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Park Officials Explain \$1 A Year Amendment

(The following message was received by the Review early this week, and in an effort to clarify a rather jumbled situation we present the complete statement herewith—Editor's Note.)

To the Citizens of Grose Pointe Park: We wish to call to the attention of the people of Grose Pointe Park, the fact that the new Charter Amendment...

"During the campaign we favored the adoption of the proposed amendment to the charter reducing salaries of President and Commissioners to \$1.00 per year and the employment of a Village Manager. After the election we considered the possibility of returning to the Village our salaries during the current fiscal year and prior to the effective date of the amendment, but determined against that course because of a question as to legality of the return of a salary required to be paid by the charter in force this year; also to return the salaries this year would have created an unusual situation wherein the three Commissioners already serving would receive a salary and the three new Commissioners and President would receive no salary."

"Beginning with March 17, 1941, the effective date of the amendment, the President and all Commissioners will serve at \$1.00 per year in compliance with such amendment. We feel that the Village benefitted more by this action upon our part than it would have, had we done otherwise. Operating expenses of the Village have been substantially reduced during the current year and a capable Village Manager was secured and entered upon his employment in accordance with the wishes of the voters expressed at the election last March."

"It has come to our attention that there has been confusion in the minds of some of the people in reference to this matter, possibly due to the fact that it was not generally understood that the charter amendment which was adopted could not immediately become effective. For this reason, we believe this clarification of the matter will be of interest to the residents of the Village."

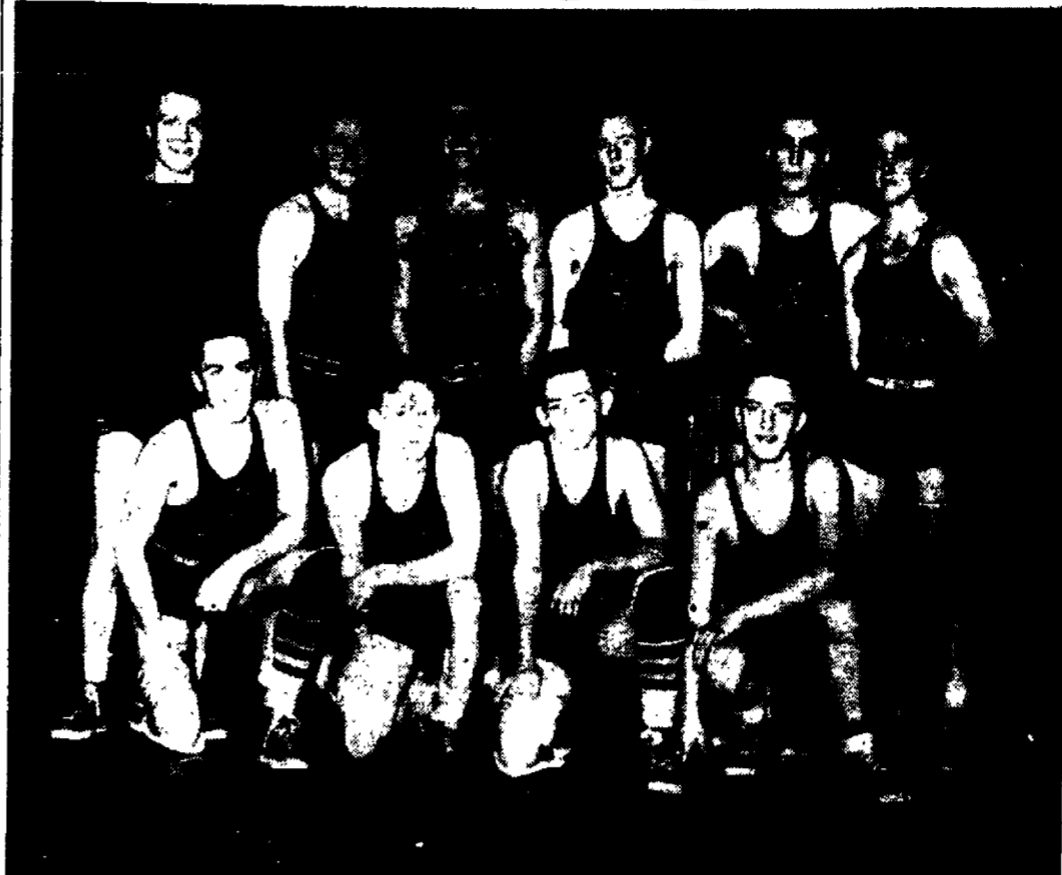

Winning Streak Reaches Six As Prep Cagers Score Double Victory

Notching another weekend double victory, Grosse Pointe high's rapidly developing basketball squad upped its present winning streak to six straight last Friday and Saturday evenings, when Wyandotte high and a strong Port Huron high school squad crumbled before a powerful "Blue Devil" scoring onslaught.

The 36-19 victory over weak Wyandotte on Friday night was expected and created little excitement, but Saturday evening's severe 38-20 drubbing administered to a Port Huron quintet that many consider the best in years was definitely "not on the program" and sent the hopes of loyal Grosse Pointe rooters sailing high into the balcony.

After the dust of battle had cleared and the "side-line coaches" had departed in search of further conquests, the shadow of one individual player, who had rung down the final curtain on a thrill-packed athletic career just a few short hours before, stood out far and above the pack. This high scoring star, destined to go down in the book as one of Grosse Pointe high's basketball greats, is known to his friends and schoolmates as "Scotty" but signs his name Gordon Tanner.

By sinking 25 points in these last two games, 13 at Wyandotte and 12 against Port Huron, Tanner advanced his scoring total for the season to 74 points, or an average of slightly over nine per game. In addition to being the squad's leading point scorer, Tanner was definitely a "snack plug," possessing that rare intangible "something" that keeps a team together when the going gets tough. Finding a capable replacement for Tanner is now Coach Forrest's foremost objective. Although several other players have improved so

rapidly that the loss may be only slightly felt.

Also prominent in the Wyandotte contest, was muscular Adolph Neeme, the fourth in a series of athletic brothers that have plagued Grosse Pointe opponents for nearly 10 years. Neeme scored four field goals and two free throws against the "Dottes," and followed up against Port Huron with five free throws. Neeme's value does not lie in his scoring ability, for he is definitely an awkward shot from beyond the foul line, but centers under and around the backboard where he is an absolute terror while scrambling for rebounds.

Keeping pace with the varsity squad, Grosse Pointe's smooth reserve team also chalked up a double victory. Wyandotte was easy (37-16), but Port Huron was a different volume. Deadlocked at 22-22 with a minute left, good-looking "Whitey" Beyer dropped in a charity toss and gave the Pointers a slender one-point victory.

Tomorrow evening, a dangerous and only once-defeated Royal Oak squad will invade Grosse Pointe in pursuit of the Border Cities League first-place position now firmly held by the "Blue Devils." The tip-off is scheduled for 8:15 p.m., and the 32 minutes of play that follows will undoubtedly produce some of the best prep basketball in the whole state during 1941.
