Grosse Pointe Surpasses War Chest Quota

Officials Express Appreciation as Drive Concludes

According to Tuesday evening tabulations, the War Chest drive in Grosse Pointe has gone over the top, passing the goal which was set by the amount collected in the drive last year. This announcement was made by the co-chairmen of the drive here, Edgar A. Fink and Mrs. Edward C. Parker.

Hubbard, who with Mrs. Richard W. Backmann, are co-chairmen of the secretaries, reported that \$30,579.25 had been collected. This exceeded last year's total and this year's quota of \$29,000. The goal which the local officials tried to reach was \$42,000, and with contributions still pouring in, this goal might be reached.

The majority of the gifts given to the drive came from the housewives of this area. These contributions plus the remaining small gifts ran the total up from \$4,000 in the first 10 days of the drive, to over \$30,000 in the remaining six days.

Appreciation is expressed by the officials of the War Chest drive to the solicitors who worked so diligently and to the contributors who gave so generously.

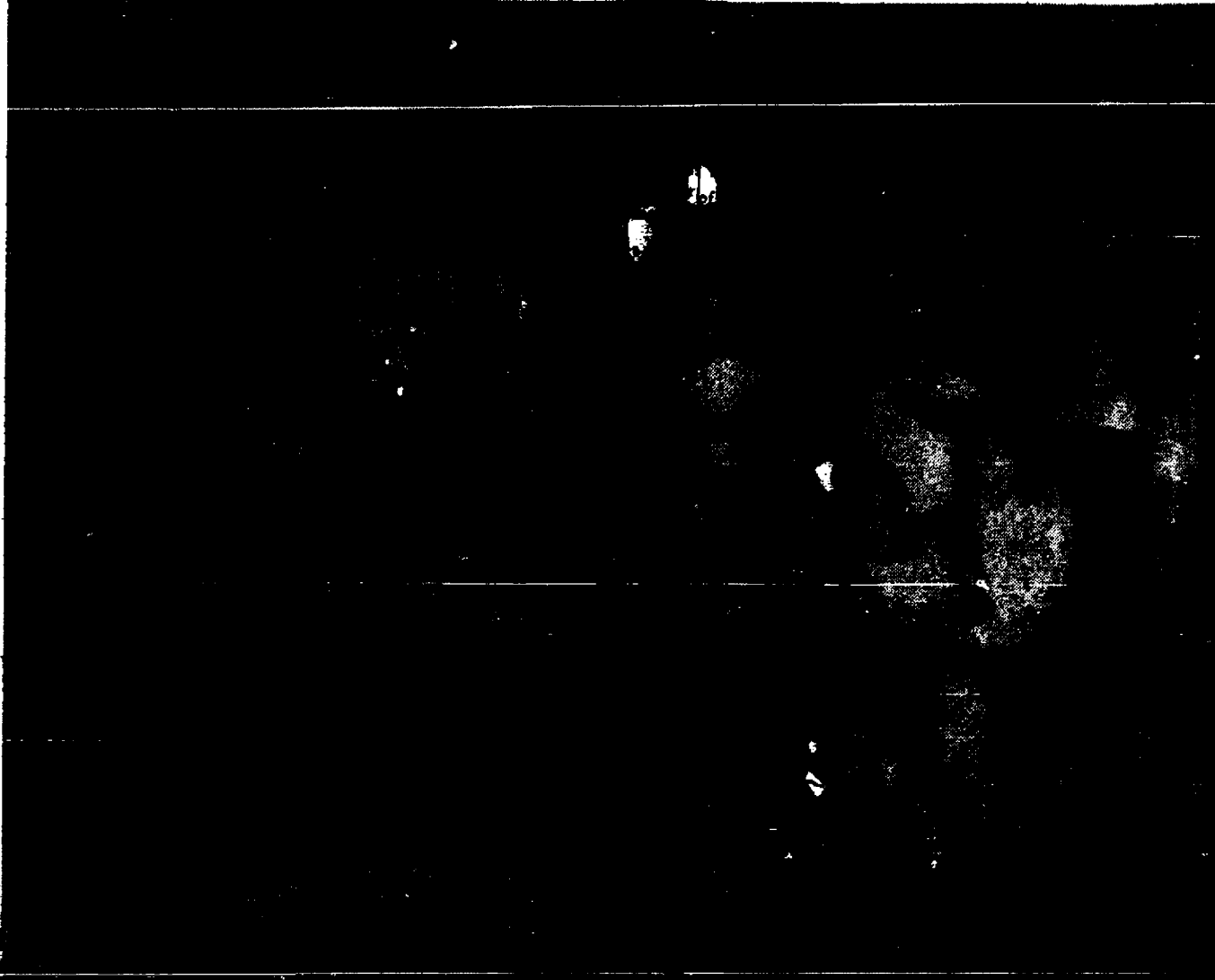

Local Branch Established Here for Second Time

For the second consecutive year, Grosse Pointe will have its own post-official facilities for the holiday rush season. This announcement is made by the following letter from Norbert P. Neff, City clerk. Through the efforts of the City officials and the co-operation of Roscoe B. Huston, postmaster of Detroit, this seasonal post office will again be housed in the

city-owned building next to the municipal offices, at 17140 Maumee, between Neff and St. Clair.

General arrangements for the post office will follow those of last year. A staff of five persons, directed by Leland F. Lidnow, will carry on the same type of services rendered last year.

To show how well this project went over with the residents, approximately \$10,000 in stamps were sold in the few weeks of the Christmas season last year. On one Sunday afternoon on which the office was open, there were 55 people in line during the first hour.

The movement for a post office for Grosse Pointe was started with the open letter to The Review by Norbert P. Neff. It was this action that "started the ball rolling," so to speak, in the direction of more efficient and more convenient postal facilities. This year, his letter bears even more fruit.

Two Persons Injured in Accident in Park Friday Evening

Two automobiles were badly damaged last Friday night when Ben McPherson, 55, of 793 Piper boulevard, struck a car driven by John Green, of 575 Lakeland, who was going in the opposite direction on Kercheval near Berkshire.

Both McPherson and his wife, a passenger in the car, were taken to Cottage hospital where the former was treated for a cut on his lower lip, also four stitches to close a laceration on his chin. He was released from the hospital later.

Mrs. McPherson had to have five stitches to close a laceration on the top of her head, 12 stitches to close a tongue injury. She was also treated for shock and was held at the hospital.

Green, who was driving alone in his car, claimed he was not injured, and was taken to his home. McPherson received a traffic violation ticket for crossing the center line of the street and causing an accident.

The left front of Green's car and the rear bumper were damaged extensively, while the front end of McPherson's car was smashed. When the accident occurred, Green was traveling approximately two miles per hour while McPherson was traveling 30 miles per hour. It was raining at the time of the collision.

The war department notified Edwin K. Hoover, of Rivard boulevard, Monday that his son, Lieut. Gordon P. Hoover is "missing after action at sea." The telegram did not disclose the theatre of operation or the name of the submarine on which Lieutenant Hoover was stationed.

A graduate of Yale university in June, 1939, Lieutenant Hoover attended local schools and was prominently known in Grosse Pointe. His wife is living at Wilmington, Del.

Thieves Gain Entrance to Local Ration Board

When the janitor of the Grosse Pointe ration board, at 341 Fisher road, reported for work last Monday morning, he found that the front door of the building had been demolished, and that entrance had been gained into the building.

Upon investigation, it was found that nothing had been taken because nothing of value is kept in the building over night. A few records were found in front of the City police station that morning, the thieves evidently depositing the records there after seeing that they were of no use to them.

Entrance to the building was made between 6 and 8 a.m., Monday.

Bombardier Missing, Though German Prisoner of War

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Gorden, 1865 Hollywood, Grosse Pointe Woods, were overjoyed last Saturday when advised that their son, Lieut. Harry S. Gorden, who had previously been reported missing in action, was safe in Germany, though a war prisoner. Word came from the International

Red Cross.

Lieut. Gorden was reported missing after action over Bremen, when the B-17 Flying Fortress "Miss Fortune" on which he was bombardier, was forced out of formation when struck by flak. Four parachutes were seen to open as the plane lost altitude rapidly. A Detroit, Staff Sgt. Michael Urban, 215 W. Margaret, is also a prisoner, according to word received by his wife. The ship carried a crew of 10.

Personally credited with shooting down a Messerschmidt, Lieutenant Gorden has been decorated with the Air Medal and two Oak Leaf Clusters.

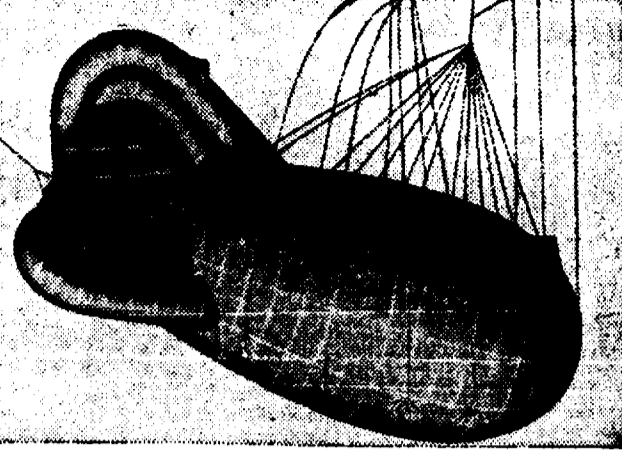

Fire Chief Warns Residents to Use Extra Precaution for Wartime Heating

"The war has brought new fire dangers to many homes," Chief Edward L. Rector warned today in discussing the hazards of wartime heating.

"Take the case of someone who has converted from oil to coal," the chief said. "Maybe he used to fire a coal furnace years ago, but now he's a little rusty at it. In that case, he should get an expert to show him how. Many coal gas explosions are caused by faulty banking, and a draft that isn't regulated right can cause the furnace to overheat and start a fire."

The chief then mentioned other precautions in connection with wartime heating. "If you have stored extra supplies of coal, try to arrange the bins so that the coal first laid down is the first used. And if you plan to use portable electric, gas or kerosene heaters during cold spells, see that they are in good condition or have them repaired. And when you use them, make sure they are not too close to woodwork, curtains or furniture, or in places where they are likely to be upset."

Chief Rector also had a word of warning about the "old standby" dangers of winter heating — cracked or dirty chimneys and flues, defective furnaces and burners, hot pipes in contact with exposed woodwork, inadequate insulation at the point where the smoke pipe enters the chimney, dry wooden shingles, improper storage of hot ashes and embers, fireplaces without protective metal screens, faulty storage of fuels and the "crazy" use of kerosene to quicken a fire.

"Before winter sets in, make a complete checkup of the heating plant, and then start doing everything the safe way," the chief advised. "First of all, look over the furnace itself. If anything needs repairing, have it done right away. Then start with the roof and work downward. If chimneys or flues are cracked or clogged with soot, have them cleaned and repaired. If the roof is covered with wood shingles, get a new fire-resistant covering or put spark arresters over the chimney. Next, see that all insulation around pipes is in good condition, especially if steam is used. "If you have been in the habit of dumping hot ashes or embers in

wooden boxes or barrels, hunt around until you find safe metal containers," he continued. "Keep wood, paper and rubbish out of the coal bins, and see that everything that can catch fire is at a safe distance from the furnace and burners. Keep the basement floor clean."

The chief cautioned owners of oil furnaces, stoves, heaters or lamps to avoid spilling the fuel when drawing it from drums or other containers, and to prevent oil drums from dripping. Best practice, he pointed out, is to have drums located outside — but not where they can block exits in case of fire.

Grosse Pointe High School Lads Combine School Work With War Effort

The shop classes at Grosse Pointe high school are being patriotic and at the same time are getting valuable practice in this type of work by making crutches, ping pong paddles, ash trays and other articles for the Red Cross.

At a meeting of the Red Cross and Industrial arts departments of the Detroit schools last summer the Red Cross was promised a year's

quota of 50,000 articles. Grosse Pointe high school promised 25 bedside tables; 25 pairs of crutches; 50 ping pong paddles; 50 ash trays; 50 ash stands; 25 lamps; 25 shuffle boards sets, and 50 canes. These quotas are expected to be tripled and in many cases the boys will probably make six times the promised number.

The group making ping pong paddles has already made 75 and has only started. It expects to make at least 250. Each student makes as many paddles as he can, doing the entire job.

The boys making crutches have materials on hand for from 100 to 150 pairs. The ordinary worker makes one crutch in two days.

The ash trays are made from the tuna fish cans used in the cafeteria. About 25 cans are used by the boys each week. The boys working on these are developing their own design for the trays. Eventually two or three of the most logical plans will be put into mass production.

Patterns and tools used in the work to make all parts uniform, are being made by the advanced class in shop fundamentals. When these things are completed, the work in the shop will be done on a mass production basis.

A Grosse Pointe high school stamp is put on all the articles so that a sick or wounded soldier in New England or Texas or Oregon will know where it came from and who made it for him.

These students who are taking shop are doing a highly patriotic service in turning over all their shop time to this work and at the same time are getting priceless experience in shop work and in co-operation with their fellow students.

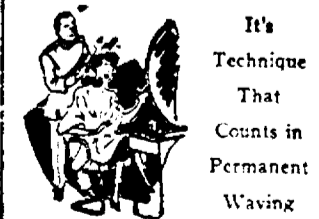

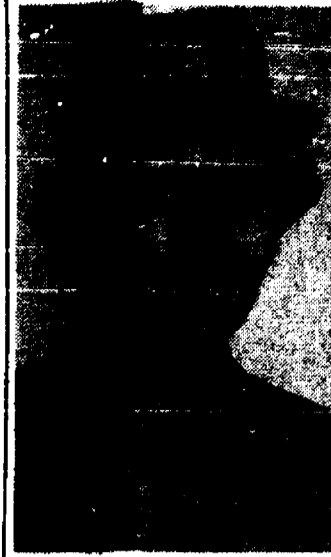

The class, meeting Wednesday evenings from 7:30 to 9:30 o'clock, is being taught the fundamentals of pottery making. Miss Marian Lampman, senior high art instructor and teacher of the class, says, "They are an enthusiastic group and seem to be having a lot of fun."

This work is very satisfying for those participating as they are making articles they plan to use after completion. Lovely vases and bowls will decorate some Grosse Pointe homes and many will find ash trays within reach as a result of this interesting activity.

State Highway Dept. Heads Meet to Review Progress

LANSING. — District engineers and department heads of the state highway department in Lansing this week for lengthy conferences with Charles M. Ziegler, state highway commissioner, on construction, maintenance and postwar planning problems which confront the department and for a discussion of departmental policies, including changes made by the commissioner since he assumed office almost seven months ago.

The commissioner commended the department heads for their part in cutting down unnecessary expenses. "Telephone tolls of the department, as an example, were reduced \$8,150 during the last six months as compared to the same period a year ago," he pointed out. At the same time he insisted that unnecessary expense be eliminated further.

Ziegler also informed the district men that "politics are out as far as department employees are concerned. All that you will be required to do is perform your daily duties in an efficient manner."

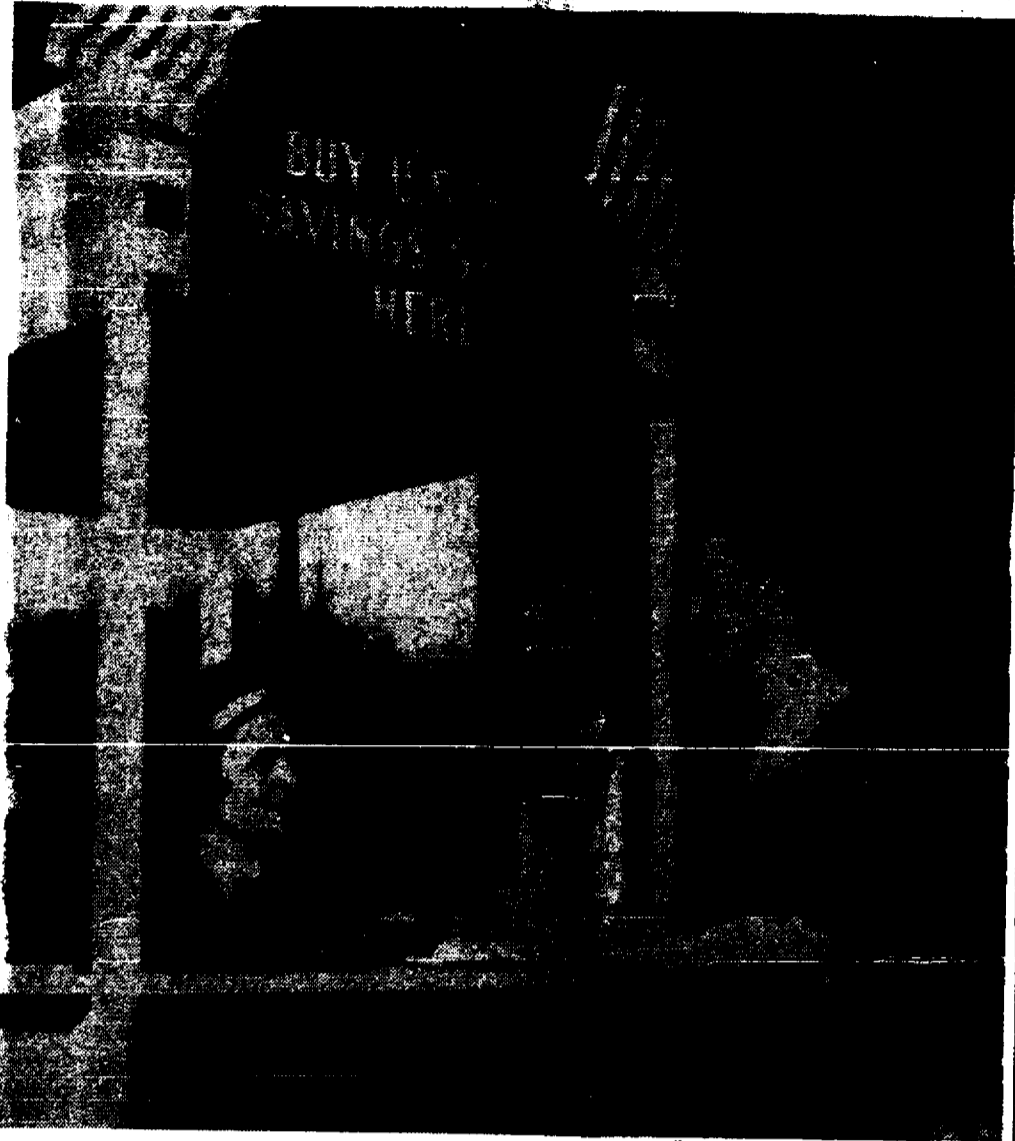

Play Performances Run Smoothly Because of 'Behind-the-Scenes' Activities

Last night, Pointe Players produced "Arsenic and Old Lace" at the high school. The audience saw a nice, finished production, it looked easy. A few actors came on the stage and spoke for a couple of hours. But behind that was over a month of hard work for over 30 people. Every one has heard of stage crews, but do you know what they really do? First, let's take the lighting crew. They don't, as would seem likely, come the night of the performance and pull a few switches. The lighting crew of "Arsenic and Old Lace" worked well over two weeks, rewiring the switchboard and placing lights to the best advantage of that play. They have to co-operate with the stage crew in building "light traps" for off stage lights. The stage crew itself has to place, and care for all properties. They have to build the set perfectly, so that it will not shake. They have to build light traps so that a light on in the kitchen will leave the stairs in darkness; likewise with all combinations of exits from the stage. Stage craft has to paint the entire set, much of it before the "flats" are together. That means that all the little lines in the wall paper have to be in place so exact that when the flats are placed together, they will continue without alteration. Properties committee have to get, and then generally return, everything which appears on the stage. That means "everything," from the couch to the matches for lighting the candles. Costumes are closely related to properties. They scour all of Detroit for clothes of the right kind; they are hard enough to find, often, but often the size of the persons they are needed for makes them

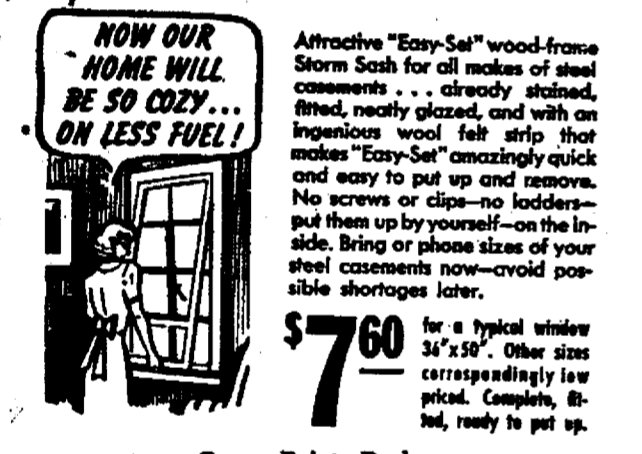
