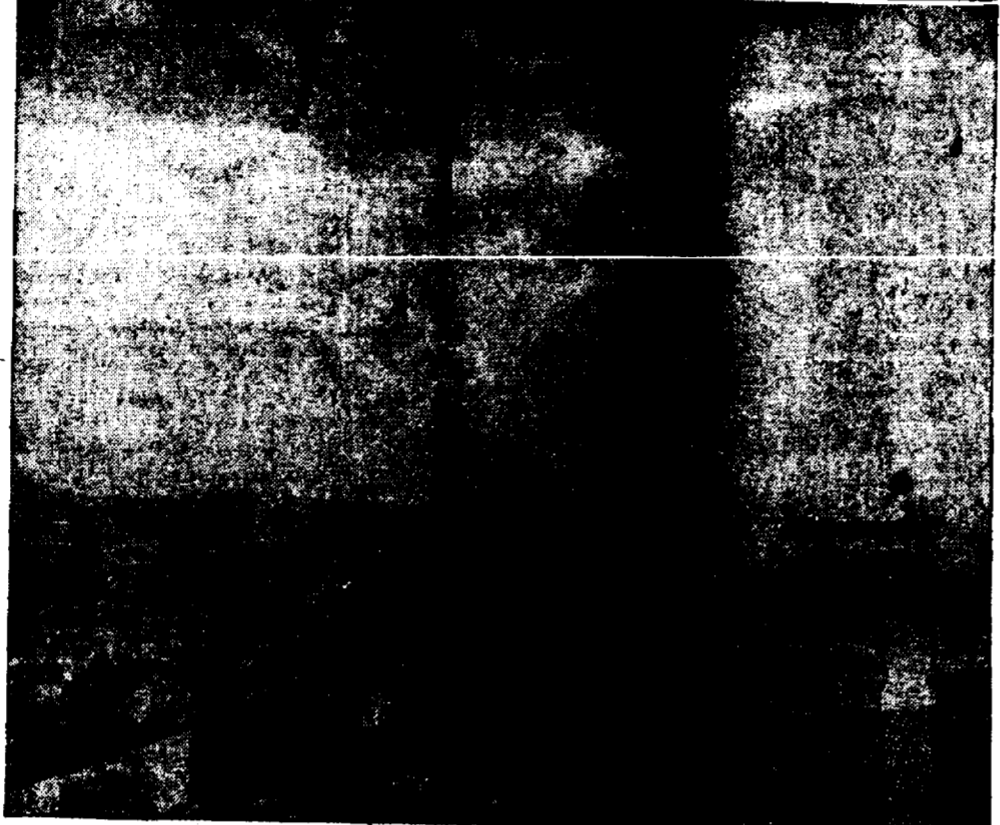

Draft Board Calls Two Large Groups for Month of August

Two of the heaviest draft calls have been scheduled by Selective Service Board 57, for the month of August. One call has already been made, and another is scheduled in 10 days. On Aug. 12, several bus loads of men left for the induction center in Detroit; 38 will report for active duty at Fort Cass on Sept. 2. Friday, Aug. 27, the second large call for the month will see married men called for induction. This is the first call in which the married men of the community will figure prominently. A call for the colored men who are working in Grosse Pointe, but who live in Detroit, is set for Monday

Patronage Drops in 'No-Pay Plan'

Attendance at the waterfront park in Grosse Pointe Park, took a decline since Tuesday of last week when paying guests were banned by commission action to stem the tide of overflow crowds of non-residents. Many reports reaching The Review from residents who expressed their approval of action taken by the commission for the benefit of the residents. Presence of a police officer at the Park on Friday and Saturday was also praised. Few objections were raised over the refusal to admit paying guests over the 20 free punches on resident guest tickets or 10 on pink tickets issued to property holders. Many residents reported that they had visited the park for the first time in many weeks. Police Conclude House Canvas for Owners of Dogs

Many residents of Grosse Pointe Woods were surprised to know that 581 dog licenses were given to the pet owners by members of the Woods police department who were making their yearly house to house canvas, issuing the licenses. Due to the food situation, many thought that a large decrease in licenses would be shown, but the total is the largest yet on the record. This procedure involved approximately a hundred hours of labor by the patrolmen. Police have not been requested to dispose of any dogs, and it is noticed throughout the village that very few dogs are running loose.

Farms Trustees Send Hoyt Matter to Police Committee

The Grosse Pointe Farms trustees at their Monday evening meeting, referred the request of Walter Hoyt for leave of absence to the police and fire committee for more consideration. The decision was made after various members discussed the request and the position he would assume upon his return from voluntary service in the armed forces. The trustees were afraid that any immediate action would set a precedent among the employees if they requested a leave of absence and were hesitant to express themselves on the specific question of the pension.

Farms Patrolman Resigns from Force

Patrolman John Reed, of the Farms police department sent his resignation to the village meeting, Monday evening, stating that his leave of absence will expire Sept. 1, and that he will not be able to return to the force due to private employment. The trustees accepted Mr. Reed's communication as his formal resignation.

Professional Thief Visits Pointe Store

The Edw. J. Pongraz, Jr., jewelry store on Kercheval avenue was robbed of a diamond ring, valued at approximately \$150 this week by a well dressed thief who victimized clerks in the absence of Mr. Pongraz. Finding none of the rings on display large enough, the customer, a man of some 35 years, gave his name as Bobby Gordon and asked that he be called at 2:30 at a local club by Mr. Pongraz to make an appointment to see some larger stones. Shortly after his departure, the ring was discovered missing from the tray and Bobby Gordon from the store. Mr. Pongraz is completely covered by insurance. Police and detectives are working on the case.

Victory Gardens Being Judged in State Contest

With final inspections under way in the local, county and state contests, 8,000 victory gardeners in 42 counties in Michigan will soon know just how good they are as horticulturists. Over 60 Grosse Pointe gardeners have entered this contest, and a preliminary judging was made July 15. A number of gardens which scored the highest will undergo another judging at the end of this month, it was announced by Vincent DePetris, head of the victory garden committee. State prizes totalling \$25,000 in war bonds and local county awards of approximately five thousand dollars are offered. Two trophies will be presented by Gov. Harry F. Kelly for the best farm and city gardens. The second and final judging inspection is already underway in other parts of the state, and a list of gardens is being selected for consideration in the state-wide contest. State judges will then visit the counties during a two week period beginning Aug. 30, after which the winners will be announced.

Water Pressure Is Upped by New Main in G. P. Woods

An increase from 19 to 55 pounds pressure has been noted by engineers who have been testing the pressure in the new water main in Grosse Pointe Woods, which was completed during the past week. Very little difficulty has been encountered in chlorinating the mains and only a short section remains to pass the state board of health's test. The main from the southern village line to Cook road has been in service for over a month, and the rest of the village can expect such service within a week or ten days.

Recording of Men in Service Nears Finish Line Here

Members at the board of education offices are busily compiling the totals of the names of the men in service who lived in the Grosse Pointe area. This work is fast approaching the end and the record will be released to the public soon. An added question was put to all residents of the Pointe as they were interviewed for the school census, concerning members of the household who were in service. This was noted on the census card from which the permanent record for Grosse Pointe is made.

Principal Requests Notice to Students

W. R. Cleminson, principal of the Grosse Pointe high school this week asked that the following notice be directed to new enrollees at the school: "Students transferring to Grosse Pointe high school from any schools other than the Grosse Pointe public schools should send a transcript of their record to Grosse Pointe high school before Sept. 1."—W. R. Cleminson.

Owner Must Remove Caterpillar Nests

A request was made at the Farms meeting for action regarding caterpillar nests in some trees on vacant lots on Vendome road. It was decided that unless the owner complies with the village's request to remove the pests, the village will do so and bill the owner. It was stated that these caterpillars are very destructive and will, in a short time, ruin most of the trees in the local vicinity.

Well, I haven't very much to write about today, but there appeared in one of the camp papers an article which I thought was rather funny so I'm going to copy it for you to read. The title is "Stars and Stripes Issues a Short Guide to the United States."

More Secrecy Asked
Capt. Donald S. Leonard, director of civilian defense, has informed civilian defense officials that all persons with knowledge of the exact location of air corps information and filter centers, as well as other air defense services and installations "regard this information as strictly confidential." The same applies to all control centers and district warning centers.

The request is in line with the security of information campaign being carried on by the federal government to prevent the leakage of important military data to the enemy.

"Not so many months ago, the war department issued guide books for soldiers shoving off for service overseas.

"They were filled with information on customs in other lands and designed to make Yanks social successes in England, Australia, China or Africa, by advising them on what to do or say, and what not to do or say.

"Now, with more than — Americans overseas, some of them for more than a year, The Stars and Stripes, Army newspaper finds it fitting to print a "Short Guide to the United States," for the benefit of veterans of the Tunisian, Solomon, and other campaigns, when it becomes necessary for them to return to the States and adjust themselves to the quaint ways of the home folks. Here are some of the excerpts:

"Americans usually open a conversation with strangers by asking, 'Well, what's new?' Whatever you do, don't reply 'Allez.' The only correct answer is to say, 'Well, what's new with you?'"

"The American monetary system is rather confusing. Regardless of their denomination, five, 10 and 20 dollar bills are all the same size. A nickel (worth only two and a half cents) is almost twice as large as a dime (worth five cents). Two-dollar bills are taboo and "natives" are extremely superstitious about them.

"In some parts of the United States, eggs in powdered form are unobtainable and you'll have no choice but to eat them directly from the shell. However, it is advisable to boil them first.

"In the rural districts, it is also difficult to get dried vegetables due to a lack of dehydrating equipment. You may be shocked to see beets, turnips, cabbages, and potatoes displayed in the market places in their natural state with bits of soil still clinging to them. Yet, when washed and properly prepared, these vegetables can be quite palatable. The "natives" seem to thrive on them.

"In restaurants, cafes, pharmacies and other public shops you will usually see three or four "natives" huddled in a corner over a strange contrivance with small iron balls, lights and bells that keep ringing.

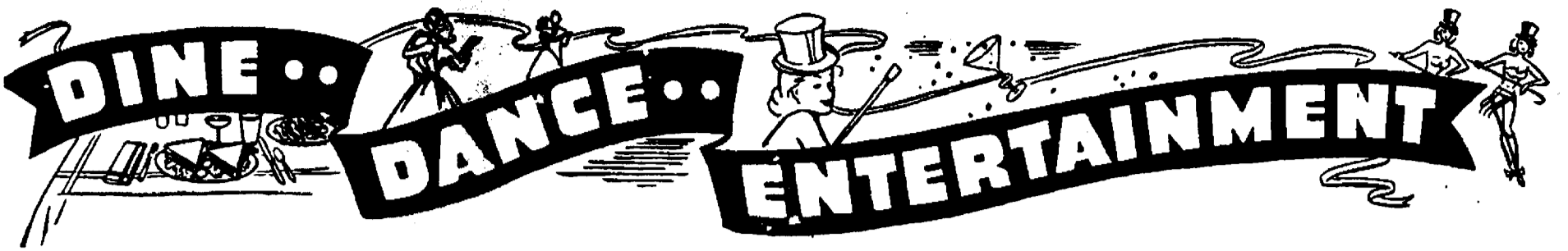

How to save ELECTRICITY



without sacrificing needed **LIGHT**

With fall evenings just around the corner, the matter of home lighting becomes doubly important. In many homes there will be increased demands for longer hours of eyework—extra studying, sewing and other seeing tasks. Fortunately, it is possible to make your present lamps and fixtures do double duty... and to save electricity without sacrificing needed light.

Here are a few practical suggestions: (1) Fitting dark-colored lamp shades with white linings can increase the amount of light from the lamp by as much as 50%. Use good white paper and fasten seam with Scotch tape. (2) Clean lamp bulbs and reflectors frequently. Dust and dirt may rob you of half the light you pay for. (3) Flaring lamp shades do a better job of spreading light than straight-sided shades. The wider the opening at top and bottom, the more useful light is directed into the room. (4) Whenever possible, make floor and table lamps serve more than one person for reading or sewing. A single lamp on a table, for example, can provide light for chairs on both sides of it. LANSING — The steady rise in Michigan highway travel speeds which started soon after the 35-mile an hour speed limit was ordered on state roads last October has halted, and there has been a slight decrease in the speed being maintained by drivers in the last few weeks according to a recent survey by the state highway department, Charles M. Ziegler, state highway commissioner, reported this week.

The July average of drivers' speed on Michigan highways was 39.1 miles an hour, compared to 39.3 miles in May and 39.9 miles in April, the commissioner reported.

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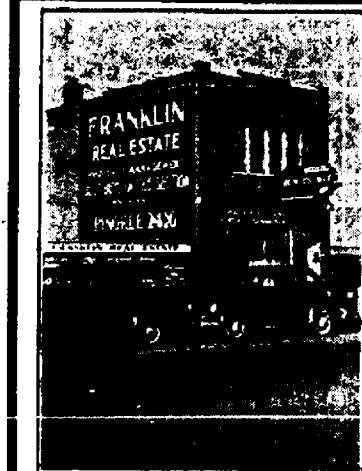
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
