## Postal Authorities Seek Location for Branch

### Plan Send-offs for Men Entering Army and Navy

The first sendoff to be held in several weeks in Grosse Pointe will take place next Tuesday, April 11 at the Neighborhood Club. At this time, twenty-two young men will leave for service in the U. S. Army.

After the usual sendoff ceremonies which the Home Front Committee and the Breakfast Club sponsor for the boys, they will leave for the railroad station in Detroit.

Three days later, a group of 20

men will leave for the navy, and sendoff ceremonies will also see these boys at the Neighborhood club, Friday morning, April 14, at 9:30. Norbert Neff, chairman of the Home Front committee, asks that all servicemen and women who are home on furlough visit with the boys at the sendoff on both Tuesday and Friday morning. Suitable quarters for postal purposes are asked at or in the vicinity of the intersection of Kercheval avenue and Notre Dame, which is

Important consideration must be given as to reasonable central location and accessibility to rear entrance for mails. The post department usually makes provision for a five or ten year lease for quarters. Cast in this role of a recruiting sergeant for the Wac, the Hollywood singing star is to recruit eligible women for duty as air Wacs with the army transport command — and Sergeant Autry was never more serious about a job . . . No publicity stunt to attract the young women who aspire to a career in the moving pictures . . . but . . . the deadly serious business of interviewing all qualified prospects, for only those eligible for enlistment are being permitted to talk with Sergeant Autry.

Sergeant Autry has been in the army almost eighteen months. During most of that time he produced a weekly network radio show for the AAF at the Santa Ana army air base. Transferred recently to the air transport command he is now stationed at Romulus army air base. The air transport command, which operates a world-wide ferrying task, is now conducting a campaign to enlist several thousand Wacs, explains Sergeant Autry. They will be trained as weather observers, photographic laboratory technicians, auto drivers, draftsmen, link trainer instructors, parachute riggers and for dozens of other important and interesting jobs.

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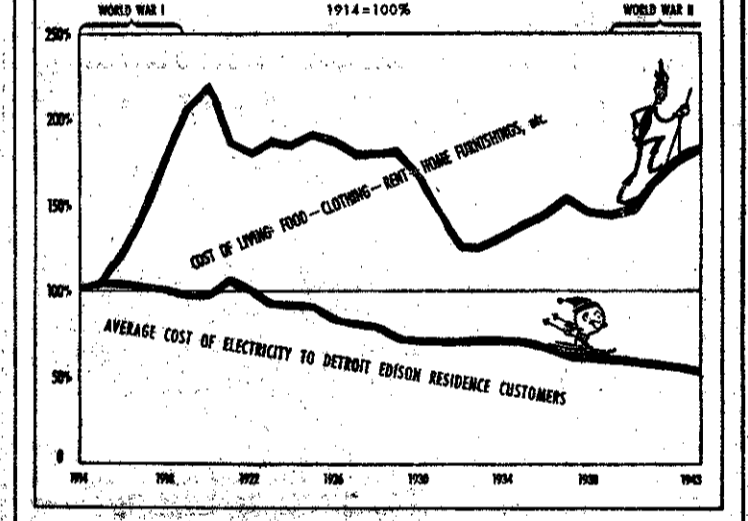

### Open River Traffic Between Cleveland, Detroit Saturday

Opening of the 1944 passenger and freight navigation season on the Great Lakes considerably earlier than last year, the D & C steamer

City of Detroit III made its initial run between Detroit and Cleveland Saturday night, according to James MacMillan, general manager of the Detroit and Cleveland Navigation company. "It is fortunate that an unusually mild winter has permitted this early sailing," he explained, "because of the need for additional transportation facilities to handle the great number of wartime travellers between these two industrial centers was never greater. Anticipating an early sailing we had the D & C steamers ready for sailing well in advance of the usual opening date."

D & C boats are now leaving Detroit and Cleveland each night at 11:30 and arriving in each city the next morning at 7.

"With the extremely congested condition of other types of transportation and with the scarcity of hotel accommodations, it is expected that the 1944 season will be one of the largest in the 76 year history of the D & C Lines," MacMillan said. "Consequently we have made preparations to handle capacity crowds throughout the season."

In addition to relieving the travel congestion between these two cities, the regular nightly D & C sailings will aid considerably in the movement of freight between these industrial areas, it was said. "When the D & C season is fully under way, we have capacity for carrying more than one thousand tons of freight nightly," MacMillan explained.

D & C steamers to Buffalo will start about May 1, but the definite opening date will not be determined until later this month, it was said. D & C cruise ships will start operation in June.



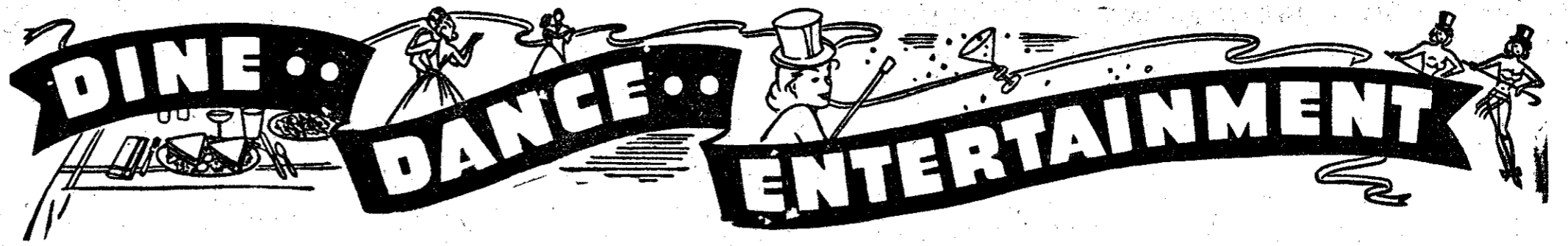

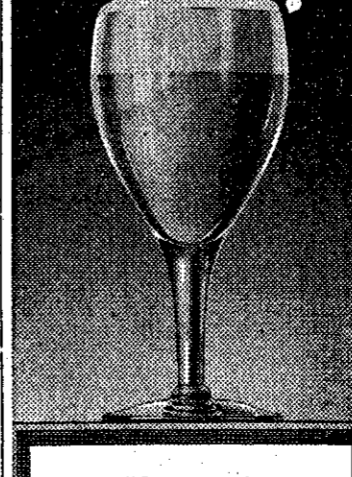

### Take Final Action on Question of Leaves of Absence

The question of police and firemen leaving Grosse Pointe Farms to enter the armed forces was finally settled at the board of trustees meeting last week, with the adoption of a resolution, allowing under certain conditions, the reemployment of the employees after their return from service.

It was decided that all regular men in the police and fire forces who are drafted or who enlist into the armed forces will be reinstated in their jobs, subject to the following terms and conditions.

That they be honorably discharged from the armed forces; that they are physically and mentally still qualified to perform the duties of such a position; that application be made within 40 days after the applicant's discharge; and that the council approves of the reinstatement.

It was further agreed that upon the reinstatement of the policeman or fireman in his respective position, he shall be considered to have had a leave of absence without pay and will again be able to benefit from the village pension fund.

Previous to the adoption of the above resolution, action was taken to rescind two resolutions adopted in September and December, respectively, regarding the granting of a leave of absence to Walter Hoyt, who joined the navy; and Jack Paisley who left for army service. By rescinding these resolutions and adopting the final one last Thursday, all police men and firemen, leaving for service, will be governed in the manner in respect to the granting of leaves of absence.

### 'Pistol Packin' Lads Found by Police in Pine Woods

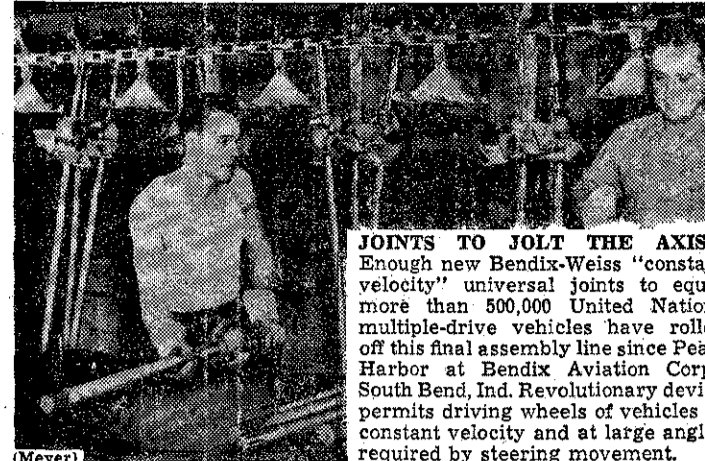
