While no special guards have been detailed to individual men here, the police are exercising special alertness in the protection of all such cases.

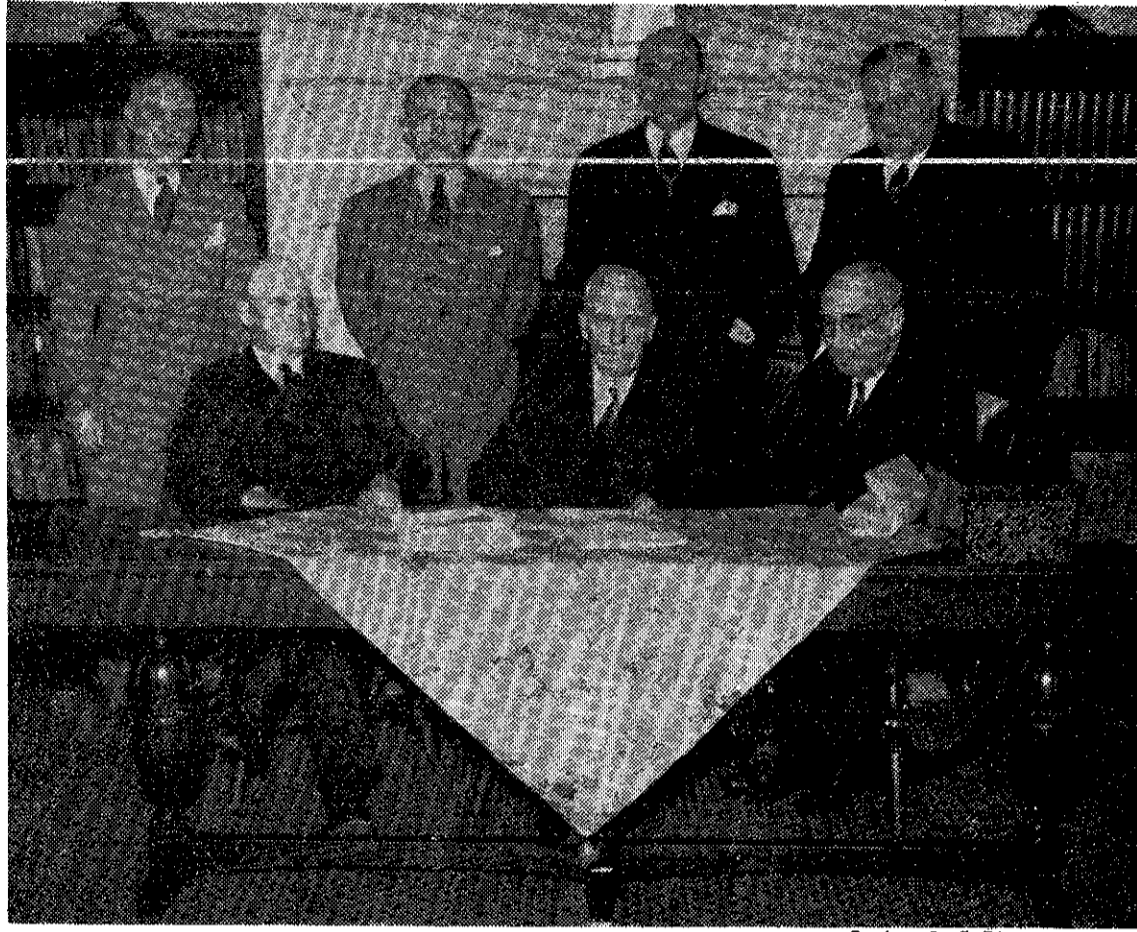
## Reopen Draft Rolls Here

## Limit Crafts In Farms Harbor

All cabin cruisers and boats with lavatories will be prohibited from harboring in the village harbor during the 1942 season, the Grosse Pointe Farms council ruled Monday night. The motion was passed by a vote of four to one.

The ruling was made to prevent pollution of the water in the harbor, which is used for swimming by both children and adults. Sole negative vote was cast by Councilman J. R. Sutton, Jr. Voting for the prohibition were Councilmen William K. Muir, Joseph Snay, Walter Strittmatter and E. P. Wright.

At Monday night's meeting the Farms council also received petitions signed by approximately 1,000 residents asking for improvements at pier park. Submitted by John J. Miller, 332 Moran road, the petitions called for acquisition of additional property adjacent to the present pier at the foot of Moross road, the provision of hard surface road for parking at pier park and the provision of additional picnic tables and stoves at the park. The petitions will be turned over to a special committee, yet to be named, for study and recommendation.

To avoid delay and to speed up all possible needs for home defense, Murray M. Smith, village engineer, was granted complete authority to proceed with proper protection for the water filtration and pumping plants in the village.

## Streets, Sewers Lead List Of Park's PWR Program

A public works reserve program of capital improvements to provide a backlog of projects to relieve post-war unemployment is being planned for Grosse Pointe Park by Village Manager Byron J. Rockwood in conferences with William E. Hamilton, of the PWR, it was disclosed last week.

Relief, sanitary sewers and street improvements will head the Park's list of projects, Rockwood said, with sidewalk repairs and improvements following close behind. Resurfacing of streets, reconstruction of curbs and sidewalks are felt to be the most compelling need, he said. ### EMERGENCY FINDS BOY, GIRL SCOUTS PREPARED FOR SERVICE

So well organized is the program for Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Campfire Girls that declaration of war found the boys and girls ready to swing into action for national defense. No changes in the regular program of scouting was necessary, only an intensification and enlarging of the present set-up.

Here in Grosse Pointe, the Girl Scouts are undergoing an intensive training in emergency preparation which includes a complete knowledge of the community both socially and geographically.

They are becoming intimately acquainted with the map of the community to enable them to serve as girl guides, to aid in the evacuation of children during emergencies and to aid in transportation and communication wherever needed.

Shelter, clothing, recreation and general service complete the program. Child care and entertainment of children play an important part in the program, as training to provide for children during emergency.

Preparation of air raid shelters, first aid and nutrition are other studies. At the present time, too, Girl Scouts are offering their services in places which will free adults for other services. In this connection they are working with the Red Cross in institutions such as old age homes and orphanages. The girls are also manning telephones at recruiting and other military offices.

Right now the girls are engaged in a campaign to provide gifts for soldiers and are busily making comfort kits for the men in camp.

Boy Scouts too are using their basic program as an outline of defense work, the boys concentrating on first aid, signaling and communications both by foot and by bicycle.

### 'Caution for Xmas' Slogan for Traffic Safety Campaign

Co-operating in the "Caution for Christmas" safe driving campaign, the state highway department this week announced maintenance crews had been placed on a "war" footing to keep Michigan's highways safe for holiday travelers.

G. Donald Kennedy, state highway commissioner, predicted that Michigan's highways, already carrying more than 25 per cent more the biggest holiday transportation traffic than last year, would witness a rush in the history of the department during the next three weeks.

"Exceptionally short holiday vacations," Kennedy said, "are expected to be the rule this year as the nation gears for war. Motorists may be tempted to take chances they would otherwise avoid in making hurried holiday trips. Such trips should be discouraged as much as possible and drivers should remember they are driving in the most dangerous month of the year."

All preliminary work, Kennedy pointed out, had been completed by highway maintenance crews, including the checking of equipment, installing snow fences and placing of the familiar orange barrels of sand and calcium chloride at strategic points.

Each morning, Kennedy explained, "during adverse weather conditions, district headquarters relay weather and road conditions to the Lansing office from where they are made available to newspapers and radio stations."

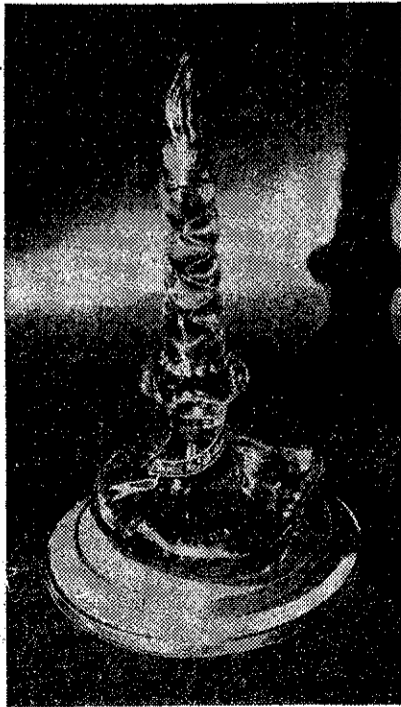

(Continued from Page One)

Elworthy and other heads of defense units throughout the state have been meeting this week in Detroit where they are receiving instruction from the federal government on civilian defense problems.

Similar co-operation by fire departments of the five municipalities was pledged at a meeting of the five Pointe police chiefs last week.

Both the fire and police departments will recruit 25 men each, totaling 125 volunteer police and 125 volunteer firemen, to serve in emergencies. Schools will be conducted by the police chiefs for these volunteers. Members of the fire departments will be taught the fire equipment available in each village and the city. Fire hydrants will be marked so that visiting firemen will be able to ascertain immediately the size of the main, thus facilitating their work. Both equipment and services will be interchangeable during emergencies. Thus, should any emergency arise which called for more fire department aid than could be supplied by the village concerned, firemen from a neighboring village would be on call to aid them, while the fire departments of the remaining municipalities would be on the alert to aid the village left without its fire department services.

Emphasis was placed on the fact that the auxiliary force of volunteer firemen would be called out for emergencies only. Their services will be neither required nor desired for regular fire calls.

### Local Draft Board Doubles Output Of Questionnaires

### Feeling the Christmas Spirit

During the Christmas season one sometimes hears the plaintive question, "How can I feel and enter into the Christmas spirit when my own affairs and the lives of others seem so troubled?"

Nothing can dim the spiritual beauty and power of the Scriptural narrative of the nativity, as given in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. Again and again, the Christian student is impressed by the boundless joy which was felt by those whose spiritual sense discerned the fulfillment of divine prophecy in this great event. The Wisemen, who saw and followed the star in the east, "rejoiced with exceeding great joy" (Matthew 2:10). And when they found the infant Jesus they fell at his feet, and offered him precious gifts. Watchful shepherds, who were tending their flocks on the Judean countryside, heard the angel message of "good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people" (Luke 2:10). Heavenly intuition led them to Bethlehem, where they found the babe lying in a manger. Many of the villagers listened with awe while the shepherds related the wonderful message which had come to them that night. Then these simple, kindly men returned to their sheep tending "glorifying and praising God" (2:20). Later, Simeon, a spiritually-minded man in Jerusalem, took the child Jesus in his arms, and blessed God

for the light and glory which had come into the world. . . .

On page 332 of "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," Mary Baker Eddy writes, "Christ is the true idea voicing good, the divine message from God to men speaking to the human consciousness."

Troubles disappear when the true spirit of Christmas is understood, felt, and loved. Abundant health, activity, happiness, and affection are the natural co-comitants of the right and understanding of God and ever-present Christ, Truth. . . .

The real man, who is God's offspring, His likeness, is spiritual, perfect, eternal. God's thoughts, or ideas, are imbued with His power and goodness. They are pure, life-giving, and ennobling. Truth, Life, and Love are real, incorruptible substance. . . . All that is worthy, genuine, and beneficial to men originates in Spirit, God. Strength, serenity, beauty, dominion, and un hindered activity are divinely established facts of real being. That which claims power to injure, vitiate, and destroy good is naught but the false argument of mortal mind, the opposition of the one perfect Mind, God. Health, or spiritual wholeness, is God's eternal gift to all His children.

Someone may say: 'How Happy I could be, if I knew that my loved ones were safe and enjoying the blessings of Christmas! But duty calls them where danger and distress threaten each moment.' The spiritual fact is, however, that God's dear love and the power of His Christ are ever present to save, enlighten, and comfort all. Divine Love is never absent, but ever active, meeting each and every need. God is man's only Life; hence man is eternally safe. The unreal mortal concepts of life, happiness, intelligence, and security are powerless, and cannot touch the real, spiritual man.

### Scouts Take Part In First Aid Meets

Always considered as part of scouting's regular program, and now definitely acknowledged as valuable training because of the national emergency, a series of sectional first aid contests is being sponsored by the Detroit area council, Boy Scouts of America during this month.

Contests are scheduled for Wednesday, Dec. 17 at Hackett Field, Highland Park and Plymouth high school in Plymouth; and Friday, Dec. 19 at Cooley high school. All contests are scheduled to commence at 7 p.m.

Teams in these sectional meets are made up of Scouts who have already participated in contests sponsored within their own troops. Those teams which maintain certain standards in the sectional meets are eligible to compete in the council-wide First Aid-O-Ree to be conducted early next year, the winners of which will be eligible to attend regional-sponsored contests in Chicago.

The problems assigned to the sectional meet teams are based on scouting's second dand first class first aid requirements. One of the problems will be done in absolute darkness to represent a typical black-out situation.

Besides the great need for first aid



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training, Scouts all over the nation are becoming very much interested in signaling and other phases of the scouting program which may be of value in the strengthening of the home front. The local council plans to conduct signaling bees and cycle corp meets next year.

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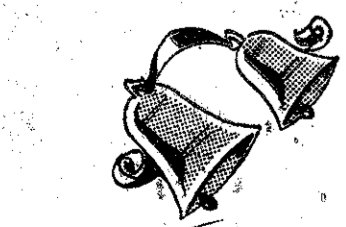

## Township Warns Against Allowing Dogs to Run Loose

A warning to owners of dogs in Gratiot township to keep the animals off the streets was issued this week by township officials. Complaints that dogs are being allowed to run loose and that they are molesting children and adults on the streets have been coming in with increasing frequency, Justice Harry J. Garman said.

While the township does not at present enforce an ordinance to license and control dogs here, a measure is now pending before the state legislature whereby township governments will be permitted to enforce dog ordinances and keep the entire license fees, Justice Garman added, so that by Spring it is expected that a dog ordinance will be in effect in the township.

At the present time, since there is no such ordinance, the township can rely only on the co-operation of its residents to control the problem of dogs running loose on the streets.

## Offer Training For Service In Merchant Marine

Wendell Lund, executive director of the Michigan Unemployment Compensation Commission today offered the commission's full facilities to help speed the training of ships for America's expanding merchant marine.

"With the United States at war," Lund declared, "speed is essential in building ships to carry supplies and to do battle with our nation's enemies. Skill and ability must now come to the fore in order to assure a constant stream of ships."

Lund declared that each of the commission's 52 Michigan state employment service offices will enroll apprentice seamen and radio operators for training by the Maritime Service. Apprentices will be paid while in training.

Upon completion of their free training course, apprentices will be expected to serve in the merchant marine.

"Some 1,200 new merchant ships, if not more, will be launched during the next two years," Lund said, "and will require 40,000 additional seamen in deck and engine departments, as radio operators, and as cooks and bakers."

"Young men are needed at once and those accepted for training are assured of good jobs at unusually good pay. There is a shortage of trained men to man these new vessels. This shortage must be ended for America's defense."

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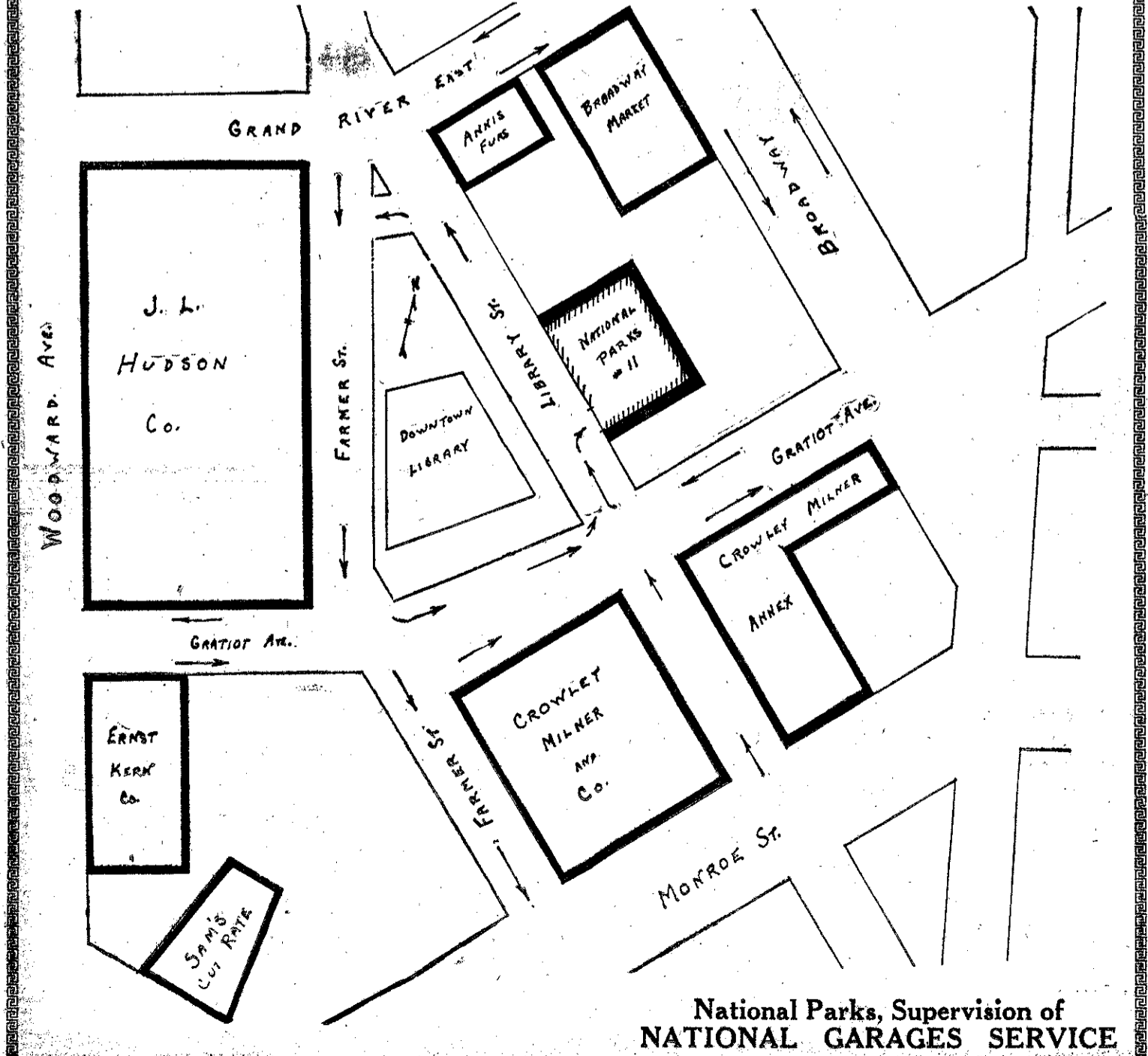

### 'Give Courtesy For Christmas'

"Let's give courtesy for Christmas" . . . This is the slogan for a nation-wide emergency safety campaign during the holiday season which is being sponsored by the National Safety Council. Let's take the Christmas spirit of "Peace on Earth — Good Will Toward Men," behind the wheel of the car with us and let us walk cautiously when crossing streets.

Parents are urged to purchase toys with the constructive element in mind rather than with the destructive idea. There are many fascinating toys which have educational value. Electric trains, miniature electric stoves, irons and vacuum cleaners should bear the approval of the underwriter's label or they may prove dangerous.

When bicycles are purchased, instruction in regulations and the safe use of this vehicle should be given

the boy or girl impressing them with the responsibility attached to the gift.

Military toys are in great demand and great care should be used in selecting toys suitable for the age of the child.

The lights and cords for the trees need a careful inspection and only a fresh tree should be selected.

"One thing that the teachers and officers of the schools have attempted to do is to make every effort to be calm and to face this war situation without hysteria. On the other hand we do not intend to shirk any responsibility where we can be of real service in winning the war." Grosse Pointe teachers pledge themselves to "all-out" effort in helping the United States to win the war.

Registration for civilian defense service may be made at any municipal office in Grosse Pointe or at the Neighborhood Club. Do your part to help the United States bring the war to a speedy end.

### This Week In Washington

Overnight, following the ruthless attack and declaration of war by Japan, all conflicting groups in this city became united in their demand to crush Japan with the greatest possible speed.

All partisanship, all isolationism, all labor difficulties and all selfish causes were swept away in the surge of patriotism which followed the realization that the United States was forced to fight — that our freedom and future depended upon the immediate mobilization of all forces to battle for our survival.

Since that fateful Sunday, Dec. 7, when the news flash came that Japan had attacked Hawaii — which was immediately followed by a meeting of the cabinet and an immediate declaration of war by congress — this city has been bristling with military activity and with staccato-like orders from all government departments aimed at turning the valves of democracy on in full force.

Washington is now virtually the chief military headquarters of the world and is in constant conference with democratic forces in every corner of the globe. All domestic matters which seemed important two weeks ago have been side-tracked to give an open track to all moves having to do with the war.

Officials here agree that the unity of the nation today is even greater than it was at the outbreak of the last World War. At that time the attack on the Lusitania caused nationwide resentment but not nearly equal to the anger aroused by the deliberate, unexpected bombing attack on the Lusitania caused nationwide and planned by Hitler.

Never in history has there been such a rapid turn-about of opinion as was displayed immediately following the Japanese attack. Congressmen who have been unceasingly arguing for keeping out of war, and were criticized by many for their isolationist policies, were quick to state that war is now justified and necessary. Even the American First committee pledged its full support to the government.

Senator Wheeler, leader of the isolationist movement, immediately after hearing of the Japanese attack, said:

"In view of the vicious and uncalculated-for attack upon the United States by the Japanese government, congress must declare war upon that government.

"The Japanese have chosen war. We must now exert our every energy, not only to win but to give the Japanese such a whipping that they will not want war again. I have sincerely hoped that we could avoid war both in the Atlantic and the Pacific. War seldom, if ever, settles anything and it is inconceivable to me that the Japanese government would be foolish enough to want war with this country.

"Everyone, regardless of party affiliations, must back up the administration to the end that we win. This applies to labor, capital and all other classes.

"The only thing now is to do our best to lick hell out of them."

Herbert Hoover said, on that same fateful Sunday afternoon: "American soil has been treacherously attacked by Japan. Our decision is clear. It is forced upon us. We must fight with everything we have."

We quote these men because they were unalterably opposed to war until the attack by Japan, which indicates the unity we can now expect from all groups in giving full co-operation to the war effort.

All of Washington is amazed at the efficient handling of the war program here, indicating that for many months the administration has been ready at an instant's notice to get our military and production machine into full operation. Production will undoubtedly be doubled or tripled almost immediately and labor has pledged itself not to let anything interfere with maximum production.

On the same day as the Japanese attack, announcement was made that John L. Lewis was given the closed shop in the captive coal mines, but that announcement, which the week before would have been headline news and have caused wide resentment throughout the nation, was passed over as being of no comparative importance. Now labor and capital will work together as never before and the aim of all groups will no longer be to get more for themselves but to produce more for our nation.

There is no question here but that the war will call for greater and greater sacrifice on the part of every American citizen — but there is also no question that every American is now eager to do everything within his power, no matter what the sacrifice, to see that the democracies win this war in the shortest possible time.

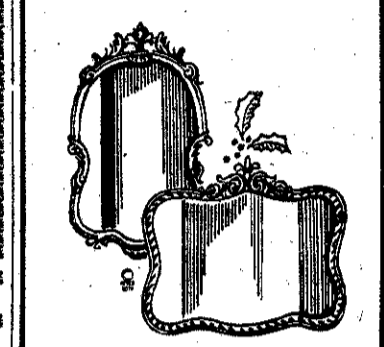

Battle on the Main Street Front



Today and Tomorrow

Leaders - In Wartime

In times of peace, a democratic nation is inclined to look on its army and navy with pride, and even affection, but with little curiosity. But when war comes, as it has now come for us, the people of that nation want to know "Who are our leaders?"

The men in command of our armed forces in the Far East saw service in Europe, or in European waters, in the last war, and were hand picked by President Roosevelt for their present positions with the knowledge that the day would probably come when our safety and success would depend upon their leadership.

Lieut. Gen. Douglas MacArthur, commander of all United States armed forces in the Far East, was graduated from West Point at the head of the class of 1903. His scholastic record was the highest made at the military academy in 25 years. After a spectacular performance as commander of the Rainbow division in France in the last war he was, in 1919, appointed superintendent of West Point. He was the youngest man ever to hold that position. In 1929 he became the youngest active major general in the army, and when, in 1930, Hoover made him chief of staff, he added another "youngest" to his record by becoming the youngest chief of staff the country had ever had.

Retirement - Canceled

In 1935, while United States isolationism was gaining momentum and war seemed a long way off, MacArthur retired and sailed for the Philippines. President Quezon of the Philippines, however, was not so optimistic. With an eye on the "complete independence" of the islands in 1946, he named MacArthur, with President Roosevelt's approval, "field marshal of the Philippines," and MacArthur set about the task of making the islands impregnable by 1946. He fought political snipers, Filipino socialists and Japanese insistence that he was a "Japanophile." Meanwhile, he created a "little native army," founded a military academy modeled on West Point and formed the nucleus of an air force. Then, last July, President Roosevelt, declaring the Far East unsafe, appointed MacArthur commanding general of all the armed forces in the Far East.

Test - For 'Hubby'

Admiral Husband Edward Kimmel, who is usually called "Hubby," faces his first serious test as commander in chief of the United States fleet. Only 59 years old, he was appointed to his present position over the heads of 46 admirals during President Roosevelt's reorganization of the navy last February. He is a native of Kentucky. In 1915, when he was 33, he was Roosevelt's aide when the latter, then assistant secretary of the navy, toured the Pacific coast. During the World War he was executive officer of the U.S.S. Arkansas, which was then operating with the British grand fleet. He has served twice with the bureau of naval operations in Washington and has

been commander in chief of the battalions of the battle forces, budget officer of the navy department and commander of the cruiser division. He was in command of the cruisers of the battle force when promoted to his present position. Ranking with Admiral Kimmel, but subject to his direction in naval operations, is Admiral Thomas C. Hart, commander in chief of the Asiatic fleet. Now 64, he reached retirement age last year, but was pressed into further service. One of the most popular men in the navy, he knows the Pacific waters thoroughly. He is also a skilled diplomat, with an equally thorough knowledge of the Asiatic mind. A native of Flint, Michigan, and an Annapolis graduate, he became commander in chief of the Asiatic fleet on July 25, 1939.

The film represents a one-year, 3,000-mile expedition through Ireland by Pat Stanton, the narrator. It covers every county, principal city, town, village, and historic landmark. Stanton pictures Blarney, Killarney, the Boyne Valley, the Mourne Mountains and other beauty spots.

WOMEN in the NEWS

Women on the Alert

We have not been idle these past months. And now that the nation is at war, many women are already at work in defense industries and in volunteer organizations — the Red Cross, the American Women's Volunteer Services, Civilian Defense groups. But there are probably many women who do not yet fully realize what a wide variety of things they can do to help. The Office for Emergency Management has released a documentary film showing what these things are. The script for the film was written by Mrs. Roosevelt, and it is not only a summary of, but also a tribute to, the work women are doing for the defense of our country.

Praises Red Cross

The Countess of Limerick, president of the British Red Cross in the County of London, left on the Yankee Clipper Sunday for London after a two months tour of the United States and Canada. She said that what impressed her most on her visit was the "magnificent effort" of the American Red Cross on behalf of Britain.

"Atta" Girls

Because of the success of the British women of the air transport auxiliary (called "Atta girls") American women are again clamoring for participation in our air defense program. They have been going ahead in increasing numbers with their flight training despite the decision of the Civil Aeronautics administration last July to stop training women and the subsequent shelving by the air corps of the possible use of women pilots in plane ferrying. The British women in the ATA have been successfully ferrying planes from the factories to RAF bases.

A Land Army

Mrs. Roosevelt has, in her newspaper column, expressed the hope that it will be possible to provide a women's "land army" to help on the farms. Defense industries and the armed services have taken so many men from rural districts that there is a shortage of agricultural workers. Such an "army," says Mrs. Roosevelt, could not be raised by the Office of Civilian Defense. But, since the idea has had enthusiastic support, she believes that a way can be found to give those who want to help an opportunity to do so.

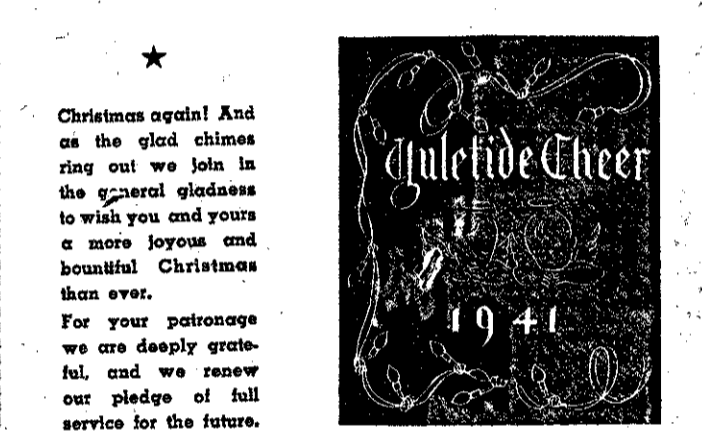

CHAPTER VI

Harley Longstreet, broker, dies on a trolley from poison scratched into his hand by a needle-pierced cork in his pocket. He and his guests were on their way to celebrate his engagement to Cherry Browne, an actress. The others were his partner DeWitt, DeWitt's superstitious wife Fern with whom Longstreet had had an affair — Jeanne, DeWitt's daughter and her fiancé Christopher Lord, Cherry's vaudeville friend Pollux, Ahearn, friend of DeWitt, Imperiale, middle-aged Latin, and Michael Collins, brawny Irishman. Questioned, each member of the party seems unfriendly toward the dead man, Bruno and Thumm, investigators, think DeWitt guilty — Longstreet had a sinister hold on him. Drury Lane, retired Shakespearean actor, says he knows who the murderer is, but will identify him only as Mr. X.
