City Residents Mourn Death of Beloved Mayor

C. F. Carpenter Fills Vacant Post for Two Months

The flag at the City of Grosse Pointe flew at half mast Friday in tribute to its mayor, Mason P. Rumney, who passed away Thursday evening in Rochester, Minn., where he underwent an operation at the Mayo Clinic earlier in the week.

For the time being, because of the mayor's death, each City councilman will alternate as acting mayor. It was explained that each council member has been assigned two months of the year according to the alphabetical list of their names and in the absence of a mayor, they will assume this post, pro-tem. For the first two months of this year, or until some other arrangement is made, Chester F. Carpenter, senior member of the council, will be acting mayor.

Local Blood Donors Give 203 Pints of Blood at Mobile Unit

The residents of Grosse Pointe responded whole-heartedly last Saturday when the Red Cross mobile blood bank again made its headquarters at the St. Clare school, Audubon and Mack, and chalked up another 203 pints of blood for this area.

Active in Business, Sports Mr. Rumney, vice president of the Detroit Steel Products company, began his business career as a salesman 35 years ago, after graduating from the University of Michigan engineering college in 1907, and steadily rose in the company until he became vice president and director. He was elected president of the Detroit Railway and Harbor Terminals company in 1927.

His membership in clubs included the Grosse Pointe Yacht club, Detroit Athletic club, Detroit Boat club, the Society of Automotive Engineers and Psi Upsilon. He had also been president of the University of Michigan Alumni association in Detroit.

Mr. Rumney leaves his wife, Miriam; two daughters, Mrs. Henry Gage and Mrs. Guy Conrath; son, Mason P. Jr., a cadet at West Point; mother, Mrs. John G. Rumney; sister, Mrs. Richard H. Doughty of Grosse Pointe. The home is at 305 University Place.

Capt. William H. Horwitz, of Rochester, N. Y., of the army medical corps, who has been assigned to the Red Cross blood donor's service in Detroit, said that this amount will be included in the 5,500 pints of blood which is the new quota assigned to Detroit. He urges more residents to make plans to visit the blood bank when it will return in approximately three months.

The driver was given a ticket for not having his car under control while the young niece was ticketed for allowing a person with a temporary license to drive, while she, the qualified driver, was sitting in the rear seat and allowing more than two persons in the car.

Marine, Erroneously Reported Killed; Safe in States

Although a Detroit daily carried the report that Marine Pfc. Robert Martin, 22, was killed in action in the Southwest Pacific, his mother, Mrs. Helen Martin of 15008 Mack avenue, said this was a mistake for she talked with her son by telephone only last Sunday at the U. S. naval hospital in Oakland, Calif.

Private Martin was wounded by a Japanese mortar in his face and shoulder in November and was treated for his injuries in a hospital in the Pacific. He was transferred to the California hospital on Jan. 11; he is at present in a cast and will undergo plastic surgery in the near future.

Robert, who received the award of the Purple Heart, was one of the Marines who stormed Bougainville on Nov. 7. He saw a great deal of action as a machine gunner and has personally accounted for 36 Japs. One time it was a hand to hand encounter, but, as he explained to his mother, "You can imagine what I did to him."

Besides being injured in the face and shoulder, Robert had 18 teeth knocked out. As soon as he is able to travel, he expects to return home on a furlough.

His brother, Private Harold, 19, also a Marine, is still in the Southwest Pacific, making up for the troubles his brother has endured.

Pedestrian Struck by Passing Auto; Driver Escapes

After some investigation by Park police, Egrini was discharged for the lack of complaining witnesses. His car was released to him Saturday afternoon.

Mr. Nash was transferred to Receiving hospital for treatment, after a short stay at Cottage.

Pointe Gallants Report Bond Sales At AWVS, Bank

Although Grosse Pointers in general are responding to the Fourth War Loan Drive, it is the school children of the area who have really been pushing the drive so that officials are confident that the Pointe will go over the top, as they did in the last campaign.

To date, the actual cash receipts taken in by the AWVS and the Grosse Pointe bank totals \$835,983.25. Of this total, \$216,000 has gone thru

the AWVS and the purchaser's individual bank. Grosse Pointe high school leads the schools with a total of \$395,725; this exceeds the total amount collected in the third drive by \$2,000. The high school conducted their drive for the five days ending yesterday, and because of current examinations, they will stress only one more day for selling bonds, the closing day of the drive, Feb. 15.

Father Receives Word of Son Missing in Action

Camille T. VerVaecke Sr., of 1231 Lakepointe avenue, received word from Lieut. Col. Douglas P. Wingo of the U. S. Marine corps, that his son, Pfc. Camille T. (Bud) VerVaecke Jr., USMC, has been missing in action since Nov. 20, 1943, when he failed to return to his organization after contact with the enemy on Tarawa Atoll in the Gilbert Islands.

Mr. VerVaecke received a telegram on Jan. 17 stating that his son was missing, and two days later received the communication from Lieut. Col. Wingo. The Marine officer explained that every effort is being made to obtain information regarding Private VerVaecke, but due to the extensive areas involved, and the opposition of the enemy, it will be some time before any details or clarification can be made.

The father was assured that any additional information received concerning the whereabouts of his son, it would be immediately furnished him.

Three Grosse Pointe Park lads were taken to their homes on Jan. 19 by the police after they had fallen through the ice near the home of R. H. Berry, at 15816 Lakeview. The boys who were given temporary shelter at the Berry home, were Parcell Strong, 15, of 623 Lakepointe; Fred Yonkman, 13, of 725 Middlesex; and Van McLellan, 13, of 860 Beaconsfield.

The boys had crashed through the ice into water up to their hips.

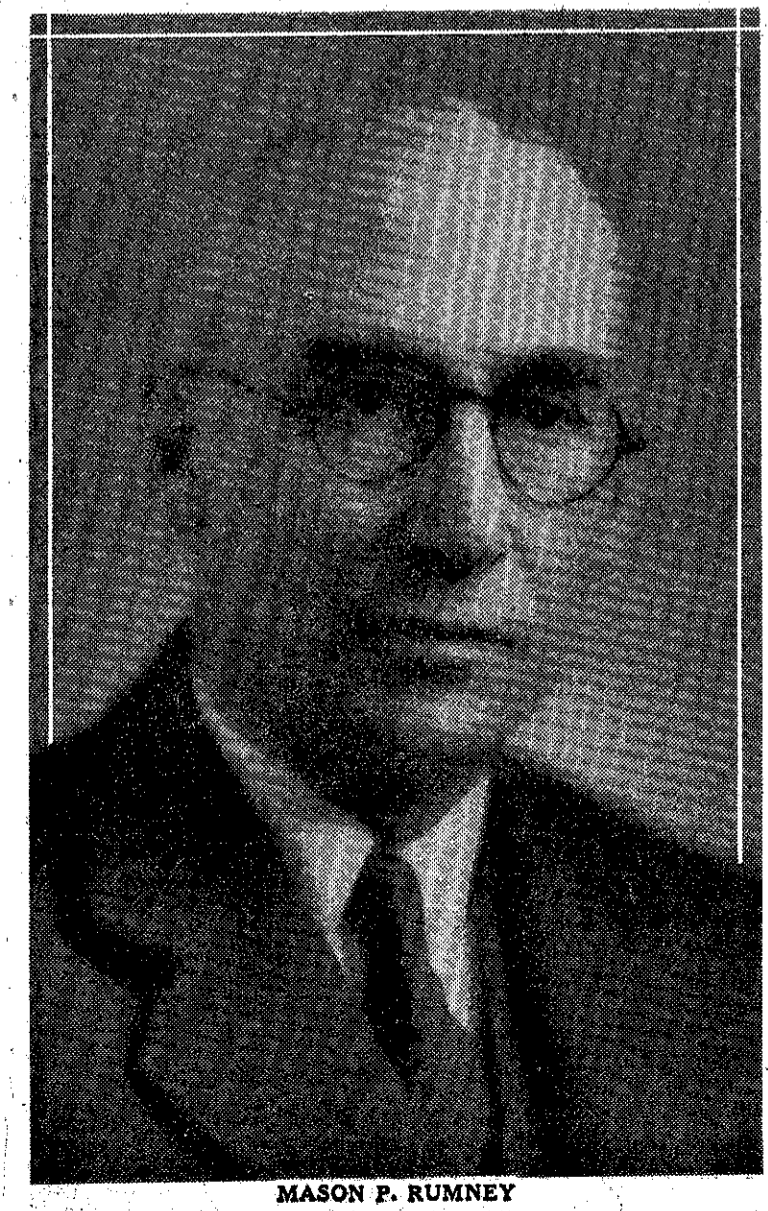
Mr. Blessed has urged all residents of the Pointe to co-operate in every way when a warden visits them while canvassing the area.

The loss of a man of the character and stature of Mason P. Rumney is most deeply felt and regretted.

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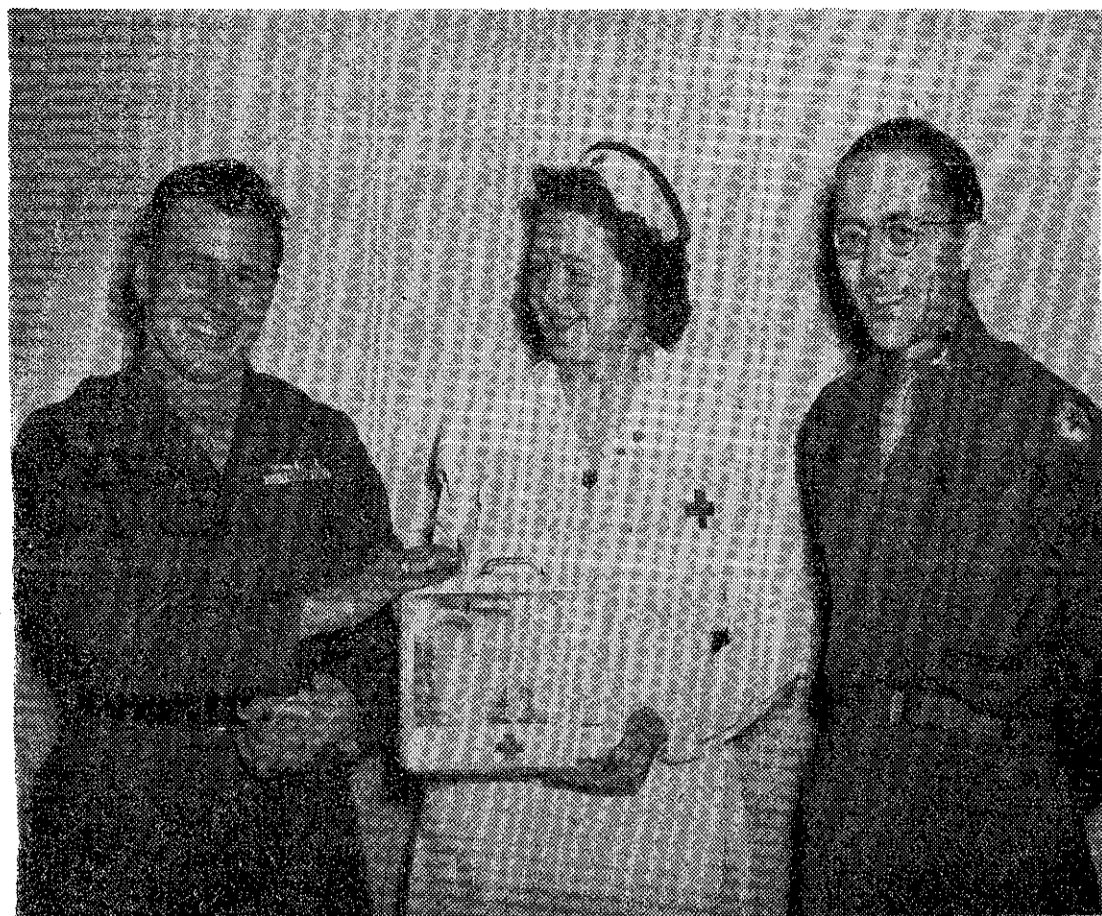
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TARAWA VETERAN FONDLY HANDLES BLOOD PLASMA

Tarawa Veteran Home After Stopping Japanese Bullets

Pfc. Charles Pentecost, USMC, is spending a 40-day furlough with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Pentecost of 1352 Lakepointe, and is busily telling of his experiences which he had with his fellow Marines when they stormed the island of Tarawa in November.

His left arm still enclosed in a cast, the young Marine made an appearance at the mobile blood bank last Saturday, not to donate blood but to thank the donors for giving theirs, for it was four blood transfusions which, he claims, saved his life after he was seriously wounded in the left side and arm.

Pentecost, who attended St. Ambrose school, said that after he was able to get a few Japs, their bullets got him, one entering his side and three entering his arm. He was operated on after "I had taken two shots of whiskey, because there was enough anesthetic for only one operation, and that was used on a buddy who had his legs amputated."

Pentecost returned to the United States on a hospital ship from Honolulu. He has been a Marine for five years and previous to his overseas service was a judo instructor in San Diego.

Army Bound Father Puts Problem Up to Trustees

A slight change in his original plans may enable Fred Runnells of 323 Moross road to provide for his family and still remain within the limits of the Grosse Pointe Farms ordinance if he is inducted into the army.
Mr. Runnells appeared before the board of trustees at their last meeting on Jan. 17, asking them to help him in his time of distress. He explained that he expected to be drafted in the next few months but with the allotment allowed by the government, his wife and two children would not be able to make the payments on their new home. For this reason, he was asking the council to waive the ordinance of prohibiting two family dwellings and allow him to build a temporary income out of his home.

After investigation, his request was denied. Later, however, Runnells was told that if he converted the upstairs into two sleeping rooms he would be within the ordinance.
When asked about the soldier's and sailor's act, as it is commonly called, Mr. Runnells explained that when he had asked the bank which holds his mortgage about payments while he was in service, he was told that if two payments were missed, foreclosure proceedings would have to begin. He was told that no special consideration is given servicemen any more than other people.
Raymond M. Foley, state director of the FHA, told him the same thing.

After the meeting it was found that there were no building restrictions in his subdivision which prohibited the making of sleeping rooms. He was told that he was the first to present such an arrangement to the council and that they would do all in their power to assist him. It was a few days later when it was discovered that he could convert his second story into sleeping rooms as long as a kitchen was not included.

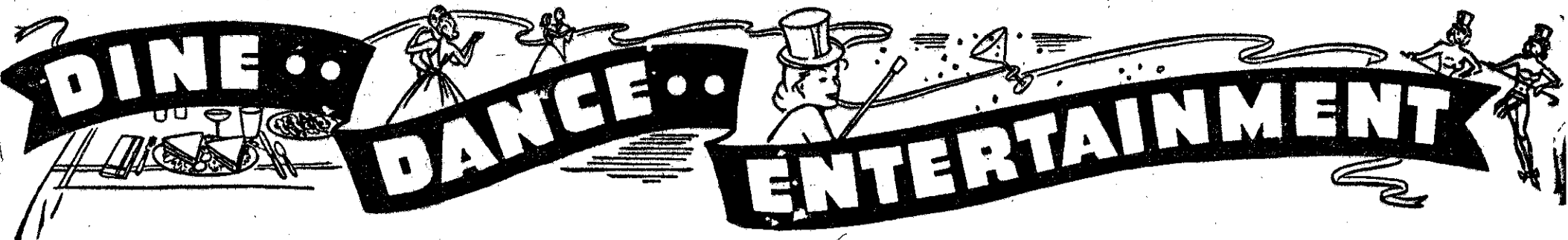

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Invisible Storm and Screen Windows Now Available

"Invisible" combination storm and screen windows which cannot be detected from the outside but appear to be the regular windows of the house are available to the homeowner.

They are in reality a duplicate set of sliding two-sash windows permanently installed in front of your regular windows. They slide up and down in the usual manner. The frame is permanently installed and can be caulked into the window opening. They do not have the "boarded-up" appearance that ordinary storm windows give a fine house.

Each window has two glass sash inserts and one screen insert. All of them slide up and down. When one of the windows is to be washed, each insert can be slipped off its slide in a few seconds, washed inside the house and slipped back into its slide.

Ventilation can be controlled. In rainy summer weather the sliding sashes can be adjusted so that air enters but rain cannot. There are interchangeable glass and screen inserts for the lower section of each window.

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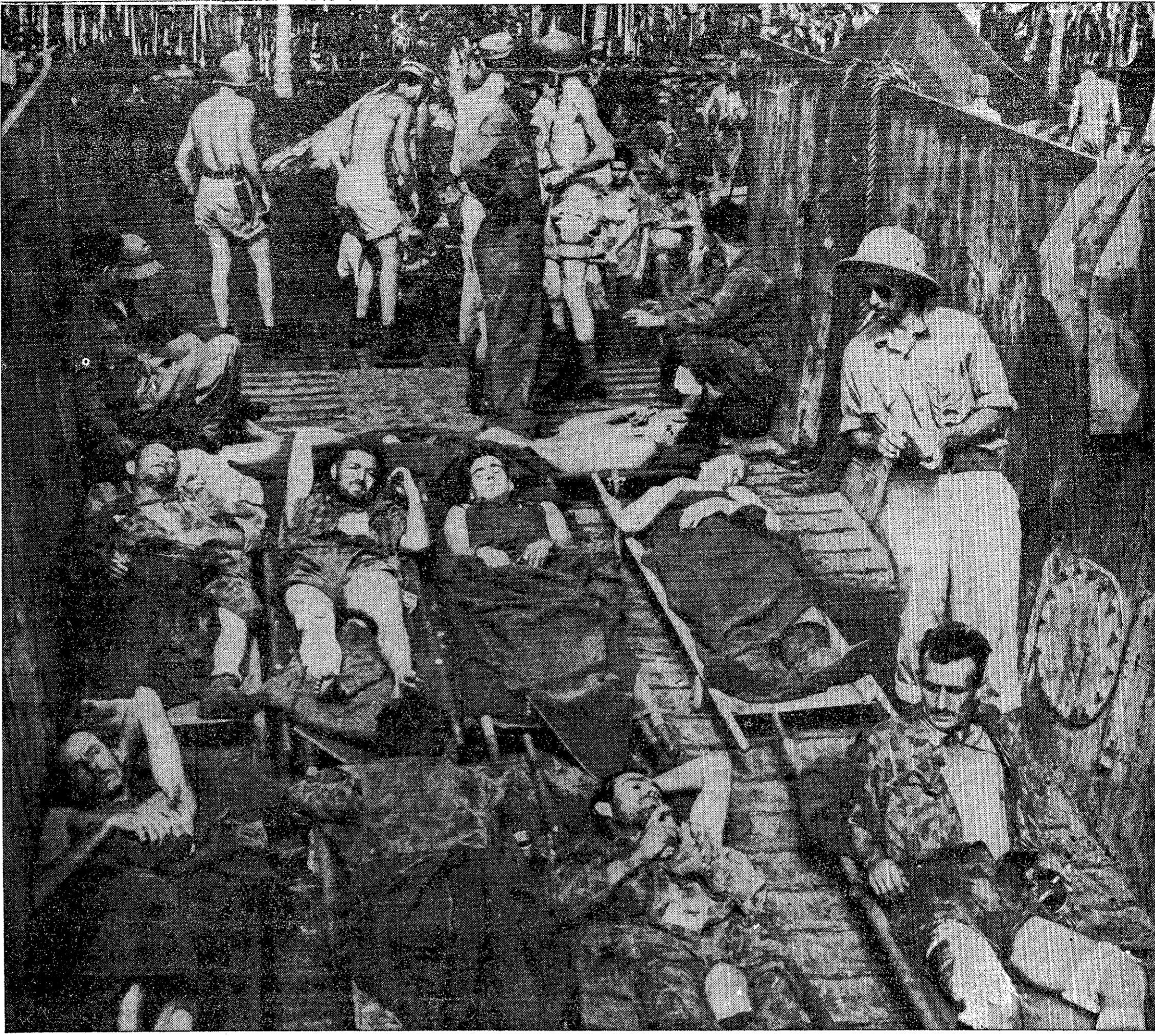

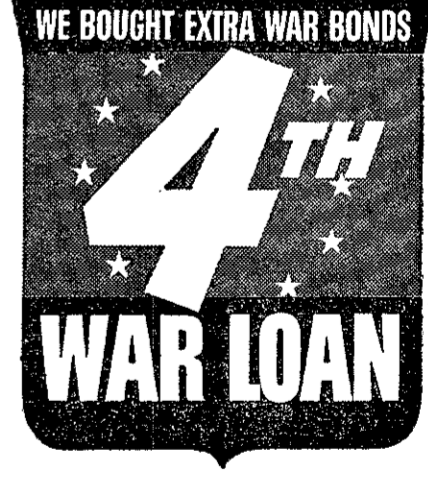
