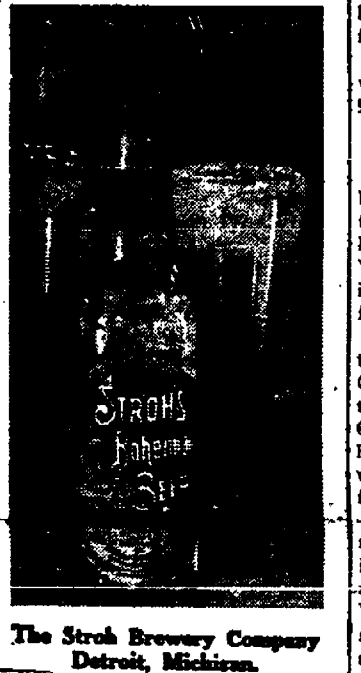

**Grosse Pointe Scouts Start Western Tour**

Tearing a leaf from Horace Greeley's "Go west, young man" advice, seven ambitious young Grosse Pointe Boy Scouts and their capable scout master embarked late last week on a proposed 10,000-mile tour of western United States.

Traveling in a station wagon, the boys of Troup 39 will bear a letter of introduction to the mayors of cities in the United States written by Detroit's Mayor Jeffries. Jeffries' document states: "May this tour bring to the boys a greater realization of the common bonds which bind the youth of America into one great body whose greatest desire is the perpetuation of the American way of living."

The trip, planned by the scouts and their scout master, is largely financed by money the boys themselves have earned doing various jobs in the community. Chet Sampson, master and leader of the expedition, is a "real guy" to all the boys. Sampson, a teacher at the Pierce Junior High School, is a likeable and friendly young man, who has the interest and welfare of the boys at heart at all times.

The boys themselves average in age from 13 to 16 years. All five of Grosse Pointe's municipalities are represented at least once in the homes of the seven boys. The group is composed of Ted

**Tommy Burke Starts Drive For County Sheriff's Office**

"For the good of the country, as well as Wayne County, the present situation in the sheriff's office must be cleaned up," Thomas A. Burke stated Saturday when officially announcing his candidacy for the high office of sheriff of Wayne County on the Democratic ticket.

"The vital part played in the defense of America by Wayne County's heavy industries makes this essential," continued Mr. Burke. "Our next sheriff must place patriotism above all else, and co-operate with those federal agencies combatting fifth columnists."

"If I am elected," Mr. Burke pledged, "I will first establish a division solely devoted to assisting the FBI in curbing the activities of saboteurs."

Mr. Burke, known to his thousands of friends as Tommy, is a native Detroit. This marks his first appearance in politics. He was born in the Holy Redeemer parish in 1898 of Irish parents. His active part in athletics, particularly football, should make his name familiar to the followers of that sport a score of years ago. He starred at quarterback on many championship teams, including Western High School, the Holy Redeemer Grays, and prominent semi-professional teams of the day.

Since the repeal of prohibition he has been engaged in the retail end of the liquor business and at present has an establishment on Livernois avenue.

At the time of filing, Mr. Burke made public a platform upon which he will base his campaign. In addition to his pledge to fight fifth columnists, Mr. Burke also believes that the sheriff's office can be run more efficiently and economically if all local communities enjoy home rule.

"If the cities, towns and villages will police themselves as they have the rights and facilities to do, there should be no need for the sheriff's office to interfere. The present troubles now besetting the office can be traced to deputies 'butting in' situations which local authorities can control."

"When the community cannot enforce its laws, and asks the aid of the sheriff, such aid will be given. Otherwise, if I am elected, we will not interfere with a community's right to home rule."

BEYOND THE BENCH

Women Drivers

Perhaps it is time to give women drivers the credit due them. According to a recent survey of 1,000 mixed motorists in one of the eastern states, it was found that while women drive only half as much as men yet they are involved in but one-third as many accidents.

Assuming that women throughout the country drive but half the mileage of the mechanized male figures for last year may interest the men. They indicate that only one-third of the motorists involved in a recent survey's 12,000 automobile fatalities were women.

Public authorities throughout the country testify that women are far less likely to be driving than men, and that when they do, the greatest percentage of accidents is in automobiles.

Michigan. During 1939 there were 6,520 people killed and 103,500 injured by speeding motorists.

It is a common failing of men to regard the woman driver as a traffic menace, but the facts cited above prove that women pay for greater attention to the rules of safety than men. Perhaps the principal reason may be a more skillful driver but the women have fewer accidents!

Many solutions of the problem of traffic safety have been offered but the women are doing their share—by good example.
