Goal of \$5,000 Set By Lions Club Committee

For the 12th successive year, the members of the Grosse Pointe Lions Club will appear on the streets and corners of the Pointe very early in the morning of December 17, selling "Goodfellow Papers" for the benefit of the unfortunate children and their parents living within our community.

Carl Schweikart, president of the Lions Club, has set the amount needed this year at \$5,000. Chairman of this year's sale, Nelson L. Korte, believes that coupled with good weather and the usual generosity of the Grosse Pointe public, the Club should have no trouble in reaching this goal.

The Grosse Pointe Goodfellow Fund, in addition to defraying the expenses of furnishing the underprivileged of Grosse Pointe with Christmas baskets of food and clothing, is used through-

out the entire year for optical services, hospitalization, medical aid, dental service, rent, coal, shoes, etc. The fund is distributed through Lions Club member George Khovorky, welfare director of the Neighborhood Club, 17145 Waterline avenue.

Restaurant Proprietor Thrown From Skidding Car Into Lake St. Clair

Fred Troger, 50, proprietor of a well-known dining room on E. Jefferson avenue, was thrown into the icy waters of Lake St. Clair shortly after 11 a. m. last Thursday, when his car skidded over the curb and slid down a terraced embankment to the edge of the seawall near Oxford Road in Grosse Pointe Shores.

Police officials believe that the car's doors were jarred open by the jolt, tossing Troger over the wall into several feet of water. Shores Police Lieutenant Bert Morrow and Maurice R. Germaine, of 662 St. Clair avenue, quickly pulled the startled driver from the lake.

Troger was taken to Cottage Hospital, suffering from shock and exposure.

Bandit Brothers Guilty In Attempted Robbery

John and Salvatore Serra, two brothers who attempted to rob the apartment of George DeLoria, 15117 E. Vernon Highway, Grosse Pointe Park, on the evening of January 10, 1937, have been convicted of breaking and entering by a Circuit Court jury.

The brothers, previously arrested on suspicion many times by Detroit police but never found guilty, will probably be sentenced this week. Judge Lester S. Moll heard DeLoria testify that he and his downstairs neighbor, Harry Briggs, struggled with the burglar pair but were unable to hold them. In the scuffle, both thieves lost their hats, which proved valuable identification evidence.

John Serra was arrested by Grosse Pointe Park Patrolman Dilloway, 20 minutes after the attempted robbery, when the bandit returned to the scene and attempted to drive away the thugs' abandoned car.

Salvatore Serra was captured in Detroit on June 10, 1940. At the examination held in the Park court room four days later, defense attorneys unsuccessfully attempted to confuse DeLoria in his identification of the brothers. The jury deliberated 26 hours before announcing a decision.

Supervisor Questions Gratiot Treasurer In Open Letter

Ernest Provo, Gratiot Township Supervisor, has recently written the following open letter to Township Treasurer Frank Jones:

"To Mr. Frank Jones:
"On November 28, in the 'Town News,' you showed how Gratiot Township salary payments had been made up to date. What did you gain by this? You showed that you had drawn \$675 of a \$750 wage and that I had drawn \$675 on a \$1,200 wage. What is the reason for this amount?"

The general fund does not have sufficient money at this time to bring the salary accounts up to date. On November 9, according to the treasurer, the general fund balance was \$230.46. Mr. Jones, the county records and the township records show that a check was mailed out from the county on November 20 to you in the amount of \$922.48, eight days previous to this story. Why did you refer to November 9 on November 28, when you already had this money? Also tell the people why you held this check in your possession for several days. While I cannot criticize for that, the check was safe but the bank records show that you deposited this check on November 27, but still tried to lead the people to believe the funds were low on November 28 and you should have received this check on November 21. So, while you were telling the people that the fund was low, you had nearly a thousand dollars in your possession that had not been deposited. Will you explain this and please refer to the records when you do?"

"You stated further in this article that the report was being made public at the request of registered voting taxpayers. Did these taxpayers ask you to conceal the fact that you had this money in your possession? If so, would you make known the taxpayers who asked you to mislead the people?"

LaVerne Fluitt, 20-year-old son of Grosse Pointe Farms police chief, A. O. Fluitt, returned home from a seven months' auto tour of 13 southwestern states and Mexico last Saturday.

After spending several months visiting his uncle's ranch in the Texas Panhandle, LaVerne toured northern Mexico on his return trip. Estimating that his extensive journey netted a total distance of nearly 7,000 miles, the travel weary youth smilingly exclaimed: "I'm sure glad to be home!"

Young Driver Of Death Car Found Guilty On Manslaughter Charge

John Silvan, 18, of 2127 Anderson, driver of the car in which a 16-year-old boy met death on September 22 in a crash at Charlevoix and Nottingham, has been found guilty of manslaughter by Circuit Court Judge Joseph A. Moynihan and may be sentenced this week.

John Chisholm, 27, of 2552 Anderson, owner of the death car and chief witness at the trial, was found guilty of contempt of court and sentenced to a \$50 fine and 15 days in the Wayne County jail. Judge Moynihan stated that Chisholm had lied in his testimony. At the time of the accident, Chisholm's driver's license had been revoked through a previous reckless driving conviction.

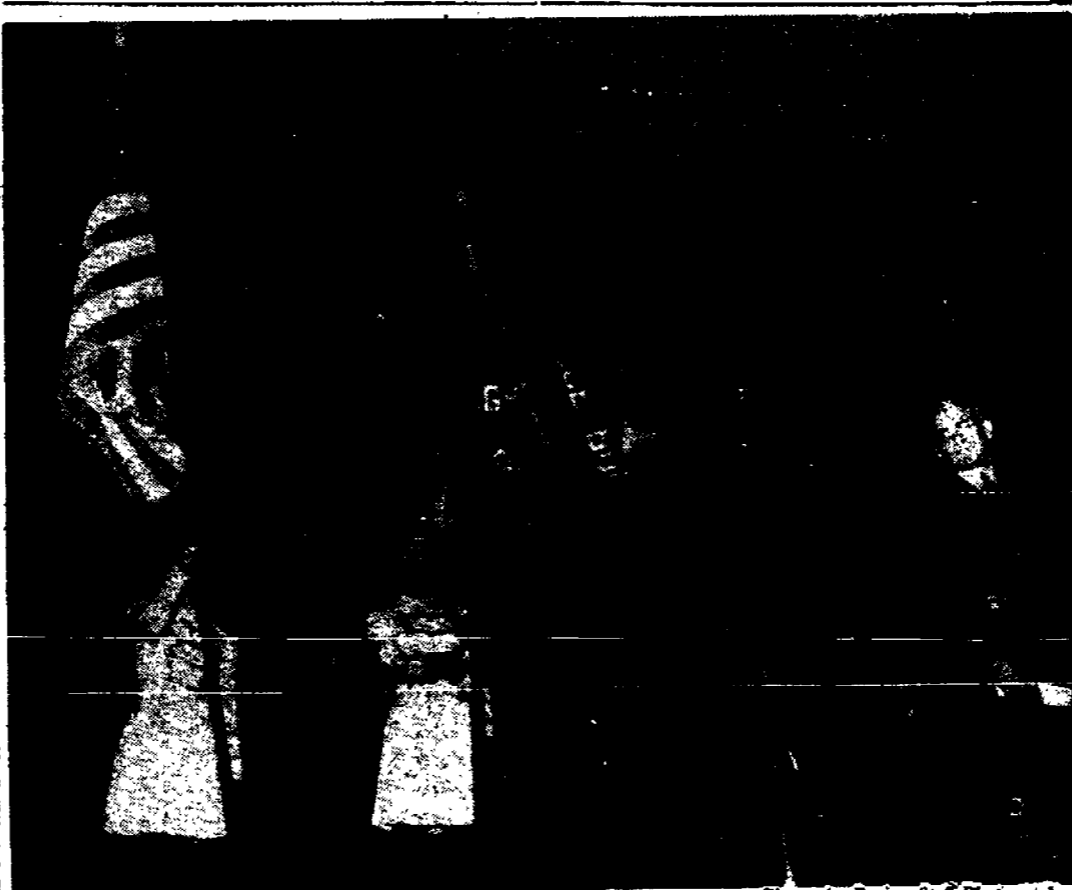

High School Graduates Hired By Wide Variety Of Detroit Companies

Five Detroit department stores have employed nine of the 104 graduates of the Grosse Pointe High school's January 1940 class.

Himeloch Brothers have employed three of the graduates, Best and Co. has employed one, Siegel's two, the J. L. Hudson Company, two, and the Ernst Kern Company one.

Eight boys of the class have been employed by six different automobile concerns, including the Hudson, Cadillac, Chrysler, and the Packard Motor Car Companies.

Thirty-nine of the graduates are now working in the following businesses: Edison Company, Bell Telephone Company, the Acme White Lead and Color Works, the General Accident Insurance Company, the United States Rubber Company, and the Wabek State Bank.

Other companies which have employed at least one recent graduate are: The Central Steel and Wire Company, the McIntosh Coal Company, the American Still Alarm, the Behr Company, Ned's Auto Supply Company, the Standard Oil Company, the Billing Machine Company, and the "Grosse Pointe Review."

Forty per cent of the January class is now attending colleges, while 20 graduates are securing other training in business schools. Only four graduates of the class have moved to different cities, and only three are studying at home.

Mail Your Christmas Cards And Gifts Early

In an effort to assure delivery of all Christmas cards and packages before December 25, Detroit postal authorities are urging encouraging early mailing in order to speed up handling of the expected local rush.

It is suggested that all holiday greeting cards be sent first-class, as only this type of mail will be returned or forwarded. A time-saving tip advanced by postoffice officials advises that Christmas cards addressed for Detroit and vicinity be tied in separate bundles and marked "local mail." This procedure will undoubtedly facilitate rapid delivery.

A man of the United States, marked off into right zones, showing mailing deadline dates has been compiled by Detroit's postmaster, Roscoe L. Huston.

State Faces Huge Task Of Clearing Away Wind Storm Debris

According to the map, today, December 12, is the deadline for all gifts and greeting cards addressed to California. All mail destined for Canada should have been dispatched by yesterday, Huston stated.

All articles easily broken or crushed should be securely packed, boxed and marked "fragile." All shipments of general merchandise should be insured. Parcels containing perishable articles should be marked "perishable" and packed in suitable containers, according to contents. The use of the proper amount of special delivery stamps will assure delivery on Christmas Day, if mailed at the proper time.

Huston concluded, "Early mailing makes possible co-operation in the huge task of distribution, dispatch, transmission and delivery of Christmas greetings and packages. If the public will help us, we'll be able to accomplish our tremendous job of delivering all mail before Christmas Day."

The gigantic task of clearing debris from storm littered roadsides will be pushed during the winter so as to be completed by spring, it was announced early this week by State Highway Commissioner G. Donald Kennedy.

Kennedy, who had just returned from an inspection tour of storm damage to state highways in the Upper Peninsula, reported that new scenic highway US-2 in Mackinac County was particularly hard hit by the recent windstorm. Although the trunk lines were immediately cleared for traffic, Kennedy found the roadsides piled deep with fallen trees.

It is estimated that nearly 35 per cent of trees between US-2 and Lake Michigan, in the vicinity of Gladstone, have been destroyed.

Kennedy remarked, "In some areas the fallen trees made it appear as though a huge ice had been used to cut a swath through the forest."

Because of the enormous amount of work involved, application has been filed with the WPA for a roadside cleanup project which would be sponsored by the state highway department. "We are also investigating the possibility of enlisting the aid of CCC labor in the work," added Commissioner Kennedy.

"BEYOND THE BENCH"

By JUDGE THOMAS F. MAHER Of Traffic Court

Crowding the Car Ahead In a general sense no traffic ordinance or regulation may properly be called obscure because information concerning them is always available and it is the motorist's duty to inform himself of the motorist's duty to inform himself of the law's provisions.

An outstanding example of such a regulation is Section 15(d) of the Detroit traffic ordinances which reads: "The operator of a motor vehicle shall not follow another vehicle more closely than is reasonable and prudent, having due regard to the speed of such vehicle and the traffic upon and conditions of the highway."

Unavoidable minor and some major accidents are caused every year by motorists who make a habit of following the vehicle ahead too closely in violation of this regulation. In cases of this kind the driver's car is constantly buffeted with the same excuse: "He stopped too suddenly." Patiently the expert must point out that if the defendant had been following the other car at a reasonable and prudent distance there would have been no accident.

Accidents that involve injury to persons or property are proper mechanical accidents; the car which cannot be stopped at a sudden stop behind the car in front is generally not under control and many demands of these cars are not under control.

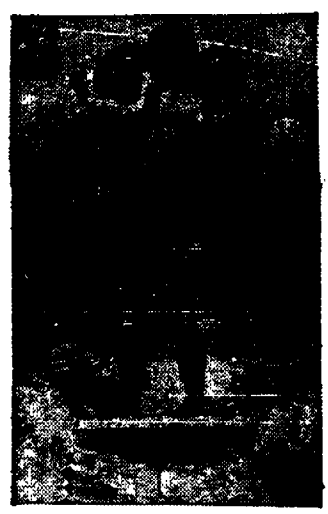
SANTA Goes Modern
