Park to Resurface Four Streets Soon; Asking for Bids

Four streets in Grosse Pointe Park are to be resurfaced in the next few weeks with an inch and a half compacted single course wearing surface of bituminous concrete mix. Payment of this job will come from weight and gasoline taxes.

The resurfacing will be done on Beaconsfield, from Charlevoix to Vernor highway; Bedford, between Windmill Pointe and Jefferson; Harvard, from Mack to 200 feet south of Maumee, and Wayburn, between Mack and Vernor highway. Crack and hole filling will also be done.

Lane Assigns Rhodent Blame

Village Manager E. R. Lane, of Grosse Pointe Park, laid the rat problem in the laps of the residents Monday evening at the village council meeting. At that time he gave a detailed report on the serious rodent problem which is facing the village.

He said the solution of this situation would have to come from the residents themselves with one hundred per cent co-operation on everyone's part. Through much investigation, he found that the people could eliminate much of the trouble by keeping their refuse containers closed tight, by not allowing rubbish to go uncovered, to close up holes, cracks and runs in lawns, gardens, house and garage foundations.

The request for placing a bounty on rats is condemned by boards of health because of the great danger of contracting disease from the rats, whether they are dead or alive. Mr. Lane stated that over 40 per cent of rats carry jaundice and fever germs; and at all times, people

should wear gloves when handling them.

When asked the best procedure one should follow to kill the rats, Lane advised three methods: Poisoning, trapping and fumigation. He continued by saying that the village will fumigate any runway with carbon monoxide, and that it also has a limited amount of "Red Swill" poison which is recommended by the department of health.

A survey was made in some of the larger cities of the country, and it was found that these communities have spent fabulous sums of money trying to curb this same problem. If any one locality was rid of the pests, it was only for a short time, because the rats returned in three months.

One community in Ohio reported that one couple raised rats to collect the bounty which was paid for them. Manager Lane concluded by saying that the problem can be met and lessened to a greater degree, if everyone took it upon themselves to kill the pests in their own vicinity.

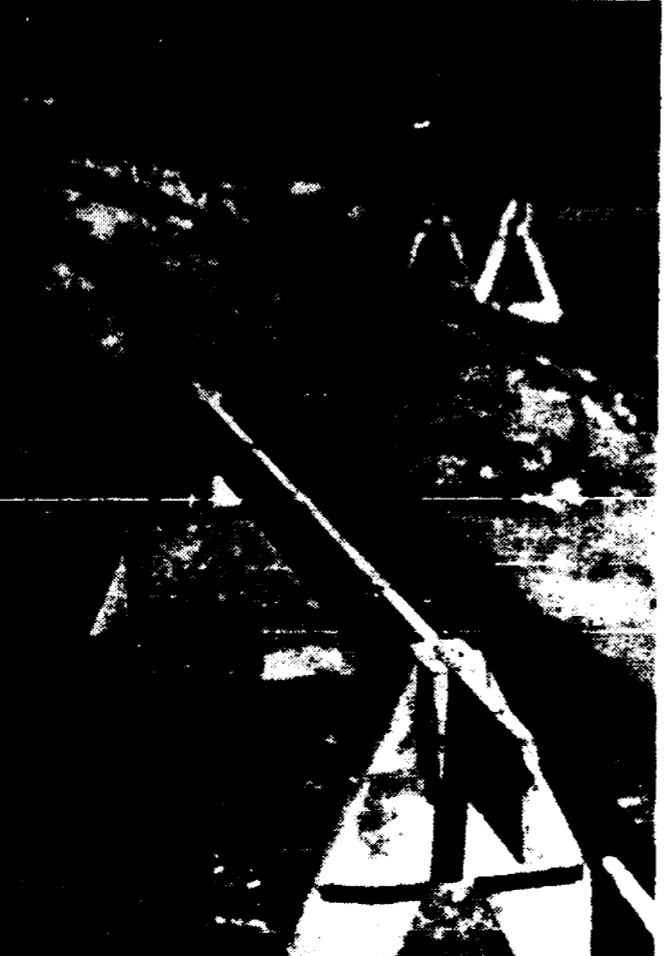
Man Arrested on Morals Charge Here

Fifteen Planes from Women's Corps of CAP Participate

The Women's corps of the Civilian Air Patrol found the Grosse Pointe area an easy target for bombing Tuesday night at 7:51 as a screen of 15 planes rained some 900 simulated incendiary, demolition and gas bombs on the villages.

Only the village of Grosse Pointe Shores escaped as a target of the Women's corps of the CAP. The narrow strip bordering the lake was missed by missiles as the wind carried them off the target.

Coming over at approximately 3,000 feet "bombs" found their first

mark around a garage in the rear of the Fisher-Record Motor Sales lot at 14900 Kercheval, where six bombs fell in the yard and alley and four on top of a garage. These were the "incendiary type, with pink streamers. The bombs were retrieved by women wardens Mary Hill and Mary Brown and reported to headquarters.

Each municipality had incidents calling forth all facilities of the area OCD, including all wardens, fire fighters, messenger corps, ambulance corps, motor corps, gas fighters, etc. Every municipality had set fires, casualties, gas and utility incidents.

Joseph A. Dennison, of Lansing, observed the alert in the Pointes as the official representative for Capt. Donald S. Leonard, state director of the OCD. Mr. Dennison complimented the Grosse Pointe area defense set-up in stating that all services functioned smoothly and with speedy efficiency.

Paying Guests Banned at Park

The village commission of Grosse Pointe Park moved swiftly Monday night to reduce the inroads of non-residents upon the lakefront park by eliminating the privilege of taking guests into the park upon payment of a twenty-five cent fee.

This step means that for the balance of this year and until further notice, Park residents will be allowed only the twenty free guests permitted on their guest card and property owners who are non-residents will be allowed only their ten guests as permitted by their pink guest cards. No additional guests will be allowed on payment of the twenty-five cent fee.

The new ruling went into effect Tuesday, August 10. Over running of the water front

park by hundreds of residents of Detroit and other communities who are not entitled to the use of these facilities prompted a real investigation by a committee of some twenty-five Park residents headed by Dr. and Mrs. Lyndie Martin, who early placed the matter in the hands of Homer C. Fritsch, commissioner of the park. The matter had previously been called to the attention of Mr. Fritsch by other complaints of violations and abuses at the park.

The meeting of the committee on Tuesday night, Aug. 3, was attended by representative citizens who had voluntarily been observing on the gate at the park to investigate the intrusions of rules and general disorder occasioned by the large crowds (Continued on Page 6.)

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

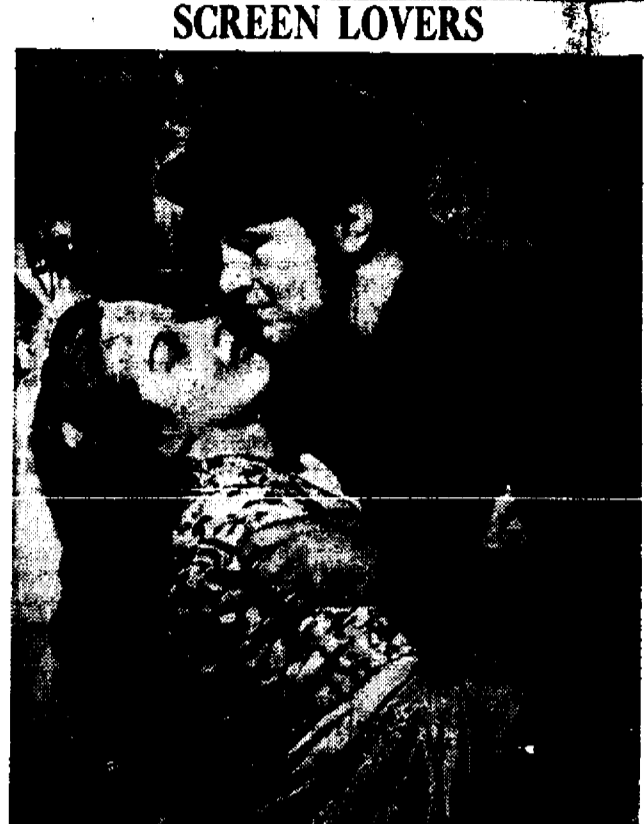

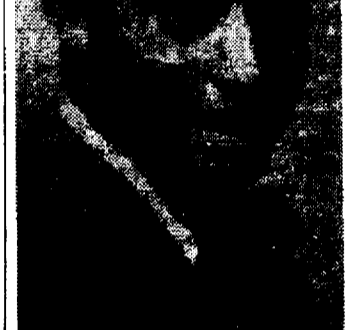

Plan Expansion of Work-Experience Program for Pointe High School Students

In an effort to co-operate with industry and business in meeting the present manpower shortage and also in order to provide students with practical working experience, Grosse Pointe high school last year inaugurated a Work Experience program. Approximately 70 students were enrolled in this program during the past semester.

Plans are now being formulated to expand this project for the coming school year for students in the 11th and 12th grades. The usual plan will be to so arrange a student's schedule that he will be in school for half a day and then will be working the other half day. Insofar as possible, an effort will be made to dovetail two students to the same job. Under this plan, one student would be on the job in the morning and another student would be on the same job in the afternoon.

Students who are either juniors or seniors and who are interested in being enrolled in the Work Experience program are urged to sign up at the high school not later than Aug. 31. Such students should see either

Mr. Peterson, field counsellor, or Walter Clemenson, principal.

The following criteria will be used in considering the application of each student interested in the Work Experience program:

1. Will the pupil benefit from the experience gained in the particular job under consideration?
2. Can the student's schedule of classes be satisfactorily arranged so as to permit part-time work?
3. Is the student qualified for the particular job for which he is being considered?

The present plan is to give five hours credit to each student who is enrolled with the field counsellor in the Work Experience program and who completes in a satisfactory manner his job for one semester. The student's adjustment and progress in his work will be checked periodically by the field counsellor.

At the conclusion of the semester, the student's work will be evaluated by his particular employer and this report will be the basis for a regular semester mark.

YOUR REFRIGERATOR. Don't overcrowd your refrigerator or put hot dishes on the shelves to cool. Have refrigerator inspected periodically, and defrost regularly. Don't open door any oftener than necessary. Locate refrigerator away from heat sources.

YOUR RANGE. Use the deepwell cooker often—it's thrifty. Cook complete oven meals. Start your surface cooking on HIGH, then switch to LOW heat as soon as food comes to a full steam. Use very little water for cooking. Bringing large amounts of water to a boil wastes electricity. Foods should be steam-cooked (this helps conserve vitamins, too). On many electric ranges, cooking can be finished with stored heat from the surface units, after the current has been turned off.

YOUR OTHER APPLIANCES. Avoid overloading your electric washer. Do two washings instead of one, if need be. Don't run your washer longer than necessary—7 to 12 minutes per tubful is usually enough. If your electric iron hasn't a thermostat to control the heat, pull out the plug when the iron is hot enough—and attach the cord again when additional heat is needed. This saves electricity. The same thing is true of your toaster—disconnect it when temporarily not in use. Then plug it in again as needed. When baking or roasting in your electric cooker, don't waste heat by lifting the cover to "peek" at foods. The Detroit Edison Company.

(Continued from Page One.) of non-residents who were being infiltrated into the park.

During the last ten days, nearly five hundred park tickets have been confiscated when found not to be in the hands of rightfully qualified residents. Some were reported to have been sold by residents for sums of three dollars to as high as ten dollars.

The investigating committee, as well as Commissioner Fritsch, and members of the commission, stated bluntly that the responsibility for the situation at the waterfront park lies largely with residents of the Park who have failed to cooperate with the spirit of the rules as well as the letter of the law. An appeal was made by the committee and the commission that the residents of the Park immediately come to the assistance of the authorities in helping to preserve the park and its fine facilities for the use only of qualified residents of the Park and their respective guests.

Legal entrance into the park has been made by large groups of children and adults swimming around the fencing which stretches into the lake. Others have also attempted entrance by climbing over the fence, damaging a large portion of it. An attempt to curb this nuisance was made recently when park authorities strung barbed wire across the top of the fence.

J. C. Sage, a resident of Belford road, opened the discussion by commending Commissioner Fritsch and the members of the commission for their immediate move to remedy the situation and complimented the citizens committee who has devoted many hours to the study of the conditions which have been brought about. Mr. Sage pointed out that certain violations upon the part of village employees should be stopped at once, and was assured by the department heads that this would be handled immediately.

Another spokesman for the residents cited the case of a fireman's wife collecting fees from her guests. An explanatory open letter from the lady is published in this issue.

A list of nine recommendations submitted by the citizens committee was received by the commission who are taking them under advisement.

The recommendations include in short that guests purchase their park tickets from the park office at a quarter of the price of the park tickets, that a maximum of ten guests, that boat captains bring in their guests or leave guest list at

(Continued from Page One.) charged during this period with the transportation by air of equipment and supplies to forward areas in Papua and the cessation of casualties to the rear and although attacked by enemy aircraft, the group efficiently and successfully accomplished its assigned mission. Utilizing various types of unarmed aircraft an average of 200 planes a day was flown to the troops and casualties were evacuated daily. Several thousand planes, including artillery, were transported to battle areas by this means. The high degree of technical ability, the devotion to duty, and the excellent morale of the group as a whole made possible this outstanding contribution to the success of the campaign in this area.
