**NOTICE OF ALTERATION AND RE-  
VISION OF VOTING PRECINCT  
NUMBERS 22 AND 23.**

Township of Grosse Pointe and Village  
of Grosse Pointe Woods, Wayne  
County, Michigan

Resolution by: Justice Belanger.

WHEREAS, The Township Clerk of Grosse Pointe Township  
has investigated the necessity of revising certain election precincts  
in the Township of Grosse Pointe so that in accordance with the  
provisions of Act No. 351 of the State of Michigan for the year  
1925, as amended, no more than Six Hundred and Fifty (650) regis-  
tered voters shall be situated within the confines of any election  
precinct, and

WHEREAS, the Township Clerk recommended that precincts  
number 22 and 23 in the Township of Grosse Pointe be revised in  
such manner so that four (4) precincts shall be created in the  
place and stead of precincts number 22 and 23,

**Now Therefore Be It Resolved,**

That in accordance with the provisions of Act No. 351 of the  
Public Acts of the State of Michigan for the year 1925, as amended,  
election precincts number 22 and 23 be altered and changed and  
that in their place and stead precincts numbered 22, 23, 25 and 26  
shall be created with boundary lines as herein set forth, to wit:

**Election Precinct No. 22**

That part of Grosse Pointe Woods, being bounded by a line  
beginning at the intersection of the centerline of Mack Avenue and  
the north boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods  
thence easterly along the north boundary line of the Village of  
Grosse Pointe Woods, to the centerline of Charlevoix Avenue as  
extended; thence south along the centerline of Charlevoix Avenue  
as extended to the south line of P.C. 156; thence west along the  
south line of P.C. 156 to the centerline of Mack Avenue; thence  
north along the centerline of Mack Avenue to the place of begin-  
ning.

**Election Precinct No. 23**

That part of Grosse Pointe Woods being bounded by a line be-  
ginning at the intersection of the centerline of Mack Avenue and  
the south line of P.C. 577; thence east along the south line of P.C.  
577 to the west boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe  
Woods; thence north along the west boundary line of the Village  
of Grosse Pointe Woods, to the north boundary line of the Village  
of Grosse Pointe Woods; thence east along the north boundary  
line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods to the centerline of  
Mack Avenue; thence south along the centerline of Mack Avenue  
to the place of beginning.

**Election Precinct No. 25**

That part of Grosse Pointe Woods, being bounded by a line  
beginning at the intersection of the south line of P.C. 156 and the  
Easterly boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods;  
thence westerly along the south line of P.C. 156 to the centerline of  
Mack Avenue; thence south along the centerline of Mack Avenue  
to the intersection of Mack Avenue and the south line of P.C. 577;  
thence west along the south line of P.C. 577 to the west boundary  
line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods; thence along the west  
boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods to the south  
boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods; thence along  
the south boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods to  
the centerline of Mack Avenue; thence northerly along the center-  
line of Mack Avenue to the south boundary line of the Village of  
Grosse Pointe Woods; thence easterly along the south boundary  
line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods to the East Boundary  
line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods; thence northerly along  
the east boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods to the  
place of beginning.

**Election Precinct No. 26**

That part of Grosse Pointe Woods being bounded by a line  
beginning at the intersection of the east boundary line of the vil-  
lage of Grosse Pointe Woods and the south line of P.C. 156 thence  
west along the south line of P.C. 156 to the intersection of such  
south line of P.C. 156 with the centerline of Charlevoix Avenue as  
extended; thence north along the centerline of Charlevoix Avenue  
as extended to the north boundary line of the Village of Grosse  
Pointe Woods; thence east along the north boundary line of the  
Village of Grosse Pointe Woods to the East Boundary line of the  
Village of Grosse Pointe Woods; thence south along the east  
boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods to the point  
of beginning.

**Be It Therefore Resolved,**

That the Township Clerk be and he is hereby authorized and  
directed, to give notice of the change and alteration of such pre-  
cincts by publishing a copy of this resolution for two (2) successive  
weeks in The Grosse Pointe News and The Grosse Pointe Review,  
newspapers published and circulated in the Township of Grosse  
Pointe and by posting copies of this resolution in two (2) conspicu-  
ous places in each of the election precincts altered and changed as  
herein provided.

**Be It Further Resolved,**

That the Township Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to  
certify a copy of this resolution to the County Clerk.

**Be It Further Resolved,**

That the Township Clerk be and he is hereby authorized and  
directed to transfer the registration cards of persons duly registered  
in the precincts aforesaid so as to place such registration cards in  
the proper precinct file and to notify the registrant of such change  
by forwarding to the address given upon such registration card, a  
notice to the registrant of the fact that such change has been made  
and that the said precincts have been altered and changed and  
that such registrant is now a resident of the new precinct, created  
hereunder.

When we walked in the mess, we were handed a cigar and a package of cigarettes. We then took our plates and followed up to the chow counter. The dinner was started off with delicious pea soup and accompanied with it was turkey, mashed potatoes, green beans, corn, dressing and gravy. On the tables there were all kinds of fruits, nuts, candy and for dessert we had either both pumpkin and mince meat pie, with ice cream. So, you can see we all went for that lovely dinner.

The weather in the East has been very changeable, as one day it is like spring, and the next is the opposite. It rained for three days straight, and since then we have been wearing our overcoats.

As you know, I am in the medical corps, and for that reason am kept busy at all times. It seems that everybody gets sick at the same time.

I guess that all Grosse Pointe is busy having the registrations for gas rationing. It sure will make it tough for some people, as I can not see that here, as you see so many new cars jacked up on account of gas rationing. Up here, the people have been cut down to three gallons a week, and you don't see many cars on the street.

We don't have much to do at night, if it isn't too late when we

have finished our chores, we usually go to the USO. They have about five of them here, which offer all kind of recreation, plus dancing. The people up here are very nice, but I will still take the people of Grosse Pointe.

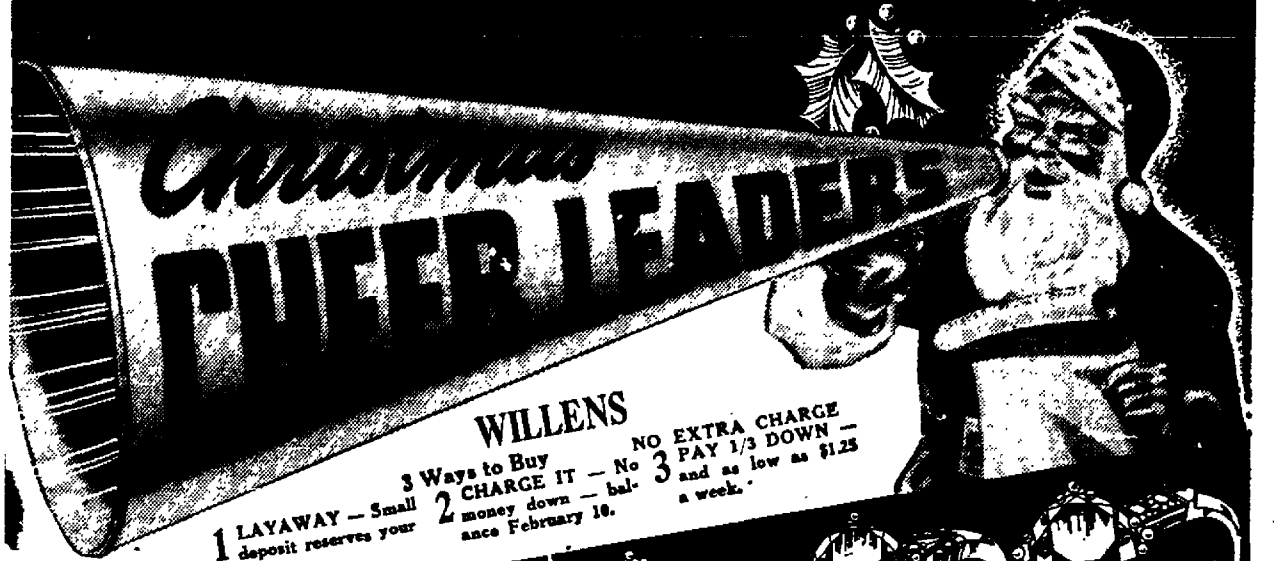

### YOUR OCD

**EDITOR'S NOTE**—This is the another of the series of articles describing the work of the office of civilian defense in the Grosse Pointe area, which includes the five Grosse Pointes and Gratiot township, and the way it would function in case enemy bombers should attack your community.

#### Air Raid Wardens

Pearl Harbor's bombs galvanized Grosse Pointe's OCD organization into immediate action.

Within 24 hours the police and fire departments of the five Pointes and Gratiot township had launched their own "lend-lease" system. Each community agreed to send its equipment to any other part of the defense area in which an emergency might arise; regardless of city, village and township boundaries, and to respond to calls from a single OCD control center.

A supreme council of defense, consisting of the presidents, mayor and township supervisors, set up a common fund to purchase needed equipment. George Elworthy, named by the council as commander for the area, turned next to another extremely important part of the protective organization — the appointment and training of air raid wardens.

Clarence D. Blessed of 271 Roosevelt Place accepted the council's appointment as chief air raid warden and, as soon as the area had been divided into zones, began to select zone wardens.

The zoning itself was a much larger job than one would suppose. One reason was that detailed maps of the entire area were almost nonexistent (although Wayne county later supplied excellent ones).

The council of defense did have at its disposal, however, statistics arranged by political subdivisions and for expediency's sake decided to follow the boundary lines of the communities in determining zones.

The following five zones were accordingly laid out and subdivided into districts: A—Grosse Pointe Park, 10 districts; B—City of Grosse Pointe and Grosse Pointe Farms, 10 districts; C—Grosse Pointe Shores, three districts; D—Grosse Pointe Woods, eight districts; E—Gratiot township, eight districts.

Parenthetically, visitors often wonder why Grosse Pointe zones are subdivided into "districts," for in Detroit and everywhere else the subdivisions are called "sectors." The reason is that Grosse Pointe's OCD was completely organized while the rest of the country was still wondering what to call zone subdivisions.

When at last the national and state OCD decided on the term "sectors," Grosse Pointe clung with an obstinacy which might be called justifiable — to "districts."

Zone wardens were chosen by Mr. Blessed, and each selected two alternates as well as a warden (who also had alternates) for each district. The five zone wardens are: A—M. H. Collinson, 704 Westchester; B—Hiram Walker, 68 Muskoka; C—Sherwood Reekie, 69 Renaud road; D—Lawrence D. Marr, 1463 Anita; E—Ray Johnson, 20320 East Eight Mile road.

Mr. Blessed's deputies, each of whom is empowered to act, in his absence, as chief warden for the area, are: John Sutton, 175 Merriweather; William Gillett, 782 Westchester, and Miss Frances Booth, 17000 Maumee.

Hundreds of volunteers' names were on file in the OCD headquarters when the zone wardens began to select their alternates and district wardens. So great was the flood of volunteers that the council of de-

fense authorized the appointment of a full-time paid secretary.

This position was first filled by Mrs. Douglas Crane, who kept the volunteers classified alphabetically, according to capabilities, according to addresses and in other ways. The council had forms printed and purchased filing cabinets. The Neighborhood club provided an office and most of the equipment, such as typewriters.

Mrs. Crane resigned last July because of illness, and the secretaryship has been filled since by Mrs. Ruth G. McGee. Neil Blondell, who has acted as salvage chairman, has also been treasurer for the OCD.

Lambert F. Whetstone, headmaster of Detroit University School and Grosse Pointe Country Day School, accepted appointment as OCD educational director. He immediately took advanced courses in gas and fire defense, first aid and kindred subjects and then transmitted this specialized training to some 20 others who served as class instructors.

Playing prominent parts in the instruction work have been Wardens Gillett and Walker and Mrs. Raymond B. Baer, Howard Case, Mrs. Wilfred V. Casgrain, Andries Cole, Charles T. Ellis, Sidney Hall, Mrs. William Innes, Humphrey C. Jackson, Mrs. James W. Lee, William Mann, Robert E. Marshall, Kenneth L. Moore, Mrs. Harry L. Pierson and H. Leroy Schmeier.

First aid, gas defense and similar subjects were taught to wardens, volunteer policemen and firemen, bomb squads, rescue and decontamination squad workers, drivers, messengers and other groups.

On completing their courses these workers received diplomas at mass meetings.

The wardens have maintained a closely knit organization. Every man and woman in the service knows who is empowered to give orders in case of an alert. Each knows his fellow workers.

How rapidly the defense mechanism can be activated has been shown in the four test blackouts. From the master control center the word goes forth, and in a matter of minutes every warden from Mr. Blessed down to the one in the smallest district is at his post.

A wardens' headquarters was established in July at which two volunteer workers are constantly on duty, working in shifts from 8:30 a.m. until midnight. For a time the office was even kept open 24 hours a day, but Mr. Blessed and his aides decided that, beginning Nov. 1, the midnight-to-8:30 a.m. shift could be abandoned on the ground that such super-vigilance was not required.

This does not mean that the speed of an early morning alert would be in any way lessened. Mr. Blessed or one of his deputies is constantly on call. Grosse Pointe will not be caught napping.

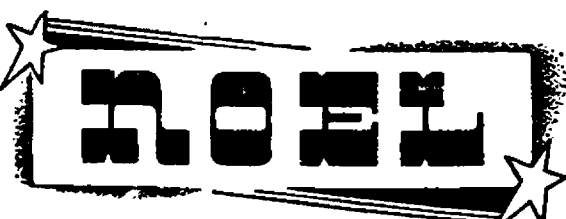

## Holiday Splendid Opportunity to Save Waste Fats

Cook Hitler's goose with kitchen fats by taking them to the nearest meat market today! Pointe butchers are more than willing to accept the strained grease in tin containers, and housewives are urged to save cooking grease, especially this week of Christmas when the fat from the fowl is extremely precious and should be saved.

There was a dispute but a short

time ago to determine whether or not the entire grease from fowl was to be used in the making of gravy. The chef of the famous Chicago Palmer House refuted those who said there would be none left for victory by proving that but a small portion need be used for gravy and the rest can be saved for important war uses.

One pound of waste pan, broiler or roaster drippings will make enough glycerine to fire four .37 mm. anti-aircraft shells. From one-quarter to one-half pound of fat goes down the drain or in the garbage weekly in every American home. If

half of this were salvaged it would total between 500 million and one billion pounds of fat a year for war use.

Remember, the Nazis started a fat salvage program in 1937 when they installed grease traps in kitchen sinks, rebuilt sewage systems so fats and greases could be recovered from them, boiled animal carcasses for fat. Conservation was strictly enforced and, to date, lack of fats has not affected morale nor are they a vulnerable point in the German war machine.

Save and strain that waste fat today! Place it in a tin container, not glass due to possible breakage, and when you have a pound take it to your local meat market! If every housewife in America saved only four ounces of waste cooking fats a week, there'd be enough glycerine rendered for 13,000,000 pounds of gun powder! Start saving today!

## Ceiling Prices Placed on Honey and Wax

Ceiling prices have been placed on honey and beeswax by the OPA, according to notification received by the State Department of Agriculture.

The ceiling on honey is 12 cents a pound for U. S. No. 1 or better, 10

cents shipping point. The price on beeswax has been established at 4 1/2 cents a pound, f. o. b. apiary, while the trade price is 4 3/4 cents.

## High School Adds Additional Courses for Next Semester

Grosse Pointe high school in announcing its program of studies for next semester includes nine additional courses to those which have been offered. These additional courses have been added in response to the recommendation of the United States office of education to prepare better our youth to meet the need for specialists in the Army and Navy, to give additional preparation to young men and women taking their places in industry, business, and work on the home front. Over 63 per cent of the jobs in the armed forces are now of a technical nature.

The recommendation of the United States office of education is based on the great need for more young men trained in automotive mechanics, telegraph and telephone repair, radio operation and repair, international code, touch typing, shop work, and also the increasing need for more workers, especially girls and women in industry and business, child care, home nursing, etc.

Another new feature in the program next semester will be a five period per week special course for boys in calisthenics, military track, and contact sports. A high school committee has completed bulletins recommending special programs including the new courses and allowing other changes in view of the recent board of education action which modified somewhat the requirements for graduation beginning June, 1943. The new courses are Fundamentals of Shop Work, Electricity, Machines, Automotive Mechanics, and Radio, Machine Tool Operation, Precision Inspection, Preflight Aeronautics, Calisthenics, Military Track and Contact sports.

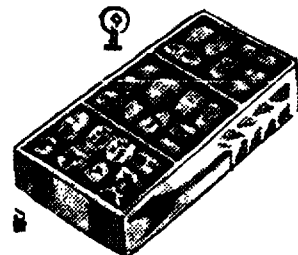
In addition to these, there have been extensive modifications in many existing courses.
