Fire Department Praised for Quick Action at Fire

Fire Chief Chauvin, City of Grosse Pointe, received a letter of thanks from Dr. Alfred Whittaker, for the efficient workmanship of the department shown at a fire at his home.

The project is open to all residents of the Grosse Pointes and Gratiot township, who may come and do their own canning in pressure cookers which have been obtained thru priorities. Appointments must be made by calling the board of education, Niagara 2000, extension 25.

The center will be open Monday through Friday, from 9:45 to 5 for the canning of non-acid vegetables only.

For the first week, any quantity desired may be brought. This rule may have to be changed for succeeding weeks.

Prospective canners may bring their own jars, or may purchase them at the center. A nominal charge of three cents per jar will be made for the use of the fine equipment at the high school.

It is advised that, for the best results, all vegetables should be young, tender and freshly picked. Jars should be washed at home and jar rubbers and two dish towels brought along.

Please cut this out for reference: Approximate number of quarts of canned vegetables obtainable from one bushel:

- Beans about 16 qts. Beets about 24 qts. Greens about 6 qts. Peas in pod about 14 qts. Carrots about 20 qts.

If You Can't Pay — You Cannot Drive; Says New Law

LANSING. — Because automobile license plates may be taken away

from the owner under provisions of the new motor vehicle financial responsibility law, drivers who formerly continued to operate their cars after their driver's license had been revoked can be effectively dealt with when the new law takes effect July 30, state officials believe.

Police frequently pick up traffic offenders only to find that they are driving illegally, and that their operator's license has been suspended for a previous violation. They gamble on not getting caught, and they know their chances are good unless they get into another accident or are recognized by an officer who knows of the suspension.

"It is these repeaters — these irresponsible and chronic violators — that the new financial responsibility law is particularly designed to reach," according to Herman H. Dignan, secretary of state, who is charged with administering the new law. "They comprise only a small percentage of all drivers but are involved in too high a proportion of all accidents.

Local Ration Board Releases Rubber Czar's Driving Tips

The following explanatory message from the rubber czar, William M. Jeffers to Prentiss M. Brown, price administrator, relative to the tire and synthetic rubber situation has been released for public information by local rationing board 8212.

Prentiss M. Brown, Price Administrator, Washington, D. C.

"I know you and your organization here fully realize the necessity for strict adherence to the announced tire conservation regulation particularly during the next few months. We will be making synthetic rubber but there will inevitably be some delay in fabricating it into passenger car tires because of shortage of facilities, equipment and manpower.

Reports from all over the country indicate that it will help your local boards perform their duty in holding down mileage and thereby reducing the number of requests for new tires if the public were better informed of these facts. I hope and believe it would help all concerned to get through this critical period if you would impress upon your boards and in turn have them advise the people in their community that all conservation measures should be strictly adhered to. We do not want to be forced to impose any new and more drastic regulations other than limiting eligibility for Grade III tires but this may have to be done if present regulations and advice does not bring the necessary results to tide us all over this period while we are scraping the bottom of the barrel for tires to keep essential cars in service. The people should not request new tires that are not absolutely needed and all used tires should be kept in service until recapping is necessary and then recapped before asking to have them replaced with new tires. I am confident that in possession of the facts the American public will co-operate to achieve our goal of keeping cars rolling. I hope that by sometime in 1944 our supply of rubber and tires may be adequate to enable us to remove most if not all of the existing regulations."

Streets Receiving Coating of Rock, Tar in G. P. Farms

Throughout the past few weeks, various intersections in Grosse Pointe Farms have had a treatment of tar and crushed stone.

This has been done to seal and preserve the present pavement, which has had its top layer of concrete chipped and broken. By spreading tar and a double layer of crushed rock at these corners, a new surface job will be accomplished. After approximately three weeks, the road crews gather any of the excessive rock which has not been absorbed into the tar.

This method of re-surfacing roads is the most inexpensive method, for it costs only four per cent of the original investment for maintenance.

The most damaged intersections have been resurfaced because the amount of material has been only one third of the requested amount.



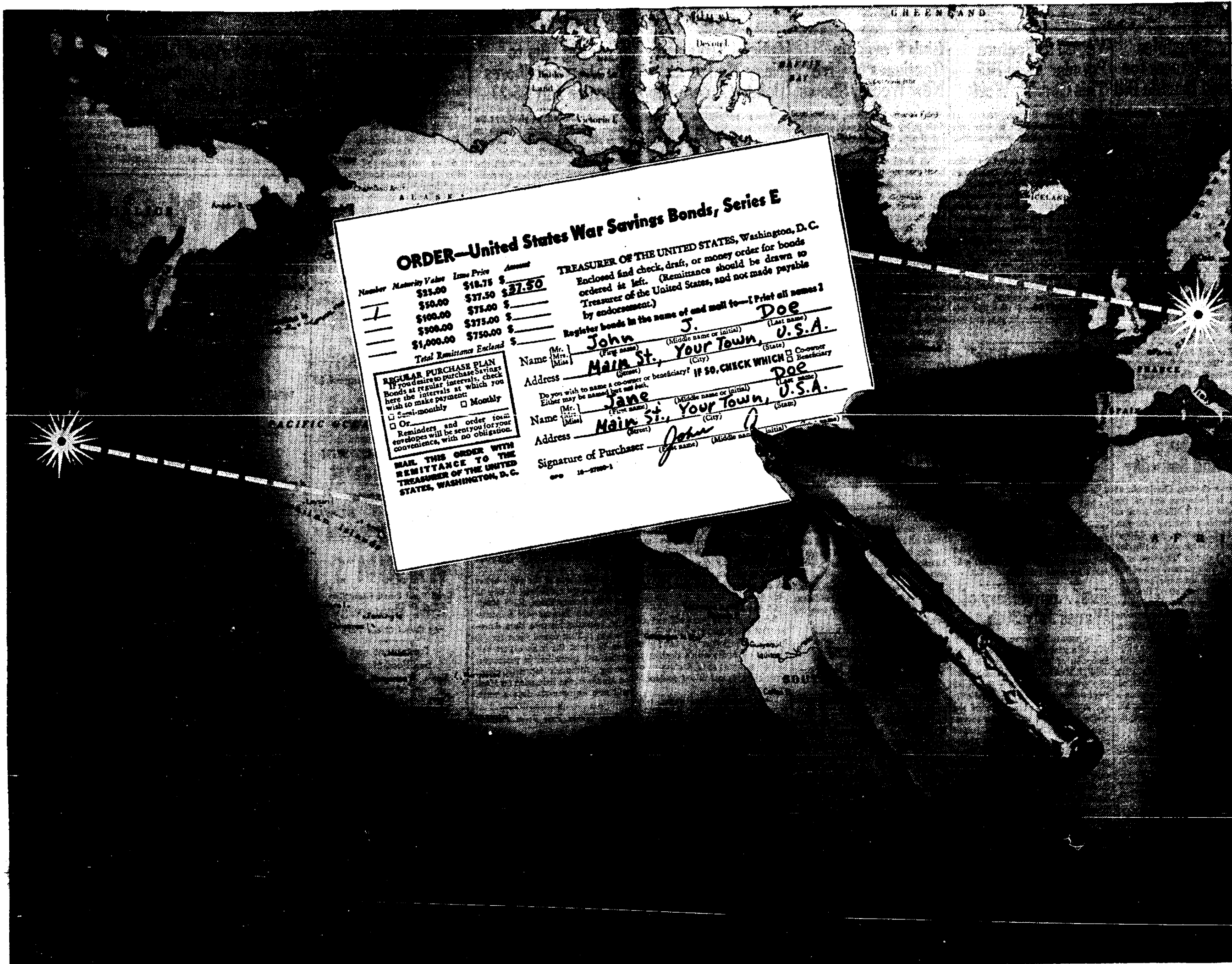
