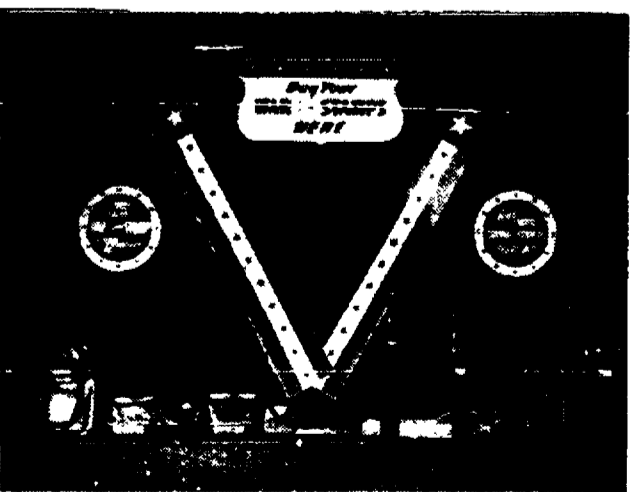

Cities Urged to Improve CD Aids

LANSING — Calling upon Michigan's citizens "to lick their own defense equipment problems," Lieut.-Col. Harold A. Furlong, administrator of the Michigan Council of Defense, urged that communities improvise needed equipment from materials already available.

Pointing out that coastal target areas have first call on the small amount of equipment now being manufactured, Lieut.-Col. Furlong declared:

"The people must look through their municipal attics and see what they've got to work with. Much of the job is a task of inventory and assembling and new equipment is not needed in many cases."

"Blankets, sheets and cots can be obtained from people in the community, and any woman's organization can make bandages, under supervision of a doctor or a nurse," he

continued. "Most county road commissions have plenty of shovels, pick axes and similar tools."

"Michigan is a state of mechanics — and if some of them can't contrive pumps and fire wagons out of materials they have on hand, I will be greatly mistaken."

Lieutenant-Colonel Furlong cited several instances where local ingenuity had solved equipment problems. Saginaw officials have converted an old fire truck to defense purposes. Lansing has fitted street sprinkler trucks for use also as fire pumping units. Flint has made Thomas splints out of scrap metal. Inmates of Jackson prison have made their own stretchers.

Agreeing that gas masks and steel helmets can not be made locally, the state administrator suggested that World War veterans be requested to loan helmets which they brought back from France. Many bugle corps also are outfitted with tin helmets which might be suitable for air raid wardens and other defense workers.

MORE DEATHS BY DROWNING SEEN AS WAR LIMITS SUMMER TRAVEL

Death by drowning in Michigan waters this season may be increased by wartime limitations on travel by automobile which will send increased numbers of vacationers to easily-reached lakes and streams where supervision of swimmers is lacking, the Michigan department of health warns.

Calling attention to the 316 drownings in public places last year, Dr. H. Allen Moyer, state health commissioner, declares: "Carelessness and foolhardiness remain two of the important causes of deaths by drowning. Each season lives are claimed because swimmers get beyond their depth in unfamiliar waters. Others die because some thoughtless person rocks the boat. Common sense will save lives."

"Do not enter the water for at least an hour after meals or when

overheated, leave at once if fatigue or chill is felt, stay away from treacherous currents or undertow and do not allow children to wade where deep holes may be found. Look before you dive. Learn how to save lives of the near-drowned. And swimming below sewer outlets where water is polluted may present the equally serious risks of acquiring disease."

As between sexes, drownings claimed six times as many male lives as female last year. The age group 15-19, with 48 deaths by drowning, was hardest hit among males.

More Beekeepers in State Because of Sugar Rationing

"If we can't get sugar from the grocer, we'll get honey from the hive." That, apparently, is the slogan of a good many Michigan families that have become beekeepers in order to obtain a supply of honey as a substitute sweetener during the sugar shortage.

According to Leo V. Card, state commissioner of agriculture, there are now more than eleven thousand registered beekeepers in the state, a gain of about five per cent over a year ago. The increase is attributed largely to a number of persons who have installed two or three colonies of bees in order to get honey for their own use. There has also been an increase in commercial apiaries.

There are nearly two hundred thousand colonies of bees in Michigan and the yield of honey is between fifteen and twenty million pounds a year. Michigan bees out-produce those of other states. Honey may be used in a variety of ways in the place of sugar, including cooking and baking and in soft drinks.

Smith Receives Collegiate Honors From Denison

Hold Forth Cause of Swimmers' Itch Can Be Removed

New promise that the cause of swimmers' itch can be removed from northern Michigan beaches is held forth as field crews under the direction of the state stream control commission continue their inspections of waters which have been treated to kill snails in recent Summers.

Workers from the University of Michigan's biological station on Douglas lake near Cheboygan are finding that most snails infesting state park beaches on Indian lake near Manistique have been killed during the last two Summers, by applications of copper sulphate salts in solution.

High winds and waves have severely handicapped operations of the crews on Mullet lake near Cheboygan.

Despite difficulty experienced in obtaining chemicals, the crews are continuing their work on a restricted scale, for the fourth Summer. Methods of control which are being developed in Michigan are attracting attention in other northern states where swimmers' itch is a problem. Finding of snails on the beach of a Van Buren county lake where swimmers are believed to have contracted the itch is reported by the county health officer, one of the few instances of suspected infestation of southern Michigan beaches.

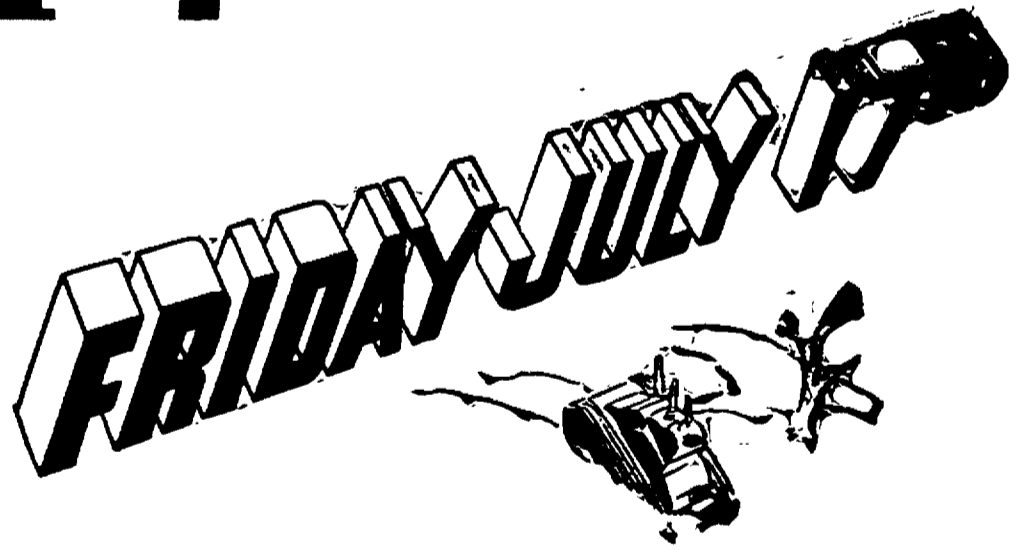
