Navy Needs Manpower NOW

The campaign to enlist at least four thousand Michigan men in the Navy during the period from Nov. 7 to Dec. 7 is not another drive, but an undertaking which deserves support of all citizens of Grosse Pointe and vicinity.

Our Navy has a fine record in this war and is continuing to do a heroic job of maintaining the offensive at sea throughout the world.

More Michigan men have joined the Navy in recent months than at any corresponding period in history and the record volume of Navy enlistments is continuing, not only in this state, but throughout the nation.

Since the production of warships also has attained the highest peak in history, it becomes apparent that Navy enlistments must continue at a high level so that sufficient men can be provided to operate these new ships.

Although the Navy is asking for at least 4,000 Michigan men from Nov. 7 to Dec. 7, it has unlimited enlistment quotas and needs many more.

 The Detroit tragedy in which the driver could not see the train approaching from the right proves that passenger capacity should be restricted so as to permit the driver to see in each direction at all times. One of the ways in which this might be accomplished would be to extend a gate or a bar or paint a line across a given point to assure this safety measure." This possibility was to be taken up with the bus company by Councilman Carpenter and Chief Trombly.  hope that the village officials will accept this decision and work with us in order to consummate its agreement."

Following is the text of a copy of the decision made by the mediation board:

"Decision of the Arbitration Panel in the case presented by the Village Council of the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms and Local 77 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Workers.

"In the aforementioned case the arbitration panel has proceeded carefully and with deliberation. The hearings were held, on October 6, 1942, and October 29, 1942. Both parties have expressed themselves as having had full freedom and opportunity of discussion, and the panel has been pleased by the cooperative and helpful attitude of Mr. Mazer, representing Local 77, and Mr. Maurer, representing the Village Council.

"Verbatim records of the discussions are available, and the panel will not further describe the course of the discussion, other than to say that we believe no pertinent evidence or reasoning has been left uncovered.

"Our conclusions are unanimous. We have been guided by the principles of fair treatment, and have kept in mind the necessity of making our regulations match the pattern of national wage control which in those times of emergency must be supported by everyone.

"We feel that the question of industrial rates is not substantially important here, but that equality with similar jobs for similar employers is important. Further, we have tried to follow the national pattern which, roughly, falls into two parts: (1) The basic wage rates should be allowed to rise by approximately 15% to match the cost of living increase from January 1, 1941 to summer of 1942; (2) Inequalities between different employee groups of the same employer, or for the same type of work in the same area, should be adjusted.

"In the present case, the employees' base rates of pay did increase by approximately 15%, although the "take home" wages did not rise to any great extent. It must be borne in mind that the panel is attempting to follow the national pattern which is definitely tied to base rates rather than to weekly pay, bonuses, or any other criteria.

"The panel finds that the petitioning employees are adversely affected by an inequality within their own working world, and will rule that such inequality should be eradicated. The panel further has decided that a retroactive date should be observed which coincides with the date of assuming of responsibility by the arbitrators.

"Our decision is:

1. The petitioning employees shall be granted a 10% increase in base wage rates, retroactive to July 20, 1942.

2. The appeal for back pay during the strike shall be denied.

"It is recommended to both parties that no agreement made on these issues be put into effect until approval of the War Labor Board has been obtained."

 an agreement allowing the surplus tires to be assigned to the Defense Supplies Corporation. These assigned tires will be collected after the ration books are issued due to the insufficiency of the Railway Express Agency's facilities to collect all of them at present. Refusal to turn the excess tires in on demand will result in cancellation of the individual's gasoline ration book.

**Supplementary Cards**  
 Autoists who expect to apply for supplemental rations to and from work should make plans to share rides with at least three other persons or prove that they cannot do so. Applications for additional allowances may be obtained from the registrar when applying for the "A" book.

**Trucks and Commercial Vehicles**  
 Owners of trucks and commercial vehicles in order to be eligible for gasoline to run cars after Dec. 1 must first make application to the Office of Defense Transportation located in the Boulevard building, E. Grand boulevard at Woodward, and obtain a certificate of war necessity. When they have this in their possession, owners must make application for rationing books at the local rationing office. Mr. Bartlett said that owners of trucks and commercial vehicles should take these steps immediately if they wish to be provided with gasoline on Dec. 1. The local rationing board at 341 Fisher road is now ready to accept applications from truck and commercial vehicle owners.

**Fleet Owners**  
 Fleet owners, persons who own or lease three or more passenger type cars which are used principally for business or occupational purposes, must also apply directly to the local rationing office for their mileage book. These applications may be filed now at any time at the board. Mr. Bartlett urges fleet owners to make application immediately in order to avoid any delay in obtaining books prior to Dec. 1.

**Other Consumers**  
 Owners of boats, tractors, gas engines, and other users of bulk gasoline such as dry cleaners should make application directly to the rationing board. All applications must be submitted today and tomorrow and thus acted upon by Dec. 1 if the owners wish to purchase gasoline.

Mr. Bartlett added further that it is not the purpose of the OPA to deny the requests of any persons who are eligible for necessary amounts of gasoline to carry them to and from work or carry on legitimate business. However, persons who feel they are eligible for supplementary amounts of gasoline in addition to the basic allowance must show evidence why the gasoline is needed.
