The Electorate Should Speak

Although no contest exists in the township election on Monday, April 5, residents of Grosse Pointe township and the City of Grosse Pointe owe it to themselves and to the proper administration of our government to take a voice in the selection of county and state officials, as well as to declare themselves on certain state and township proposals and propositions, which will be submitted at that time.

Proposal No. 1, to be submitted to the electors of Michigan is a proposed constitutional amendment extending the term of office of township officers from one year to two years.

For the township, two separate propositions will be submitted. The first is the proposition of approving a resolution of the township board, providing a salary of \$5,000 annually to the township supervisor and a salary of \$3,600 annually to the township clerk in place of all per diem pay for certain services.

Serious consideration should be given all county and state officials seeking office. And, a full expression on the state and township proposals by a substantial majority of the electorate is to be desired.

The Other Side of the Zoning Situation

Both sides of the zoning question in the City of Grosse Pointe have not been given a hearing in the remas of publicity covering the arrest of Mrs. Pearl Adams over renting rooms to war workers.

One cannot fail to find sympathy for a woman who has sons serving our country, if it is true, nor respect for her efforts to make a living, while at the same time attempting to provide housing for war workers.

But, the fact remains that she entered the City of Grosse Pointe, if not with complete knowledge in advance, and obviously took over a property which was too large for her needs. And, as soon as she violated the city's ordinance by taking in roomers, she was completely advised of that law.

The question has also been raised as to why Mrs. Adams came all of the way from Trowbridge in Detroit, to Grosse Pointe to open a rooming house, when there are many similar mansions, in non-restricted zones available.

One needs only to look at Congress avenue and Lafayette properties, which in their day were comparable in value to the one in question, to raise the question of whether or not the development in the City of Grosse Pointe has reached the stage where the encouragement of such similar condition is to be permitted.

Regardless of what court the case is taken to, the fact remains that the city's zoning ordinance was made to protect large investments of property owners of that municipality. Relaxation of the rules would serve to depreciate the value of the real estate affected, as well as that surrounding it.

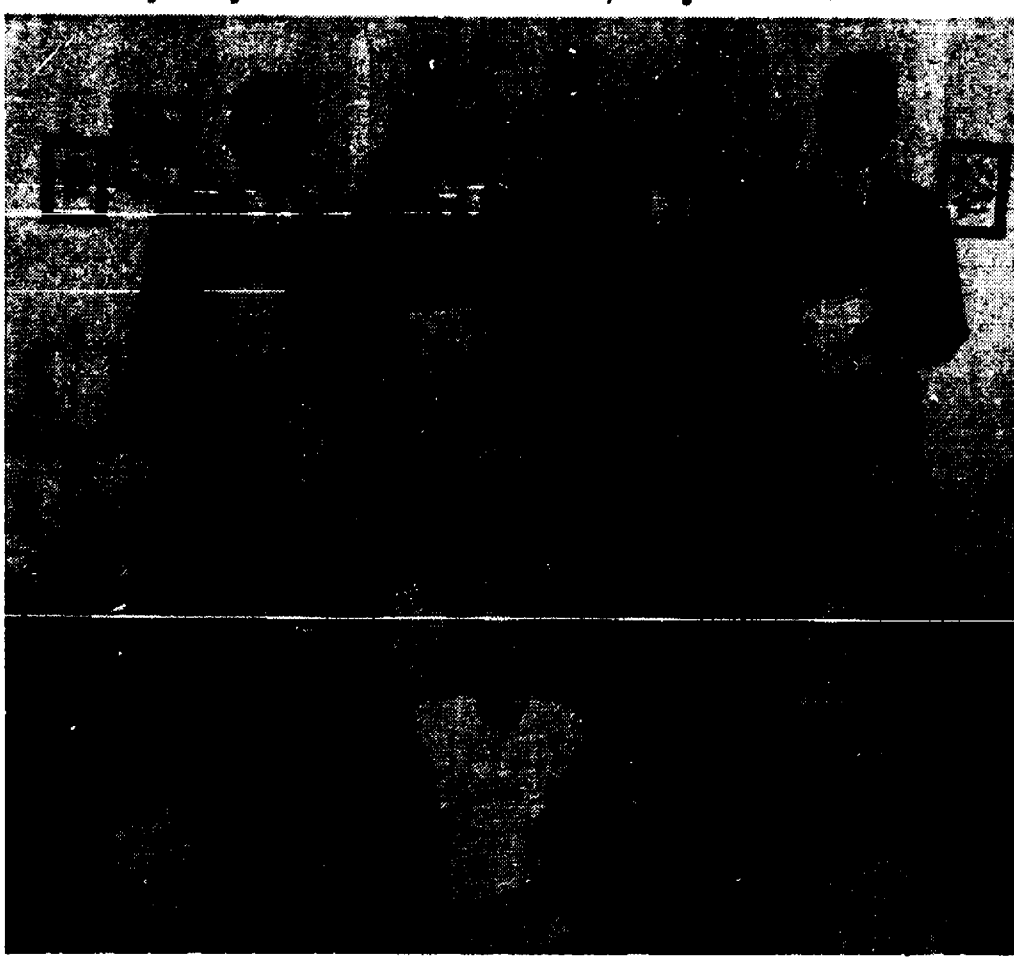

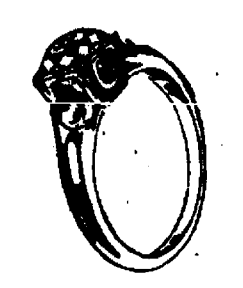

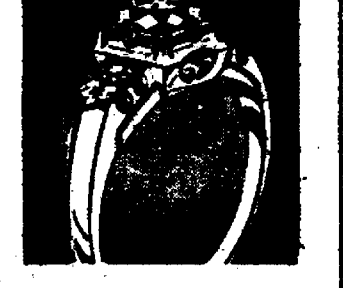

Ziegler Outlines Pledges on State Highway Office

Charles M. Ziegler, Republican candidate for state highway commissioner, today made the following statement: "If I am elected state highway commissioner, the state highway department will be operated on an efficient and business-like basis and with trustworthy and courteous personnel. All persons having business with the department will find a friendly greeting and welcome at the department's office at all times."

The only requirement with regards to contractor's bonds will be that they must meet all the legal requirements set up by the department, to properly safeguard the interests of the taxpayers and of the department. The practice of directing the contractors as to where they shall purchase such bonds will be stopped the day I enter the office."

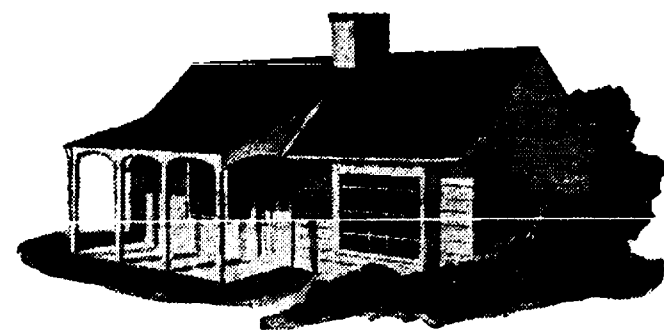
