

Christ Jesus declared God to be our Father and to be Spirit; and the offspring of Spirit must be spiritual, not material. Therefore, to reality man is a spiritually mental being. Individual man does not possess a portion of Spirit, but indi-vidually reflects infinite Spirit, or true substance. He is spiritually substantial, reflecting the perfection, completeness, sufficiency, harmony, and indestructibility of Spirit. Consequently, man's substance is never finite or limited, is never subject to exhaustion, disease, breakage, or de-struction. It can be neither increased nor decreased: hence it is never subject to growth or depletion, but is eternally perfect and com-plete. And in doing this we are

loving our neighbor as ourselves. 
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
