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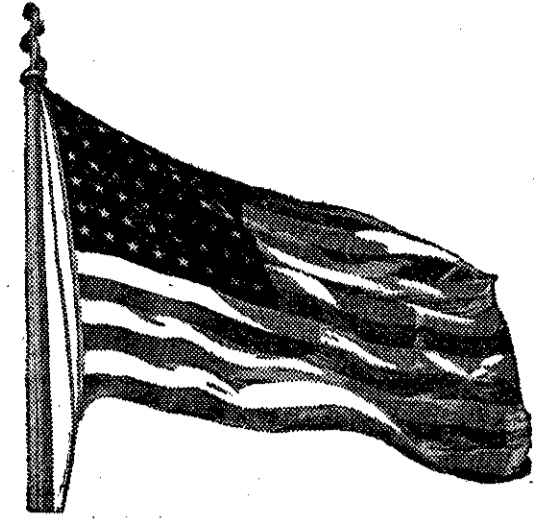

G. P. Township Government

Grosse Pointe taxpayers should derive a sense of satisfaction from the feature news story about corse township in The Detroit News last Sunday.

Ecorse township with a population of 18,571 and an assessed valuation of \$47,657,676 listed expenditures of \$106,885. Grosse Pointe township with a population of 23,445, an assessed valuation of \$77,228,190 is operating on an annual budget of \$37,875 and as the article pointed out, has a far more efficient type of township government.

With 9,615 registered voters in Ecorse township and 18 voting districts, annual election expenses totaled \$11,875 compared with Grosse Pointe's 15,301 voters in 24 election districts and budget allowance of \$4,000.

Grosse Pointe township officials are to be congratulated on the economical operation of our township government, rendering as it does a splendid health service and a very efficient police radio in addition to a multitude of other services.

NEW SAFETY DEVICE

Newspaper men in Minnesota recently previewed what could develop into a major change in highway safety supervision — a signboard which automatically tells the automobile drivers when they are going at a dangerous speed.

The sign, which was prominently placed before a highway junction, read: "Junction ahead! Your speed over —" and as each car approached the sign the speed at which the car was traveling was recorded.

There is no magic about the way the sign works even though the psychological effect upon the motorist is most startling. Two photo-electric cells are placed along the right of way approximately 750 feet ahead of the sign and 36 feet apart.

In addition to cross-sections, the inventors, L. T. Mork of St. Paul and George E. Sykora of Minneapolis, say that it is adaptable to dangerous curves, approaches to cities or towns and can even be used in unison with a second sign to warn motorists that a car is approaching from the other side of a hill.

It all sounds like a great contribution to the safety of the motorist of the future, except for one thing. On a test sign that was used in the first demonstration, under the line about speed were big lighted letters reading, "Home Brand Coffee."

If this safety device is going to be used for highway advertising, thus placing advertising at the most dangerous points on highways, it would seem as though the danger feature of such signs would more than offset its safety possibilities.

We hope that the manufacturers will have a change of heart, however. We can imagine every local police department recommending such signs, but if they are just to be an advertising novelty then it would be better to forget them and wait for other safety inventions sponsored by firms with more humanitarian interests.

England's Gasoline Rations

Although in many sections of this country we are being asked to cut down on our consumption of gasoline and oil, our possible sacrifice on that score amounts to little compared with that of the people of Great Britain.

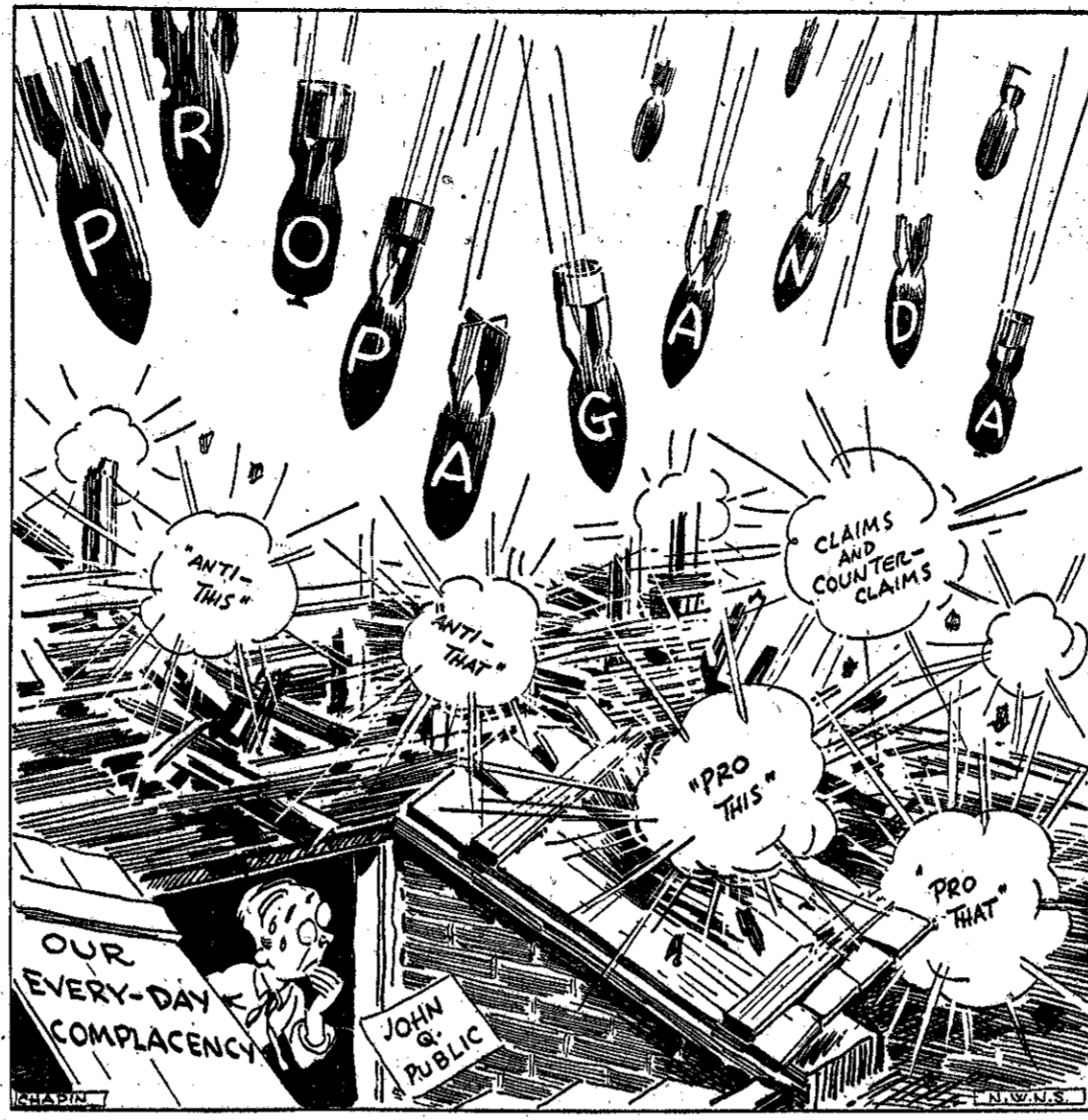
When the British faced a shortage the petroleum board promptly rationed the use of gasoline for all vehicles. The rationing for cars for private use was the most stringent. Each automobile owner was issued a coupon book good for one month, the number of coupons depending upon the horsepower of his car.

Doctors, as well as others with a good reason for having more gasoline, are given extra books. Trucks are permitted from three to as many as 23 gallons a week, depending upon their weight, but even for commercial purposes there has been a drastic reduction in the amount of gasoline which anyone residing in Britain is permitted to use.

In most of the world today, the automobile which has become such a necessity to Americans, is being treated as a great luxury and in very few countries is it being used at the present time for pleasure driving.

In England, the smaller automobiles, which consume a minimum amount of gasoline, have been the best-sellers for some time. It will be interesting to see, as we gradually tighten our gasoline belts, if the smaller, more economical automobiles will replace the large cars on our highways, if bicycles will become a popular means of transportation, or if Mr. Ickes will get our oil problems worked out so that we can continue to use automobiles with our present disregard of gasoline consumption.

On the Home Front



Today and Tomorrow

Japs and taxes are holding the center of the stage here this week. While congress is debating the biggest tax program in our nation's history, the President and state department are occupied with formulating our policies in regard to the Japanese threat in the Pacific.

The speed with which the President acted to put the Philippine army and navy forces under the command of the United States and to freeze Japanese funds in this country, following the taking over of French Indo-China by the Japanese, is indicative of an abrupt about-face in regard to Japan.

The action to put the Philippine army and navy, which amount to a standing force of about 7,500 men and a potential reserve corps of 400,000 men, under the command of the United States, was in keeping with a section of the Philippine Independence act of 1934.

The Japanese scare undoubtedly broke down much of the resistance in congress to continuing the services of the selectees and national guardsmen now in camps under the selective service act. The measure to make this extension possible, based on a resolution declaring that "the national interest is imperiled," was presented to the senate immediately following the Japanese action.

Although the measure gives the President the right to extend the services of these men indefinitely if necessary, it also reserves for congress the right to end the President's power in this regard.

The tax measure, which resulted from months of work by the house ways and means committee, is aimed at raising an additional \$3,529,000,000, as requested by the secretary of the treasury. In reporting its measure for debate by the house, the committee said:

"The bill is unprecedented in the amount of revenue it is designed to provide. It lays a substantially increased burden upon the American people. But there is convincing evidence that this burden will be borne cheerfully in the light of the overwhelming importance of national defense to the continued freedom and security of the United States."

"It is believed that the risk to life and property from an inadequate preparedness would make even a much heavier burden attractive by comparison."

The bill, which proposes to collect \$1,152,000,000 from individuals, \$1,054,000,000 from excise taxes and \$1,322,000,000 from corporations, is in addition to last year's taxes which it is expected will stay as they are.

To the family of small income the measure means that if they paid an income tax in 1941, the tax on the same

income will be almost three times as much next March. For instance, a family with two children and an income of \$4,000 was subject to a tax of \$35.20 this year and will be required to pay a tax of \$101.20 next year.

One of the surprises of the new bill, which is being attacked by a number of congressmen, is that the proposed exemptions were the same as last year, thus exempting single persons with an income of \$800 or less, and a married couple with an income of \$2,000 or less, from any tax. Many congressmen feel that it would aid the morale of the country to have the people of small income pay something, even though very little, as a contribution to our defense effort.

Another highly debatable subject is the provision in the suggested measure requiring the filing of joint tax returns by married couples, thus eliminating the right for a man and his wife to file separate returns. In some cases this puts a family in a higher income tax bracket, subject to a greater percentage tax.

Heads of the defense program criticize the new tax program on these grounds: (1) By not taxing small incomes, which make up the majority of incomes, the tax program will not aid as much as it could in stemming inflation; (2) by not providing high excise taxes on products, which use defense materials, such as automobiles, washing machines and refrigerators, competition with the defense program is being encouraged.

Highway Department Ready for Defense Improvement Program

Michigan's state highway department, geared to defense needs, was ready this week to go into action on a \$5,000,000 improvement program to meet war department requirements.

Action in speeding preparations for start of the state-wide program was taken by G. Donald Kennedy, state highway commissioner, following passage by congress of the huge \$320,000,000 defense highway act.

"According to present information," Kennedy said, "federal funds for military highways will be available within the next 30 days."

The commissioner revealed that in anticipation of passage of the defense act, the state highway department had conserved its funds so that it would be possible to take immediate advantage of the full share allotted this state.

Information received by the state highway department disclosed that Michigan would receive \$3,837,000 of the \$125,000,000 earmarked for strategic network improvements. Projects will be financed on a 75-25 per cent basis, with the federal government providing the larger amount. By adding the state's share of cost, this will make possible a \$5,000,000 improvement program for Michigan.

Said Kennedy: "It is significant to note that, with certain exceptions, the military network includes a large part of the principal mileage on the trunkline system. Due to this fact, improvements to the military network will also benefit our regular trunkline routes, and will include projects that would eventually be demanded by the constantly increasing traffic over these highways."

Because of the vital part Michigan is playing in the national defense program, the state is also expected to fare exceptionally well when appropriations are made for construction of access highways to army camps, air bases and defense industries. The defense highway act provides \$150,000,000 for this type of construction.

Kennedy stated there were at least 12 key areas throughout the state where access highway construction is urgently needed. Heading the list are the Detroit cross-town limited-access highway, additions to Fort Custer drive, and a proposed super-highway to serve the Ford bomber plant now being constructed at Ypsilanti.

Due Any Day Now

According to reports from the 48 pollen counting stations of the Michigan department of health, the hay fever sneeze will be heard early this year.

"Hay fever sufferers are advised to take whatever precautions they can about two weeks earlier than usual," said Dr. H. Allen Moyer, state health commissioner. "Communities which have ragweed pulling and cutting programs should speed up their plans. Ragweed pollen has not yet appeared in our daily counts, but ragweed has been seen in flower and all vegetation is early this year, from weeds to apples."

Michigan first state-wide pollen count, conducted last year by the department in co-operation with hotels, tourist associations and other interested organizations, showed that the farther north one goes in the state the greater freedom there is from ragweed pollen, chief cause of Summer hay fever.

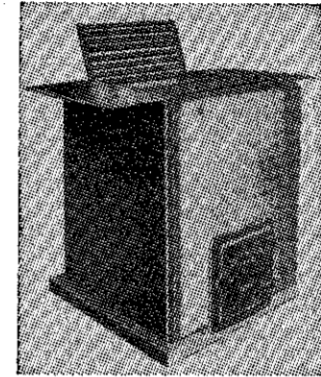

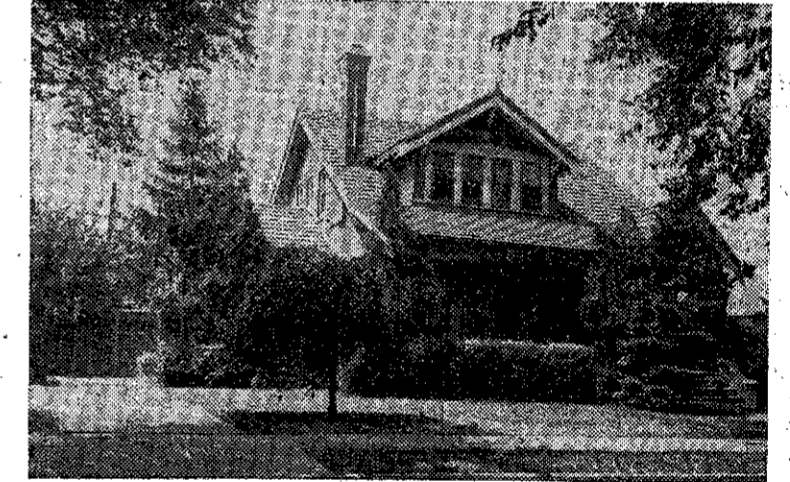

Winners will have their names inscribed upon the transferable bonds which will be presented ceremoniously by Youngblood. They will then become the guest of the management at the fair for that day.

Fisher Body Die And Machine Unit Receives 'E' Award From Navy

The Fisher Body die and machine unit, Detroit, received the coveted "E" award from the United States navy by which the navy, in one of its proud traditions, recognizes outstanding performance of duty.

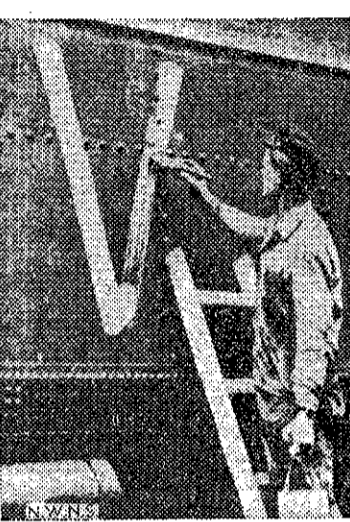

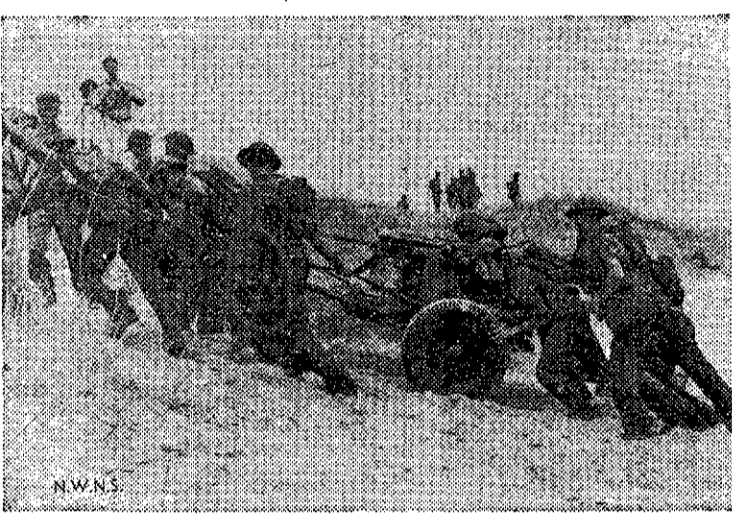

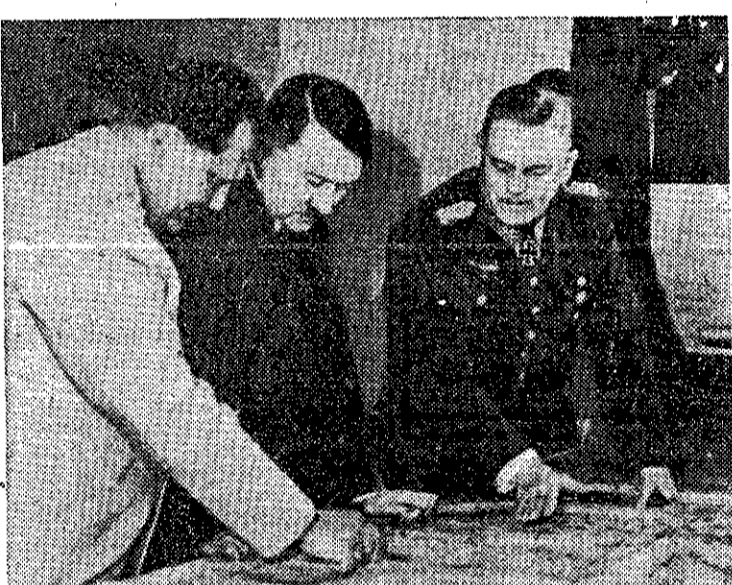

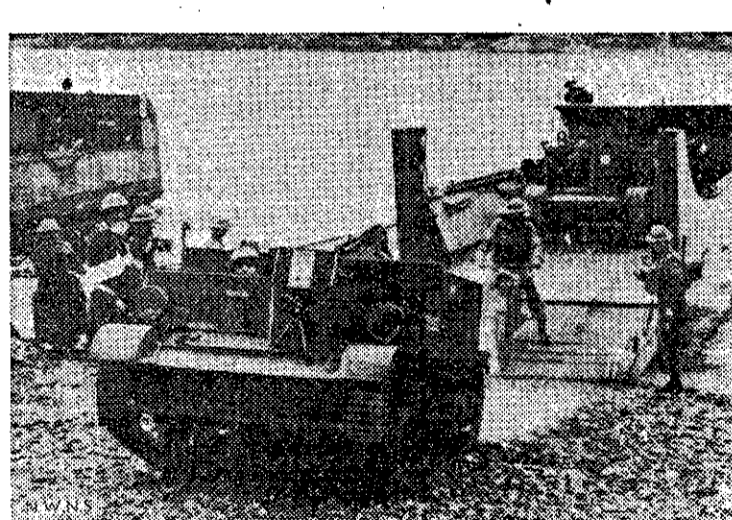

Highway Additions Set

The immediate construction of a causeway from the north shore of the Straits of Mackinac, designed to ultimately fit in with a bridge spanning the Straits, will be undertaken by the state highway department at a total estimated cost of \$1,700,000. G. Donald Kennedy, state highway commissioner, said the causeway is expected to be completed by the end of the 1942 tourist season and will be undertaken as an expansion of the state ferry service. It will reduce the travel distance for the state ferries from nine to three miles and will step up the capacity of the service by more than one-third. The causeway will extend into the Straits a total of 5,385 feet and its surface will be ample for a 44-foot roadway and shoulders. Sides of the causeway will be cased with 10-ton stones. Bids will be taken soon on the first phase construction. This will be for stone dykes and fill for the causeway. A second contract for dock facilities to be located on the end of the causeway will be awarded a little later. The initial work will form the bulk of the project and will cost an estimated \$1,000,000. The dock facilities at the end of the causeway which will provide two end-loading slips, will cost an estimated additional \$700,000. Rapidly mounting traffic on the state boats at the Straits makes drastic steps necessary if satisfactory service is to be maintained. Commissioner Kennedy said. 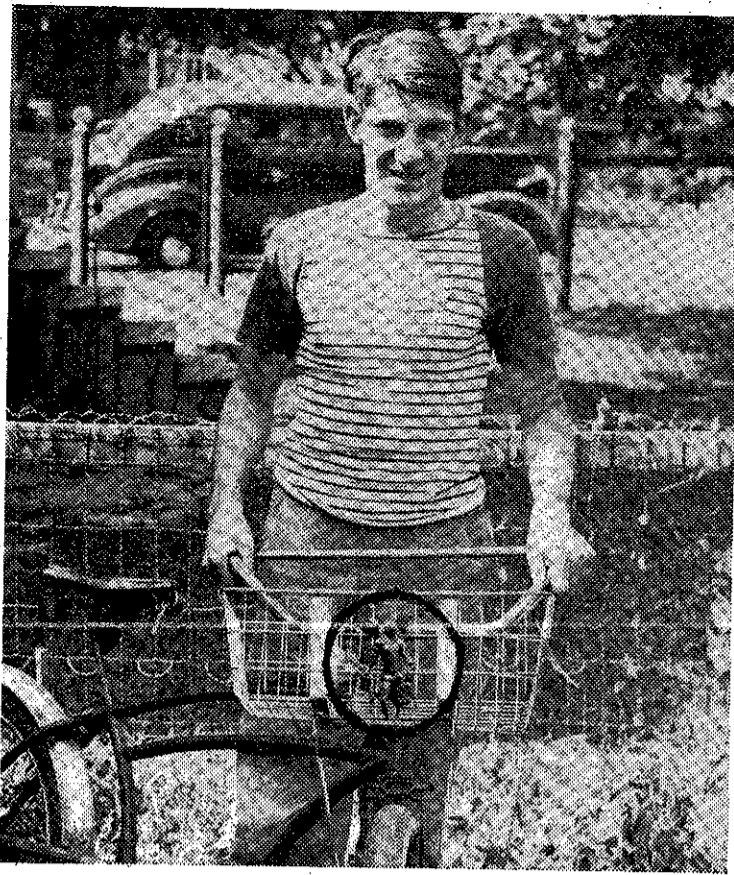

Missing Angel Found

Gerald Stromberg, 17, of 5174 Pennsylvania, had the best radiator cap on the front of his bike in all Detroit last week. It was better than any Lincoln, Packard or Cadillac caps that the other boys in the neighborhood had on their bikes.

Today Gerald has no gilded bronze angel on his bike, but he can still remember the week that he had it fastened with wire. He'll remember it because it was better than any other caps that the other boys in the neighborhood had as ornaments.

It was a small bronze angel that didn't look much like a radiator cap, but which did look well on the front of his bike. He drilled two small holes in the wings and secured it to his bicycle. He had found it in the street at Iroquois and Vernor.

Missing Angel

But then on Saturday he noticed in the paper that a 400-year-old gilded bronze angel had been stolen from a Bolognese tabernacle in a loan collection at the Alger House Museum in Grosse Pointe.

And then he saw a picture of the tabernacle and the missing angel. When he compared the angel with the one on the front of the bicycle he thought they might be one and the same.

Then he decided to go to the police station. It was then that he found that his ornament was the missing angel. It is about six inches tall, and is one of four: on the wrought tabernacle of bronze, gold, silver, and other metals. It was made in 1554 for the Cardinal of Bologna, brother of the Pope.

It was placed on the high altar of a Bolognese church and was used to hold the sacred elements for the Holy Communion.

The tabernacle was brought to America from the Cook collection in England and was loaned to Alger House by a New York collector.

Identification Made

Doctor Valentine, director of the Detroit Institute of Arts, of which Alger House is a branch, identified the figure and said that he believed the boy's story to be true.

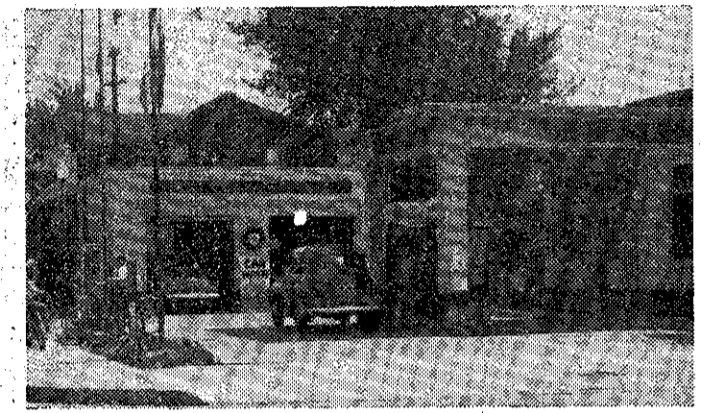
