

This brings us to a consideration of the steps in consolidation. But before outlining them, there are several preliminary matters that need attention.

The first has to do with the fact that of the five municipalities, four are villages. Three of the four villages are a part of Grosse Pointe Township in Wayne county. Grosse Pointe Shores is in both Wayne and Macomb counties. The City of Grosse Pointe withdrew from the Township some years ago and became a home rule city. Whether these four municipalities should first secede from the Townships, or whether all five municipalities can be consolidated without such a step, is a question. The answer probably is that the consolidation could be brought about even without the four municipalities taking such a preliminary step.

Another consideration is that the end can be accomplished either by consolidating all five municipalities into a new municipality, or by annexing four of them to a city which is at present existent, namely, the City of Grosse Pointe, or, if Grosse Pointe Park hecomes a city under a procedure which is now being taken, then to Grosse Pointe Park.


