Draft Registration -- October 16

Local Voters Urged to Register Now And Escape Oct. 16th Draft Rush

Wednesday, October 16, is the last day in which voters who intend to cast a ballot at the national election on Tuesday, November 5, can register. Wednesday, October 16, also is the day when every man between the ages of 21 and 35 years of age must register under the Selective Service Act.

Volunteers Needed. To aid in the registration of all men between the ages of 21 and 35 on October 16, Grosse Pointe Township Clerk Carl Schwickart has issued a call for capable and responsible men to volunteer their services on that day.

Check their status by telephone. Citizens are urged to check their status by telephone to ascertain whether or not they are registered.

Both registrations will be handled by the same personnel in your community and a tremendous load will be thrown upon the registration machinery on that day.

The only way in which the delay and confusion caused by this untoward circumstance of dates can be reduced is by voters not waiting until the very last day to register.

Electors may register at the Township office, 15215 Jefferson, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 4:30 p. m., and at the office of City Clerk Nef, 17150 Mainway, between 9 a. m. and 4:30 p. m.

Men eligible for the draft should register on October 16 at the same time as they vote at their election booths. In need of conscientious and responsible men to assist in the registering of conscripts, Clerk Carl Schwickart has asked interested citizens to contact him at his office.

Grosse Pointe Defeats Royal Oak High 7-6; Ends Losing Streak

 Rebounding from a poorly played first half, Grosse Pointe High's football squad rallied in the final quarter of last Saturday's game and nosed out Royal Oak 7-6, ending a disastrous eight-game losing streak which has dogged the local lads for two seasons.
 Royal Oak drew first blood early in the opening quarter when a 40-yard pass placed the Oaks deep in Grosse Pointe territory. Four plays later the "Acoras" swept around end to score. The Pointers blocked the place-kick try for the extra point.
 Royal Oak threatened again in the second period but could get nothing across. The third quarter saw Royal Oak stop a Grosse Pointe touchdown march, only to have the Pointers come right back and intercept an "Acora" forward pass.
 After being effectively smothered for three quarters, Grosse Pointe's vaunted passing attack finally started to connect shortly after the start of the last period. Gordon Tanner pitched the Pointers into Royal Oak territory and climaxed the drive with a long pass to Bob Bureau. Bureau advanced to the "Oak's" 20-yard line yard before shoveling a lateral pass to Bill Carlson, who traveled the remaining distance unopposed. Grosse Pointe faked a place-kick on the extra point attempt and Tanner passed to Ray Weaver in the end zone.
 Friday evening Grosse Pointe will travel to Monroe and meet the "Trojans" under the lights of Navarre Field in their second Border Cities League game of the current schedule. The kick-off is set for 8 p. m. Monroe captured the league football crown last year but have been defeated twice this season.

Are You Registered?
Be Sure You Are Properly Registered In Order to Vote This Fall
In order to vote in the Presidential Election November 5, 1940, you must be a registered voter.
The following facts govern voting registration in Michigan.
You must register if:
1. You have never registered.
2. You have not voted for two (2) years or more.
3. You have moved or failed to have your voting address transferred on the registration list.
4. You will be twenty-one (21) years old by November 5th, 1940, and desire to vote in the Presidential Election on that date.
You need not register if:
1. You are properly registered at your present address, and have voted during the last two (2) years.
2. You have moved and notified the Township Clerk of the change of address.
Any American citizen, native born or naturalized, who is twenty-one (21) years old and properly registered, and who has been in the State for six (6) months and in the Township for twenty (20) days, may vote.
Under the Registration Law, if you have failed to vote during any two-year period, your registration is cancelled, and you must re-register.
Therefore, if you have not voted in a State, County, Township or Municipal Election, other than School Election, within the last two (2) years, you must re-register.
Any person who will become twenty-one (21) years of age by November 5th, 1940, the date of the Election, may register now. Naturalized citizens should bring their citizenship papers with them when they register.
For your convenience, you may register at the office of the Clerk of the Village in which you reside, or at the Township Clerk's Office in the Municipal Building on East Jefferson Avenue at Maryland Avenue in the Village of Grosse Pointe Park, the office being open from 9:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m.; Saturday, 9:00 to 12:00.
October 16th, 1940, is the final day for registration for the November Election, which will be held on November 5th, 1940.
If in doubt as to your proper registration, kindly communicate with the Township Clerk, who will gladly examine the registration list and verify your registration.
Registration for School elections does not qualify you as a properly registered voter for the Presidential Election. You must be registered under the Township or Village in which you reside.
To avoid inconvenience, register as soon as possible.

U. of M. Professor Will Address Local Alumni Club

Dr. James K. Pollock, professor of political science, University of Michigan, will address the Grosse Pointe Chapter of the University of Michigan Alumni Club at the Pierce Auditorium on October 15, at 8:30 p. m. His subject will be "The Future As I See It." Almost exactly a year ago Dr. Pollock addressed the Alumni Club using as his topic "Whiteber Germany." At that time the war in Europe had been going on only a few weeks. At the meeting on October 15, Dr. Pollock will review and re-interpret the predictions which he made at that time regarding war in Europe. Among the statements made by Dr. Pollock a year ago were: "I believe Germany will lose the war because I do not believe Russia will give Hitler raw materials that he needs and thus offset the British blockade," and "this is the time for us to be thinking about what we are going to do to insure the future peace when this war is over—although we are not now involved, I would advise keeping our powder dry." One of the most interesting features of Dr. Pollock's address last year was the discussion which followed his talk and he has agreed to throw the meeting open to questions from the floor again this year.

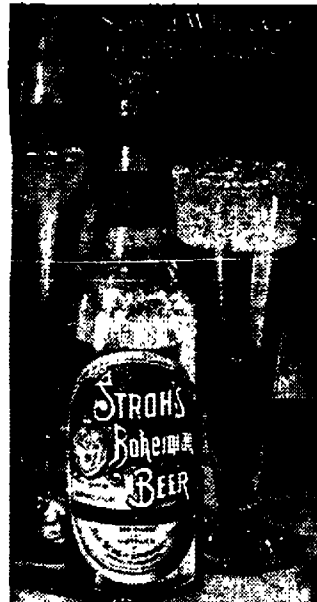

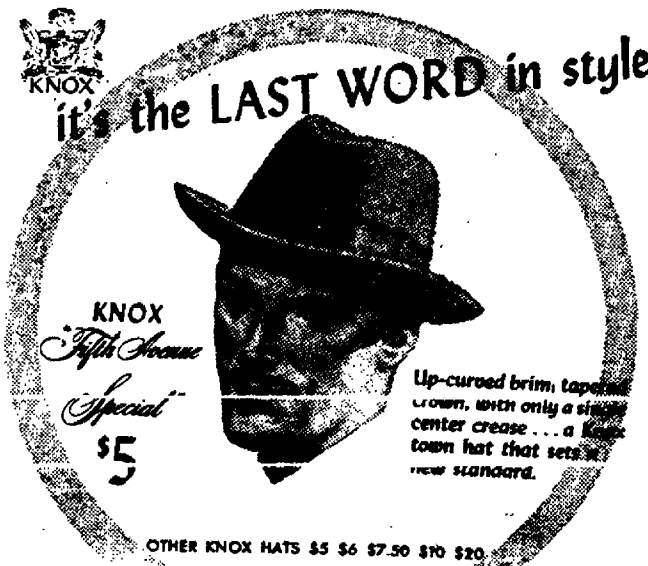
