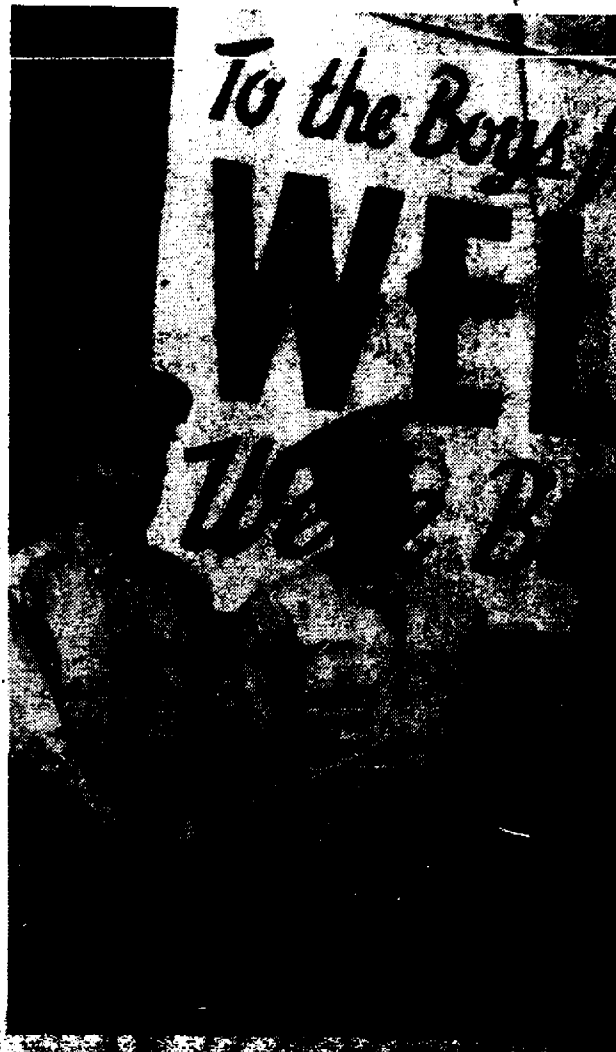

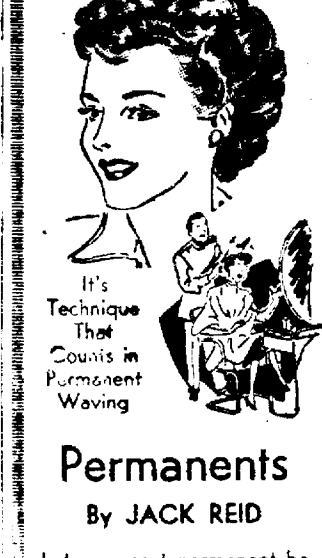

Nebraska July 18, 1943 Dear Mom: I will try to drop you a line and tell you why I haven't written you sooner. Well, here is my excuse. Last Sunday about 10 in the morning, the sarge came into the barracks and asked for fellows who weren't afraid of work and who would want to help Uncle Sam out in a big way. We asked how he told us it would be farming. Well, we all jumped on the sarge. We went into the barracks and the sarge told us we would be paid. The farmers needed us with guns and we were this good to go. The man I worked for the first day was named Cobbs. He was a swell person to work for. Sunday was the best day that I could get. He made me so much at home that I didn't have a chance to be sick. They were preparing dinner and he said I just had to eat. I didn't want

The High Seas, Aug. 4, 1943 To Uncle Sam, His Nieces and Nephews: Today, August 4, is my birthday. There are 153 candles on my birthday cake. I became a part of America's first sea-going armed force way back in 1790. My shipmates range from 17 to 70.

It started when President George Washington issued a commission to America's first sea-going officer, Hopley Yeaton of the United States Coast Guard. Since then I have rescued lives, property, and assisted many a vessel in distress. I have chased pirates and rum-runners, and right now I'm having the time of my life chasing Nazis and Japs.

Sorry I don't have time to stop and look at all my birthday cards, but you see, since the war started I've had the job of landing Yanks at Guadalcanal and on the beaches at North Africa, in addition to sinking subs. I've been pretty busy. As a matter of fact, right now my mind is on Fortress Europe. When I took the boys ashore at Sicily, they said they were pretty anxious to keep on going. I expect to be showing off for Hitler-Land any day now.

Government Care for Crop of 19 Hundred Babies in Michigan More than nineteen hundred wives of men in the armed forces have applied to the Michigan department of health for maternity and pediatric care since June 6, according to an announcement made recently by Dr. H. Allen Moyer, state health commissioner.

Funds for this care have been provided by congress for wives of enlisted men serving in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps or Coast Guard, and medical and nursing care for their babies. The funds allocated to Michigan are being administered by the state health department in accordance with a plan approved by the children's bureau of the U. S. department of labor.

The funds provide for medical care before the baby is born and at childbirth, whether the mother stays at home or goes to a hospital, she and her baby may receive medical and nursing care. Complete maternity care is provided including a final physical examination six weeks after the baby is born, and the baby may receive medical care during the first year of life if he is acutely ill.

Some wives are under the impression that payment can be made directly to them. Doctor Moyer points out that a children's bureau ruling requires that all payments be made to the physician or to the hospital on receipt of detailed statements of services rendered. Eligible applicants may obtain application blanks from their physicians, the local health department or the local Post Office.

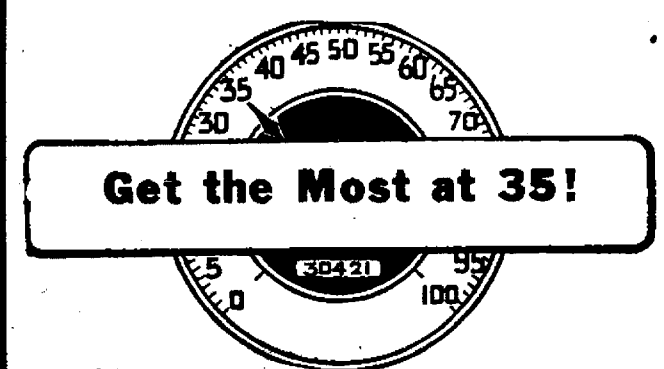

And there are these birds who continue to defy the OPA in an effort to protect their ample tummies and save a tailor's bill. But, far more astonishing, is a four-foot tomato plant, with ripe tomatoes—growing out of a semi-concrete base over around Maumee and St. Clair, while most plants are hardly above the ground.

**How to STOP FUSE TROUBLE**

*before it happens!*

It's no fun sitting in the dark simply because a blown fuse has plunged your house into a black-out. Most fuse trouble can be stopped before it happens by observing a few simple precautions.

(1) Frayed lamp cords and extension cords are often responsible for short circuits. Such frayed cords are dangerous. Have them repaired BEFORE they cause trouble. (Don't loop cords over a nail. Don't kink cords or tie them in knots. Don't run cord through a door jamb or under rugs.) (2) Never put an electric appliance in water. Never poke at the element of your electric toaster (or any other appliance) with a fork or sharp tool, whether turned on or off. (3) Don't connect too many appliances and extra lamps on one circuit. (4) Be careful not to overload your washer, or feed too many pieces of clothing through the wringer at one time. The same is true of your ironer. (5) Disconnect appliances by pulling on the plug—never jerk out the cord. Do not let cords come in contact with water, grease or acids. (6) If a faulty lamp or appliance burns out a fuse, disconnect it at once—and don't use again until it has been repaired. The Detroit Edison Company.
