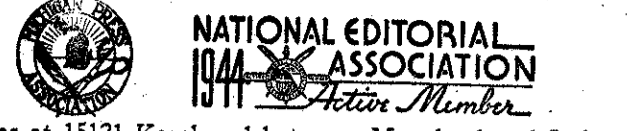

Kids, Fly Your Kite in the Open!

"Build your kite frame of wood, just like a Mosquito Bomber" is the advice given to youngsters today by teachers, Scout leaders and employees of The Detroit Edison company.

It was explained that flying kites near overhead wires constitutes a hazard to children whose kites or kite strings touch the wires. Flying kites away from electric lines will eliminate this danger.

In addition, the following rules were offered for kite flying safety:

Use cotton rags for kite tail. For kite string use cotton twine (no wire, tinsel or metal in cord). Wet string or any other wet material, like a wire, will conduct electricity. For this reason, it is dangerous to fly kites in a storm. String that is soaked from lying in puddles or wet grass should be dried out thoroughly before it is used.

Clean-up Time Is Paper Time

Spring is the time for clean-up campaigns and we are hoping that this will add impetus to the waste paper drive for the paper situation continues to remain critical. Paper mills in nearby Monroe, Mich., have been forced to close one to two days per week because of the lack of waste paper, even though army ordinance is putting constant pressure on the mills to increase deliveries of shipping cartons.

In Grosse Pointe Park, the Farms and the City, the regular pickup of waste paper is made by the municipal trucks on their regular runs throughout the community. Through this concentrated effort of these three communities, the waste paper from the households reach the mills and eventually into war production.

# SERVICE PARADE

Preparing to take over the important duties of a shore-stationed male yeoman, Mary F. Curto, 20, 912 Rivard boulevard, Grosse Pointe, has enrolled in the naval training school for women reservist yeomen on the Iowa State Teachers college campus, Cedar Falls, Iowa.

Past civilian experience and "boot" training aptitude tests were the basis for her selection to the specialty school.

Successful completion of the 12 weeks course makes the feminine Bluejacket eligible for a petty officer rating before she is sent to active duty at some naval shore station.

One of the first pieces of information I heard when I went to Ft. Des Moines for basic training was "Remember that you are first a lady." Our commanding officer took pains to explain that even though we were entering upon a course designed to train us to be soldiers, we were to retain our femininity.

As I learned more and more about what it meant to be a Wac, I found nothing in the training that would threaten to lessen a woman's feminine charm. Basic training was not entirely new to me, not even drill. For I had learned a smattering of military formations in high school physical training. We went to school every day in basic. I have been going to school practically all my life; so, except for the difference in subjects taught, I did not find the army system of education essentially different from that used in big schools and colleges. It certainly offered no threat to my femininity. Our physical training instructors did not teach boxing or football. Instead, they put us through a planned routine of exercises designed to loosen muscles and keep us in shape.

There was more housekeeping to be done than I was used to handling, but house work has never been considered a man's job, so I couldn't see why all the fuss about the fact that life in the Wac might make us feminine replicas of Superman.

Our uniform is not manish either. In fact, except for the color, it is not very much different from many of the spring suits you will see in the Easter parade this year.

Some of the work assigned to us was of a mechanical nature, that which is customarily considered a "man's job." But I cannot see how driving a nail tends to coarsen a woman any more than washing the dinner dishes does.

I finally decided that our commanding officer had no real fear of our losing femininity. Perhaps she only felt it necessary to remind us we are ladies because up until May of 1942, the army was always considered a stag organization.

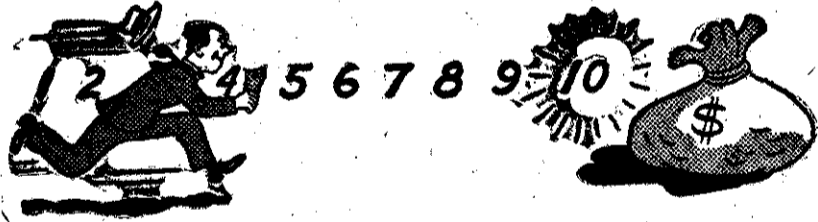

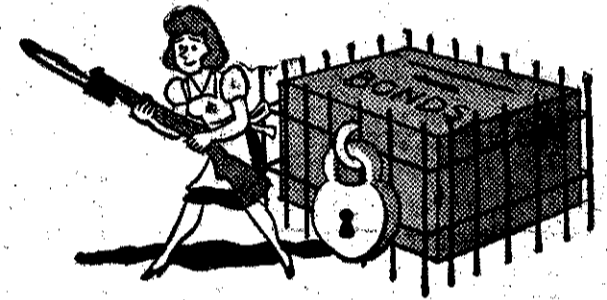

Dear Sir:

I have certainly appreciated receiving The Grosse Pointe Review all these weeks. I arrived here at Great Lakes on Sept. 17, 1943, and it certainly struck me as a huge place.

I am in my tenth week of a 16-week course at storekeeper school and it is quite a large dose packed into only 16 weeks. We had four weeks of general store keeping, one week ship's stores, one week clothing and small stores, one week provisions, one week aviation accounting, and the last eight weeks are devoted to naval disbursing.

During all these weeks we have one period of typing a day and the last eight weeks we also have a course in English and correspondence. All in all, there is quite a bit packed into those short 16 weeks.

The Review has been very helpful in passing away a few spare moments that we have now and then. I graduated from the high school in 1936 and I see names of fellows and girls I knew then and it brings back memories. I want to thank you again for The Review and I wonder if you

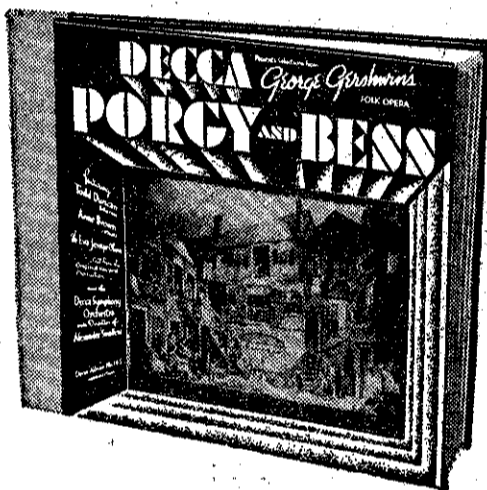

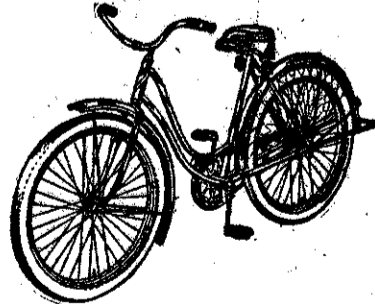

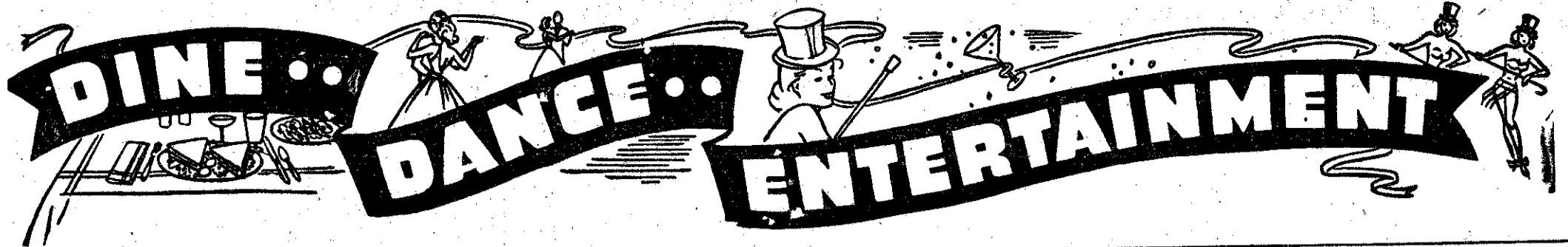

At that time, Commander Bulkeley was wearing a heavy beard and "looked like a Spanish pirate, a sea wolf of the old days," to quote Quezon who at first was doubtful about trusting the unidentified stranger. But Quezon did, ad. escaped. Later General MacArthur presented Bulkeley to Quezon in Australia, after the commander had shaved and donned a clean uniform. "You know Lieutenant Bulkeley," said MacArthur.

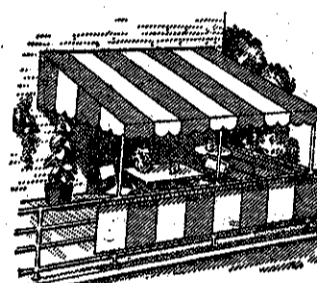

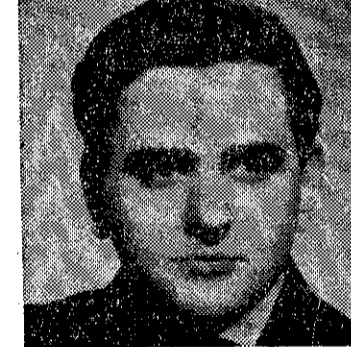

**Young Woods Father Dies at His Home; to Be Buried Friday**

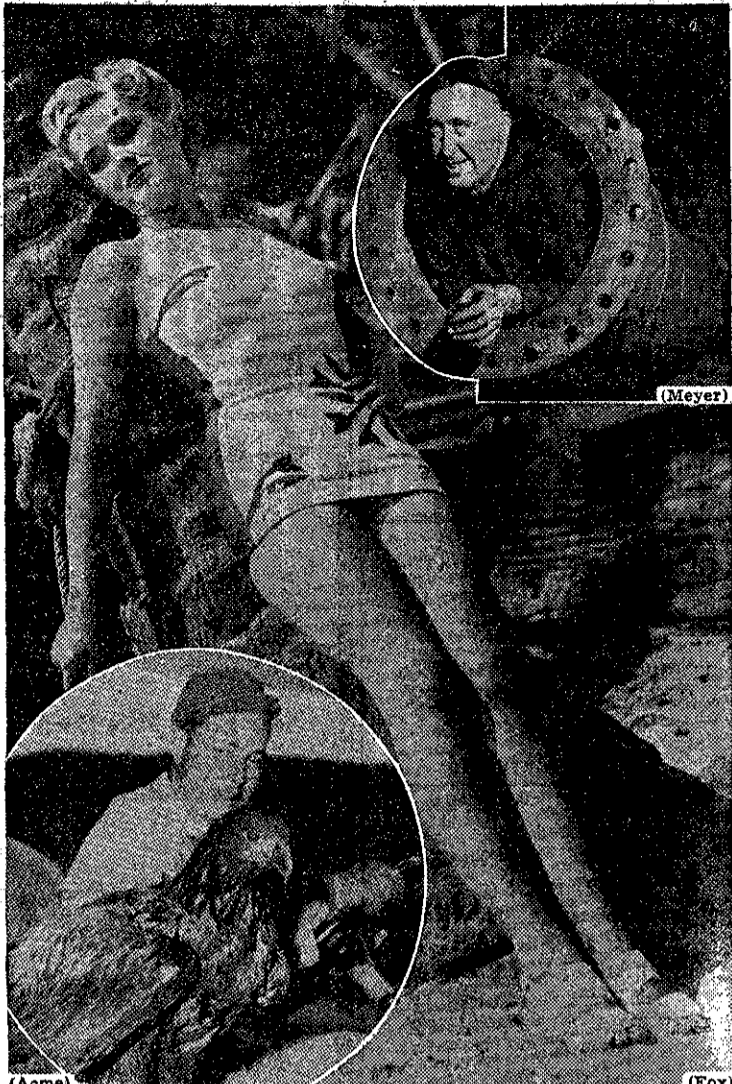

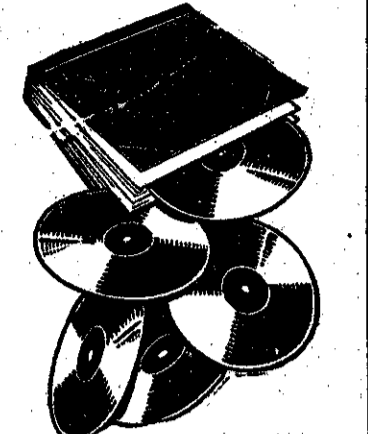

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The follow-  
ing is one of a series of stories  
about life at the Waves training  
school, Hunter college, N. Y. It  
was prepared by young women at  
this school where all Waves, in-  
cluding those from Michigan, get  
their initial six weeks' indoctrina-  
tion.

We come from large cities and  
small towns, from farms and offices  
and schools. We come from every  
part of the United States and its  
possessions. Our backgrounds are as  
varied as our personalities and in  
civilian life many of us would never  
have met.

Today we are united by a single  
purpose. Our way of life has been  
challenged and we have been given  
an opportunity to help meet the  
challenge. None can say that we did  
not meet it with the determination  
to win that has been bred in us thru  
the generations of American women  
who pioneered for the life we are  
defending.

From the day we arrive at the  
naval training school in the Bronx,  
N. Y., and are issued our seamen's  
hats and GI shoes, we feel our re-  
sponsibility. Our story is the story of  
all "boots" (recruits in training)  
learning to fight shoulder to should-  
er with the men of the navy.

Fresh tang of navy atmosphere  
smacks the recruit when, shortly af-  
ter arrival, she finds herself in com-  
pany with other girls, marching thru  
barracks and "falling out" at the  
apartment she will share with other  
shipmates during "boot" training.

The fascinating change from civil-  
ian individuality to Wave uniformity  
starts as soon as the bunks are  
claimed and mysteries of their mak-  
ing unfolded. Feminine garments  
with laces and ribbons suddenly be-  
come known as "gear."

The familiar long mirror gives  
way to a pocket mirror which must  
answer all needs. The tub loses its  
status as a bubble-bath haven and  
turns into a "big some thing" to be  
scouted.

The "boot" finds she must bunk  
with more shipmates than she has  
ever lived with before, "stow her  
gear" in closer quarters . . . but  
when all's said and done, she knows  
these experiences in the navy will  
take their place with such treasured  
memories as the "first date."

**Postmaster Suggests  
for Soldiers at  
Overseas Stations**

Postmaster Roscoe B. Huston an-  
nounces that instructions concerning  
articles that may be mailed to the  
army forces overseas have just been  
received from Washington which it  
is believed will be of more than ordi-  
nary interest to the mailing public.

Heretofore no parcels were accept-  
able for mailing to these forces un-  
less the articles enclosed therein  
were requested. Exceptions were  
made to essentials such as watches,  
eyeglasses, pens, etc., up to 8 ounces,  
provided they were sealed and sent  
at the first class rate of 3 cents per  
ounce.

In accordance with the instruc-  
tions received, all mailable merchan-  
dise may now be accepted up to 8  
ounces without request therefore,  
under the conditions shown above.  
Care must be taken by mailers of  
course to exclude perishable matter  
and prohibited articles. Considera-  
tion must be given to the long de-  
lays and extremes of atmospheric  
temperatures these parcels will be  
subjected to in transit. Such articles  
as prepared meats, soft candy, cer-

tain pastries, nut meats or sealed, or  
any other article liable to become  
mouldy or rancid should not be sent.  
Matches, lighter fluid, narcotics,  
liquors and obscene matter are pro-  
hibited in the mails and declared un-  
mailable.

The following and similar articles

are suggested as suitable for mail-  
ing:  
Leather goods, hard candy, sta-  
tionery, playing cards, soap, shaving  
kits, toilet articles, flashlights, pens  
and pencils, sewing kits, first aid kits,  
shoe polish, magazines, newspapers,  
books, watches, name bracelets, cig-  
arettes, cigars, tobacco, and clothing.

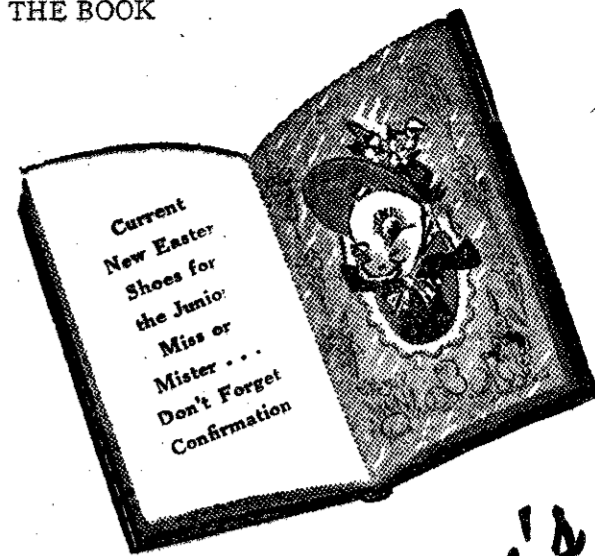

**Workers Over 65  
Should Consult  
Board When Quitting**

Workers in business and industry,  
65 or older, should file claims for  
old age retirement insurance with  
the social security board when they  
have to leave their jobs in the event  
of illness.

Managers of the field office staffs  
of the board are reporting that too  
many workers of retirement age are  
failing to make proper application  
for insurance benefits when such ill-  
ness occurs.

Some workers fail to file claims in-  
tentionally, thinking they will go  
back to work very soon, so they will  
not need retirement benefits. Others  
quite correctly believe that if they  
file for benefits at once, their benefit  
amounts will be frozen from then  
on and they will never expect to re-  
ceive anything larger.

Social security officials believe,  
however, if a man in covered em-  
ployment becomes ill and is off a  
month or more he should be entitled  
to receive insurance benefits. If he  
goes back to work after his illness,  
the benefits of course will stop but  
they will also have served as a form  
of sickness benefit which he would  
not otherwise have received.

He must be fully insured in order  
to receive benefits, and failure to  
file at once on becoming ill might  
affect his insurance status, particu-  
larly his benefit amount.

It is very definitely recommended  
that a worker in such circumstances  
consult, or have a friend or relative

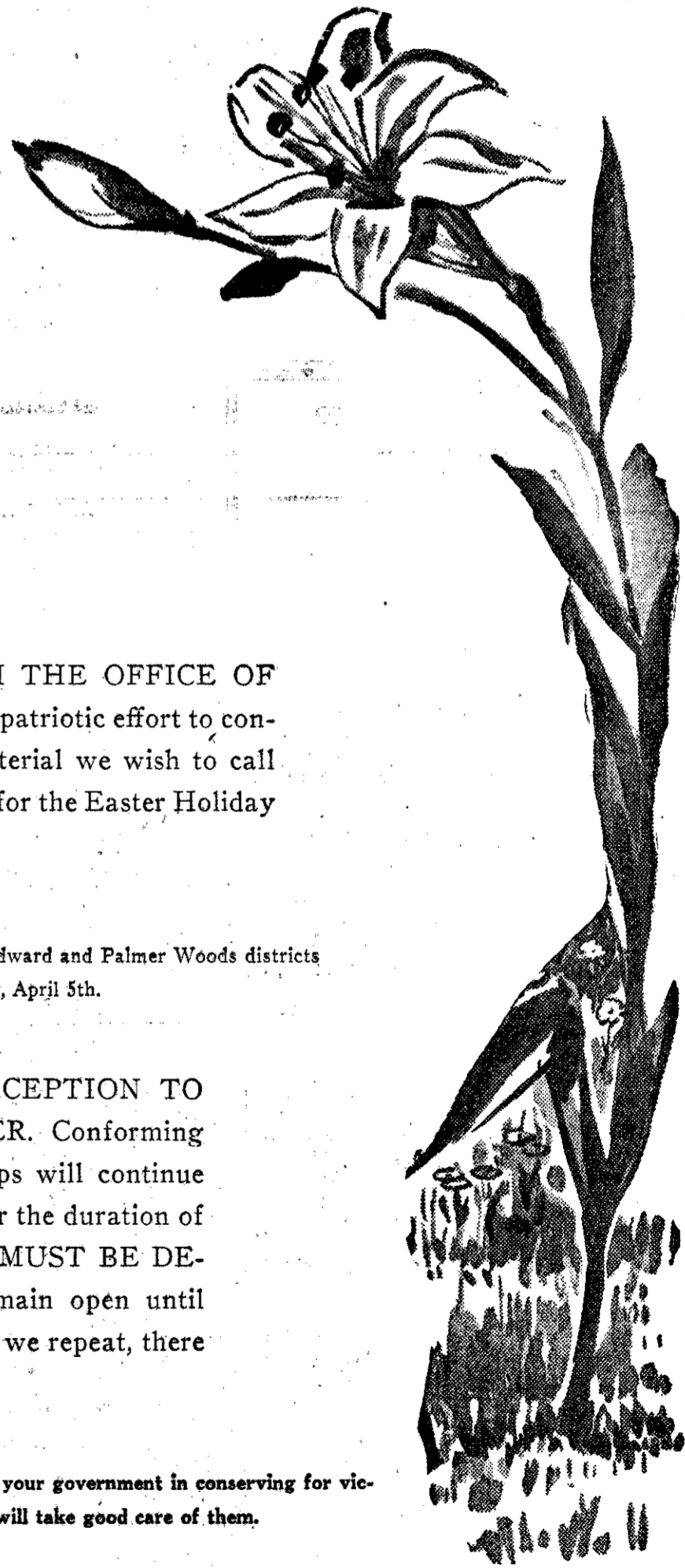
