# **Defense Executives** Extend Review's Car-Sharing Plan

Falling in with the national campaign to "Share Your Car for National Defense," sponsored here by The Grosse Pointe Review, the executive council of the Grosse Pointe civilian defense office this week made final plans for the registration of all drivers desiring to share rides with passengers and of all those desiring rides.

The work of carrying out this program has been turned over to Thornton E. Waterfall who has drafted the clerks of the five municipalities and the police officers to aid him with the registration.

ing, drivers and riders may register at the office of their local village clerk during regular off ice hours and at their local police station at any other time. In this way the opportunity to register will be available for the full 24 hours and will provide for those working long hours on defense jobs. Registration will begin Monday, July 6.

A registration fee of 25 cents will be charged for which the registrant will receive two cards, one identifying him as a registered driver with the Share Your Car program and the other identifying him as a registered driver who desires to share his car.

In this way a driver who picks up pedestrian may ask him to show his card as assurance that he is registered with the defense office. Conversely, the driver may also assure himself that the pedestrian is a registered rider.

Copper sprays or powders are no longer being manufactured due to the war, and must be obtained from existing stocks. Sulfur however is plentiful and may be obtained at reasonable prices. For sulfur sprays colloidal type of sulfur only can be made to dissolve in water. When spraying do a thorough job. 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

Adult Education

The adult educatoin program in Grosse Pointe has also been greatly intensified by the war and has made distinct contributions to the knowledges, skills and understandings of our community. Over 4,500 people have attended adult classes this year as compared with 1,800 a year ago. Even had the war not come, the enrollment in these adult classes up to December 7 indicated that they would have exceeded last year's enrollment by approximately 500. These 4,500 people were about equally divided between classes of the Office of Civilian Defense training courses and our regular adult students of Grosse Pointe public schools. Fifty-one different classes were offered, 11 of which were OCD training classes. The Wayne university extension division and the University of Michigan extension division have co-operated in making these classes possible.

In co-operation with the state board for vocational control, an exellent beginning has been made in training workers for war production. Fifty-five men have enrolled in the three classes organized in the new Industrial Arts building and several of these have been placed after the first few weeks of training. Skilled foremen and shop superintendents have been employed as instructors. Over 150 more men are awaiting their turn to enroll. These classes are free, being financed largely by the state board of vocational con-

The OCD classes and the Americanization classes are also free. Experienced teachers in the OCD classes volunteer their time. All other adult classes are self sustaining by fees of those enrolled.

The third test of the valuets of education in Grosse Pointe which I wish to apply in this report is that of the development of character. I wish to be clearly understood in discussing this subject in the Grosse Pointe schools to be talking about something very specific and real. I am discussing the development of the quality of self-government of individuale which makes of each a peaceful and neighborly individual as a result of his own code where no outward discipline seems to be applied. It is that characteristic which is left when an individual remains quietly with his own family or when he is driving along the highway and no policemen are in sight, or when he is left at a responsible task and no supervisor or boss is ruling his actions, or when he is given an opportunity to vote and express himself in public affairs but is not required to do so, or when his country calls him to do his duty and he does it gladly without complaints.

In school it can be measured in many ways but in the Grosse Pointe schools we do not make the mistake of expecting that this quality will suddenly emerge. We know that it has to be a long and gradual process because children in their earlier stages of life are naturally expected
