The electric induction furnace is an important tool in helping to speed up war production . . . and it is most unusual in its manner of operation. An Ordinance PROVIDING FOR COMPLIANCE WITH VICTORY TAX

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE ORDAINS:

Section 1. Deduction to be made. That, beginning with the first payroll after January 1, 1943, the City Deputy Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to deduct and withhold from the wages or salary paid to each officer or employee of the City, the Victory Tax in such an amount as is required by the Revenue Act of 1942, based on the wage bracket withholding authorized under Section 466(c)(1) of the act (or 8% of the amount thereof) on every payroll.

Section 2. Accumulation, depositing and payment of funds. The City Deputy Treasurer at the time of making up the payroll or immediately thereafter, shall transfer the monies deducted therefrom under the provisions of this ordinance to a separate liability account and this account will be designated as a "Victory Tax Account, to the credit of the Collector of Internal Revenue. The monies accumulated from such withholdings during each quarter of the calendar year shall be paid by the City Deputy Treasurer to the United States Collector of Internal Revenue for the District in which this City is located on or before the last day of the month following the close of any such quarter.

Section 3. Report of Tax Withheld. On or before January 31st of each year subsequent to 1943, or when the last payment of wages is made, if employment is terminated before the close of the calendar year, the Deputy Treasurer shall furnish to each employee with respect to his employment during the calendar year, a written statement showing the wages for the period covered and the amount of the tax withheld and paid in respect to such wages. A copy of this statement for every employee shall be included with the final return for the calendar year to the Collector of Internal Revenue. The aforesaid officer shall keep such records and make such reports to the Bureau of Internal Revenue of the Bureau of Internal Revenue collected and paid in respect thereto as that Bureau may require and prescribe.

Section 4. Termination. The taxes to be withheld and collected under this ordinance shall not apply to any taxable year commencing after the date of cessation of hostilities in the present war and the account established for the collection of the tax funds hereunder shall be closed with the last payment to the Federal Government of the funds withheld. The operation of this ordinance shall terminate at the time of the cessation of hostilities as determined by the Revenue Act of 1942 and any action taken prior to that time.

Section 5. Amendment. The provisions of all ordinances or parts thereof now in effect relating to the payroll procedures of this City in connection with or with the provisions of the Revenue Act of 1942 shall be amended to conform thereto to the extent modified.

Section 6. Emergency. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and to meet the requirements of the Revenue Act of 1942 and to take effect immediately.
