**Two South American Artists to Appear At Concert on Nov. 14**

By all odds the most novel program planned for the Detroit Symphony orchestra this season will be heard at the concert of Thursday night, Nov. 13, in Masonic auditorium, and at the repeat performance Friday afternoon, Nov. 14. Two of South America's greatest artists, Burle Marx, conductor-composer, and Elsie Houston, soprano, will make their local debuts at these concerts in a program that is almost entirely Brazilian in character. Further distinction is lent by the fact that a world premiere, a new work by the guest conductor himself, will be heard.

Marx, through his activities as permanent conductor of the Philharmonic orchestra in Rio de Janeiro, and his extensive tours, has established himself as the leading conductor of South America. No less than an authority than Walter Mocchi has said, "Burle Marx is, in my opinion, the greatest conductor South America has ever produced." March 22, 1939, Marx made his debut as a composer in New York, when his "Ave Maria" was presented by the Schola Cantorum and the New York Philharmonic. The Brazilian government appointed Marx as commissioner of music for the World's fair in New York and also for the San Francisco fair. Since coming to this country on his present good-will mission he has conducted many of the leading orchestras of the United States.

Miss Houston was born in Rio, to which her father, member of that Virginia family which gave Texas its liberator, emigrated half a century ago. Her mother is a member of the family which came from Portugal to settle in Brazil some 300 years ago. Miss Houston is the same Elsie Houston who is known in Paris, Rio and other European and South American music centers as the chosen interpreter of the works of Hector Villa-Lobos; and whose researches in the field of Brazilian folk and magic ritual music have won recognition from no less an authority than The Sarbonne. Her book, "Popular Songs of Brazil," was published under its auspices. Villa-Lobos, the best known of South American composers, has dedicated his notable collection of folk-songs to her.

**Social Security Card Necessary to Work**

If you are looking for temporary work during the holiday season, get a social security account number before you set out to find a job. This is the advice given by E. E. Pollock, manager of the East Side Field office of the social security board, located at 8037 Harper at Van Dyke. Explaining why this action should be taken, Mr. Pollock said today: "Employers have learned that it saves time and trouble for all concerned if account numbers are issued before or at the time a new worker takes a job. Then the employer can see the card, copy the name and number exactly as they appear on it, and be sure his records are complete before his tax return for the final quarter of this year is filed in January, 1942."

"Many employers have learned that it is a difficult matter to get account numbers after holiday workers have left their service, and hence are asking for social security cards when new workers are hired. Any one who has lost his original card should get a duplicate, not a new number," Mr. Pollock added.
