Leanwhile, jobbers with parts which bicycle builders (not manufacturers) use to assemble bicycles, have quietly offered their wares, such as coaster brakes, tires, frames, wheels, etc., o dealers at scandalously high prices. The result is that a dealar is forced to ask more for a used bike, which has been aspembled, partly from new parts and partly from old, than he would get from a Victory bike. Because some old parts are pised in assembling a practically new bicycle from costly new parts, no priority is required. The dealer has to pay the jobber be manufacturer his price, or do without the parts he needs to build up bicycles. He can't possibly exist on the limited sale of bikes on priority. It is impossible for a dealer to ask more than the limits of reason allow. However, somehow, somewhere slong the line, someone is doing some profiteering, or some-thing nearly akin to it.






