## Park=McHugh Case Before Wayne Circuit Court

### Attorney Summons Village Officials to Answer Petition

The board of commissioners of Grosse Pointe Park and the village treasurer, Charles Heise, Jr., will appear in circuit court Oct. 15, to show cause why a preemptory writ of mandamus should not be issued, directing them to reinstate Hugh Mc-

Hugh to his former position as head of the violations bureau of Grosse Pointe Park.

This action was taken by Arnold Zelesnik, attorney for McHugh, who unsuccessfully petitioned the Park village commission on Sept. 13, for the reinstatement of his client to his former position, and to pay the salary due from July 1, 1943.

In the petition presented to the commission, McHugh's fine record of his position in the Park police department was recorded. It was also stated that since he is an honorably discharged veteran, he is not removable from office under the terms of the Veterans Preference Act No. 205, public acts of 1897, and Acts 66 and 67, public acts of 1931.

These same facts were included in the petition which was submitted to Circuit Judge Guy A. Miller on Oct. 6.

Among the exhibits presented by McHugh's counsel was the account of injuries received in the performance of duty on Aug. 29, 1933, which partially incapacitated him, and resulted in his assignment to the head of the police violations bureau; which position, upon his removal, was filled by a third person.

Press Is Builder of a Nation of 'Home Folks'

The men and women who edit our small community newspapers are the builders not only of their home communities but of a great nation of home folks.

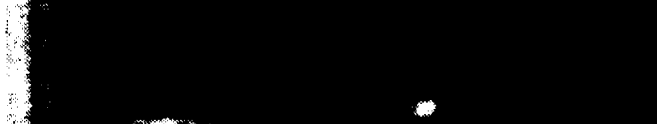

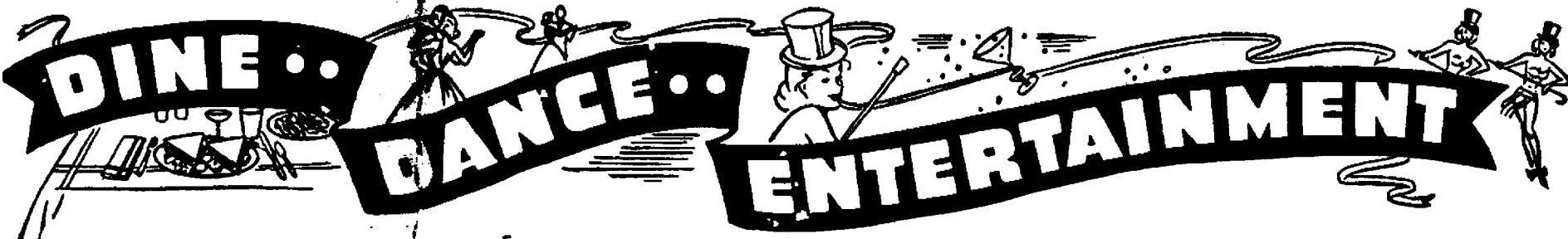

**Vernier School N-E-W-S**

Army aircraft carriers have already given their value. During the Aleutian campaign, the baby flat-tops were instrumental in the taking of Attu. When communication difficulties arose one of the carriers took over the job of relaying radio messages to Army forces on Attu to Amchitka and to aircraft and Navy task forces. When action grew tense, to save time, these messages were given in plain English. The Japs caught on at once and attempted to send confusing, counter American messages. The radio officer on a baby carrier adopted a quick recognition procedure in order to identify the carrier of American messages. An Army colonel on a B-17 issued instructions which were countermanded by the Japs. In order to es-

ablish the identity of the Army colonel, the carrier's radio officer said, "What's the first name of the skipper of this ship?" The colonel retorted, "I don't know his first name, but he's still that chunky baboon who walks like an aviator!" The radio officer replied, "Okay, colonel, we recognize you," and sent his message through.

Many things have been learned by the men fighting the Japs in the Pacific, but few have learned as much about trading as Marine Pfc. Harlow J. Benton, Cold Springs, Ky. Within two hours Benton, starting with a stake of \$10 and a 50-cent jackknife, traded himself into a 17-jewel wrist watch (conservatively valued at \$45), \$5 in cash, and a

pocket watch. Here's the procedure he followed. He bought a wrist watch from a Seabee with the \$10, then sold it for \$15 and a \$2 pocket watch. Next, he traded the 50-cent jackknife and the \$15 for another wrist watch, and sold this same watch for \$30. Later, he bought still another wrist watch for \$25 and traded it for the aforesaid watch worth \$45 — And that's why they call Benton the "David Harum of the Somewhere in the Pacific Area."

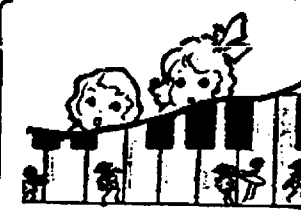

### Official Post Office Instructions on Boxes for Men Overseas

Christmas mail for members of armed forces overseas to be mailed between Sept. 15 and Oct. 15 for Army personnel, and up to Nov. 1, 1943, for Naval personnel.

In order that Christmas parcels may reach the addressees on time and in good condition, arrangements have been made by the post office department in co-operation with the war and navy departments (the latter including the Marines and Coast Guard) for the acceptance of such parcels for members of our armed forces serving outside the continental United States.

### Term Overseas—

The term "armed forces overseas" is regarded as covering the personnel of our armed forces who receive their mail through APO or fleet post office in care of the postmaster at New York, N. Y., San Francisco, Calif., New Orleans, La., Miami, Fla., Presque Isle, Maine, or Seattle, Wash., or through a naval installation or station in care of the postmaster at Seattle.

### Time of Mailing—

Christmas parcels and Christmas cards for the Army personnel overseas must be mailed during the period beginning Sept. 15, 1943, and ending Oct. 15, 1943, the earlier the better while parcels and Christmas

cards for members of the naval forces may be mailed as late as Nov. 1. No requests from the addressees are required in connection with Christmas parcels mailed to Army personnel during this period only. Patrons should be encouraged to endorse each gift parcel "CHRISTMAS PARCEL." Special effort will be made to affect delivery of all Christmas parcels mailed during that period in time for Christmas.

### Size and Weight—

In view of the urgent need for shipping space to transport materials directly essential to the war effort, Christmas parcels shall not exceed the present limits of 5 pounds in weight or 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. These departments have pointed out
