



TOWNSHIP BOARD OF HEALTH HEAD RESIGNS

Extensive Post-War Program Suggested For Park

Village Mgr. Lane Maps Improvements to Total \$721,000

A total sum of \$721,000 has been proposed by Village Manager E. B. Lane of Grosse Pointe Park, as the amount of funds of the main essential projects necessary for safe and healthy environment conditions for the citizens of the Park, to be constructed in the post-war era.

These recommendations were given at the village commission meeting last Thursday evening in a report in which Lane stated, "I feel duty bound to devote the majority of my time to the larger problems of the village, omitting the unnecessary and minor things which have appeared so effective through public discussion during the past few months. The biggest jobs ahead of us are the planning and the effectiveness of a sound financial program which will carry us through the post-war period."

Preceding the recommendations, the financial status of the village was given as follows:

The gross indebtedness amounts to \$3,128,000. The present sinking fund for bond retirement totals \$997,766.18, which leaves a net total debt of \$2,130,233.82. The net per capita debt is approximately \$165.00. The average net per capita debt reported from 273 villages and cities in the Municipal Index is \$87 per capita subject to normal financial conditions. The village tax rate per thousand dollar valuation is divided as follows: General operation, \$9.64 and debt service \$7.14. Approximately forty-two cents of every tax dollar is spent on debt service.

Suspects Bound Over to Circuit Court at Examination Friday

Two men and a woman ended up behind bars last Thursday at the Grosse Pointe jail as the result of a short jaunt of shoplifting. They are Steve Klaczek, 22, of 3251 Tanager, his wife, Marjorie, 22; and Clarence Stevens, 25, of 6859 Gratiot; all of Detroit.

After city police received a tip from a local store on Kercheval, three people had just left the premises who appeared suspicious. Detective Sergt. Trombly and a scout crew apprehended the trio in the vicinity.

After questioning, they admitted being in the dress shop but denying anything. Their car was taken to the business section where Klaczek attempted to hide the items they had a car by throwing empty key case and certificate ownership behind some files in the chief's office.

The trunk of the car was found open and two dresses on the floor from the dress shop were found inside.

They were arraigned Friday by Justice Leslie Young with their names over to circuit court on \$500 bonds and two sureties. How they said he would accept \$100 bonds for each of the men and \$100 for the woman.

It was noted that both men have records of some 12 or 15 years. Clerks from the Edward Jewellery viewed the proceeds could not identify the goods.

Grosse Pointe Airman Reported 'Missing in Action' in Pacific; Decorated Four Times

Grosse Pointe's most-decorated aviator, World War II, Sgt. Francis Caldwell (Eddie) Caldwell, son of Mr. E. A. Caldwell, 1251 Beaubien, has been reported "missing in action" according to a communication received from the adjutant general by his parents.

On June 10, 1943, Caldwell was on a bomber, Sergeant Caldwell was presumed to have been shot down at or near Lae. His plane failed to return to base.

Meanwhile, Sergeant Caldwell's parents are awaiting additional information from the war department and with their many friends hoping that word will be received that the crew was taken prisoner or rescued by natives, known to be friendly in New Guinea.

Sergeant Caldwell has been decorated four times in addition to being singled out by Lieut. Gen. George C. Kenney, commanding officer in the Southwest Pacific area, and cited for extraordinary achievement by that officer. Recently, he was awarded Uncle Sam's highest honor conferred upon fliers when decorated with the Distinguished Flying Cross. Veteran of three previous crackups, he was decorated with the Order of the Purple Heart on April 16, after injuries received in a 100-mile-an-hour crash landing in his disabled ship, which had been shot up by Japs, and two members of the crew killed. This was on his thirteenth bombing mission and he was also awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action, following the sortie. The Army Air Medal was also conferred upon Sergeant Caldwell.

Sergeant Caldwell is a graduate of Grosse Pointe high school. He entered the service in the Army air corps in February, 1942. A brother, Wallace, is stationed at Fort Benning, Ga.

Dr. B. H. Warren Leaves Post After 25 Years of Service

Dr. B. H. Warren, veteran Grosse Pointe township health officer, effective Sept. 15, was revealed this week when Doctor Warren told The Review that he had tendered his resignation at a township board meeting on Monday, Aug. 23.

In commenting on his move, Doctor Warren stated that after 25 years of active service to the community, he wished to step down from the responsibility and will return to his old home in Wisconsin.

Henry Lavers, township clerk, stated yesterday that a number of successors were being considered by the township board, but no public announcement would be made at this time.

The following tribute to the retiring health officer was submitted from the township board by Supervisor Carl Schweikart of Grosse Pointe township:

To the Residents of Grosse Pointe Township:

At a meeting of the township board of health, held on Aug. 23, 1943, a letter was received by Supervisor Carl Schweikart from Dr. Benjamin H. Warren, advising Mr. Schweikart that Doctor Warren was tendering his resignation effective as of Sept. 15, 1943.

This communication was quite a surprise to the members of the township board as Doctor Warren was the oldest employee, in point of service, of the township and this is the 25th year that he had been health officer in this community.

It was with much regret that the resignation of Doctor Warren was accepted by the Grosse Pointe township board of health.

To the many friends of Doctor Warren, we are sure that his departure will be a loss to the community.

Commission Awards Firm Resurfacing Job for Four Streets

The Grosse Pointe Park village commission accepted the bid of \$15,733.40 submitted by Cooke Contracting company of Detroit, for resurfacing four streets in the Park. The accepted bid was one of three bids submitted.

The successful bidder has agreed to furnish the materials, work and labor for the prime coat and resurfacing plus any other jobs for a total of \$18,753.40. The complete job will be done in 30 days.

A bid of \$19,575.09 was submitted by the Detroit Asphalt Paving company and T. P. Flynn & Co. submitted a bid of \$21,140.56.

The streets to be resurfaced are Wayburn, between Mack and Vernor highway; Harvard, Mack avenue to 260 feet south of Maumee; Bedford, between Windmill Pointe and Jefferson, and Beaconsfield, from Charlevoix to Vernor highway.

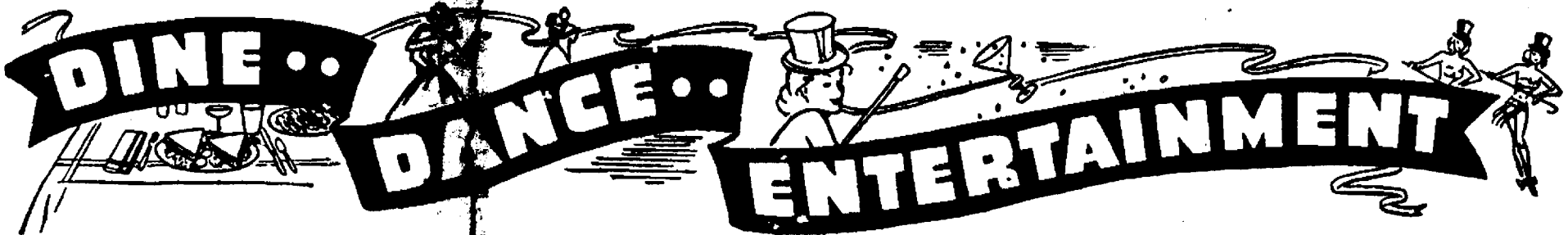

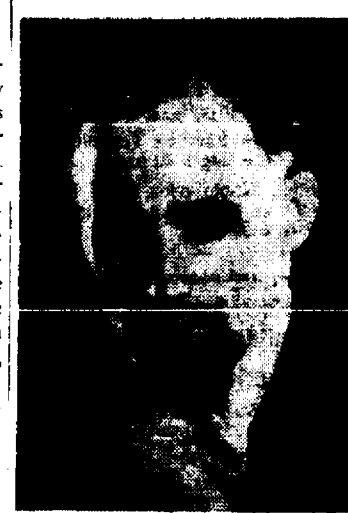

 mately \$42,000; 5. A land reclaiming project on refuse disposal at a cost of approximately \$14,000.

The total cost of these recommendations adds up to \$721,000.

The following suggestions are offered to the financial committee by Lane as part of a "sound financial program which will carry us through the post-war period":

1. Effect a more rigid program of economy in personnel, departmental procedure, and general operations;
 2. Reduce our present indebtedness as rapidly as possible;
 3. Invest any surplus in War Bonds for a public works program after the war;

4. Place some of the village services which are now being paid out of general budget items on the assessment basis, such as street cleaning, snow plowing, collection of garbage and rubbish, tree service, and so forth;

5. Adopt a definite financial and work program on the "Pay-As-You-Go" method.

6. Install improvements, such as sewers, paving, drainage, curbs and gutters on the property assessment basis by setting up a revolving fund and collecting in advance on the "Pay-As-You-Go" method.

7. Complete and pay for a portion of the improvements each year. The funds accumulated by the purchase of War Bonds could be used to defray the cost of the village's share for such improvements.

8a. Eliminate discount on water billing charges which will net an additional amount of \$6,000 per year.
 b. Increase the charges on sewage disposal 100 per cent which will net an additional \$14,000 per year.

c. For the past four years \$25,000 has been placed in the budget as a special contingent to compensate for the delinquent tax loss. It appears that next year we will be able to discontinue this practice and the like amount could be placed in the sinking fund.

"As compared with our present procedure," Lane stated, "these latter three items would net the village an additional amount of \$45,000 per year. The return from service charges can be increased materially. For the past few years rates and charges have been maintained at very low prices which is inconsistent with the increased cost of commodities, supplies, and labor which the village is now paying."

"The opportunity to guide and direct the future of local municipal finance rests largely in the laps of all of us today. It is my belief that with careful planning, with each one doing a part more than his reasonable share, and with the proper cooperation of all citizens and taxpayers, much will be done to solve the general problems of the village of Grosse Pointe Park," Lane concluded.

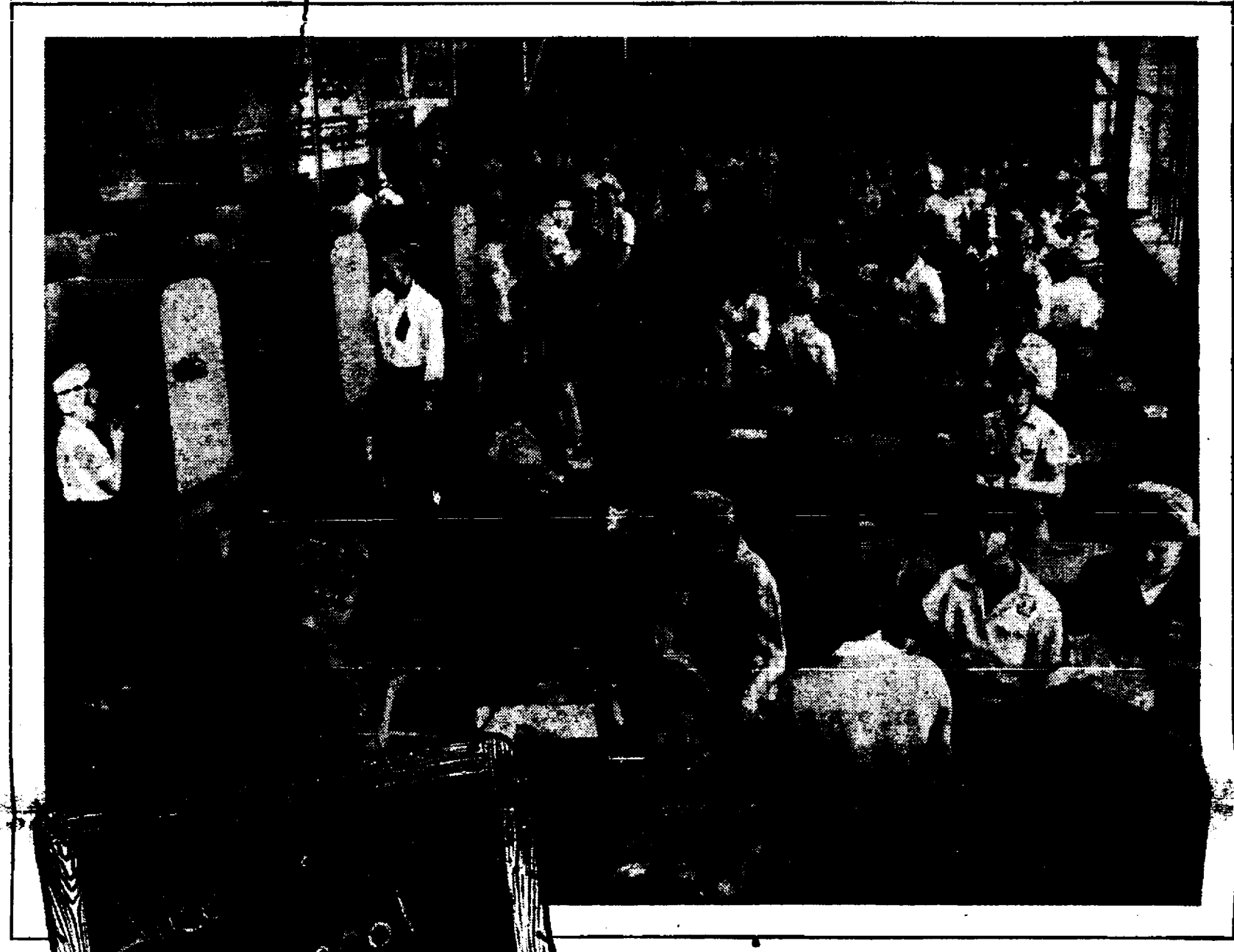

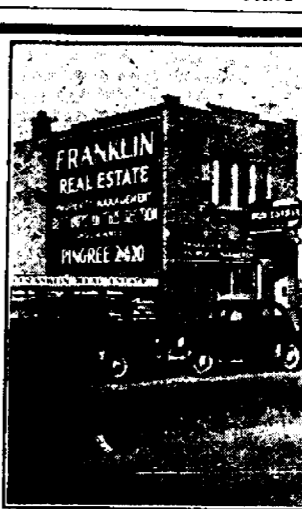
