An operations officer, Captain Stone was on a bombing mission when his plane fell into the Mediterranean after a collision with another plane off the coast of Sicily. Although no survivors were seen, it is entirely possible that he may have been taken prisoner and his family and friends are not giving up hope.

### Grosse Pointe Youth Reported Casualty in Japanese Prison Camp in Philippine Islands

Grosse Pointe's first service man to succumb in a Japanese prison camp was made known Sunday when the war department notified Mrs. Allen J. McDonald, 824 Rivard boulevard, that her brother, Sergt. Louis F. Berendt, had died on June 30 in the Philippine Islands while a prisoner of the Japanese government.

Text of the telegram follows: "Report now received from the Japanese government through the International Red Cross that your brother, Sergt. Louis F. Berendt, who was previously reported a prisoner of war, died on June 30 in the Philippine Islands. The secretary of war shares your grief and extends deepest sympathy. Letter follows."

Sergeant Berendt was reported missing in action after the fall of Corregidor, where he had retreated with General MacArthur and General Wainwright's men after the fall of Bataan. It was not until last April that Mrs. McDonald and another sister, Mrs. Charles Frick, 1055 Philip, Detroit, knew that their brother was alive and a prisoner of the Japanese.

A nation-wide, door-to-door collection campaign for "old" phonograph records began Saturday, July 4, because of the tremendous demand for music and entertainment from the armed forces in overseas service. The President's war relief committee heading the plea for records of the Army and Navy representatives.

### Asks Consideration Given Problems Facing Commission

During the month of May a goodly number of residents of Grosse Pointe Woods were annoyed, suffered losses and were angered because of flooded basements. A smaller number have felt that some of the flooding was due to negligence or lack of alertness on the part of some agents, employees or officials of the village and for that reason have a legal claim and should collect damages from the village.

While it is conceded that residents of the Woods may be justified to a degree in being annoyed and angered by the floods, and while it is highly regrettable that anyone should suffer losses of any kind at any time from water backing up into the basements, it would be just as regrettable that any resident or group of residents should press claims to collect damages from the village.

This statement is made not in criticism of those who have such intentions but rather as an appeal to them to consider the facts leading up to the catastrophes that occurred in May.

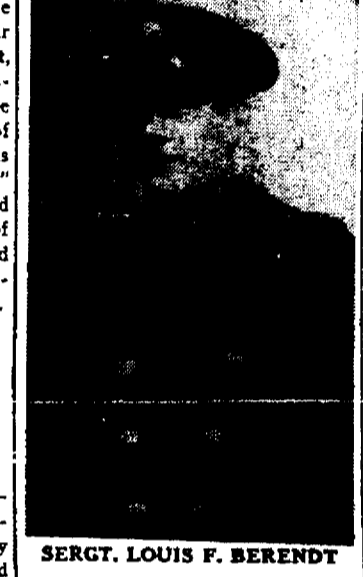
The facts are briefly as follows:

- 1. Between the years 1932 to 1938...

the finances of the village were in a bad way due to it having been over-sold on a great many improvements by the real estate developers of the 1927-1929 boom era. The improvements were all financed by borrowing the money by bonding the village. During the depression years very few (about thirty-five per cent) of the property owners paid their taxes, with the result that bonds were defaulted and the credit of the village was ruined.

2. In 1938 our first refunding plan was set up and the debt and interest burden eased to a great degree, but it was not until the 1940 refunding plan was set up that the credit of Grosse Pointe Woods was re-established. Both of these plans reduced our indebtedness to a large degree and reduced our interest payments considerably.

3. In the year 1938, our rapid growth began and we increased our population from 1,300 to 6,000 in less than four years. During the years 1940-1941 and 1942, our financial credit was again used to the limit to furnish pavements, lateral sewers and water mains that the residents of the village demanded. Also...

### Ration Board Again Urges Public to Apply at Once for Basic 'A' Book Gas Renewal

Application forms for renewing basic gasoline rations are now available at local filling stations and other centrally located places, and should be picked up by motorists and motorcyclists as soon as possible. A. A. Guesquiere, chairman of the Grosse Pointe war price and rationing board, reminded the motoring public today.

The forms must be filled out and sent to the rationing board in order to get new "A" and "D" coupon books to take the place of present ones which expire on July 21. To save the public time and trouble, arrangements have been completed to handle the renewals by mail. Mr. Guesquiere said.

### ments of course increased the load on our sewer system and while it is still adequate under normal conditions, when such highly abnormal conditions occur as did in May and on several other occasions, all of our sewage facilities are inadequate to dispose of the huge amounts of flood waters. Plus this, our troubles have been aggravated twenty-fold because our neighbors to the west have also had a building boom and as they have no sewer system of their own and must depend in large upon open ditches for their drainage, which all find outlet through Grosse Pointe Woods, overflowing our streets and sewers because we are downstream from them. The unusually heavy snow and rainfall, especially the latter in May, plus the extremely high water levels in the lake and Milk river, which are our outlets, have, of course, greatly complicated matters. All of these have set records for a 15-year period.

5. The village commission has, during the past five years, consistently, even with changing membership on it, taken the following steps in sequence of importance, as they appeared to them:

- a. Furnishing the local improvements as demanded by the residents.
- b. Entering into a raw sewage disposal plan for sanitary reasons and because it was demanded by the Michigan state health department.
- c. The providing of an adequate water supply.

The increasing of facilities to handle storm water drainage.

The last mentioned was just getting under way and developing into a comprehensive plan when the United States entered the war and all projects of such nature were virtually stopped. However, certain projects of a minor nature have continued in the attempt to give relief from storm waters. These have consisted of widening and deepening of ditches, culverts and outlets and improvements on our existing pumping stations.

During the winter, a firm of engineers was engaged to design an additional pumping station and also to increase the capacity of our Mackinac road station, in order to sell the WPS the extra storm water needed and thereby acquire proceeds to build...

Germany's belated thrust at Russia will have a telling story to reveal as the weeks slip into months. Meanwhile, here on the home front, we lie in position for the first savage blow of sabotage. That is, if the riot wasn't the first. We can be sure of this much. The Axis isn't going to let the "Arsenal of Democracy" escape a thrust of some sort. It can take most any form and that is why we should all, always be on the alert.

Honestly speaking, we would welcome a surprise blackout or daytime alert and we may have one. We are inclined to believe that somewhat of a panic would be created. We don't expect the Axis to send a 40-ton tank roaring down Kercheval avenue, such as the one from Selfridge Field Monday. But, those who saw and heard the thundering roar of Army equipment hastening to the downtown parade, couldn't help but pause to think how much of a surprise it gave them. How about enemy aircraft overhead?

Now comes a good one. A Park policeman's car was stolen right on Kercheval avenue in Grosse Pointe Park. We wonder if there is any connection between such brazen thievery and the fact that the Park force is shy three men via the lay-off route. Could it be that hoodlums are taking advantage of the situation already?



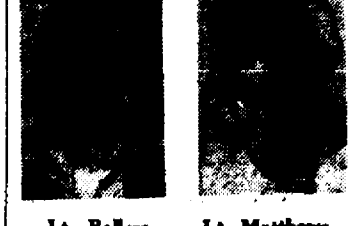
It is about high time I wrote a brief note of thanks and to let you know how much I enjoy receiving your paper here in New Guinea.



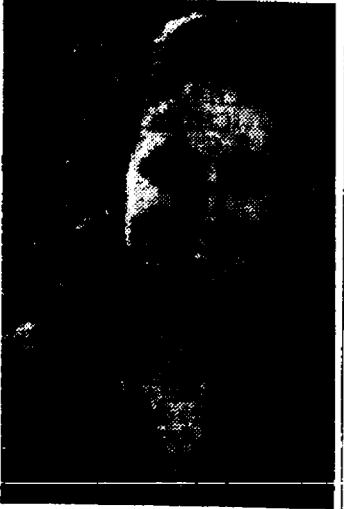

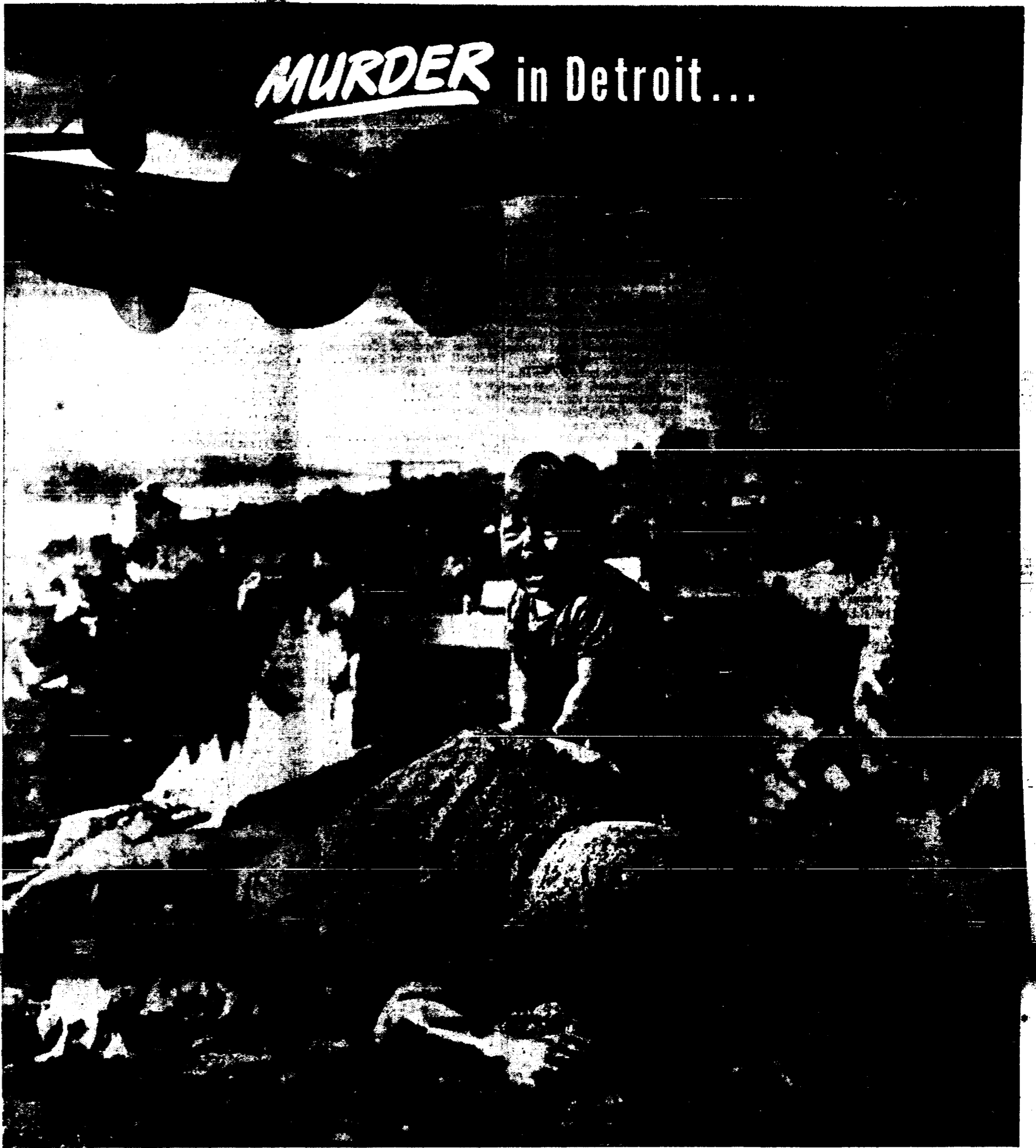

Don't keep a "snow-man" in your refrigerator— IT COSTS YOU MONEY! Warm weather means an added burden on your refrigerator. The hotter the weather, the harder it works to keep things cool. If you notice a "snow-man" forming inside—heavy frost on the cooling coils—it's time to get busy and defrost the refrigerator. That layer of frost is costing you money: It means that the refrigerator must work overtime to absorb heat through a blanket of frost around the cooling coils. And for economical operation, the motor should run as little as possible. It's only human to keep "putting-off" the chore of defrosting—especially in summer, when ice cubes are in big demand and you hesitate to have your refrigerator out of commission even for a few hours. But see that it is done regularly. Do not use an ice pick or a sharp instrument to remove ice; this sometimes punctures the refrigerating coils. After defrosting, wash the whole interior (coils, shelves, trays, etc.) with lukewarm water and mild soap. Unless the motor of your refrigerator is hermetically sealed, have it oiled and inspected periodically. Remember that your refrigerator must last for the duration. Treat it accordingly! The Detroit Edison Company.

Constructive criticism and suggestion and spurring on will accomplish the task but demands by the few for better positions and special consideration because they have suffered more, will spread to others until such a commotion is raised that the whole boat load will be upset. We hope the homely illustration will be pardoned, but just what could happen to the whole economic structure of the village if enough of its residents were able to get judgments for claims. The situation would be such that our credit would again be hurt to such a degree that no improvements could be financed for some time to come. It must also be remembered that any claims collected from the village is later reflected in tax bills of those who collect claims.

But, however, regrettable it seems to us that anyone should file claims, it is still a fact that anyone who thinks he has been injured by the village may do so by the methods as set up in the village charter. The charter provides on page 80, section 14 and 15, that such claims must be filed within 60 days of the date the injury occurs and that such claims against the village must be served on the president or clerk. The way is open to do this and in all fairness we must publicize the facts but it is still hoped that our appeal will be heeded and that before anyone files the claims they will stop to again consider the facts; to consider the ultimate results that may occur and to consider the community spirit and neighborliness of the village and decide to sacrifice present remuneration for future benefits. We are suffering the growing pains of a young and new community but if given a little chance and encouragement, we will grow to be the wonderful village we all desire it to be.

To All Block Leaders: Our work for the next two weeks will be: A brown paper campaign—An acute shortage exists, requiring an emergency campaign. Used brown paper boxes, brown corrugated paper and boxes, bags and heavy wrapping paper are urgently needed to fill increased war demands for paper products. Your brown waste paper will be converted into bomb bands, victory containers and other essential military needs.

Here is an emergency for each Neighborhood War club to do its share in this emergency. Each block leader is asked to conduct a waste paper campaign in her unit, under her own direction or that of her salvage chairman or committee, stressing the point that brown paper is most urgently needed, although all waste paper, such as old newspapers, is to be collected.
