SHOULD FATHERS BE DRAFTED

Whether fathers should be drafted into the Army is undoubtedly one of the most discussed topics of the day...

On the one side, the Army says that to have an army of over 10,000,000 men, it is essential to draft fathers on a wholesale scale...

One thing is certain, a terrific amount of resistance is going to be met at home over any advent of taking fathers by the scores as long as single men remain at home...

Then, too, it would seem that before drafting fathers begins on a large scale, it would seem advisable that some regulations be adopted about dependency...

If it becomes necessary to break up homes, it would seem only common sense to take those men whose families can get along before taking those whose families would become public charges.

IF DISASTER DOES COME

Perhaps we dwell too much upon the possibility of a disaster striking the serene Grosse Pointes...

Let us suppose, for example, that by some means (no matter by what route, or how) an enemy block-buster bomb, earmarked for industrial Detroit, would be dropped by mistake in residential Grosse Pointe...

With the twisted condition of street markers throughout the area, we wonder just where they would go. Our hypothetical raid would certainly have far more disastrous effects if rescue squads, ambulances, fire fighters, doctors and nurses were unable to go directly to the spot...

Aside from the disaster angle, every day vital gasoline, oil and rubber are consumed, needlessly, because visitors or deliverymen are forced to cruise around looking for streets, which should otherwise be easily found...

This is a problem for every municipality to work out. It should be the duty of the commission of every Pointe village to instruct its highway and street department to remedy the situation at once...

(Continued from Page One.) service. Each week the number increases. Over five hundred boxes have been sent out so far. Each recipient, picked at random from an ever growing list, is asked to write in acknowledgment and send his picture in return...

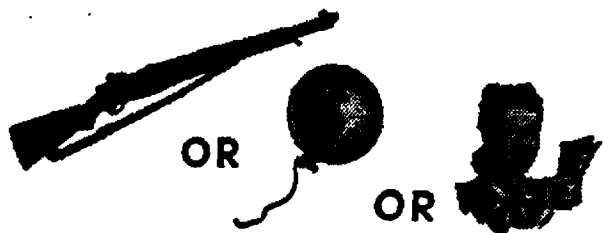

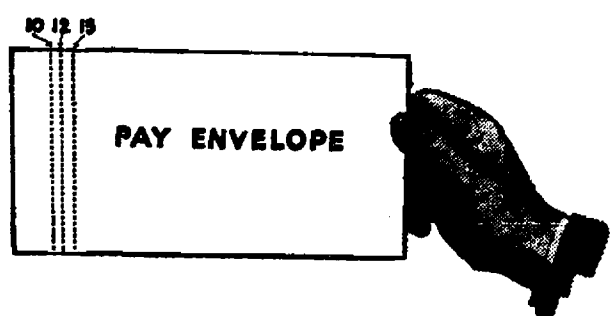
