## Schools' Second Waste Paper Pick-up Friday

### Urge Cooperation of Residents in Monthly Drive

"Here is a war job—a very urgent one—which school pupils like to do and can do well."

With these words, Lynn M. Bartlett, director of pupil personnel of the Grosse Pointe board of education, has called upon the Grosse

Pointe schools to help salvage waste paper for the second monthly school waste paper pickup tomorrow, Feb. 11.

Already the local schools have heeded the urgent call for this war emergency material and in their first drive on Jan. 7 collected 27,658 pounds of waste paper. "The collection of waste paper has become the No. 1 salvage job of the nation, exceeding in importance and urgency the collection of metal scrap," Mr. Bartlett explained.

He pointed out that "constantly growing demand for paper by our armed forces for the production of hundreds of military items has reduced the inventories of our paper mills to alarmingly low levels" and "the need for waste paper is becoming increasingly critical each day."

"Because of the seriousness of the situation," Mr. Bartlett continued, "I am calling upon each student in Grosse Pointe to do his and her share in the collection tomorrow and to the record which we chalked up in January to at least double the amount. I know we will be able to do it."

All public, private and parochial schools are participating in this drive. Residents who have no children in the local schools are asked to bring their waste paper to their nearest school.

**Additional Collections Made—**  
In addition to the monthly school collections which are carried on, the various municipalities are also making a special effort to correct the serious situation.

Grosse Pointe Park collects waste paper every other Saturday when village trucks pick up the bundles of cardboard, corrugated paper and other waste paper at the curbs of the municipality. Grosse Pointe Farms has rearranged its public works schedule to include a separate pickup of paper along with its collection of garbage and rubbish. The City continues with its salvage collection which has been operating for the past several years.

Although the municipal collection of waste paper has brought a great deal of paper to the salvage front, the school children are asked to search every "nook and cranny" for all scrap and waste paper for their drive tomorrow.

This letter was smuggled out of Greece by Lieut. Ernest A. Frey of the AAF. Mr. and Mrs. Bennett have vowed that they will find this unknown lad to thank him for sending this all-important letter, which arrived in a tattered, well-worn envelope, written in indelible pencil.

Oct. 26, 1943

Dear Mother and Dad:

I wonder if you will ever get this letter as I sit here trying to think what to tell you, so I can only hope. You must have been worried not receiving any letters from me lately so I'll tell you as much as I can.

I was shot down on a mission over German-held country, but lucky enough was rescued by pro-Allies and they are hiding me from the Germans. I was wounded quite badly but I still have my life, thank God. A doctor is looking after me and is very good and I should be able to travel in a month. I have been here quite some time now but have not had a chance to get a letter out but now four other Americans that were shot down in a bomber are starting back and am sending this letter with them.

I was unfortunate enough to hit the water going 300 miles per hour (the Bay of Corinth—Editor) and

### Pointe Mother Notified of Son Missing in Action

The war department notified Mrs. Carrie L. Fisher recently that her son, Lieut. William Fisher, 23, was reported missing in action over Germany since Jan. 11.

Overseas since September, 1943, Lieutenant Fisher is believed to have been a member of a Flying Fortress which participated in the huge raids over Germany on Jan. 9 and 10. It is not definite just what position he held on the Fortress although he has been commissioned a pilot.

A graduate of Grosse Pointe high school in 1939, Lieutenant Fisher enlisted in the armed forces in the spring of 1942 and has been in training in San Antonio, Texas, and Pine Bluff, Ark. He received his wings and commission as second lieutenant at the Blackland Army Flying school in Waco, Texas in April, 1943.

He has a brother, Lieut. James M. Fisher in the medical corps at Camp Van Dorn, Miss. The lieutenant's father is Dr. O. O. Fisher of 528 E. Grand boulevard.

### Alger Post to Assist War Veterans in Applying for Mustering-Out Pay

Alger Post 995, VFW, will have a committee available on Monday and Wednesday nights from eight to nine o'clock and on Sunday afternoons from three to seven o'clock to assist in making out the mustering-out payment applications for discharged servicemen who have been honorably discharged since Dec. 6, 1941.

Veterans to be eligible for the mustering-out payment must have been honorably discharged or released from active service on or after Dec. 7, 1941, from the army, navy, marines or coastguard or one of the components thereof, including the female reserve in each branch of the service. Only those members of the War who were discharged under honorable conditions on account of disability are entitled to the payment.

Since Dec. 6, 1941 approximately one million three hundred thousand discharges or releases have been given.

The bill provides payment of \$100 to veterans with less than 60 days active service; 60 days or more without foreign service, \$200, in two payments of \$100; 60 days or more with foreign service, \$300, payable in three \$100 monthly payments.

A person who becomes eligible for mustering out pay subsequent to approval of the law will receive their pay from the proper department without application.

He explained that there were cars parked near the cross street and evidently Wygal's vision was obstructed by them. Fiegel was not held by the police.

James K. Watkins is seeking his second term as president and is unopposed for the coming election. His term of office is for one year.

The only other candidate filed for office who has previously held a position on the board is John Sutton Jr., who is seeking his sixth term as a trustee. His two fellow members who are not running this year are Joseph W. Snay and Raymond C. Moore. Mr. Snay has been a member of the board for the past 21 years while Mr. Moore has served for the past three years.

The other four seeking a seat on the board are B. Dave Bushaw, Richard L. Maxon, John H. Flancher and William G. Kirby. Messrs. Bushaw and Maxon are seeking office for the first time while Mr. Flancher was a candidate in 1940 and was defeated in the primary and Mr. Kirby sought office in 1942 and lost in the election.

Clerk Harry A. Fuprton, Assessor Francis A. Beupre and Trésaurer Alonzo J. O'Connor are unopposed. Their terms are for one year.

### Need Final Spurt for Pointe Bond Drive

Already, \$2,149,018 has passed thru Grosse Pointe gallants hands for bonds of all denominations. The great majority of solicitors who have been seeking would-be bond purchasers have been the school children of the area. Together they have \$825,284 chalked up for the present drive.

The Grosse Pointe high school has not carried on its drive for the past week because of the change in school semesters. However, the students are preparing for one more day, the concluding day of the drive, in which to raise their total of \$398,725.

Country Day school is leading the private schools with a record total of \$251,625, closely followed by DUS with \$130,000 and Sacred Heart with \$88,500.

Kerby school tops the elementary schools with \$216,925; Pierce follows with \$95,450; Defer, \$9,850; Maire, \$39,000; Mason, \$22,250; Richard, \$20,875; Trombly, \$14,600, and Vernier, \$7,609.

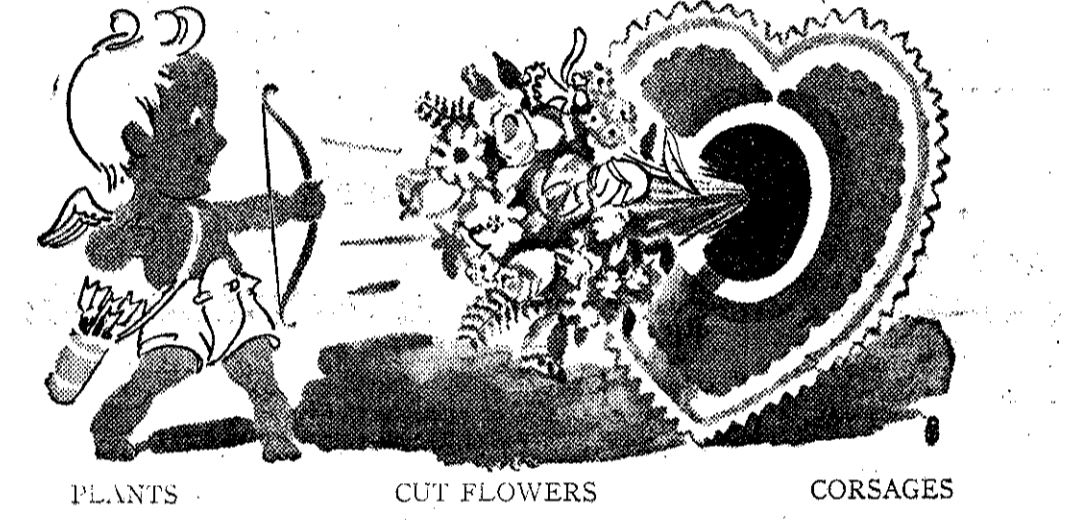

**I Am a Wac**



by LIEUT. FREDDIE BOYLE

Technician Fifth Grade Charlotte Friedly, one of the enlisted women on duty in the Detroit recruiting office, told me last week that many civilians ask her, "What about your officers?" She has given her answer in the following paragraphs:

"We enlisted women depend upon our officers. We expect them to set an example for us in conduct and appearance. We look to them for advice and assistance in doing our jobs as good soldiers should. In return, we respect them and their authority."

"To become a Wac officer, a woman must go through basic training as all Wacs do, and then further her training at a specialist school or work at an army installation. A woman must be in the Wac for three months before she may apply for officer candidate school. Before being accepted as an officer candidate, she must go before a board of two or three Wac officers.

"Perhaps the following officer's remark which I heard recently will explain, better than I can tell you, personal qualifications some Wacs have for a commission in the Women's Army Corps: A gentleman asked a Wac how she could become a captain in less than a year when it took his daughter, who is an army nurse, three years to get her training. The Wac captain answered, 'Sir, it took me 40 years to become a cap-

tain' . . . You see, our officers are qualified by previous civilian experience and training. Some of them are assigned as adjutants, classification and special services officers, etc. These women replace male officers as we replace enlisted men."

Well said, T-5 Friedly . . . I want to add just this one thought. During the first week of officer candidate school, a lieutenant colonel spoke to our class . . . "Each of you wonder whether you will be a good officer," he said. "This is the test: If you can put the welfare of your enlisted women above your own welfare, you will be the ideal officer." And in the same vein, a brigadier general told another officer candidate class this: "Don't forget that you were once a private."



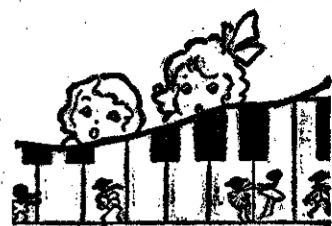

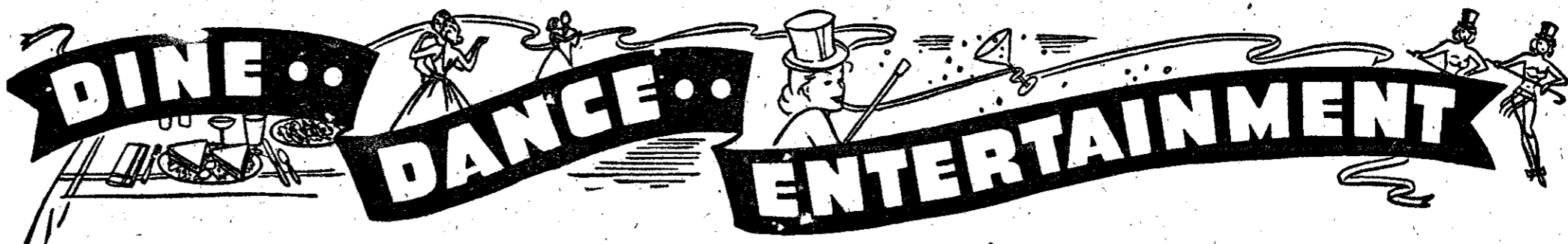

With 20 years of living in China, six of them in close association with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, George W. Shepherd has acquired an enviable insight into many little known phases of the Far Eastern situation.

In 1933 stupendous problems of social and economic reconstruction faced Chiang Kai-Shek in the areas where he had driven out the Chinese Communist troops. He invited fellow-Christians to develop a rural reconstruction unit in devastated Kiangsi and Dr. Shepherd was appointed one of the first co-directors of the unit. The next year, when the New Life Movement was founded, Dr. Shepherd was made a member of its board of directors.

A Congregational minister and career missionary of the American board of commissioners for foreign missions, Dr. Shepherd was lent by this board for the New Life Movement. In 1935 Dr. Shepherd was asked by the generalissimo to make his headquarters in Nanking as an adviser to the New Life Movement.

He was there during the historic development that resulted in the unification of China, the Sian kidnaping and the July, 1937 Marco Polo Bridge attack.

An enthusiast for an overwhelming victory for the United States, Dr. Shepherd believes implicitly that the only sure and lasting foundation of a new and better world is the spiritual understanding between races.
