Park Youth Applies for Admission to College at Age 15


Richard Sidney Collins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kins Collins, 757 Westchester, Grosse Pointe Park, who has applied for admission to the college of the University of Chicago under the "Chicago Plan" - college student at 15; college graduate at 18 will compete with 179 high school students from 34 states on April 22 for a free-tuition scholarship.

He will be seeking one of 24 national scholarships, ranging in value from \$300 to \$2,400 and covering one to four year's tuition, in the college, which has proved to be the fastest growing in the country with a 64 per cent enrollment increase over the past year.

In keeping with the revolutionary college program itself, aptitude and not a mass of unrelated facts will be the basis of the scholarship examination. The test will be given at the University of Chicago and simultaneously in 129 cities throughout the United States.

Richard who is 15 years old and junior at Cranbrook high school, will be eligible at the completion of the present term to enter the college. At the end of three years, when most college students will traditionally begin their junior year, he will already rave completed his basic liberal education and received his bachelor's

Students may enter the college of he university anytime after the end of the sophomore year and obtain their bachelor's degrees from 27 months to four years later. The plan was adopted in January, 1942, after five years' experiment on the Midway, and has borne out Pres. Robert M. Hutchins' belief that students between 15 and 18 are ready for mature education. The plan also has made it possible for boys to complete their college work before in-





Important Work Carried on by **Cancer Committee**

Over one hundred thousand cancer dressings have been made and distributed this last year by the Women's Field Army of the American Society for the Control of Cancer. Every community has had a share in this work. The Girl Scouts, the Camp. Fire Girls, the Girl Reserves, church groups and social groups have all united in this great health work. The AWVS and the auxiliary of the Jewish War Veterans maintained workrooms devoted to the making of

these cancer dressings. These dressings are made from salvage material which has been donated by housewives - old sheets, tablecloths, men's shirts, in fact, anything that is white and absorbent is usable. The Women's Field Army furnishes the cellulose filler. These cancer dressings are distributed to the various hospitals throughout the city. Eloise alone takes 15,000 a month. The Visiting Nurses Association cannot speak too highly in praise of these dressings as they are able to distribute thousands of them to indigent cancer patients. The tremendous volume of pads required is explained by the fact that every cancer patient uses from 12 to 15 every day and they are immediately destroyed. This service is available to anyone in need of these dressings.

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
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
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
