### Parents Receive Awards in Absence of Hero Sons

A Grosse Pointe father and a Pointe mother received medals in their sons' names last Saturday at presentation ceremonies held at Selfridge Field. The two Pointe heroes were among the 17 Michigan army flyers who were so honored at the ceremonies.

Courtney D. Allington Sr., of 77 Moross road, received the Air Medal in the name of his son, Sergt. Courtney D. Allington Jr., who was reported missing since July 2. Sergeant Allington was a radio operator in the troop carrier command in the North African theatre of war; he was on a ship transporting paratroopers. It is believed that his plane became lost while flying over Sicily.

Three Oak Leaf Clusters were presented to Mrs. Myrtle M. Stone of 1336 Berkshire in the name of her son, Capt. William C. Stone who was reported missing prior to July 8. Captain Stone, a graduate of Grosse Pointe high school in 1938, was an operations officer in the AAF, and while on a bombing mission last summer, his plane fell into the Mediterranean Sea after a collision with another plane off the coast of Sicily.

Farms Engineer Murray Smith, reported to the board of trustees, that on Feb. 23, Macomb county stopped discharging their sewage through the Farms' pumping station to the Detroit system and went back to direct discharge of all their sewage into Lake St. Clair.

He said that it appears that altho the individual communities in lower Macomb county agreed a year or so ago to stop polluting Lake St. Clair and to discharge their sanitary sewage into an intercepting sewer which is connected to the Detroit sewage disposal system for treatment, still these communities never made provisions for the collection or payment of the necessary treatment charges.

Since the presentation of awards is still a little new to Sergeant Moffat, he was a little nervous when Gen. James Doolittle pinned the medal on him. He said in a letter to his parents, "I was more scared at the presentation ceremonies than I was over Berlin."

TIN CANS FOR GAS MASKS

Now that the invasion of Europe is imminent, you will be helping the armed forces more than ever if you prepare and turn in all of your tin cans on the next collection date, April 15, for they are vitally needed in the manufacture of gas masks. We don't know what to expect from the enemy and as a result more of the new cannister type gas masks are needed for our servicemen. The new gas mask is a tin can attached to a mask which fits over the face. The cans have an ingenious chemical filter within them that turns the gas, which is breathed in through openings in the can, into pure fresh air.

A LITTLE MORE CO-OPERATION

We have been asked again by the police departments of Grosse Pointe to warn the public that a little more co-operation is needed on their part if the party, or parties, who have been terrorizing the Pointe within the past few months, is to be brought to justice. Red Cross Given \$128.49; Penny Adds to Total

It was just a routine check at Bethany school, 11475 E. Outer Drive, to see whether all the money had been brought in for the Junior Red Cross. The 8th and 9th grade room had reported \$17.50, the largest

amount for the school. The 6th and 7th graders were informed that their total was \$17.49, just one cent less. For a moment they were crestfallen. Then one boy jumped up and said, "We'll fix that." In just a few minutes pockets were emptied and a shower of coins poured out on the teacher's desk. Some had to be cautioned to save get their bus fare. The sixth and seventh grade room led with \$20.00.

The upper grade room heard that with dismay, but in precisely three minutes \$8.88 was jubilantly placed in the collection box. Final total, \$26.30 to \$20. The news spread to the other rooms and the next morning the other children got into the competition. That penny brought rich returns. The fund stood at \$61.62 when the provocative coin moved into the picture. At the campaign's end the total collection was \$128.49, and the Red Cross had \$66.87 additional to spend for the needs of the soldiers and sailors who are fighting our war. 





### Chinese Orphanage Director Saves the Lives of 800

For saving the lives of 800 Chinese orphans by her quick thinking, Miss C. Y. Li, director of an orphanage in Chekiang Province, received a commendation from Mme. Chiang Kai-Shek.

News of Miss Li's exploit was received this week by the war chest of metropolitan Detroit which assists the Chinese through its affiliate, the United China Relief.

A few months ago enemy guns were firing only five miles from the orphanage. On her own initiative Miss Li evacuated the orphans. She started walking inland with her hundreds of small charges. Wherever she found a kindly farm family she left a few of the children. In this way she found temporary homes for the entire 800.

weeks later, she gathered up her charges and returned to the orphanage. She discovered that the authorities had burned the building as a precaution against plague, which had broken out in the area.

Retracing her route she again "fanned out" the children who are now very proud of the fact that, through helping their hosts on the farms, they are learning farming and are, in a measure, self-supporting.

The China Aid couch of United China Relief has been asked to build another orphanage for Miss Li's charges. When that is done, the children intend to farm the nearby wasteland while resuming their education.

### Fire Chief Warns Against Dangers of 'Exposure' Fires

Fire Chief Rector today warned against the dangers of "exposure" fires. "When a spark from a bonfire sets fire to a neighbor's roof, or when a fire in one building spreads to another—that's an 'exposure' fire," the chief explained. "Exposure fires are bad because they often make fire-fighting double work, and, once a fire starts to spread, it may keep right on going until the whole community is threatened."

Exposure fires may occur wherever buildings lacking fire resistive construction are built close together, the chief said. Under such conditions a fire can quickly spread from one structure to another. If outdoor rubbish, high grass, oil-soaked garage floors and similar hazards are allowed to go uncorrected, the danger of a fast-spreading fire becomes just that much greater.

The chief suggested that homeowners clean up the grounds around their homes, refrain from building fires outdoors except in approved type incinerators, install fire-resistive roofs, erect spark arresters over chimneys, observe the rules for "good housekeeping" indoors, and keep private fire-fighting equipment in serviceable condition.

To store and building owners he

offered much the same advice, adding, however, that all vertical openings should be protected by fire stops, that walls between sections of the same building should be made fire retardant and that combustible outside construction, such as overhanging roofs and cornices, should be eliminated.

### Status of Health Professionals Given by Commission

Status of physicians, dentists, nurses, veterinarians, and sanitary engineers under WMC stabilization programs was clarified Monday by Edward L. Cushman, acting state director of the manpower agency.

Cushman said if workers in these professions are self-employed, they are permitted to accept employment without regard to employment stabilization procedure, unless they are subject to controlled referral through WMC's U. S. employment service under the stabilization program in effect in the area in which they reside.

"Persons in these professions who are employed in other than 'essential' or 'locally necessary' activities," Cushman stated, "also may be hired without regard for the employment stabilization plan unless they are to be employed for work in a locally controlled occupation or are members of a group which is subject to controlled referral."

"However, persons in these professions who are employed in essential or locally necessary activities are subject to provisions of the employment stabilization program, the same as other workers in such activities," he continued. "The determination of eligibility for a statement of availability or a referral is made by the USES in the same manner as for other workers."

If workers in these professions may be hired only upon referral by the USES, that agency is required by WMC regulation to obtain the advice of the state chairman of the procurement and assignment service before making the referral. Purpose of this restriction is to make sure the worker is referred to the job in which he or she can make the greatest contribution to the war effort, Cushman pointed out.

The WMC official stated that none of the area employment stabilization plans now in effect in Michigan provides for controlled referral of physicians, dentists, nurses, veterinarians, or sanitary engineers.


He said appeals of workers in these professions or of their employers are treated according to the pro-

cedures and instructions governing appeals involving any essential or locally necessary worker. However, he added, it is mandatory that the WMC area director seek the advice of the procurement and assignment service and transmit recommendations to the WMC area labor-management committee before the case is heard.

### Farms to Match State Funds for Post-War Activity

The board of trustees of Grosse Pointe Farms adopted a resolution Monday evening for the appropriation in this year's budget of \$4,626 to be used on a 50-50 matching basis with state funds for the preparation of plans and specifications on post-war plans. For this reason, a definite program of authorized projects will be achieved for the village.

### ★ I Am a Wac ★

Most women who think about joining the Women's Army Corps want to know what basic training is like. So I am devoting this column to the description of a typical day at a Wac training center.

First of all, contrary to most people's ideas, the getting-up hour is not the same on every post, and it customarily changes with the season of the year. Usually, it is six or six-thirty. The Wac whose name appears on the duty roster as barracks police turns on the lights in the barracks at the proper time and calls out some variation of "rise and shine." Wacs in GI pajamas roll out of lower bunks and clamber sleepily down from uppers, grab soap, wash cloths, towels and tooth paste, and scurry off to the latrine in the rear of the barracks. Most "rookies" go off the heavy makeup standard for the five weeks of basic training because morning dressing-time is only fifteen minutes. A whistle blows for reveille, and everyone rushes outside to fall into her regular place in formation.

After reveille, beds must be made GI fashion, floors swept and everything put in order for daily inspection. Breakfast is around seven and formation-time for the first class comes shortly before eight. Instruction in military courtesy, close-order drill, organization of the army, etc., occupy the rest of the day until four or four-thirty. Ten-minute breaks between classes prevent writer's cramp from note-taking. And an hour at noon provides time for "mess" and mail-call, two very important morale-builders in any army. At five the entire company forms for retreat. Five-thirty finds hungry "skirted soldiers" lined up for "evening chow" at the mess hall. After supper Wacs are free until bed-check at about 10:45. They spend their evenings at the company day-room, writing letters, listening to the radio or phonograph, or they gather at the post service club for table tennis and dancing.

Most "rookies" enjoy the rush and novelty of basic training, and all of them show marked improvement as a result of army discipline.


