Senior High School Students Relieve Fuel Oil Situation

Coming to the immediate rescue of the Grosse Pointe ration board on Friday with the approval of W. R. Clemenson, principal, the senior members of the high school got out 2,000 fuel oil coupons in answer to the board's plea for more volunteers. "The young people did an excellent job," said L. M. Bartlett, director of pupil personnel and a member of the rationing board. "They are to be highly commended for their willingness to help and their efficiency and speed in handling the applications."

There were but few errors, and the fuel oil coupons were all quickly checked after the senior students had carefully "tailored" them. All citizens should be grateful for the aid the volunteer workers, and the students gave in working for the board. The job was a tremendous one and took a great deal of time to accomplish. At the present time all fuel oil coupons have been distributed.

Should anyone feel that an error had been made in his fuel allotment, the board assures him that they will gladly recheck the coupons. However, they ask that everyone refrain from doing this at the present time as they are still confronted with some supplemental gas rationations and some fuel oil users who have just made application. They request that fuel users exchange the coupons they have in their possession at the present time and make any complaint as to their proportionate cut at a later date.

Insufficient Evidence Releases Two Men

Victor Moghan and William Dermier were brought from the county jail Friday by Detective Sergis R. Butts and A. Louwers for examination at 4 p. m. on a charge of attempted breaking and entering. For lack of sufficient evidence they were released. However, federal authorities are awaiting a warrant from Washington for Moghan in regard to a parole violation. He will be released from the penitentiary there he had been imprisoned on a mail theft charge. It is thought that Dermier will join the armed forces.

13,000 USE LOCAL POST OFFICE

Over 1,000 Kiddies Get Toys They Want With Citizens' Help

A happy Christmas will be assured over one thousand youngsters because of the work the Toy club is doing, a check-up of this year's work to date discloses. Mothers of from six to seven hundred boys and girls had already visited the club headquarters by Monday morning to select from the vast store of toys collected there, the gifts which their children had been asking Santa to bring them this Christmas. In addition to this the club also donated toys for the 50 orphan boys and girls who were entertained by the Rotary club at a huge Christmas party Monday afternoon. They are sending loads of toys to inmates at the Marine hospital, the Sigma Gamma house and other institutions throughout the county.

Last year was the first time the Toy club called upon the mothers and asked them to come to the club's headquarters and select the gifts for their own children. In previous years members of the club had selected the gifts themselves, but they introduced the new feature in order to make the gifts even more delightful to the tiny recipients for the mothers know just what their youngsters really want.

In addition to the toys, thirty or more aged persons receiving aid from the welfare department are being helped.

Henry Fiel, Park police chief, was chairman of the drive this year; George Dansbury, Farms fire chief, was the secretary-treasurer. The Toy club's worthy cause, that of providing needy Pointe children with toys, was accomplished through (Continued on Page 7.)

Grosse Pointe Boy Again Hero in Daring Raid Over German-Occupied Europe

Grosse Pointe's ace flier and number one hero of World War II is none other than Lieut. Edward P. Maliszewski, of the U. S. Army Air Corps, son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Maliszewski of 1347 Bedford road. Veteran of two previous miraculous raids on Nov. 8 and Dec. 12, Lieut. Maliszewski piloted some of the famed P-51 Mustangs in the raid over the fortress in which the Germans had been holed out. The flight was one of the most daring and successful in the history of the war. Lieut. Maliszewski was one of the few who were able to land safely after the raid. He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for his part in the raid. (Continued on Page 5.)

Should the chimes arrive in time to be installed, they will be used in special services at the close of a Christmas Novena, at 11:30 p. m. prior to the midnight mass. If they are not received before Christmas, dedication exercises will be held on New Years.

Costing \$1,500, the Bernardin chimes are renowned for their beauty of one and will prove a wonderful asset to the Grosse Pointe area, as well as a fine tribute to the service men.

Need for Continuing of Postal Facilities Seen by Committee

At least thirteen thousand persons have made use of the so-called "Christmas" post office for Grosse Pointe residents at 17140 Maumee from Friday, Dec. 11 through Monday, Dec. 21, inclusive. This alone shows the popularity and the necessity of having postal facilities available in this area, but the fact that \$8,000 worth of stamps were sold for letters and parcel post packages further substantiates this fact.

The amount of mail dispatched during the above-mentioned days resulted in 59 pouches of first class mail; 584 sacks of parcel post packages; and 200 outside packages. There were 3,500 parcels insured. In part, the above figures are approximate, although the computation for Dec. 11 through the 19th, inclusive, when 12,000 people visited the post office, is exact.

Government Asks Pointers to Lend Axis Ship Pictures

An urgent request to Grosse Pointe civilians to lend pictures, which they may have of Axis ships, particularly warships, was made this week by the government, with the explanation that the knowledge which may be obtained from them may prove of great material aid to the Allied cause.

The only available pictures for military and naval use are in the hands of former sightseers and travelers and the government is asking camera enthusiasts to send either film or prints of Japanese, German and Italian ships to Castle Films, 30 Rockefeller Plaza, New York City. Movie footage, both 8 mm. and 15 mm. is also wanted.

Even though pictures may be from five to 10 years old, they still have military value. They will be duplicated and returned to the owner in their original condition officials say.

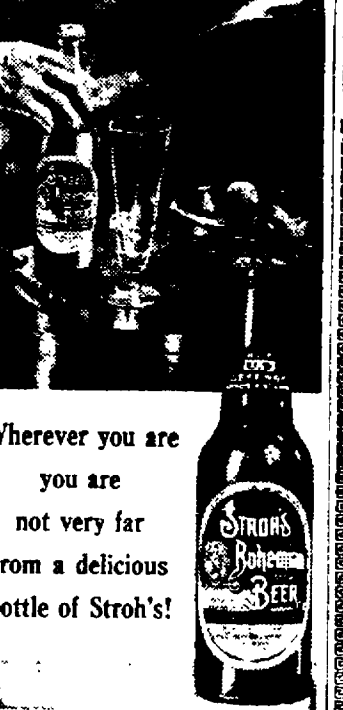
Lieutenant Maliszewski was decorated for valor after his first raid into France on Nov. 8. He has been honored by being interviewed by King George.

The starter switch continues to operate and the lamp flashes on and off, or glows steadily at both ends. These are warning signals. 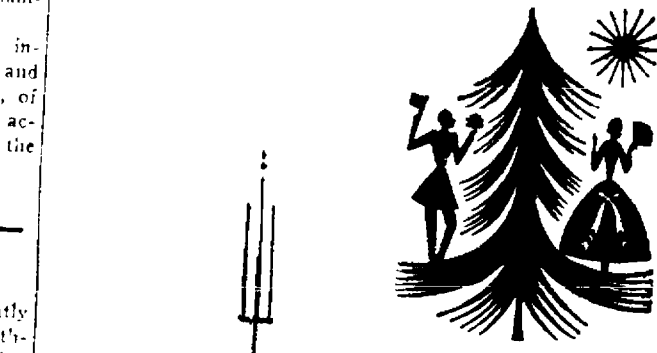

The Toy club began in a small way 10 years ago when a group of generous-hearted Pointers decided to buy and distribute Christmas toys to the children of poor families. The idea grew until now the club receives contributions from local citizens which total a sum large enough to provide toys for hundreds of children.

When visiting the club's headquarters one sees a veritable storehouse of dolls, games, children's furniture, water colors, and too-numerous-to-mention toys. Each toy is selected with great care so that toys suitable for both boys and girls of every age and type are available. Special talent toys such as paints, and musical toys and educational toys as well as simple games for amusement only are all included in this year's selection.

The work of the club is not confined to the Christmas season alone. Immediately after Christmas, Toy Club executives begin to select and buy in toys for the next year, buying up the stock left over from the holidays which can be bought at a much-reduced price.

Today, Wednesday, is the last day that gifts will be distributed at the club. After that time, whatever gifts are left will be donated to various orphanages.

Remember that your annual dues of 50 cents and the enrollment of your entire family made the Toy Club's slogan, "Not a Kid Without a Toy for Christmas," possible. You have done your share in bringing joy and happiness to some little needy boy or girl or some little orphan or crippled child.

(Continued from Page One.) congratulate Leland F. Lindow, postmaster in charge of the Grosse Pointe office, and his competent staff on their successful work during the Christmas rush. Congressman Rabaut is also to be extended a vote of thanks for his earnest efforts in bringing the facilities to the Pointe upon the inspiration of Norbert P. Neff, city clerk, whose letter to The Review first made the idea known. The whole enterprise was followed through in but six short weeks, and as a result thousands of dollars have been spent in the Pointe post office.

When one stops to consider the important role this little post office on Maumee has played in the nationwide effort to conserve tires and gasoline, one is astounded. By not having to drive to the nearest post office at Kercheval and Marlborough approximately 50,000 miles of travel was eliminated for 13,000 people traveling about 4 1/2 miles round trip would have used gasoline and rubber for that amount of driving.

Then, too, about six thousand hours of waiting have been done away with for it took on the average of five minutes for each person to be served in the Pointe post office, and they would probably have waited about a half hour in the crowded station at Kercheval and Marlborough.

Norbert P. Neff, city clerk, says he received many letters reiterating the phrase, "Don't Give It Up," for citizens are anxious for the post office to continue in operation instead of closing on Dec. 24 at 5 p.m., as scheduled at present. If you are desirous of continuing to enjoy the convenient Pointe post office at its present location, write at once to Norbert P. Neff, city clerk, at 17130 Maumee, and make it known that you want these handy facilities to be permanent.

The postage rates will continue to be two cents for all Detroit mail even if Grosse Pointe's post office is a thing of reality, for it will be a branch of the Detroit office.

At the present time registered mail and war bonds and stamps are not handled at the Maumee office, but it is hoped that these may be added if the post office is continued. Write today if you would have the post office continued.
