G. P. Shores to Hold Official Inspection of Civilian Defense Unit

The first official review and inspection of all civilian defense groups of Grosse Pointe Shores, by the village officials, has been called for Monday evening, Sept. 14, at 7 p.m., on the Vernier school playground at the village hall.

Over 250 residents out of a total of 800 in the village, compose the many diversified civilian defense groups.

Local and state defense officials and executives of the Red Cross organizations, have been invited to attend and participate in the ceremonies.

Nearly fifty members of the auxiliary fire and police corps will take the FBI pledge for law enforcement officers, which will be administered by John S. Bugas, chief of the Detroit district of the FBI.

An interesting program of events has been arranged in which the Wayne county chapter of the American Red Cross is co-operating by providing the mobile canteen and motor corps units, also representatives of the blood donors service.

First aid demonstrations will be supervised by Mrs. Franklin Morgan, who has conducted several first aid classes for the village.

More than 175 women who have completed the Red Cross training classes in first aid, motor corps, drivers tests and motor mechanics, and home nursing will be reviewed.

The village first aid station will be inspected for the first time. Seven prominent physicians and surgeons with 10 emergency nurses, come.

SUPERVISOR HOUTEKIER'S PRIVATE GARBAGE DUMP STIRS UP STINK IN GRATIOT TOWNSHIP

Indignation, disgust and plain human temper sparked plenty of fireworks in Gratiot township Tuesday night when a crowd of angry citizens jammed the township board meeting to demand a showdown over Supervisor Odilon Houtekier's actions in personally reorganizing the sanitary collection setup of the township — involving the purchase of a twelve hundred dollar truck.

The article declared that while the city of East Detroit had written to the Gratiot township board protesting the dumping of garbage on the park site no response had been received by the city. Since the city's request had been ignored, the paper went on, East Detroit planned to carry their protest over the heads of Gratiot officials to the Michigan department of health.

Tempers flared particularly over the last point, the transformation of the park, which the people had given their time and money to fix up for their youngsters, into a public dump. One resident asked the supervisor flatly if Mr. Houtekier owned the park and asked, "If so, Mr. Houtekier, when did you buy it?"

Citizens charged that not only had the supervisor taken away the free and healthy use of the park from the children, but that by using it as a garbage dump he had created a menace to the general public health of no small proportions.

Substantiating this charge, an article which appeared in a prominent position in The South Macomb News on Thursday, Aug. 27, was read at the meeting.

5,500 YOUNGSTERS RETURN TO SCHOOL THIS WEEK

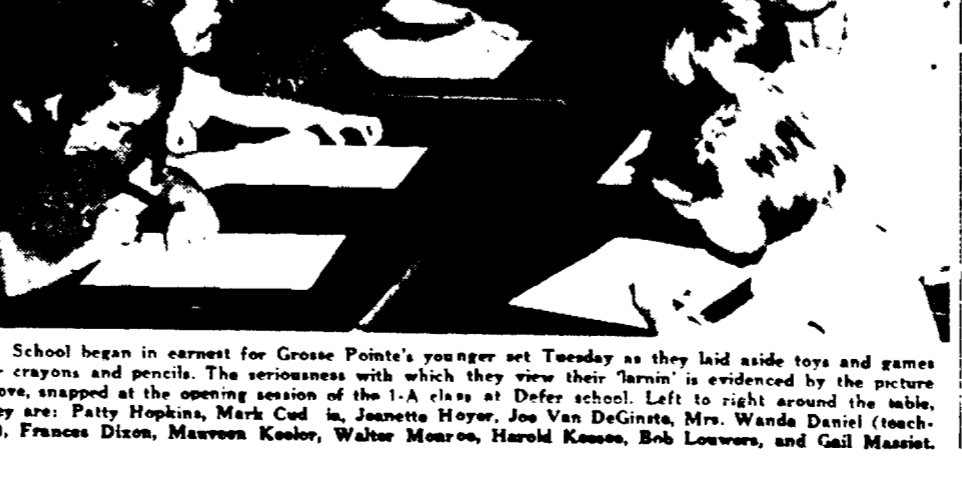
After a Summer of unprecedented changes in staff due to the effect of war on Grosse Pointe's teaching personnel, all posts were filled Tuesday morning, Sept. 8, to meet the 5,500 pupils of the public schools. This is over 300 more than a year ago.

Forty-two new appointments that morning are the 19 accepted for education since January, 1942, 35 of which have been made since school closed in June. This constitutes a turnover of almost one-fifth of the teaching staff according to Dr. Paul Essert, superintendent of schools.

In order to meet the problem of properly inducting these teachers into the curriculum of the Grosse Pointe schools and to carefully supervise and guide their work in instruction, Mrs. Ethel Cowe, principal of Trombly school, has been appointed acting supervisor of instruction. She will resume her post as principal of Trombly school in September, 1943, but during this year will give special assistance to John R. Barnes, director of instruction, in inducting the large new staff and in concentrated improvement of courses of study.

Many changes in courses of study have already become necessary as a result of the war, such as increased emphasis on geography and mathematics, attention to the emotional stress and strain of elementary children due to war conditions. Mrs. Cowe has shown considerable leadership in these fields in Grosse Pointe and is admirably suited to the new responsibility.

To HELP YOUR WASHER stand up under the big load it faces for the duration, keep in mind these few simple rules:

- (1) Drain washer and rinse tub thoroughly after each washing. Remove agitator or suction cups and rinse.
- (2) Wipe dry with a soft cloth to remove any soap suds or lint that may remain. If your washer has a spinner dryer, this too should be cleaned, rinsed and wiped dry.
- (3) Don't try to force thick, bulky articles through your wringer—and especially don't run through belt buckles or other hard objects that might cut the rolls. They are rubber, and precious!
- (4) Release the pressure on wringer when not in use. This saves the spring and the rubber, and prevents the rolls from becoming flat on one side.
- (5) Don't overload your washer. Cramping in too big a wash simply puts a strain on the motor, and results in a less satisfactory job.

POINTE SOLDIERS IN AUSTRALIA EAGER FOR NEWS FROM HOME

Few communications from foreign theaters of war have come to the attention of this paper, partly because no releases are made by the war department concerning men outside the country. It is sincerely hoped that more news concerning the boys beyond the seas will be conveyed to this paper by relatives and friends throughout the Pointe as they hear from the men in the service.

A most interesting letter from a well-known Grosse Pointe boy was received this week by David E. McCarron of the Oak Cleaners, when Pfc. Peter F. Weins wrote a 14-page letter from "Somewhere in Australia."

Excerpts from "Pete's" letter follow: "Rationing is more severe here than in the states. I'm sure you

shouldn't have any complaints there. You folks back home can't really appreciate how easy you have things back there because you've never lived under the conditions the Aussies are living under. They really have things tough here and I can't help admiring them. Never a complaint do you hear from them. They can't even buy clothes without ration cards and gas is rationed so severely that three-quarters of the transportation is carried on by bicycle and horse and buggy. It reminds me of the days mom and dad spoke of living when pa was courtin' ma. It sure looks funny to see a middle-aged woman riding down the road on a bike with a baby in her arms, but they are very sincere in their war effort. I know all you people are back home, too, but if I ever hear any of my friends complaining that they have it tough, there will be another war when I return.

"... Another thing. Will you do me the favor of giving my address to the Grosse Pointe Printing Co. They've sent me a Grosse Pointe Review ever since I've been in the army... You might also mention to them that the boys from Grosse Pointe who are in Australia would like a note or two of encouragement. When a paper comes in all the Grosse Pointers gather around and read it 'til it crumbles."

"... A few Grosse Pointe boys besides myself here are Pingree Mastrianni, who by the way, since his induction, has risen from the rank of buck private to the master sergeant of the entire 107th medical battalion. That's something for Grosse Pointers to be proud of alone. Then there's one of the Higgendorf boys. He used to catch for one of the teams in St. Paul's League when we played out there. Besides him there's Henry Van Vive (something like that), Ralph Springer and many others. These fellows I mentioned are just in my outfit alone. One of the Ryan boys, Scotty Torangio and many others are scattered in our infantry battalions."

"... As we say to our cook, 'Keep 'em Fryin'." Sincerely, P. WEINS
