Olive Deane Hormel opened her lecture Monday evening on "Books as Ammunition" with a citation of Hitler's statement in his "Mein Kampf" that an "explosive idea" on the part of the democracies was the only weapon that could check the American music, will be in charge of progress of Nazism under his leadership. 





A palimpsest on vellum has recently been discovered, after it had lain fourteen hundred years in ob-scurity. If viewed simply as material substance and the result solely of human effort or skill, to be used only to meet material ends, all this will not, in the last analysis, prove to be wealth. 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

# Scrap Within 30 Days Activities Due to **Red Cross Gets Title Travel Curtailment**

That much-discussed wrought iron fence on East Jefferson avenue be- tation facilities, the Border Cities roads which was constructed more than 25 years ago in Grosse Pointe Park will be on the scrap pile within 30 days.

All parties holding legal title to the fence have signed an agreement whereby the Red Cross would take title to the fence immediately and scrap it.

Albert J. Berres, manager of the Detroit chapter of the Rd Cross, difficulties. said that proceeds from the sale, which has between fifty and one hundred tons of the finest type of heavy melting scrap, will be used to purchase comfort kits for soldiers embarking on foreign assignments. It is reported that the scrap will probably bring about \$1,600.

Bids for the fence have been opened and the successful bidder must sell the fence to the Great Lakes Steel Corporation, as part of the agreement.


