Enjoy better lighting in your home and save money doing it! It's easy if you follow the three suggestions listed here:

FIRST—Get as much as 25 per cent more light by keeping your lamps and fixtures clean. Dust and dirt rob you of the light you pay for. Dust collects on bulbs and inside reflector bowls, cutting down their efficiency and wasting electricity . . . exactly as if you were buying electricity for four lamps and only getting light from three. Wipe all lamp bulbs frequently — also reflector bowls and ceiling fixtures. Dust your lamp shades inside and out. Remember that dust collects insidiously, day by day — stealing light before you realize it.

SECOND—Dark colored lamp shades soak up light like a thirsty sponge absorbing water. A light colored shade is far more efficient because it reflects more light into the room where it can do some good. If you have a dark shade and want to increase its usefulness, try fitting it with a white lining. The difference in the amount of light reflected will surprise you!

THIRD—Use the right size bulbs in your lamps and fixtures. Too large a bulb can result in just as poor lighting as too small a bulb. Squeezing a big bulb into a small lamp causes glare and harsh shadows. Using a small bulb in a large lamp gives inadequate light. Choose the right size lamp bulb for the right socket.

Dictatorship in Gratiot Township

Last week this column pointed out that many of the water board meetings were incomplete, in that many of them failed to show how much money was being spent for certain services and the purpose for its spending. In both events they were kept secret from the people. It's interesting to note that a water board meeting of July 11, 1942, paragraph 6 reads as follows: "A motion was made by Commissioner DeHaneau that Emil Lakeman be hired as meter setter. It was carried unanimously." You will note it doesn't state how much Emil Lakeman was to be paid. This is one reason why this column says "Why should such things be kept away from the people?"

At the water board meeting of May 28, 1942, paragraph five shows that Emil Lakeman was paid \$83.00. It doesn't say how many taps were made or how many meters were set. The people are supposed to guess whether Mr. Lakeman worked that week or not. However, from May 28 up to the present time Lakeman's wages are a total blank, excepting that he is paid \$125.00 per week, which is \$2.85 per hour. Just what Emil Lakeman does for this work is kept strangely from the people.

Paragraph 4 of the above meeting reads as follows: "A motion was made by Commissioner Jones, supported by Commissioner Kraft that the bill for E. Beauchamp be paid. Ayes—Houtekier, Kraft and Jones; nays—none; absent—none. The bills which were paid as listed under the date of this meeting do not show the amount paid E. Beauchamp as ordered by the above motion.

For your information, E. Beauchamp is Gratiot township's attorney and is a very personal friend of Supervisor Houtekier, so says Supervisor Houtekier, and has been Houtekier's personal attorney for years. Now E. Beauchamp is given taxpayers' money without stipulating the amount he receives or what this money is for. Likewise, you will note that it is the water board who approves and pays for E. Beauchamp's services, even though he was hired by the township board. Such bills, of course, should be approved by the township board in an open meeting with the taxpayers present. According to the meetings of April 11, Supervisor Houtekier resigned as manager of the water board. The people will remember Supervisor Houtekier had himself

cal board offices next Tuesday and Wednesday, Ghesquiere stated.
"Fuel oil users who have not received their applications from their dealers by Friday should take steps to obtain them immediately," he said. "The forms, OPA R-1100, can be obtained at the local office."
"The applicant should take three important steps before filling in his application:
1. Measure the floor area of the living space of his house. 2. Have his fuel inventory as of Oct. 1, 1942. 3. Obtain from his dealer a certified statement of last year's fuel oil purchase from June 1, 1941 through May 31, 1942.
"In measuring the floor area of the living space the applicant should not include basement space, laundries, sleeping porches, sun porches, garage space, recreation rooms, workshops, attics, storage space other than closets opening into heated space, and any other space for which heating is not essential."
"Applicants who are unable to get certified copies of their last year's fuel oil purchases must explain the reason. If the applicant failed to take his present inventory Oct. 1, he should take his inventory Oct. 1 and then add the amount of fuel oil consumed since that date."
Special allowances will be made to fuel oil users who have children under four years of age and invalids residing in the house.

L. M. Bartlett, co-chairman of the fuel oil rationing board, stated that even at this late date the local rationing board and the school authorities have not yet received full instruction as to the exact manner in which the registration and processing is to be conducted. This immense job will be handled by the local rationing board, the school teachers and volunteers. Every attempt will be made by these organizations to handle each application as quickly and efficiently as possible. In view of this, the fuel oil using public is asked to be patient and co-operative with the volunteer workers who will be handling the immense emergency war-time job.
