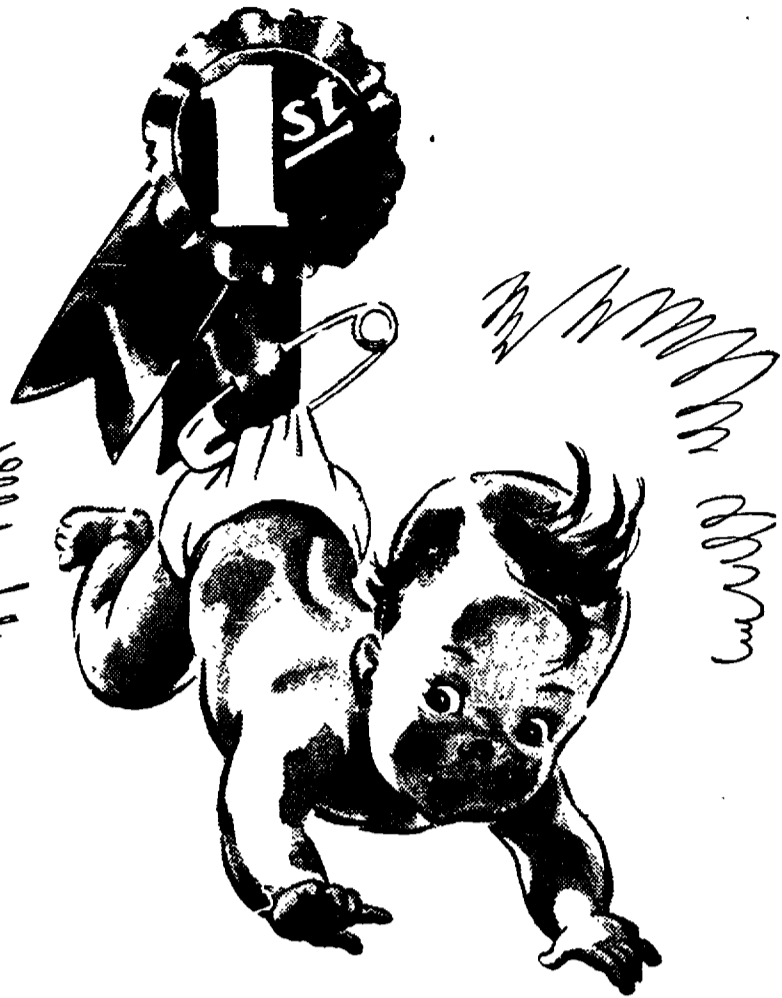








Army life is no bed of roses, but if we fail to realize the acuteness of our conflict, we might have no roses whatsoever.

I, as many of my "buddies" in the service, realize the sacrifices that our fellow citizens in civilian life are trying to make to make this army the finest fighting force in the world.

We, as soldiers, thank our public in general, and they in turn may well be proud of the type of military personnel the Army produces.

To maintain and uphold our ideals and principles of American progressiveness, no sacrifice can be too small or too large on the part of either the civilian or the military.

We are writing to express our gratitude for what you and your newspaper did for us during the campaign on Proposal No. 2, the so-called "Home Rule" Amendment. Your help was doubly appreciated because of the persistent campaign in favor of the amendment on the part of two Detroit newspapers. You supported the best interests of the people in your community at a time when every vote counted. In fact, many believed that our battle was lost before the campaign even started, because the opposition was so powerful, so deeply entrenched, and so well financed.

The final report from the State Board of Canvassers, Nov. 23rd, gave 432,164 "yes" votes against 455,320 "no's," or a majority of 23,156 against State Proposal No. 2. Only 10 counties, five Upper Peninsula and five urban, gave a "yes" majority. In Wayne county, the combined vote of the 11 cities and 18 townships outside of Detroit was a majority "no," while from Detroit, itself, the "yes" margin was only a third of what its advocates had anticipated.

Again, we thank you for your valuable assistance in informing your fellow citizens about the dangers in State Proposal No. 2, and for your help in causing its defeat.

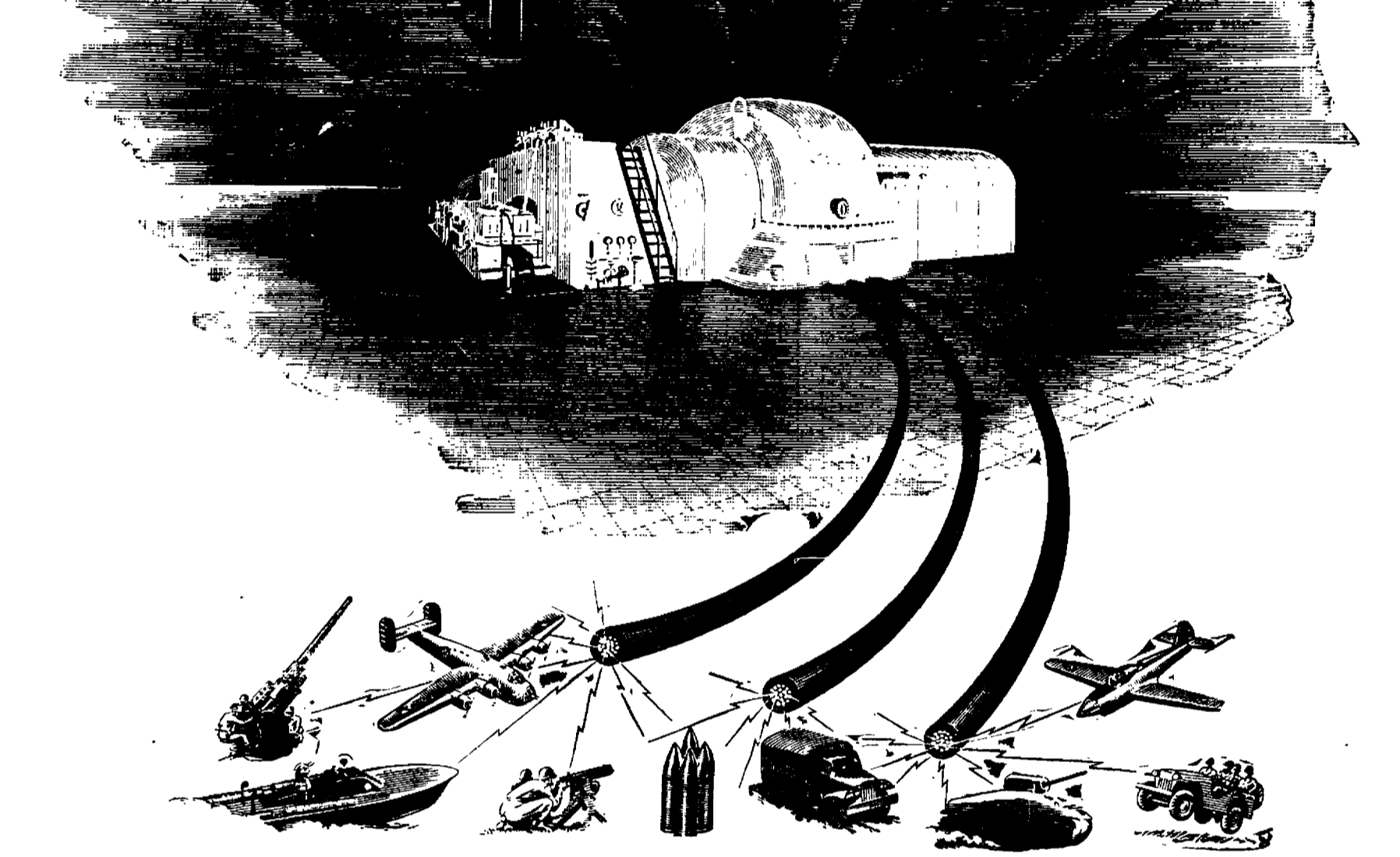
