Farms Village Council Approves Several New Real Estate Moves

At the regular monthly meeting of the Grosse Pointe Farms village council last Monday evening, the following new residential real estate developments were approved:

Beacon Hill Subdivision, which is a division of property lying between Grosse Pointe boulevard and Lakeshore road, approximately midway between Kerby road and Moross road.

The Lothrop Estate company's Mt. Vernon Subdivision, which is a division of property adjoining Mt. Vernon avenue, now a half street from Chalfonte avenue to Charlevoix. This subdivision will clear up the half street situation which has existed on Mt. Vernon avenue for many years, and remove an unsightly condition for the residents who now live on Mt. Vernon.

Roland Estate Subdivision No. 1, which is a development of the property adjoining Moross road and Chalfonte avenue and Piche avenue.

Edgemere Subdivision No. 1 and Edgemere Subdivision No. 2, which are developments of the Berry estate lying between Grosse Pointe boulevard and Lakeshore road directly across from the Grosse Pointe Country Day school property.

All of these subdivisions are to be fully improved by the proprietors, in accordance with the requirements of the Farms village platting ordinance.

Continued improvement of Chalfonte avenue was also ordered by the council, in approving the purchase of approximately 100 trees to be planted this Spring along the new right-of-way.

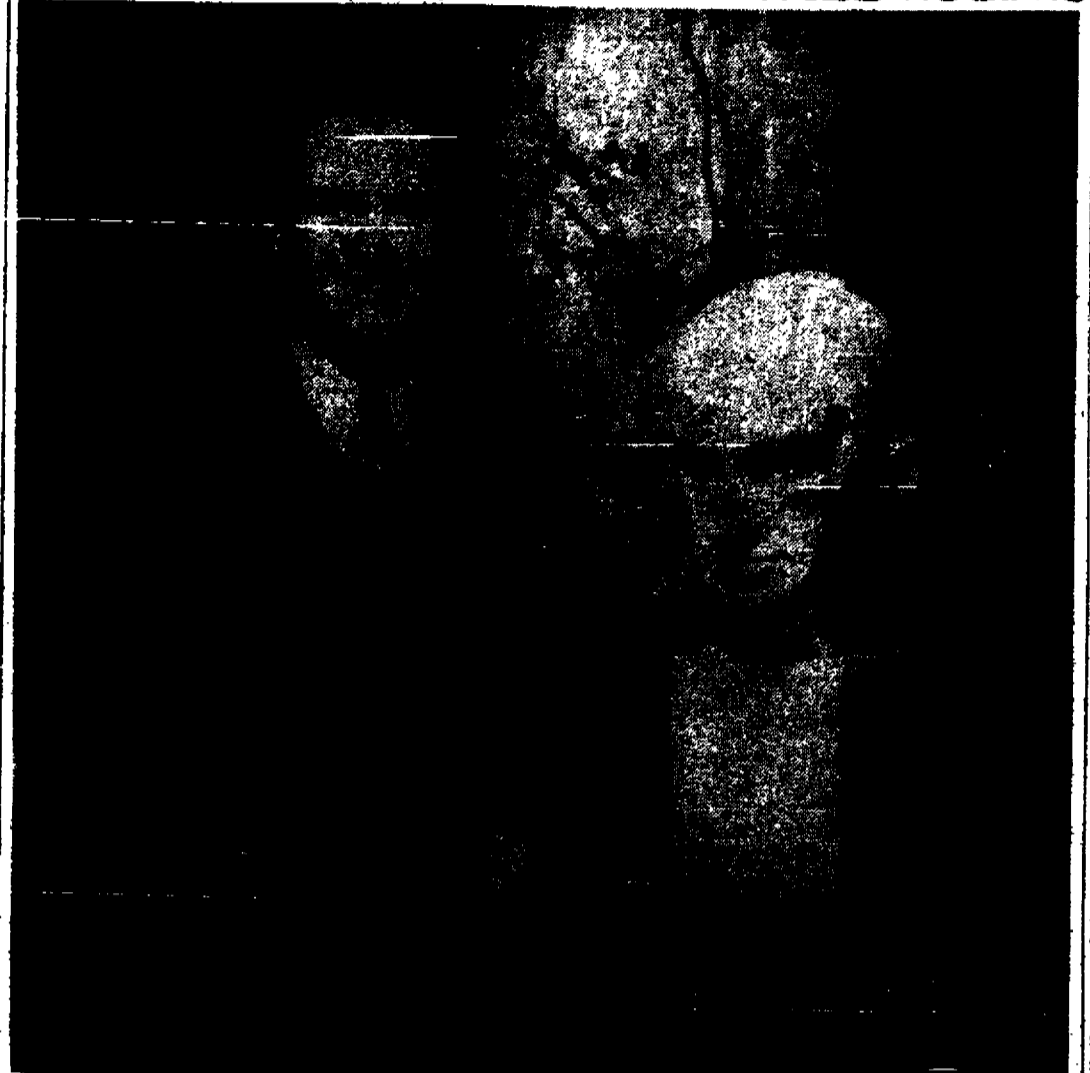

Mexican Consul Discusses United States "Good Neighbor" Plan

Grosse Pointe Rotarians proved themselves perfect hosts last Monday, when they welcomed consular representatives of six Pan American countries at a luncheon held to celebrate Pan American Day. Rotarians from Detroit and surrounding area came to help swell the crowd that had for its object the furthering of the good neighbor policy and the creation of a better understanding and friendship between the United States and its 20 sister republics in the New World.

Adolfo G. Dominguez, consul for Mexico was the keynote speaker. He gave a very interesting account of the relationship that exists between the United States and the Central and South American republics. He stated that the greatest problem confronting the furtherance of the good neighbor policy is one of economics. He cited discrepancies that now exist in trade agreements between Latin American countries and the United States.

Citing the case of the automobile manufacturers with assembly plants in our sister republics, he showed that the wages paid by American companies are but a fraction of those paid to similar workers in the United States and with the higher cost of automobiles in those countries, it is impossible for such workers to purchase automobiles, such as do similar workers here.

He stated that the danger of Nazi fifth columnists in Mexico and South American countries was overestimated.

Death of C. H. Murphy Disrupts Local Fire Survey Arrangements

C. Hayward Murphy, 58-year-old Detroit business man and former fire commissioner for over 20 years, died last Sunday evening in Harper hospital following a short one-week illness.

Murphy, who had lived at 30 Oxford road, Grosse Pointe Shores, for the past year, had recently been associated with a proposed survey of the fire departments of the five Pointe municipalities. The move, originated by Mason P. Rumney, mayor of the City of Grosse Pointe, would have included Murphy and John B. Moran, well-known Pointe resident for many years. The survey would have determined if any additional fire equipment was needed, officials stated.

Serving as secretary and treasurer of the Simon J. Murphy company, founded by his grandfather, Murphy had entered Harper hospital only a week before his death. A lifelong resident of Detroit, Murphy attended Central high school, Detroit University school, Anderson college and Yale university. He had formerly lived in Indian Village, before moving out to Grosse Pointe Shores.

Murphy is survived by his wife, Rebecca Steele Murphy, two daughters, Mrs. Eppa H. Heaton, of Detroit and Mrs. Francis S. Cronin, of Baltimore.

Mrs. a brother, Dr. Fred T. Murphy. Funeral services were held Tuesday morning from William R. Hamilton company chapel, the Rev. Frank Fitt, pastor of the Grosse Pointe Memorial church officiated. Interment was in Woodmere cemetery mausoleum.

In addition to his intense interest in Detroit fire department development, Murphy was also active in local theatrical performances and yacht racing. He was a past commodore of the Grosse Pointe Yacht club, a member of the Detroit Athletic club, Lochmoor Country club, Grosse Pointe club, and the Players.

Declared to be a "crazed" and "psychopathic person" by a circuit court jury, Maas will be committed to a state hospital until cured. Following a report from the court probation department, Judge Vincent M. Brennan will issue commitment orders.

Following capture by two City of Grosse Pointe patrolmen after a wild 20-block chase, Maas was confined to the county jail during the tedious legal proceedings of the past 10 months. Drunk Driver Fined \$110 By Local Judge

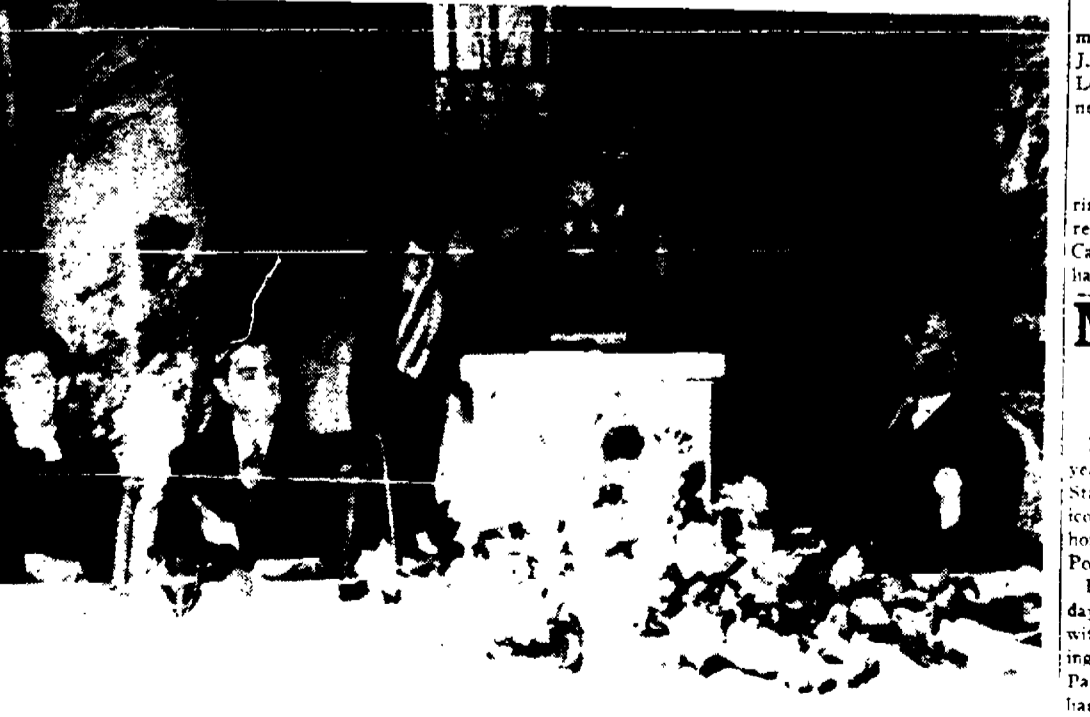

Arraigned before Township Justice Victor H. DeBaete on Saturday afternoon, Fouch was found guilty on a drunk driving and causing an accident charge, and fined \$110 or 35 days in jail. He paid the fine.

Shores police stated Fouch was arrested by the pursuing scout car near Kerby road in Grosse Pointe Farms. Fouch apparently started to pass the other car and hooked the left side, police believe. Damage to both cars was estimated at \$50.

In January the state laboratory made 32,000 blood tests for syphilis and in February 37,000 more, both totals being new monthly records.

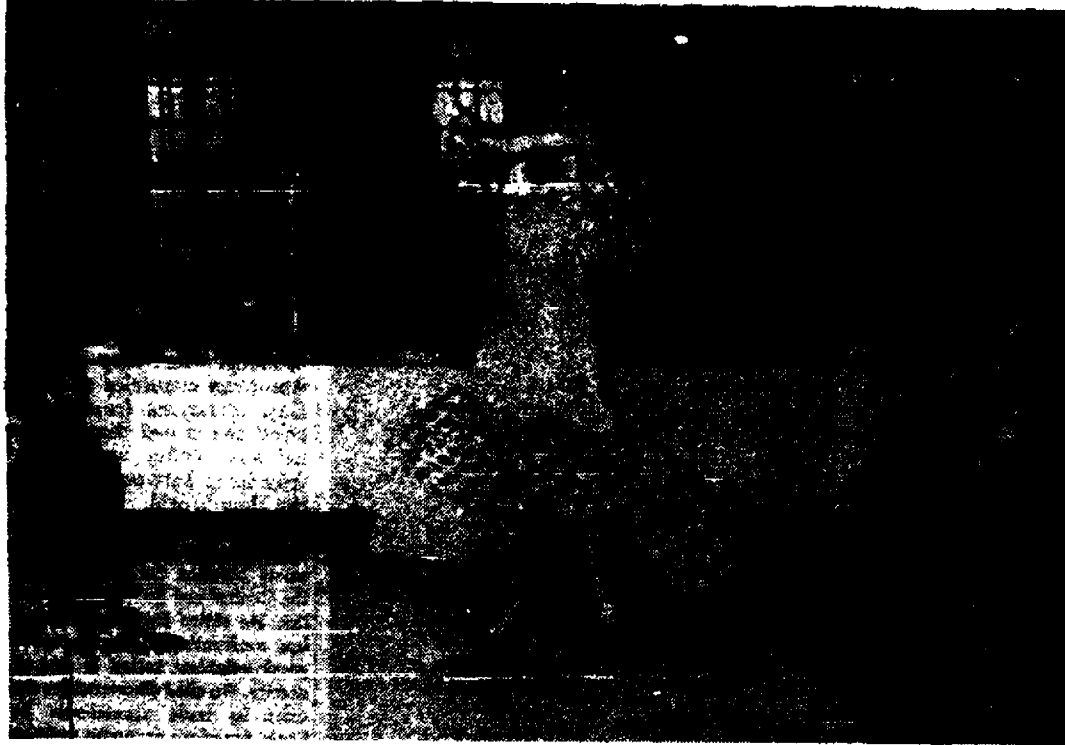

Winter Damaged Many State Roads

With the retreat of Winter weather this week, state highway department officials reported gravel and blacktop roads suffered extensive damage as a result of the annual Spring "breakup."

G. Donald Kennedy, state highway commissioner, pointed out that unfavorable conditions last Fall, when freezing weather followed heavy rains, was directly responsible for the widespread damage.

"The Spring season is always a headache for highway men, but this year conditions are unusually bad. A survey of roads indicates the 'breakup' has caused more damage than at any time in the last 10 years."

During the period of Spring thaws, Kennedy explained that the moisture held near the surface of the ground by the early freeze last Fall had caused a "muddy" condition which permitted severe cutting of many roads.

Already maintenance crews have started the enormous task of repairing damaged roads in the northern part of the state where road beds have cracked and hardened for normal travel.

Loading restrictions are established for the trunklines annually during the Spring breakup. These restrictions call for a 25 per cent reduction of loads on concrete highways and 35 per cent on gravel roads.

World History Put on Tap for Button Pushers

Here's what pushing a button will get you now in the halls of Griffith observatory: A history of the world—presented orally and visually—in four minutes!

Source of this condensed panorama of the past is the cosmochron or "clock of the ages," constructed in the observatory shops. The "clock" is 10 feet wide and 8 feet high, with a dial 4 feet in diameter in the center. The dial has illuminated sections to represent the geological ages.

Two hands turn on the dial. The shorter hand turns once for each 100,000,000 years of geological time, while the longer hand makes one revolution for the complete geological history of the world.

As the hands turn, a series of 44 pictures is flashed on a screen on the dial's face to show scenes at the time being indicated.

At the same time the voices of Dr. Chester Stock, Caltech scientist, paints a word picture of the changes and the reasons behind them.

Apply Your Bible The days in which we live are crowded with problems—social, religious, ecclesiastical, political and economic. Do It Now! Many reasons suggest themselves for not going out of our way to aid people in trouble. Laziness says, "Why should you?" Fear of being misunderstood steps in. But he swept such cowardly prompting aside. No harm ever came to anyone out of kindly effort, sympathetic words, readiness to lend assistance. If we stifle our impulses in that direction we may lose the greatest opportunities of our lives.

Meats Help Teeth Cows are the answer to the problem of good teeth. So Dr. Harold F. Hawkins, former associate professor of bacteriology and preventive dentistry at U. S. C. recently told the Southern California State Dental association. A hunk of bovine, cooked rare, and a quart of milk a day are surefire to keep the dentist away. Dr. Hawkins intimated. Of course, the meat doesn't have to come from a cow. It could be lamb—or even pork. The essential thing is to keep it on the rare side, he said. "The diet must not be too vegetarian," he warned the assembled dentists at their convention.

Again at Billion In 1939 the nation's gasoline tax bill exceeded the billion dollar mark for the first time. That amount had been collected by December 15. In 1940 the billion dollar mark was reached 30 days earlier, on November 15, according to estimates.

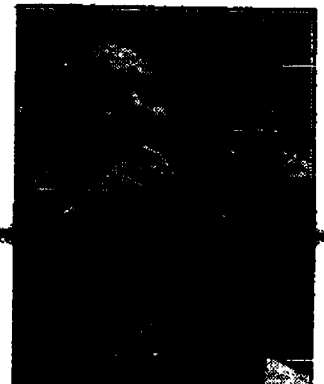

Senior High School Senior high school 1,111, March 1940 -1,057, showing an increase of 54 students with 5.11 per cent increase.

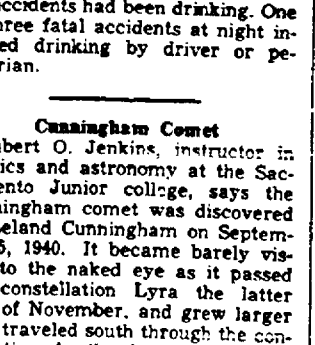

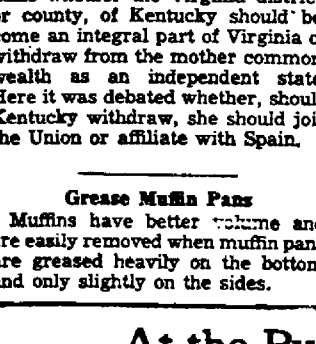

When the history of this World War is written, much of the initial success of the dictator countries in overpowering France, Belgium, Holland, and Norway will be credited to the pre-war activities of nationals and sympathizers of the axis governments.

In these United States, we are at present facing internal conditions that unless controlled immediately might closely parallel fifth column accomplishments in those European countries now bearing the Hitler yoke.

Many of our citizens seem to have adopted a highly critical attitude toward our government. We hear constant yammering about the way things ought to be run in Washington.

We are proud of our democratic form of government and the freedom of expression that it affords us, but we often overstep the bounds of common decency in our personal remarks about our President.

National unity can never be achieved by destructive criticism. It is of course a human trait of most of us to believe that we could do the job better than the other fellow, but this is not the time for that sort of reasoning.

The time has come when every true American should put his shoulder to the wheel of National Preparedness. Every American citizen, worthy of the name would immediately take action to apprehend a foreign fifth columnist.

We ought to thank God every day that we are Americans, but we ought also to remember that our American citizenship carries the responsibility of true loyalty to our government.

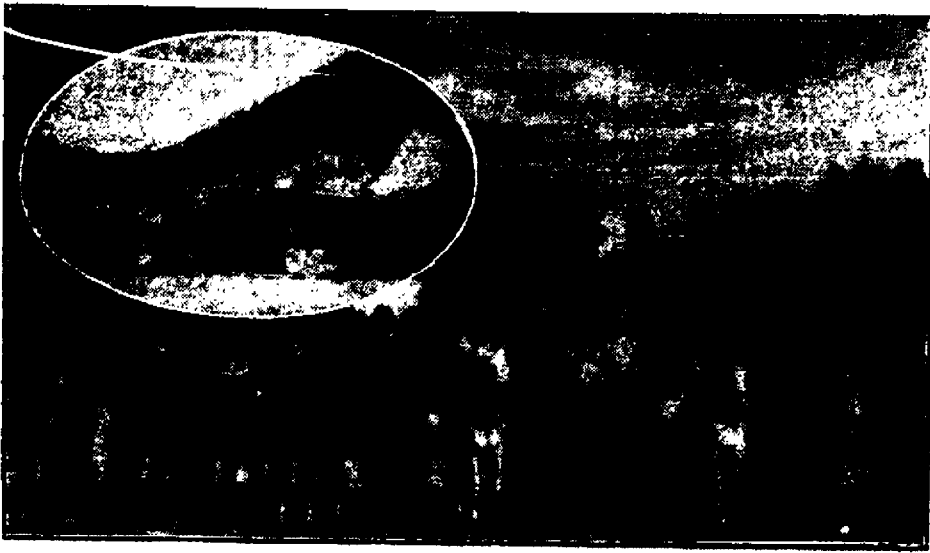
The former faculty member of the University of California, who now is consultant and research scientist of the Mayo clinic at Rochester, Minn., spoke at the dedication of the new 500,000 wing of the Collis P. Huntington Memorial hospital, Pasadena.

Dr. Alvarez drew back the veil on "New Things That Hospitals and Physicians Are Doing for Mankind." He revealed recently discovered drugs, new methods of anesthesia and other advances.

"In addition to common pneumonia," announced Dr. Alvarez, "we have a vaccine to prevent a plague of measles. . . the deadliness of pneumonia has been overcome and new drugs have lessened the dangers from blood infections."

He pointed out that anesthesia is now far superior to past forms, largely eliminating pain, and that deformities are being overcome by the miracle of plastic surgery.

The only creature that can stand still in the air with about 56 wing-strokes a second, take off from a perch in seven-hundredths of a second, and fly backwards is the ruby-throated hummingbird. Although its apparent maneuvers in reverse have been disputed repeatedly, recent photographs have established proof of this flight phenomenon. The Smithsonian Institution recently put the hummingbird under a microscope, so to speak, when the organization's Dr. Winsor M. Tyler went into gardens, woodlands, and other habitats to study this tiny creature. The adult is about the size of a small thumb and at birth no larger than a black-eyed pea. The babies are nature's mistletoe, being born completely naked. Although blind at birth, they grow so fast that in less than two weeks they possess all their faculties, are almost as large as their parents and leave the nest.

The Smithsonian Institution also discovered that hummingbirds are the Stuka bombers of Nature—they attack much larger birds in a form of "dive bombing." Their unusual dexterity of flight enables them to win victories over relatively powerful winged creatures, the hummers attacking their foes in "blitzkriegs." And yet, despite such valor and victory in flight battles, the hummers, themselves, may become completely ensnared in a spider's web, helpless to free themselves. One instance was one of a small dragonfly attacking and conquering a hummer.

The hummingbird, recent scientific studies reveal, is a confirmed bachelor. The males and females migrate separately and remain single except for brief mating periods. Flights northward are timed with clocklike precision. They often arrive the very day their favorite flowers appear.

Births to Poorer People Not Alarming to Nation

There is no cause for alarm over the fact that the so-called underprivileged economic classes in the United States are producing a large proportion of the babies, according to Dr. Constantine Panunzio, assistant professor of sociology at the University of California at Los Angeles, an expert on population trends.

The Westwood professor recalls the birth figures of 1929, a prosperity year, when fully one-third of the 3,000,000 babies born came from families whose total income was less than \$750 per year; and the figures of 1930-35 when 55 per cent of the natural increase was contributed by those in agriculture—principally low-paid agricultural workers.

"Low income, unskilled occupation and low educational status do not necessarily mean biological or other kinds of inferiority," Dr. Panunzio says. "The common people of the nation have at all times contributed a large proportion of the leadership of the country."

"Unless we are willing to claim or admit that the population of this country is as a whole an inferior type or that its leadership is poor, we are forced to conclude that the lowly classes are contributing much to the population. In fact, if it were not for them the professional and other so-called upper classes would become a constantly diminishing segment of the population."

Sweet Potato in Bombs
The southern sweet potato, already being used in starch manufacture, could also be pressed into service as a source of cellulose for manufacturing bombs, hand grenades and other high explosives if America were involved in war.

This was revealed by Gilbert C. Wilson, instructor in chemistry at North Texas State Teachers' college.

Wilson said yarns are used in Germany and Japan for manufacture of slow explosives, and that starch can also be used for manufacture of nitro-starch for shattering explosives such as hand grenades.

Ten Year Building Peak Reached in U. S. Cities

New home construction in 310 leading American cities in 1939 totaled the highest in value and volume in 10 years, according to the annual national home building survey of Investors Syndicate recently made public.

"Volume of new homes last year was more than 10 times (10.4) the 1934 total, the low for the decade," explained C. J. Ryan of the company.

"Value of these new residences was almost 10 times (9.8) the low total hit in 1934."

Contributing substantially to these record breaking figures was the smallness of the advance, only four-fifths of 1 per cent, in average cost per person provided with new housing over the preceding year.

"Rapidly of residential construction last year, the fifth successive year to record gains, is emphasized," said Ryan, "by the fact that both value and volume increase were the largest year to year rise during the decade."

The cities included in the survey, located in 41 states and the District of Columbia, have a population, according to the 1940 preliminary estimate of the United States bureau of census, of 49,134,786, or 87.4 per cent of the population of the United States.

This group includes the 63 cities with a population of 100,000 or more. New home building in these 310 cities last year, the survey reported, was valued at \$1,100,000,000.

This was a gain of 202,000 people, or 30.4 per cent, over the 656,533 newly housed in these same cities in 1932.

New residential construction last year in these same cities provided for 67.1 per cent more people than in 1930, when only 519,163 were newly sheltered.

Fossilized Camel Bones Found
Fossilized bones of a browsing type of camel with a giraffe-like neck which once roamed Oregon's miocene forests have been unearthed near Madras by California Institute of Technology scientists.

The discovery was made in the sedimentary beds of Jefferson County, only one mile from the heavily traveled Dalles-California highway.

Dr. Arthur Drescher, heading the paleontologists, said the primeval creature's long neck made it possible to graze from the tree leaves in much the same fashion as the modern giraffe.

The Madras field has also yielded fossilized remnants of a three-toed horse, about the size of a sheep.

Generosity Shown Children To correct certain unavoidable inequalities that children cannot understand, the Los Angeles county coordinating committee sponsors an annual drive for unused or worn-out toys, which, reconditioned and repaired, are then loaned to less privileged youngsters exactly as books are loaned by the library. Children are asked to contribute their retired toys or those that are hopeless casualties; mothers are asked to rummage in attics and closets and send along the playthings that have been outgrown or forgotten.

Scented Closets
It is a moot question whether women dress for men or for each other, but there is little doubt for whom a woman chooses her scent. Therefore the masculine reaction to milady's fragrance is of first-rate importance. A noted authoress recently revealed how she achieved such a delightful fragrance and scent. She stated that the walls of her closet were painted with a scented lacquer. "And when I am traveling," she said, "I paint the lining of my suitcases as well."

Horses Know Tides
Twelve horses at Bowen, Australia, know more about the tides than the local fishermen. Although they wander about town at all hours, as soon as the tide runs out between an arm of Bowen harbor and Magazine Island, the 12 assemble as if for parade. They then splash through the shallow water to Magazine Island, where the feed is to their liking. As soon as the water begins to flow back the horses wheel in a body and make the return journey.

Wind Velocity
Wind velocity varies little in most cities of U. S. during the year, on basis of monthly averages. It has varied as much as 6.1 miles per hour in Buffalo, N. Y. Average variation in majority of areas where data is gathered is about 2.3 miles per hour during the year, explaining recurrence of similar figures in daily tables of wind velocity. Highest monthly average during 1939 was 17.8 during January in Buffalo, N. Y.; lowest was 3.8 during December in Lancaster, Wyo.


'Fresh' Water Salty

Smothered Onions and Peppers (Serves 4) 2 tablespoons butter 3 cups onions (sliced) 1 1/2 cups green pepper (sliced) 1 teaspoon salt Melt butter in a heavy skillet. Add onions and peppers. Cover. Cook slowly for 30 minutes. Add salt, and serve.

Sulfanilamide Giving Back Eyesight to Indians

Sulfanilamide is giving back to Indians eyesight threatened by trachoma. In tiny clinics spotted throughout the West, public health and Indian service doctors are treating the dread eye disease which once meant blindness or patient treatment that might show results in six months—or three years. Trachoma, which historians say Coronado and his conquistadors probably brought to New Mexico in 1534, has taken a growing toll of Indian eyesight since. A virus disease, trachoma granulates and scars the eyelids, leading to scarring and eventual clouding of the cornea, resulting in blindness. The Indian service estimates that Kansas has 1,975 cases, North Carolina 1,135, North and South Dakota 3,133, Wyoming 419, Montana 3,895, Oregon and Washington 720, Idaho 4, California 472, Nevada 428, Utah an Colorado 364, Arizona 3,326 and New Mexico 4,239, a total of 25,088 cases but it conceals the existence of many more. The disease is unknown among the Florida Spaniards and the Tepehual tribe in the South West region. Sulfanilamide, which without other antibiotics is the only drug that has been shown to cure trachoma, is now used in Arizona's Navajos have it.

Spent Tenth for Research Ten firms in the U.S. spent more than 10 per cent of their gross income on research in 1940. These included four chemical concerns: Methulberg, agricultural and organic chemical technology, petroleum synthetic textiles, rubber and resins; were the chief fields of industrial research in the United States during 1940. British, German and Russian investigations have been concerned specially with metals, coal and petroleum products, paints, plastic and foodstuffs. There is also an ever-increasing awareness in American industry of the importance of research and of the high dividends which research has paid in recent years. Cancer Deaths Increase "In the last 25 years cancer has increased alarmingly from seventh place to second place as a cause of death," Dr. Carl A. Wilzbach, health commissioner of Cincinnati, Ohio, said recently. "We have tried to control tuberculosis and have met with encouraging success," Dr. Wilzbach pointed out. "The progress made in fighting tuberculosis can be duplicated in fighting cancer if the public will get behind the fight." Dr. Wilzbach said that during the last four or five years there has been an annual increase in fatalities from cancer, and that throughout the nation cancer is the greatest cause of death among women between 45 and 54 years old.

Progress by Individuals Progress is made only by individuals—some young, some old, but not by the mass movements, say one noted psychologist. It is his belief that "youth movements" are engendered by selfish interests of oligarchs and partly because youth age both are, in the mass, pretentious. "Youth is always in rebellion," this psychologist states, "this is one of the great facts of human nature. The younger generation always wants to change things toward what they think is improvement, while the old folks are either angered, shocked or amused. Older folk forget that they went through the same rebellion and that now the have jettisoned into a sort of compromise."

Winter Garden Indoors Makes Spring Come Faster

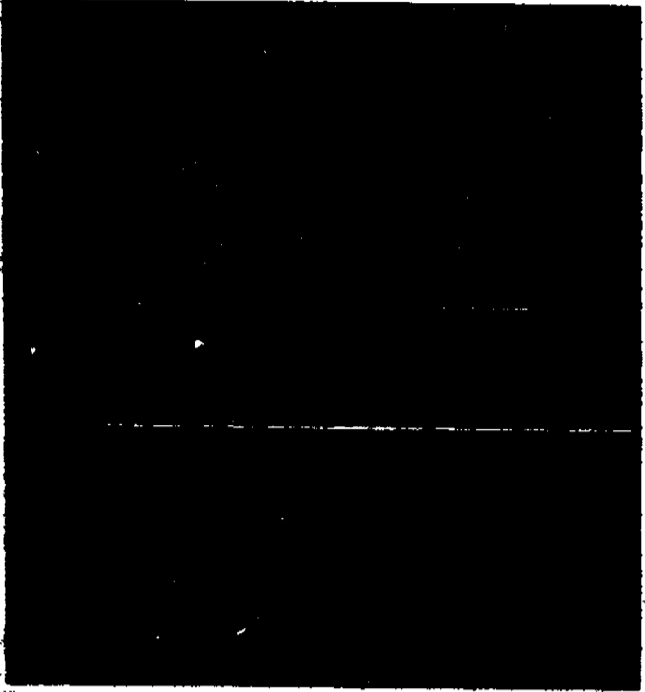
Home gardeners who enjoy the experience of growing plants are well equipped to follow the modern fashion of indoor gardening. A great variety of flowers may be forced into bloom indoors with little trouble. Arranged on shelves, or in a window box near a sunny window, they will keep fresh throughout the winter the memory of summer days. Experience in growing flowers indoors is of value in outdoor operations, too. The gardener sees at close hand the progress of the plants, and learns how gratefully they respond to intelligent care. The easiest plants to grow indoors are the bulbs, both the hardy kinds, which are grown in gardens, and tender varieties which will not stand our winters, but grow vigorously indoors.



Some of them need potting in soil. Others can be grown in bowls with fibre, moss, or even pebbles and water. Select them according to the experience you have had, and the attention you are willing to give them. It is easiest to grow those which flower in pebbles and water, but more interesting, and a better test of your gardening skill, to bring into bloom those which require soil. All bulbs can be grown in soil, a smaller number in fibre, and still fewer in water with pebbles, or moss. To begin with the latter, they include the tender narcissi known as Paper Whites (white), Soliel d'Or (yellow), and Chinese sacred lilies; the largest size hyacinths, and lilies of the valley. In bulb fibre, which is a mixture of peat and plant food, it is possible to grow in bowls without drainage all the above, together with daffodils, early tulips, crocuses, freesias, calla lilies, grape hyacinths and scillas. From this list one may select a pleasing assortment of colors and shapes, to decorate the winter garden. By starting bulbs in succession, a bowl or pot may be replaced as soon as its flowers fade and a continuous display maintained throughout the season.

Keep Sneezes Six Feet Away, Advises Physician

If you have your friend's health at heart, you'll be careful when you're sneezing when you sneeze in their presence.

This was one of the conclusions drawn from a lecture on colds and sneezing by Dr. Charles F. McKham, professor of pediatrics at the University of Michigan, before the Graduate Conference for Physicians at Herman Kleber hospital.

Illustrating the distance a sneeze may travel, with photographic slides, Dr. McKham pointed out that the distance depends on whether it is a high sneeze or a heavy one and also on what letters or syllables are being pronounced at the time.

Thus a person who happened to be saying "Peter Piper picked..." etc. at the very moment was seized with a sneeze would undoubtedly get the maximum carry, or close to six feet. That's par.

Dr. McKham said it was therefore advisable to stay away from people who had colds or when you had one—six feet or more.

Abrasive Injurious to Nickel Never use an abrasive cleaner on your shiny nickel kitchen and bathroom fixtures. Instead wash them first with soap and water, then polish with whitening moistened with fine-quality household ammonia.

When a harsh abrasive is used on nickel it eventually will wear it off and after that cleaning is an ever-present task. Whitening made into a paste with household ammonia will also remove egg stains from silver and is fine for polishing mirrors. However, with the latter it is very important to avoid getting dampness on the back.

The best way to use the paste is to coat the glass with it, then rub it off and polish with a clean dry cloth. This method can also be used on the glass in pictures, taking the same precaution against getting moisture on the back of the picture.

Care of Children's Teeth Loss of even a single tooth without replacement can seriously affect the health and appearance of high school children, according to evidence obtained from an extensive school survey reported in the Journal of the American Dental Association.

Dr. J. A. Salzman of New York city describes the survey conducted in New York vocational schools which included more than 10,000 boys and girls 13 to 19 years of age. "Examination of the pupils," Dr. Salzman states, "has revealed conclusive evidence that when a single tooth is filled by a dentist, not only is this tooth saved, but in addition the regularity of position and appearance of all the teeth are maintained, and the tendency of teeth to decay is kept at a low level."

The first successful balloon ascension in this country was made by Francis Blanchard, a Frenchman, at Philadelphia on January 9, 1793. Blanchard had tried in 1784 to make a balloon with sails and a rudder, and in 1785 he crossed the English channel in a balloon and in the same year used a parachute. He came to America in 1792 and arranged to make an ascent from the yard of the old Walnut street prison in Philadelphia. President Washington was among the spectators on the date fixed. When the balloon rose into the air a salute was fired and a band played a lively tune.

Blanchard landed at Congress Ferry, in New Jersey, 45 minutes later and returned to Philadelphia, where he paid his respects to the President at his house.

Prognosticator Uses Indian Method William F. Hodson of Orange, Mass., uses an old Indian "magic formula" in making his annual long-range winter forecasts. He says of 55 yearly predictions, 53 have been accurate.

Here's his system: Find out when the first quarter of the October moon occurs. Count the number of bright stars that appear located about 30 feet from all sides of the moon. Look for a dull star above six inches from a bright star; will determine whether there will be one storm more or less than the number of bright stars.

Hodson says that according to the stars this year there will be approximately 26 storms in which enough snow will fall for dog or cat tracks to show.

Outdoor Seed Box Gives Many Plants a Safe Start

The usefulness of a "flat" or seed-box is not confined to the early spring, when seeds may be started indoors, or in the hotbed and cold-frame.

Even after danger of frost is over, and seeds might be sown directly in the ground, it will still pay to use the seed-box for the very small seeds, like petunias, and for varieties of both flowers and vegetables which require to be transplanted.

The seed-box is under closer observation than even a seed-bed; it may be carried to a shady spot during an excessively warm spell. It can be kept where the hose is handy, and soaked daily. The seedling plants may be kept growing without a check, and when they are ready to move, transplanting may be more easily performed by carrying the flat directly to the spot where the plants are to be set out.

The management of the "flat" is the same, whether it be used outdoors or indoors. The standard sizes range from 12x18 to 14x20 inches, 4 inches deep. They are nailed together loosely, and it is not necessary to bore holes in the bottom for drainage, as excess water will escape through the cracks.

The flat should be filled with a fine loam, preferably sifted to get out all lumps. The coarse soil may be placed in the bottom, but only fine soil should be used on top.

When seedlings are grown in an outdoor box, it is not necessary to transplant them into pots before setting them directly in the garden. But precautions should be taken to avoid crowding so that the tiny plants may grow as sturdy as possible before they are moved. With the coarser seeds, sow thinly in rows 2 inches apart and when the seedlings appear thin out so that each stands alone without crowding. With the finer seeds, it will help to broadcast the seed rather than sowing in rows. Take a separate flat for each variety and scatter the seeds over the whole box. They will have more room to grow this way.

Transplanting may be done as soon as plants have made true leaves. This means the second pair of leaves to appear. If they are left in the box longer than this, they should be thinned out, if necessary, and allowed to develop without restraint from crowding.

Slow germinating subjects are usually best handled in a flat or flower pot, which can be given particular care until the seedlings appear.
