



# PARK TO HOLD PRIMARY

## 2 Million Mark in Sight in Local Bond Effort

### Pointe Schools Carrying Local Drive Over Top

Approximately two million dollars in War Bonds have been sold in Grosse Pointe during the present War Loan Drive, it was announced Wednesday by co-chairmen Kenneth L. Moore and Richard Maxon.

From the number of servicemen's pictures in this issue of The Review, readers might be led to believe that we were trying to publish an issue of Stars and Stripes. Actually, The Review wants and is proud to publish news and pictures about Grosse Pointe servicemen and women and we feel that the residents are just as proud to read about them.

To date, the Grosse Pointe bank has received \$1,133,387 for bonds, while the amount which the AWVS has collected and which has not gone through the local bank totals \$749,500. This makes a grand total of \$1,882,887.

Grosse Pointe high school is still leading with a total of \$398,725, while Kerby is leading all elementary schools with an amount totaling \$207,956; Country Day school is leading the private schools with \$228,100.

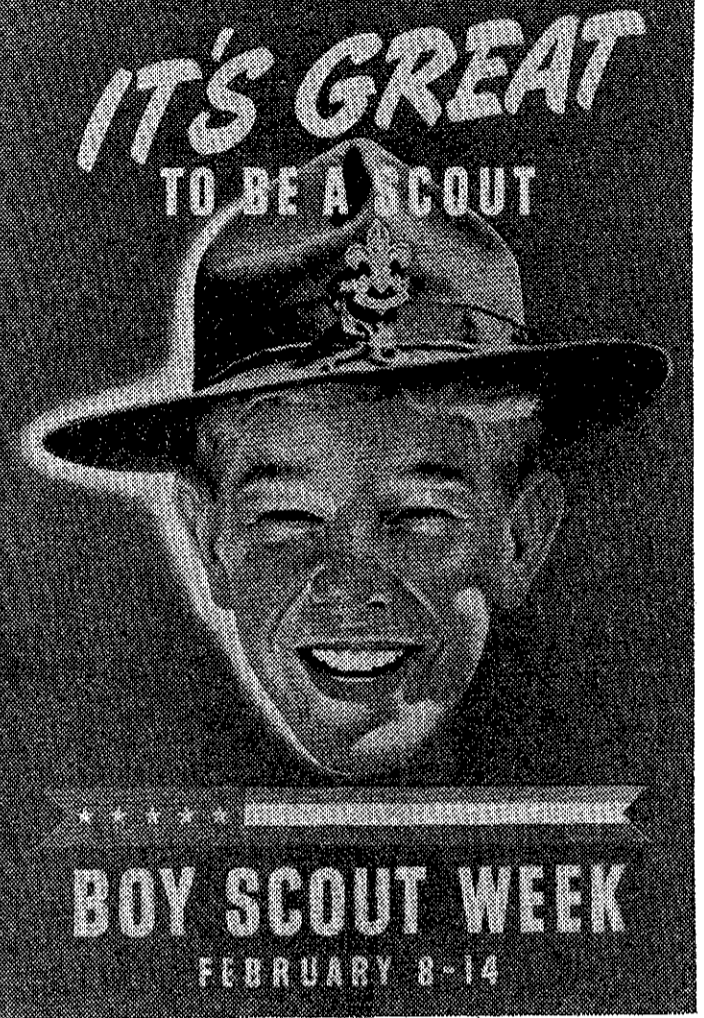
The remaining school totals are as follows: Convent of the Sacred Heart, \$50,000; DUS, \$126,449; Pierce Junior high school, \$83,000; Defer, \$9,850; Maire, \$28,650; Mason, \$21,200; Richard, \$16,775; Trombly, \$6,056; Vernier, \$6,225; St. Paul, \$19,000.

Mr. Moore expressed his thanks to those who have been working hard on this current bond drive but urged all that the drive is not yet over, and to reach the top, all must co-operate until the midnight of Feb. 15, the closing day of the Fourth War Loan drive.

### Gratiot Township Sewage Problem Comes Up Again

Hardly a Grosse Pointe Woods commission meeting has been conducted in recent weeks when the topic of Gratiot township and its sewage problem has not been brought up.

At the present time, the village has on file in Washington an application for priorities which would enable the community to construct a huge, and much needed, sewage system. A few weeks ago, Gratiot township officials notified the Woods commission that if the township and the Woods would work together on such a plan, the priorities for the Woods and federal aid for the township would be given much more readily.

The answer to this was given to the effect that if the township desired such a plan, all engineering reports and details would have to be drawn up by them to be presented to the Woods commission.

Mr. Pate explained that due to the Woods position as the area naturally tributary to the township, it would be asked to carry the sanitary sewage for the time being. The FWA has expressed its feelings on the matter and would like the Woods to carry the township sewer through the Cook road sewer.

The commissioners agreed that they should know more about this before getting involved in the proposition. When they asked Mr. Pate for his opinion, he said, "It seems that the sanitary sewage has no other place to go, and must ultimately reach the Woods interceptor and be treated."

Further details and information have been forwarded to Rep. Louis Rabaut and the priority boards in Washington.

### No Opposition in Township Election; Primary Canceled

Although the township of Grosse Pointe must hold an election this year to fill the posts of one justice of the peace and one for the board of review, a primary election will not be necessary.

A constitutional amendment provided for the election in each township of a supervisor, clerk, highway commissioner, treasurer and four constables in each odd numbered year, to hold office for a term of two years.

### Pre-Holiday Crash Driver Found Guilty

William Hogsett, 59, of 3728 14th street, Detroit, was found guilty of reckless driving Monday evening in the City justice court by Justice Leslie P. Young, and was fined \$100 and \$10 court costs or 30 days in jail.

Clemens; and Hogsett were taken to Cottage hospital, after the Hutton car was demolished and the other two cars badly damaged.

In addition to his fine, he was placed on probation for two years; if he makes restitution, it will be shortened to three months. His license was revoked for one year.

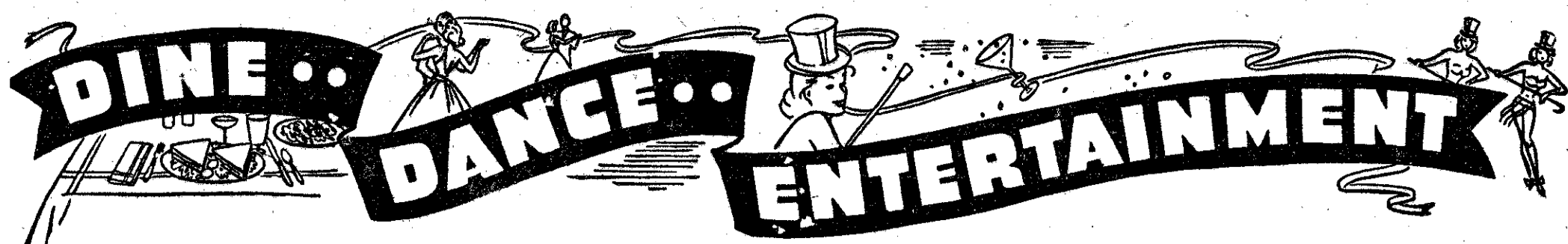

### Richard School N-E-W-S

Ruth Bockes is the director of the girls' service squad and Clarence Messner has charge of the safety patrol.

Processed Foods — Green stamps G, H and J valid through Feb. 20. Green stamps K, L and M good through March 20. Meats, Cheese, Butter, Fats, Canned Fish, Canned Milk — V and W valid now. X valid Feb. 6. All expire Feb. 26. Sugar — Stamp 30 in Book 4 good for 5 pounds through March 31. Shoes — Stamp 18 in Book 1 and No. 1 airplane stamp in Book 3 good for one pair each until further notice. Gasoline — Stamp A9 good for three gallons through Jan. 21. A10 good Jan. 22 to March 21. B, B1 and C and C1 stamps good for two gallons until used. B2 and C2 good for five gallons. State and license number must be written on face of each coupon immediately upon receipt of book. Tires — Next inspections due: A book vehicles by March 31; B's by Feb. 29; C's by Feb. 29; commercial vehicles every six months or every 5,000 miles, whichever is first. Fuel Oil — Period 2 coupons good through Feb. 7. Period 3 coupons through March 13. All have value of 10 gallons for each unit. All change making coupons and reserve coupons good throughout the year. As of today, consumers in this locality should not have used up more than 54 per cent of their total yearly ration, according to the OPA report.

### New Bathtubs

DETROIT.—Fifty thousand bathtubs will be produced after April 1 under the direction of the WPB and will be placed under ceiling prices. OPA reported Monday. These tubs will have the same prices that the last tubs manufactured were sold at in 1942. They have been authorized for installation in critical war housing projects.

### Library to Purchase New Books From State Appropriation

The Grosse Pointe public library received a check for \$602.44, Miss Florence H. Severs, librarian, announced. This represents the first half of a grant from the state aid to public libraries fund for which the library has qualified this year. These grants to our library are made possible through the appropriation by the legislature of \$300,000 for the 1943-44 year. The state board for libraries is asking the 1944 special session of the legislature for \$440,000 which would provide much needed funds to meet the increased wartime costs. This bonus is paid to our public library because the local tax support is being maintained. If the local tax support drops, the library is disqualified for this grant. The money may be used for any project that will improve or extend the services of the library. In Grosse Pointe the money will be used for the purchase of new books.

### Park Police Keep Busy Answering Accident Calls

One of the first of these numerous calls took place at St. Paul and Beaconsfield avenues on Friday morning at 6:30 when E. D. Oullette, of 1090 Lakepointe, driving on St. Paul struck an unoccupied parked car on St. Paul, owned by L. Lindquist of 1098 Beaconsfield. Both cars were taken care of by their owners.

Dorothy Kingswood, 1056 Devonshire, while driving on Jefferson avenue between Beaconsfield and Lakepointe last Saturday morning struck a parked car owned by Ray G. Fluschmann of 1619 Fairview. This second car then hit another parked car which is listed to Alton Miller of 968 Barrington road.

### Thief Changes Scene of Activity; Enters G. P. Woods Home

The epidemic of breaking and entering into Grosse Pointe homes continues this week with the scene shifted to Grosse Pointe Woods.

Last Thursday evening when the T. C. Hartman family returned to their home at 680 Hawthorne, they found that the house had been completely ransacked, especially the bedrooms of the house. All drawers, which had been carefully laid on the beds, were given a thorough going over.

The thief or thieves concentrated on jewelry, a diamond ring and two diamond stick pins, and also a 12 gauge shotgun.

Entrance to the Hartman residence was gained by breaking in the rear door that leads into a back bedroom. The theft occurred between 4:00 and 10:45 p.m.

The police believe that this theft was performed by the same party who has visited the Park and the Farms within recent weeks, for all indications show this to be the case.

Recently the sanitary interceptor sewer which runs adjacent and parallel to Milk river in Grosse Pointe Woods was completed and started in service. Because of this, many of the residents have assumed or are under the impression that this will eliminate the danger of floods in the village. This, however, is not the true state of affairs.

This new sewer will only take care of the so-called sanitary flow or raw sewage which consists of plumbing wastes. It is so constructed that during dry weather all sewage drops into this new interceptor but when it rains or snow melts and the water level rises in the sewers automatic regulators or devices shut off the outlets into this new interceptor and diverts this water into the old lines to the pumping stations where it is again pumped as it always has been in the past.

Residents, therefore, still depend on the original facilities during storms or thaws until such time as priorities have been granted and the new and additional storm water pumping facilities are complete.

The new proposed additional pumping station, addition to the present station and the necessary trunk lines for which the taxpayers of the village last summer voted authority to spend \$265,000.00, is still being delayed by lack of priority approval by the WPB in Washington.

The engineering work on this project is substantially complete, the local WPB office has recommended its approval and it is now in process of investigation by the Washington office. Even though it is not good policy to raise false hopes and even though there is always the chance of a complete refusal by the WPB or further delays for some technicality village officials are still optimistically hoping for a favorable reply within the next 30 days.

Immediately upon receipt of a priority approval, bids will be received and contracts let for the construction work. At the same time the bonds will be sold to finance this construction. The sale of the bonds which were authorized last summer by the taxpayers and which were also approved by the debt commission in Lansing, has been held up until this priority was received in order to save the payment of interest.

Until all this work is complete, the village is still in danger of floods during severe storms. However, since last spring some further minor improvements have been completed on our sewer system which will to a slight degree reduce the severity of the flooded conditions: A priority was finally received for a somewhat modified form of electric standby service for the Marter road pumping station. This standby service was designed to provide another source of supply of electric current if the main power lines were struck by lightning as has happened in the past. A sewer line has been installed in the easement between Stanhope and Allard avenues plus some ditches along the village line, will divert a good deal of the surface water running down from Gratiot township in this area.

The problem is also somewhat less threatening because at this time this area has had a long dry season which has eliminated the sodden and saturated ground condition of last year. The run-off will not be so rapid and will not overload sewers and pumping stations so quickly.

Also the lower lake levels and the Milk river levels have improved conditions as far as outlets are concerned.

But if anyone has had flooded basements in the past, care should still be taken regarding the allowing of things that can be damaged by water lying on the basement floor during severe storms. Close watch should be kept during extremely wet weather and electric motors on heating plants should be removed at the first signs of flooding.

The village commission is pressing continuously to complete the work that will relieve the situation.

### Wage Statement Not Available at Social Security Board

Don't ask your social security board field office for a statement of your 1943 earnings for income tax purposes, Francis L. Pendergast, manager of the board's office at 8037 Harper, requested today.

The social security board cannot help you because your employer's tax return will not have reached the board in time to permit it to make available a statement of your annual earnings for income tax returns.

Manager Pendergast said today that each year, "come income tax time," hundreds request statements of their annual earnings for use in making out income tax returns, because they know that the social security board keeps careful records of wages paid to workers in jobs covered by the old-age and survivors insurance system. It is on the basis of these records that benefits are calculated for the insured worker or his family.

Wages paid during the last three months of 1943 will be reported to the Collectors of Internal Revenue during January, Mr. Pendergast said. During February and March these reports will be forwarded to the Baltimore offices of the bureau of old-age and survivors insurance. There the wage amounts will be recorded in the social security account maintained for each individual worker. This will not be completed until the end of June.

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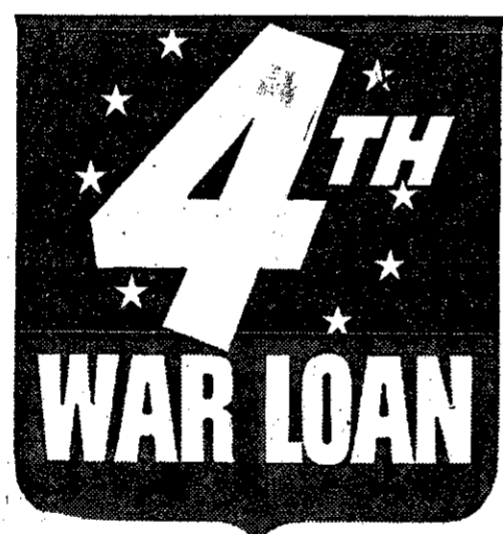
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
